The San Jacinto Colle The San Jacinto College Maritime Technology and Training Center sits 14 feet above ground. The ground level showcases a training dock with lifeboats, davits, and fast rescue craft, and a separate industry dock for crew changes. This will al-low for vessel specific train-ing for local maritime com-

panies and will serve as an aquatic training facility for sea survival and life raft training, complete with men's and women's locker rooms.

Once complete, the facility will have 15 classrooms; engineering simulators to train maritime engineers

## Harris County wins lawsuit against Food Mart for distributing Synthetic Marijuana

Harris County Attorney
Vince Ryan last Friday in a
lawsuit filed with the Texas
Attorney General's Office and
the City of Houston won a
court order to prohibit the
sale of synthetic marijuana
products known as "Kush" at
a local convenience store. The
County Attorney, the Texas
Attorney General's Office,
and City of Houston jointly
sued Almeda Food Mart for
distributing products containing the dangerous substance
that has led to hundreds of
recent hospitalizations and
overdoses across Texas.

The lawsuit follows several undercover investigations
performed by the Houston
Police Department (HPD),
which uncovered and seized
more than 300 packages of
the substance at the store.

"This product, commonly
called 'Kush,' is especially
dangerous because it is marketed to children," County
Attorney Ryan said. "The
package labeling claims this

product contains seemingly harmless substances. It actually contains hazardous chemicals."

While synthetic marijuana is marketed as "safe," the dangers of the substance are widely reported—including severe paranoia, psychotic episodes, violent delusions, kidney damage, suicidal thoughts and self-mutilation. There has been an alarming uptick in these reports in 2014-15.

"The growing reports of overdoses on this dangerous substance among our youth should concern every Texan," Texas Attorney General Paxton said. "This illegal marketing of powerful and deadly drugs to children must be put to a stop. My office will continue to work with local authorities across Texas to send the message that businesses who choose to sell this substance will pay the price."

HPD initiated the investigation following reports from

paramedics with the Houston Fire Department of individuals overdosing on the drug from Almeda Food Mart, which is in close geographic proximity to several schools and shopping malls where youth congregate. Lab reports of the packages seized by HPD confirm that the products contain AB-CHMINACA and AKB48, both highly adictive and dangerous chemicals listed by the federal Drug Enforcement Administration as Schedule 1 controlled substances, the most dangerous kind.

County Attorney Ryan, the AG's Office and the City are alleging that Almeda Food Mart and its owners, Trung and Tamie Pham, have violated the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act and common nuisance statutes under Texas law The lawsuit is seeking a temporary restraining order and a temporary injunction

Students from Highlands Junior School spent a day at Chevron Phillips Chemical's Baytown facility to learn about jobs in the petrochemical industry. The students are part of the "Young Dream Changers" program focused on teaching young men positive behavior and character traits through mentoring and education activities.

Laramie Valverde, an operator at Chevron Phillips Chemical in Baytown, said mentoring is a great way to expose students to a career field they may not have considered before. "When I was in middle

"When I was in middle school I didn't think to school I didn't think to myself that one day I would grow up to be a plant operator. I wasn't sure what I wanted to do after school and didn't really have an adult in my life to help guide me. I was fortunate to have a friend's father suggest plant work," Valverde said.

According to the trade organization American Fuel & Petrochemical Manufacturers (AFPM), the average salary for process operators is \$62,234 per year or \$28.96 per hour. The average salary for a welder is \$56,904 per year or \$27.36 per hour. Pipefitters, millwrights, scaffold builders, and instrumentation/electrical technicians are also in high demand. Due to expansion projects occurring at Chevron Phillips Chemical and the increase of retiring employees, the tiring employees, the company expects to hire more than 2,600 new employees in the next six

years. The number of people needed to build the expansion projects is approximately 10,000. "Our goal is to educate people that these jobs exist, they pay extremely well, and we prefer to hire within the local community." said Referencewith ty," said Betancourth. Twenty kids from High-

# Panel hears testimony in wake of jail death

AUSTIN — The Texas House Committee on County Affairs met on July 30 to hear testimony on Sandra Bland and jail standards.

Bland, 28, was pulled over by a state trooper in Hempstead on July 10. Soon after, she was placed in the Waller County Jail and was found dead in her cell on July 13. Investigators ruled the death a suicide. The story, covered by local, state, national and world news agencies, has emerged in the context of other tragic outcomes involving black citizens and law enemerged in the context of oth er tragic outcomes involving black citizens and law en

black citizens and law ei-forcement.

"How does someone get pulled over for not signaling and end up dead three days later? It just does not com-pute," said Committee Chair Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, in opening the hearing, Cole-man called for discussion on how such an event might af.

Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, in opening the hearing. Coleman called for discussion on how such an event might affect the Texas Department of Public Safety's training of officers and how Texas county jails might adjust their practices in the incarceration of mentally ill inmates.

Brandon Wood, director of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, said mental health has become the commission's top priority and that state funding to add beds for inmates with mental issues is forthcoming. Wood testified that there have been 140 in-custody suicides in Texas since 2009 and 22 in 2014. He recommended enhancements to mental health screening processes, such as the officers and the such collisions of the comming woods and the such collisions of the such that the such that there have been 140 in-custody suicides in the such such that the such t screening processes, such as the addition of personnel who are qualified to assess men-tal health and deliver mental

health care.

McCraw said the Federal





Bureau of Investigation and the Texas Rangers are inves-tigating the arrest and death of Bland and suggested the public release of the arrest video was an act of transpar-ency on the agency's behalf. Yannis Banks of the Tex-ce MACP testified, wayers

Yannis Banks of the Texas NAACP testified, suggesting that transparency issues include official documents that could be altered and video recordings that do not capture everything that happens. Several audience members spoke about their personal experiences related to racial profiling by law enforcement. Greg Hansch, public policy director of National Association of Mental Illness of Texas, called for Texas to better address racism in law enforcement. And, while acknowledging increases in

acknowledging increases in the Texas Legislature's atten-tion to mental health issues generally over the past cou-ple of legislative sessions, Hansch said Texas still has

long way to go in addressing needed improvements in its mental health system.






A temporary injunction is in place and discovery is ongoing.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Caleb Noon, a fire control technician and a 2009 Ross S. Sterling High School graduate and Baytown, Texas native is serving aboard the USS Maine (SSBN 741)'s Gold Crew. The USS Maine is one of the Navy's 14 Ohio-class ballistic missile submarines, also referred to as 'boomers', which patrol the world's oceans for months at a time, serving as undetectable launch platforms for submarine-launched ballistic missiles. Together with land-based missiles and strategic bombers, the Navy's Ohioclass submarines are part of the nation's strategic nuclear deterrence triad. Because of their stealth, they are considered the most survivable component of the triad. The Navy

is currently developing a follow-on submarine to replace the Ohio-class, which will begin to reach the end of their service lives in the late 2020s. 
