Residents along the San Jacinto River, and environmental activists will be disappointed in a report issued Monday, Aug. 10th by the Army Corps of Engineers.

They were expecting the report to clearly indicate the need to remove the waste pits and toxins they contained, but instead the report was ambivalent at best, saying that dredging and removal posed as much of a risk to health as leaving the wastes under a secure, well maintained

Report Card gives Galveston Bay a "C"

Galveston Bay Report Card Identifies Highs and Lows of Bays Health

La Porte, Texas – The Galveston Bay Foundation (GBF) and the Houston Advanced Research Center (HARC) today announced the first-ever Galveston Bay Report Card on the health of the Bay This is the first time researchers have graded the Baysoverall health, and some of the results are concerning. GBF sent a vear gather-

of the results are concerning.

GBF spent a year gathering input from thousands of local residents and stakeholdlocal residents and stakehout-ers to determine what people want to know about the health of Galveston Bay. As a result, HARC analyzed data and trends on the topics of

Water Quality, Pollution Events & Sources, Wildlife, Habitat, Human Health Risks, and Coastal Change.

The combined grade for all six categories is a C, which the report card describes as adequate for now. The Bays most significant challenges are pollution, declines in habitat acreage and some shell-fish species, and the impacts of sea level rise. Some of the issues that have been identified are due to human activities that can be prevented. Others are more complex and will require cooperation and planning on both the local and regional levels.

30 years old – which will provide updated space for early college high school and dual credit programs, as well as more relevant, efficient, and technically updated instructional space for employees and students. Additionally, the funding will provide for security, access, and safety upgrades throughout all facilities and significant infrastructure upgrades and replacements for systems at the end of their useful life.

"San Jacinto College brings great value to our region," said Board Chairman Dan Mims. "This bond referendum will allow us to continue to be a leader in the Gulf Coast region. The area is experiencing growth and expansion, as well as a retiring workforce, so it is imperative that we continue to meet the changing needs of our industry partners, while also helping students realize their earnings and career potential by completing their certificate or associate degree."

Impact on taxpayers in the San Jacinto College District

is expected to be minimal. The maximum increase in taxes for debt service when all the bonds are issued will not exceed 3 cents per \$100 of valuation. Residents that own a home with an appraised value of \$100,000 will see their taxes increase a maximum of approximately \$28.50 per year, or \$2.38 per month. Most senior citizens of age 65 or older will see no increase in their taxes; however, those seniors over 65 who own a house valued for taxes above \$132,500 will see a nominal increase.

"We are committed to keeping taxes low for our residents," noted San Jacinto College Chancellor Dr. Brenda Hellyer. "Our goal is to help our students succeed by completing what they start. We want them to gain the skills they need to enter the workforce or transfer to a four-year college or university to continue their education, and we know that keeping taxes low and offering an af-See San Jac BONDS, p. 8

GALENA PARK AMENDMENTS:

PONDER WINS JUDGMENT AGAINST CITY; APPEAL OR ELECTION TO BE CONSIDERED

GALENA PARK – The city learned on Monday that the judge of the 270th Judicial Court, Judge Brent Gamble, had granted a Summary Judgment in favor of the plaintiff, Barry Ponder, and ordered his proposed four amendments to be on the ballot at the next election.

The original lawsuit was filed by Ponder in January 2015, seeking to fore the city to place four Charter Amendments on the

ter Amendments on the ballot in the May 2015 election. Ponder had secured over

Ponder had secured over 614 signatures of registered voters, to place the amendments on the ballot. City Secretary Mayra Gonzales had certified that at least 492 of the signatures were valid, and wrote to Ponder, in care of the Citizens for a Better Galena Park, on Oct. 1, 2014.

In spite of that certification, and the petitions that

they subsequently adopted.

Ponder then filed suit against the mayor, the council, the city manager, the city secretary, the city attorney, and the city in general. This lawsuit and countersuits by the city dragged on, and the 18 amendments appeared on the November ballot, and were all defeated.

