Freeport Street to be rebuilt by Pct. 2

Officials, community leaders and contractors gathered last Wednesday, Nov. 6th at the Leon Grayson Center on Corpus Christi Street, for a ceremonial groundbreaking to mark the beginning of a threeand to either side

and to either side.

According to Pct. 2 Commissioner Jack Morman, this project will cost \$12.8 million dollars. The money is coming from the federal government, from the federal government, he said, as reimbursement for flooding damage after Hurricane Ike in 2008. The money will primarily be used to build new storm drainage that will alleviate future flooding. At the same time, this gives an

opportunity to reconstruct pavement along Freeport Street, resulting in a modern 3-lane road from I-10 to Holly Park Drive, with curbs sidewalks that are not there

Morman said that Freeport will also get new sewers and paving from Woodforest to Uvalde, but will not be totally rebuilt in that section. How-ever, the Cloverleaf area will

North Shore out of play-offs with 9-7 defeat

Two powerful high school football teams met last Friday night at Tully Stadium, and battled to a close score at the end. This was the Regional semifinals in Class 5A Division I Region III. The Cy-Fair Roberts and the Newt Spear Bobcats and the North Shore Mustangs came into the game with similar style of play -- an overpowering defense, and a

overpowering defense, and a strong running game.

North Shore was the favorite, ranked No. 4 and with a 12-0 record. They had only given up a total of nine points in their last four games. Cy-Fair entered with almost as good an 11-1 record.

However the Bobests came

However, the Bobcats came up with the important plays when it counted most. In the first quarter, running back Dillon Birden ran 75 yards for a touchdown, thrilling the Cy-Fair fans, and setting the pace for the rest of the game. His total yardage was 216 yards on 29 carries. D. Tobler also carried for the Bobcats, with 5 carries for 29 yards. Cy-Fair was also able to

mount a good passing game, with quarterback C. Kopecky having 9 completions on 13 passes, for a total of 185 yards.

At the end of the first half, Cy-Fair led 6-0 on the strength of their long run in the first

of their long run in the first quarter.

However, in the third quarter North Shore made a strong comeback, with a 10 play drive that went 70 yards and resulted in a TD when quarterback Lawrance McCardwll threw a 15 yard screen pass to Kevian DeLeon, resulting in the Mustangs taking a 7-6 lead. McCardell completed 3 passes in the game on 10 attempts, for the game on 10 attempts, for a gain of 30 yards.

Channelview ISD receives grant to help at-risk students

Mental Health America of reater Houston (MHA) re-ently awarded the Channel-Greater Houston (MHA) re-cently awarded the Channel-view Independent School District a \$25,000 grant to help provide services to at-risk students and their families.

The grant was awarded as part of MHA's School Behavioral Health Initiative (SBHI), which included school district personnel, behavioral health providers, child-serving and education-related agencies, and parents that joined together to develop and implement recommendations to improve the prevention, identification, and treatment of behavioral health issues among students.

Channelview ISD is using the grant funding to hire a second Harris County Community Youth Services (CYS) worker that will allow the expansion of early intervention

services to all grade levels.

"We are excited and most appreciative to Mental Health America for the gift of additional funding they have given to us," said Gloria Roach, Channelview ISD's director of process except to the description of th Channelview ISD's director of special services. With the addition of another CYS staff member, it will allow us the opportunity to provide even greater outreach to students and parents who are in need of special services and resources."



When deputies took him into custody he had a pistol on his person. He was found with others in a reputed gang dwelling garage watching a boxing match in the wee hours of the morning

The Capital Murder charge is related to the deaths of Daniel Munoz, 17, Veronica Hernandez, 17,

and Alfaro Yosselm, 21. Investigators indicate all five victims were shot in the head execution-style. The

three victims died at the scene, while another wom an and a man were rushed to Memorial Hermann Hospital by Life Flight helicopters.

According to the Harris County Sheriff's Office, the Texas Gulf Coast Violent Offenders Task Force apprehended Sanchez. Investigators said the incident started on Wednesday after a neighbor called 911 after hearing back-to-back gunshots. There was no disturbance heard prior to the gunfire.

Detectives say that Sanchez grew up in the area and has tatoos that say "Houstone" on his body.

cinto College campuses on international visas, most of whom take ESOL classes. There are also hundreds of other students from outside the U.S. who attend classes at San Jacinto College either as part-time or full-time students who are not international visas students. Accordingly, there are international counselors at all three San Jacinto College campuses who help students who attend on international visas with services such as educational planning, counseling, and registration assistance; assistance with require-

ments of immigration law and cross-cultural adjustment; processing of im-migration documents related to passports, visas, employment authorization, changes in legal status, and transfer to and from other schools. San Jacinto Collego offers ESOL classes at all three campuses. Through the program, people with very limited English skills can be-come proficient in the language in as little as two semesters. The program covers oral communication, reading, and writing skills to prepare students for college, careers, and the workplace.

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

he source of much the difference beween a karat and carat is fair ly easy to understand, but may ewhat hard to remen ber. A karat is simply a unit of measurement to indicate the purity of a metal, usually gold. The term carat is used to note the weight of a precious stone,

the weight of a precious stone, especially diamonds.

The term karat is necessary, especially for gold, simply because the nature of the metal means it must be made into an alloy. Pure gold, or 24K gold, is a very soft metal that is not

able to used practically as jewelry in its purest form. It would quickly become deformed and scratched. Therefore, jewelry makers must do something to fortify the metal. This task is accomplished by mixing gold with a harder metal.

The karat is responsible, in most cases, for determining the relative value of the gold piece. The difference in price

piece. The difference in price between 10K, the lowest purity that gold can be and still be

considered gold, and 18K, the highest purity of gold jewelry commonly available, can be significant. Gold designated as 10 karat is less than half gold, while eighteen karat gold is 75 percent gold.
