and hour rules for alcohol sales; prohibiting public consumption and open containers; and setting penalty for violation.

The Commissioners unanimously approved the City of Galena Park's investment policy. The Commissioners

unanimously approved opening the seal bids for Phase 2 of the water lines and fire protection project with a pending decision to be made later.

The Commissioners

unanimously approved the full time employment of Alexis Alvarez as utility billing clerk for the water department.

At the close of the meeting citizens are allowed three minutes to make comments or ask questions to the Mayor and Commissioners.

Former Commissioner Robert Clowers questioned the procedure of opening the seal bids for Phase 2 of the water lines and fire protection project

without approving a motion to table them for further review and awarding the bid at another council meeting. Clowers also said he believes approving the ordinance 2017-06 requiring license for alcohol may be in conflict with the state

Morman wants new EPA head Pruitt to put waste pits on "TOP TEN" priority list

HARRIS COUNTY -Pct. 2 Commissioner Jack Morman waded into the battle to remove the toxic waste pits from the San Jacinto River, with a two page letter to the new EPA Administrator last Friday, asking for an expedited removal of the material.

In his letter, Morman states that "As long as the dioxin pits remain in place, they create an ongoing hazard that will leach into the River and Galveston Bay. The site poses a serious threat to the health of our residents and to the environment." Morman referenced a

new study that Pruitt com-missioned, a Task Force that has made recommen-dations for expedited solutions to the nation's 1330 Superfund sites. Pruitt has said that he will create a "TOP TEN" list of sites with priority to be cleaned up and reused. The list will contain sites that have

been on the NPS (National Priority List) for over 5 years. Morman requested that the San Jacinto River Waste Pits be placed on that list.

Further, he said "Removal is the only remedy that resolves the contamination in the San Jacinto River Waste Pits with fi-

nality, eliminating the future costs and potential harm associated with leav-

ing the waste in place." The EPA Dallas office is currently reviewing comments and technical reports, before issuing a final ROC (Record Of Decision). They plan to have this

ready by the end of 2017. unless Pruitt moves to shorten the schedule.

In the Task Force report, Pruitt is quoted as saying he has a "passion to clean up the country's worst pollution, as expeditiously and as thorough-

ly as possible."

The report lists five

Jacinto City, TX. – Wednesday, July 26, 2017 Jacinto City Police Detective B. J. Silva took into custody ex-convict Juan Carlos Apodaca who's the suspect in a crime of "Displaying Harmful Material to a Mi-

According to Silva on Sunday July 23 a mother and 9 year old daughter were grocery shopping at the Seller's Bros. grocery store in Jacinto City when Apodaca without the mother's awareness began showing her daughter hard core pornography from his cell phone. The child became upset and told Apodaca to leave her alone but he persisted by playing the pornography in front of her

Detective Silva says after the mother complained to the police the stores security camera video was obtained for evidence. The news media aired the video Tuesday and Silva says within two hours after the

broadcast a helpful citizen watching called police providing the suspects name. Searching a law enforcement sexual offender's database using the name provided a photo matching Juan Carlos Apodaca was discovered along with his current Galena Park address.

Detective Silva said, "I membered another similar incident months before at the same store where a male showed pornography to a child. When I reviewed the videos from that incident I discovered Apodaca was the same person.

On Wednesday Silva brought Apodaca to the police station where he admitted showing the pornography to the minor. He was fingerprinted, photographed, and transferred to the Harris County jail and within 48 hours he bonded out and is on the streets again. Citizens release are worried that

DPS urges Texans to use caution in summer heat

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety is warning Texas residents to be prepared for summertime temperatures, and to take precautions to stay safe as temperatures and heat indices hit 100 degrees and above in many parts of the state this time of year. Extreme temperatures increase the risk of heat-related injuries or deaths.

"Summertime heat is a fact of life in Texas, but the dangers from high temperatures are real and should not be taken lightly," said DPS Director Steven Mc-Craw. "Heat-related deaths and injuries are often preventable if residents take the necessary steps to educate and protect themselves and their loved ones."

Warmer weather places children at greater risk of injury or death if left unattended in a vehicle. Every year children die from heat-related injuries after being left in a vehicle or by entering a vehicle unnoticed. A child should never be left unattend-

ed in a vehicle. Temperatures inside a car can rise more than $20 \ degrees \ in \ only \ 10$ minutes: and even with an outside temperature of 60 degrees, the temperature inside a car can reach 110 degrees, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Leaving windows partially rolled down does not help. Young children are particularly at risk since their bodies heat

up faster than an adult. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), extreme heat events or heat waves are one of the leading causes of extreme weather-related deaths in the United States. Periods of severe heat and high humidity tax the body's ability to cool itself and can lead to heat exhaustion and heat stroke, which can

DPS offers the following tips for staying safe and managing the heat:

• Check on the elderly, sick or very young, especially if they don't have air conditioning.