Ponder's suit claimed that the city and council had "arbitrarily rejected the election petition." It also claimed that Councilman Simms had illegally benefitted from health insurance amounting to

A College Degree is still a smart investment

Summer is almost over, which means it's "back-to-school" time. If you have young children, you may be purchasing backpacks, pencils, notebooks and similar items. But one day, you could be shopping for colleges — and when you do, you'll find the bill is a little bit higher than the one you get from your local school-supply store. That's why it's never too soon to start saving. soon to start saving.

Just how costly is college? For the 2014–2015
school year, the average expense — tuition, fees, room and board — was \$18,943 at a public four-year school and \$42,419 at year school and \$42,410 at a four-year private school, according to the College Board. And if recent history is any guide, these numbers will likely keep

tory is any guide, these numbers will likely keep climbing.

But there's no need to panic. For one thing, your child may be eligible for loans, grants or scholarships. Still, you will likely end up shouldering some of the financial load, and you may ask yourself if it's worth it. How much difference can a college degree make in the lives of your children?

Actually, college still

degree make in the lives of your children?
Actually, college still seems to be a pretty good investment: The average college graduate will receive about \$1 million more in lifetime earnings than the average high school graduate, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. So when you assist your children in getting to college, you can be reasonably sure that you're at least helping them start on the path toward a rewarding career.

How should you put away money for college? Unfortunately, more parents use a general savings account than any other method, according to Salie Mae's How America Saves for College 2015 study. These accounts pay little or no interest and offer no tax benefits.

As an alternative, consider investing in a 529

As an alternative, consider investing in a 529 plan. Contribution limits

are quite high, and federal taxes won't be assessed on earnings used for qualified higher education expenses. earnings used for qualified higher education expenses. (The earnings portion of withdrawals will be taxed, though, and can incur a 10% penalty if the withdrawals aren't used for qualified expenses.) Furthermore, your 529 plan contributions may be deductible from your state taxes. But 529 plans vary, so be sure to check with your tax advisor regarding deductibility.

Another college funding option is a Coverdell Education Savings Account, which, like a 529 plan, can generate tax-free earnings if the money is used for higher education expenses. You can typically only put in a maximum of \$2,000 per year to a Coverdell account, but it offers more flexibility in investment choices than a 529 plan.

You could also consider a custodial account, known as either UGMA or UTMA

choices than a 529 plan.
You could also consider a custodial account, known as either UGMA or UTMA. You can put up to \$14,000 per year into a custodial account without incurring gift taxes, and earnings would only be subject to the "kiddie tax" — that is, the first \$1,050 is tax-exempt, the next \$1,050 will be taxed at the child's tax rate, and just the amount over \$2,100 will be taxed at your tax rate. However, once your children reach the age of majority (either 18 or 21), they take control of the money and can do whatever they want with it — and their plans may not include college.

Don't wait too long to begin funding whichever savings vehicle, or vehicles, you choose. Your children may be young today, but before you know it, they'll be college bound.

It's coming – the first year for Galena Park IDS's Career and Technical Edyear for Galena Park IDS's Career and Technical Education Early College High School (CTE ECHS) is days away from opening. Beginning on August 24, 2015, 125 students will enter the new high school, located at the San Jacinto College North Campus, to begin earning a high school diploma along with an associate's degree or an industry certification. 

Babin: Push the Pause Button on Refugee Resettlement

I recently introduced H.R. 3314, the Resettle-ment Accountability National Security Act, which would press the pause button on a program that grants program that grants permanent legal residency to nearly 70,000 new immigrants a year under a program coordinated through the United Nations (U.N.), known as the Refugee Resettlement Program.

H.R. 3314 would temporarily suspends the program until the Government Account ability Office (GAO) completes a thorough examination of its costs on local governments, states and American taxpayers.

