Homeless Shelter for families will serve North Channel

Elswick details Baytown Facility at North Shore Rotary meeting

NORTH CHANNEL - Rotarians heard from Roger Elswick last week, about the planned Family Center to serve homeless families in the Bay Area Homeless Service

Elswick is the campaign chair for the fundraising effort to build, furnish and equip the new center. The goal is to raise \$1.2 million for this unique project.

Elswick is CEO of Community Toyota/Honda/Kia in Baytown, and devotes much of his time to worthwhile civic causes. He was accompanied in his presentation by Jim Wadzin-

ski and BAHS executive director Bill Eckert.

Elswick explained that although the BAHS has been in existence since 1982, it serves homeless men, women and

children in separate facilities. What was needed was a family facility, so that BAHS did not have to split them up. The new building, when completed in 2015, will be 6000 square feet in size, and have six family suites, dining areas, kitchen play area, office, and living room. It will be unique in East Harris County, with no other similar facility available for homeless families, he said.

BAHS service area is East Harris County, Chamber, and Liberty counties. This includes Channelview, North Shore, Sheldon, Galena Park,

World Championships.
This spring, Team KAOS, the robotics team from Gale-na Park High School, compet-ed in the South Texas VEX Championship tournament.

There were 66 teams that had previously qualified from prior events across the state and Mexico that participated in this event.

After some hard fought qualifying matches, the girls' team finished the competition as semi-finalists and the boys team finished as finalists. This qualified both teams for the VEX World Championships that will be held at Disney Land, Anaheim, California on April 23-26, with an expected 600 teams competing from

around the world.

The boys' team was also awarded the Energy Award for the competition, which is based on team enthusiasm displayed at the event. The winning team must demonstrate boundless passion and energy throughout the competition - in the pit area, on the field, and in the audience, even when their robot is not in ac-

The team mentor and GPHS teacher, Paul Johnson, was awarded the Teacher of the Year Award at the contest. Mr. Johnson has been a career and technology teacher with

Astrid Cavazos, Team KAOS Robotics Co-President, stated, "Three years ago, Mr. Johnson embraced the initiative to become the team's lead mentor. Since then, Team KAOS has flourished and succeeded to new heights. Mr. Johnson is a huge advocate of ensuring that his students are always placed before himself. We believe that Mr. Johnson is one of Team KAOS' biggest assets. The team depicts values in him that could never be

Under his leadership, the robotics students at GPHS have earned almost \$800,000 in scholarship money over the past four years and are currently attending various universities under engineering disciplines. One of the many characteristics which make GPISD such a special district is a single focus on student achievement and success. The Aspiring Administrator Academy is designed to communicate these expectations, along with many




Kuhrt receives award from state assessment group

Do you call this progress? I don't

Women throughout Texas have suffered a devastating loss of lifesaving access to health care. Over the last several years, more than 200,000 Texas women have lost their access to basic health care including cancer screenings, birth control, and the providers they trust. Seventy-six neighborhood health centers have had to close their doors.

The real life impact of these policies is severe and heartbreaking. Access to quality, affordable health care is not a political issue, no matter how much partisans in power have tried to make it one. It is a deeply personal issue. When a woman finds a lump in her breast, only to learn that the health care center she relied on is closed, no amount of political posturing alleviates her deep fear. When a woman in the Rio Grande Valley loses access to her annual exam, there is no talking point that will give her back the care she needs.

But now, in an infuriating and insulting twist, it seems as if those who caused such harm expect Texas women to send them Thank You cards. Despite all facts and experience to the contrary, those who cut access to care would like Texas women to believe their access has improved. It is outrageous to decimate women's access to basic health care. It is even more outrageous to deny the realities of hundreds of thousands of Texas women.

Texas women, however, are anything but stupid. They understand the real world impact these policies have caused in their lives. Last summer made very clear that women are paying attention, and they know what harm has been dealt

The facts are that in 2011 the Texas Legislature slashed funding for the state's family planning program by two-thirds and implemented a tiered funding system that excluded specialty family planning providers like Planned Parenthood from the program. As a result, Texas' family planning program served only 75,160 women in 2012—63% fewer women than in 2011—and paid 15% more per client for care. This reduced access to birth control is expected to cos Texas tax payers up to \$273

As a direct result of these policies, 76 health centers


have closed or stopped providing family planning services and another 55 providers have reduced their

During the most recent legislative session, the Texas Legislature adopted a biennial budget for 2014-15 that added \$100 million in new funding to the state's primary care program for women's health, including family planning. But this new funding will primarily go to organizations that have not traditionally been the lead provider of family planning services in Texas. Despite the infusion of funding, Texas is still struggling to provide care for being served before the budget shredding in 2011.

In yet another move to politicize women's health care, in 2011, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission adopted rules that would exclude Planned Parenthood from the Medicaid Women's Health Program. Nearly 40% of the women in the program relied on Planned Parenthood for cancer screenings, birth control, and other preventive health care.