• Drink plenty of water and avoid caffeine and alcohol during prolonged outdoor exposure. Start consuming water before you head outdoors; you may not realize you're dehydrated until it's too late.

• Pay attention to your body. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke can develop quickly. If you start feeling ill, immediately find a shaded or cooler area and slowly drink fluids. Seek medical attention if neces-

sary.
• Monitor weather radios and newscasts for information on current conditions and weather alerts in your area.

Stay indoors as much as possible, and limit exposure to the sun. Consider indoor activities this summer at places like shopping malls, the library or oth-

er community facilities. • Light-colored, loosefitting clothing and a hat are recommended during outdoor expo-

• If possible, avoid strenuous outdoor activity during the hottest part of the day.

• Be extra careful when cooking outdoors, building campfires or driving off road to avoid igniting dry vegetation. Also, stay aware of burn bans in your area and always abide by restrictions on outside burn-

ing.
• Don't forget pet safety. Animals are also susceptible to heat-related injury or death don't put your pets in these dangerous condi-

Senate recesses after passing 18 Bills (Plus Sunset) in 7 Days!

With 3 weeks to go, Texas Senate sets record pace in Special Session

AUSTIN - July 26, 2017 - When the Texas Senate recessed on Wednesday, July 26th, 18 bills (plus Senate Bill 20 and Senate Bill 60 - Sunset Bills) included on the Special Session proclamation by Gov. Greg Abbott had passed the Senate. Long time legislative veterans say there is no precedent in either chamber for the passage of 18 bills in seven days -- from referral to committee hearing to floor debate and final passage on third reading. Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick made this statement following the Senate recess today: The Texas Senate is

committed to passing the conservative legislation the people of Texas elected them to pass and they arrived in Austin last week ready for work. In the past week, they have logged almost 57 hours in committee hearings and over 33 hours on the Senate Floor to pass 18 bills on the Special Session call. The senators are a true testament to what can be accomplished when do what is best for

Every Texan can be proud of the work ethic, commitment and efficiency of the Texas Senate. These important bills all were fully vetted in committees that heard testimony from hundreds of Texans going late into the night. The full Senate was in session on several days past midnight to pass this important legislation. Every bill passed is listed below but I want to highlight three that are critically important:

Senate Bill 1 -

Texans pay some of the highest property taxes in the nation and the high rates are forcing people out of their homes and hampering business growth. Senate Bill 1 includes a mandatory election when local entities increase property taxes by more than 4 percent.

Senate Bill 3 - A majority of Texans in both political parties and in every ethnic and demographic group believe that women and girls should have

privacy and safety in their restrooms showers and locker rooms. Senate Bill 3 will ensure that they

Senate Bill 19 -Currently, over half the state budget goes to K-12 and higher education \bar{but} only 32%of all revenue received by schools goes to teachers. Senate Bill 19 will provide a career bonus in 2018 of \$600 to teachers who have been teaching 6 to 10 years and \$1,000 to teachers who have been teaching 11 or more years. Senate Bill 19 also directs \$212 million to TRS Care to reduce out-of-pocket health-care costs for retired teachers.

House, Senate have not yet engaged in back-andforth on key bills

AUSTIN — Not a single bill had been agreed to by the state House and Senate as of July 28, exactly 10 days into the 30-day special session of the Texas Legislature.

Lawmakers have a tall

order served up to them by Gov. Greg Abbott in the form of 20 must-resolve matters in the first called session of the 85th Texas Legislature. Something could be on Abbott's desk in short order if top-priori-ty "sunset" legislation to ensure the continuation of the Texas Medical Board and several other health-care-related state oversight boards gains approval by both cham-

bers. The Senate's version is SB 20 by Van Taylor, R-Plano; the House has pro duced two versions: HB 1 and HB 2, both by Larry Gonzales, R-Round Rock. There are enough differences in the bills to spark elongated floor debates, if lawmakers are so inclined.

Last week, both chambers moved beyond the asyet unresolved sunset legislation. The House approved and forwarded two bills to the Senate: HB 7 by Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, legislation creating a tree planting credit to offset tree removal fees imposed by a municipality, and HB 13 by Giovanni Capriglione, R-Southlake, creating reporting require ments for abortion provid ers about surgical complications.