The Refugee Resettlement Program has been running on autopilot for far too long with little regard to economic, social and national security implications. We need to step back and examine all aspects of this program. Such as, why is the U.N., whose policies often run counter to the best interests of the U.S., even in the equation?

Nearly half-a-million The Refugee Resettle-

Nearly half-a-million Nearly half-a-million refugees have entered the U.S. under the Refugee Resettlement Program while President Obama has been in office – with the state of Texas and its taxpayers being asked to take in more than any other state during that time.

With America's
growing budgetary and
national security
-challenges, it is extremely troubling that
this program would
continue at an unchecked pace without a
clear picture of its costs
to federal, state and
local taxpayers – as well
as the national security
risks it poses.

According to the

as the fautona security risks it poses.

According to the Congressional Research Service, those granted legal permanent residency are allowed the following taxpayer funded services: seven years of Supplemental Security Income (SSI), seven years of Medicaid coverage, five years of Temporary Assistance for Needy Families subsidies, and no limit on Food Stamp eligibility. This adds billions of dollars in federal

spending to our national debt, which is particu-larly troubling at a time when these services are expanding at an unsus-tainable pace.

tanable pace.

When I asked officials what the costs of these programs were, I was told that they have no idea. I believe most idea. I believe most Americans would agree that it is plain common sense to seek a full accounting of the Refugee Resettlement Program – and that is exactly what H.R. 3314 does.

does.

It also gives us an opportunity to fully investigate the national security risks associated with resettlement. The Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) is increasingly worried about this program and its potential to generate home-grown terrorism.

Clearly, there are

Clearly, there are serious problems with this program especially in regards to how these individuals are selected and resettled in commu-nities across the United States.

Under the current system, affected communities essentially have no voice in the process. This is extremely troubling considering the fact that these communities will be forced to bear the costs. Local residents should have every right to say no to resettlements within their communities – a protection they unfortunately do not have. Under the current

A full examination of this program is long overdue. As one supporter of H.R. 3314 wrote, "I've been following this issue for eight years and this is the first time I have seen anyone in Congress." irst time I have seen anyone in Congress (other than recent concerns about Syrian refugees) take a single step to begin to scrutinize the entire program."

University president says Davis statue to be moved

AUSTIN — A bronze statue of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America, will be moved from the Main Mall of the University of Texas at Austin campus to UT's Center for American History for interior display, in accordance with a play, in accordance with a decision made last week by UT President Gregory Fenves.

UT President Gregory Fenves.

Fenves said he appointed a task force in June, shortly after he became president, "to identify options for the statues along the Main Mall that have long been a source of discussion, debate and more recently, controversy." The task force reported its findings to Fenves on Aug. 10.

"While every historical figure leaves a mixed legacy, I believe Jefferson Davis is in a separate category, and that it is not in the university's best interest to continue commemorating him on our Main Mall. Davis had few ties to Texas; he played a unique

Mall. Davis had few ties to Texas; he played a unique role in the history of the American South that is best explained and understood through an educational exhibit," Fenves said in a news release.

"The Briscoe Center is the logical location for the Davis statue and can provide a well-curated, scholarly context for its

vide a well-curated, scholarly context for its permanent display. As the home of one of the nation's largest collections of Southern history, and as the keeper of UT Austin's own history — including the papers of George W. Littlefield, a former regent and major benefactor re-Lattlefield, a former regent and major benefactor responsible for the statues and fountain, and sculptor Pompeo Coppini — the Briscoe Center will bring a scholarly depth that enhances the educational valuation. hances the educational val-ue of the Davis statue. The Briscoe Center has long planned a renovation of its facility, including new ex-hibit space, and my office will help raise the remain-ing funds needed for its completion," Fenves add-ed

yet, but we will be if we dont take better care of our beloved Galveston Bay, said GBF President Bob Stokes. We hope this report card will serve as a wake-up call and prompt people to think about how their actions can impact the Bay.

how their actions can impact the Bay.