In order to circumvent federal law preventing Texas from denying women access to qualified providers like Planned Parenthood, state lawmakers ended the Medicaid Women's Health Program, rejecting approximately \$40 million in federal matching funds for the program that covered 90% of the program's cost. Researchers from George Washington University concluded that alternative providers are unable to handle the massive increase of patients that would be necessary to preserve the level of care the program provided in 2011 without Planned Parenthood. During the first six months of the new program, it was reported that birth control services declined by 38% and the number of well woman exams decreased by 23% overall.

No amount of fuzzy math or spin changes these facts, or the reality that women throughout the state are unable to get the care they need and deserve. What can change that reality is this November's election. Women will decide the outcome of this election. And one fact we can all agree on is that you can't win in Texas by working against Texas women.



Vietnam Veterans Monument is placed at Capitol

Austin — Forty-one years after the last U.S. combat troops left Vietnam, the new Texas Capitol Vietnam Veterans Monument was dedicated in a March 29 ceremony attended by a crowd of thousands, including veterans, active duty military, families, friends and

Some 3.417 Texans died or are unaccounted for in Vietnam, according to the State Capitol Preservation Board.

Speakers at the ceremony included: Gov. Rick Perry; U.S. Rep. Sam Johnson of Dallas, an Air Force pilot who was held captive and tortured as prisoner of war in Vietnam for seven years; Lt. Gen. The Fifth Circuit's decision may be appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.



Sportsman Shooting Center

I've been a shooter most of my life. From the time I was a boy carrying a Red Rider BB gun through Fannin County fields until today, I've been enjoyed shooting sports As such I am always looking for new opportunities and a few months ago, I was invited to visit the Sports man Shooting Center in Grapevine, Texas.

Sportsman Shooting Center is a fully enclosed indoor training center that provides the opportunity for shooters to practice on dynamic hunting scenarios inside an air conditioned livefire cinema range using their own rifle and ammunition. The center occupies a newly built, state of the art 9,000 square foot range facility.

While the building in impressive, what's amazon is the center offers shooters access to an advanced three part program which includes a fully enclosed 100 yard sighting tunnel, an interactive laser training simulator, and a live fire cinema range. With the exception of the simulator, the tunnel and cinema range are all live fire using your own firearm

My first station is the fully enclosed, climate controlled 100 yard sighting tunnel. I hunt with a Savage Model 110 .243 rifle that my parents gave me for Christmas 25 years ago. That gun shoots well and although I thought I had the scope dialed in nicely, the electron $ic\ target\ sighting\ system$ allowed to to refine the scope much more precisely than Î could have using paper targets.

Each time I'd shoot, I'd get instantaneous shot feedback on a computer screen via sound wave detection technology. This system shows shot placement automatically on a flat screen display near the shooter for analysis by the instructor.

The next station was the interactive training simulator. It's a system that allows the shooter to engage computer-generated targets using a non-firing replica firearm fitted with an evesafe laser emitter. The simulator mimics the trajectory of most popular cartridges and shot analysis is conducted via a 360 degree view of shot placement and real time barrel tracking. After a bit of time in the simulator, I know I became a

The final station is in the USA's first live-fire cinem range. The cinema range consists of four shooting stations that face a 12 foot tall by 30 foot wide screen where footage of real hunting scenarios are presented.

Using my own rifle and live ammunition, I shoot multiple scenarios of various hunting scenes from wild hogs to African game like kudu. Each time I shoot, the footage stops and reveals via a red dot - my shot placement.

When I am done shooting my hunting rifle, I engage Olympic style targets with an AR-style firearm

In my mind, the Sportsman Shooting Center is the premier facility in which to train and refine your shooting technique. Randy Sykora and his staff do a great job in making you feel at home and making sure you get the most from your experience.

The technology at SSC is incredible and from talking with the other patrons in the center, they agree.



Schools use golf to emphasize values and health



She was second on the team in assists per game at 4.0. "Kendra stepped up when we needed her most and started playing beyond even her own expectations," said Williams-Jackson. "It is nice to see Kendra recognized, because she deserves it. During the off-season, the



Buck was born in 1924, and with the depression coming on, his one possession was a guitar for entertainment. Later he served in WWII, was wounded and received the Purple Heart.

You may have heard Buck in another venue previously. He and Shirley played at the Jacinto City Opry, and at The Hitching Rail off C. E. King in past years.

The building he built and decorated, with Shirley, is not only a music hall, but a museum and showcase of his collection of memorabilia and objects. He has displayed them on the walls, for all to see and enjoy. They include license plates, newspaper clippings, hardware items, tools, and much more. Buck says "You don't have to listen to the music, just come and look at the junk."

Buck and Shirley have only had the Jamboree and the building for a few years. They formed the Buckshots in 2007, and moved into their building about three years ago. Even though he is 89, he reminds us that his mother lived to 102, and we hope Buck does too, and keeps on pickin' and playing. Shirley says "We are trying to preserve and keep Classical "Old Time" Country Music alive.