A number of Senate bills have gained approval and now await consideration by the House. Those bills

would, for example: - Reform how local prop erty tax rates are set and the tax programs adminis-

- Revise school finance: - Prevent the transfer of state funding to any healthcare provider that also performs abortions;
- Amend municipal an-

nexation laws: Enable a constitution-

al limit on the rate of growth in appropriations;

- Add new requirements for do-not-resuscitate or-

Along with SB 3, the "bathroom bill" by Lois Kolkhorst, R-Brenham legislation that cleared the consideration by the House bills with the potential to ignite time-consuming tus-sles between the upper and lower chambers. House Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, has signaled his disapproval for the bathroom bill, despite pressure from Gov. Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who have more or less agreed as to how public schools might accommodate transgender students.

of State Health Services on July 26 announced a Hidalgo County resident who previously had a Zika infection was most likely infected in Texas.

Because the individual

has not recently traveled outside the area or had any other risk factors, the in-fection probably was transmitted by a mosquito bite in South Texas sometime in the last few months, health officials said.

Teacher Bonus & TRS Care Boost - First Bill to Pass After Sunset

AUSTIN - July 25, 2017 - Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick issued this statement following the passage of Senate Bill 19 on second reading with a strong bipartisan 28 to 3 vote. Final passage of the bill will be later this evening:

"Just before Special Session began, I announced it was my priority to direct more of our education funding to teachers. I also made a commitment to shore up the Teacher Retirement System (TRS) Care for retired teachers. Tonight, I am proud to announce that the Texas Senate passed Senate Bill 19, by Senator Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, which will achieve both those goals. This is the first bill the Senate passed after the requisite Sunset

"Currently, over half the state budget goes to K-12 and higher education but only 32% of all revenue received by schools goes to teachers. Senate Bill 19 will provide a career bonus in 2018 of \$600 to teachers who have been teaching 6 to 10years and \$1,000 to teachers who have been teaching 11 or more years. Senate Bill 19 also directs \$212 million to TRSCare to reduce out-ofpocket health-care costs for retired teachers. Teachers are the most valuable educational resource in the classroom and it is essential that we move deliberately to get more educational funding directly to our teachers. I congratulate Sen. Nelson for her hard work on this bill. We continue to work on the teacher pay increase called for by Gov. Abbott and supported by all of us in the Senate.

As one of four Commissioners elected to serve the residents of Harris County, Texas, the third most populous county in the United States, I thank you for making the Superfund Program a

The San Jacinto River Waste Pits Superfund Site is located in my precinct. It was listed on the NPL in 2008, and contains at least 200,000 cubic yards of paper mill waste that is laden with 2,3,7,8 Tetrachlorodibenzo-p-dioxin ("dioxin"), a known mutagen and potential carcinogen.

The dioxin is in partially submerged pits on the shore of the San Jacinto River and in a highly vulnerable flood plain that is constantly subject to the forces of the River as well as threats from hurricanes and floods. Some of the dioxin has contaminated fish in the river prompting a State fish consumption ban. As long as the dioxin pits remain in place, they create an ngoing hazard that will leach into the River and Galveston Bay. The site poses a serious threat to the health of our residents and to the environment.

After years of study, the EPA has announced a proposed remedy for cleaning up the site calling for excavation and off-site disposal of the highly contaminated dioxin paper mill waste. The proposed remedy has an estimated cost of over \$50 million, placing it within the category of Superfund Sites that you have made a priority.

I strongly support the proposed remedy announced by the EPA for cleaning up this Site and previously submitted comments supporting removal of the waste. I continue to urge that you approve a Record of Decision consistent with the proposed remedy.

I have reviewed the recent Superfund Task Force Recommendations and was pleased to see your proposal to focus on sites that have been on the NPL longer than five years. respectfully request that you place the Site on the proposed Administrator's Top Ten list.

Respectfully, I re-urge that the Site be completely remediated by removal. Removal is the only remedy that resolves the contamination in the San Jacinto River Waste Pits with finality, eliminating the future costs and potential harm associated with leaving the waste in place.

show Apodaca was arrested in 2012 and found guilty of Indecency with a Child Sexual by Contact and served a prison sentence. Upon his release from prison he was added to the Texas Department of Public

Safety's Sex Offender Registry. He's required to reg-ularly report to the Galena Park Police Department for a current photo and ad-dress for the sex offender registry. In both Galena Park and Jacinto City there are about 50 sex of-fenders listed.

North Channel Star writer Allan Jamail a former Jacinto City police chief with certification and experience in dealing with pedophiles (child predators) said, most but not all pedophiles suffer from pe-

dophilia which is a psychiatric disorder in which an adult or older adolescent is sexually attracted to young children. Pedophiles can be anyone -- old or young, rich or poor, educated or uneducated, non-professional or professional, and of any race. "I strongly urge parents to keep a close watch on their kids, never let them out of your sight, whether they're with you shopping or outside your home playing, keep watch on them," said Jamail.

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