The report card calls at-tention to the items that are putting Galveston Bay at risk and provides recommenda-tions on how people can help preserve the Bay. Some of the recommendations include:

Slow runoff by reducing paved areas and installing rain barrels or rain gardens.

Help preserve and re-store habitats, like forests, wetlands, and ovster reefs,

- store habitats, like forests, wetlands, and oyster reefs.

 Dont over-fertilize or over-water your lawn.

 Always dispose of trash and pet waste properly.

 Report environmental violations, discharges, or spills.
- spills.

 Never pour fats, oils or grease down kitchen, bath or

Never pour tats, ous or grease down kitchen, bath or storm drains.
 While the overall report card grade shows need for improvement, some areas of Galveston Bay are thriving. According to the analysis, the Bays nutrient and dissolved oxygen levels (the indicators that make up the water quality grade) are in good shape. And, federal regulations under the U.S. Clean Water Act

are credited with significant improvements in pollution control and the preservation of saltwater wetlands. Additionally, most fish and bird populations are holding steady. Report Card Catego-

While most Bay seafood is safe to eat, a long history of toxic contamination has led to seafood consumption warnings for some species in certain areas of the Bay. Additionally, swimming in area streams and bayous is generally discouraged due to recurring high levels of bacteria that can make people sick.

• Coastal Change The Bay received a C for coastal change. The Bays physical environment is affected by rising sea levels, changing weather patterns, and increasing demands for freshwater.

The entire Galveston Bay Report Card can be found online at www.galvbaygrade.org. The report card will be updated annually. The overall grade of a C for Galveston Bay is not the end, but just the beginning, said HARC Vice President Lisa Gonzalez. It provides an important baseline for action and future assessments of the Bay.

Galveston Bay plays an important role in the Houston Galveston areas economy. The Bay is responsible for half of the nations petrochemical production and is a major producer of seafood. It also

supports water-based industries, such as shipping, boating, fishing, and nature tourism. These industries contribute billions of dollars to the regions economy and employ thousands of people. Additionally, the Bays upland prairies and wetlands help absorb floodwaters and filter contaminated storm water runoff.



Greg Abbott called it "imper-

ative" that Texas has a vot-er ID law, and said the state will continue fighting for the

will continue fighting for the measure.

In Washington today President Obama marked the 50th anniversary of the Voting Rights Act on Thursday by calling on Congress to update the law and urging people to register to vote.

"There are people of goodwill on both sides of the aisle who are willing to do it, but it keeps slipping as a priority," Obama said. "This has to be a priority. If this isn't working, nothing's working."

the so-called Toxic Waste Pits in the San Jacinto Riv-er, the Corps conducted a thorough study of six var-ied remediation schemes ranging from containing and capping the site, to partial removal, to com-plete removal of the toxic materials. These toxic ma-terials on the site include materials. These toxic materials on the site include dioxins, and other carcinogens with the potential to affect human health. The toxins are contained in a sludge, or sediment that was deposited on the site, from barges filled with waste from paper mills, around 1965 and later. The EPA has identified Potential Responsible Par-

The EPA has identified Potential Responsible Parties as McGinnes Industrial Maintenance Corp., Waste Management, and International Paper. These so-called PRPs were responsible for constructing the current membrane and rock containment cap now over the waste site, and they have argued that this is all that is required to safely isolate the toxic wastes.

wastes.
However, the Harris
County Attorney, Vince
Ryan, and his assistant
attorney Rock Owen, have
sued the companies in
court for damages and to
clean up the site. They won
a judgement against
McGinnes and Waste Management for \$29.4 million
follars but Internstitional dollars, but International dollars, but international Paper was excluded from the settlement by a jury. The county is now appeal-ing the ruling on this third

company.

In addition to the county suite, several other law-suits have been filed against the PRPs, includ-ing one wity about 170 in-

dividuals who live in the dividuals who live in the general area along the riv-er, and another by Viet-namese fisherman who have had their livelihood affected by the restrictions issued by the county on fishing and consuming cer-tain species.
