




Medical Insurance is expensive

I felt like my insurance company wante me out of healthcare when I received my new premium informa-tion for 2016. I paid over \$1,600 a month for my wife and I to have dical insurance in 2015. Last fall I learned my current policy would increase to over \$1,950 per month. I had the option to change policies, which would have lowered my premium to \$1,500 a month. The change month. The change would also have significantly reduced my coverage. In the process I learned that just going to the Emergency Room would be an automatic \$500 charge on my current policy automatic 5000 charge on my current policy and any other policy that I would change to. I chose to stick with my current policy and in 2016 my medical insurance will be \$23,600. That's a lot of money.

I can see what is coming this fall of 2016. I will receive my letter telling me that my current insurance will probably be in-creased to \$2,300 to \$2,500 per month. I can't pay that kind of premium and will be forced into a plan that will cost \$1,600 to \$1,800 per month and will pay less on medical expenses. The name of the game is

the insurance the insurance company assuming less liability. They want you to buy the insur-ance and then pay as much of your medical expense as possible.

I hear too many reports of people opting out of surgeries because they can't afford to pay the deductible and the copay. Many Americans who still cannot afford to buy health insurance are now being penalized. Some are opting to pay the penalty instead of buying the insurance.

Encourage Insurance companies to advertise across the country. Give people a choice.
Also, open the door to Canada's pharmacies. An approved list of pharmacies that Americans can do business with would give us another option.
Finally, we have to Finally, we have to



Governor Abbott proposes slate of amendments to U.S. Constitution

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Jan. 8 unveiled his "Texas Plan," a docu-ment promoting the pas-sage of nine constitutional amendments "to rein in the federal government and re-store the balance of power between the States and the United States," he said. The amendments Abbott is proposing include: - Prohibit Congress from regulating activity that oc-curs wholly within one state. - Require Congress to

state.
Require Congress to balance its budget;
Prohibit administrative agencies, and the unelected bureaucrats that staff them, from creating federal law;
Prohibit administrative

agencies, and the unelected bureaucrats that staff them,

bureaucrats that staff them, from preempting state law. Allow a two-thirds majority of the states to override a U.S. Supreme Court decision;

Require a seven-justice supermajority vote for U.S. Supreme Court decisions that invalidate a democratically enacted law;

Restore the balance of power between the federal and state governments by limiting the federal government to the powers expressible to the powers expressible to the powers expressible to the state of the stat ment to the powers express-ly delegated to it in the Constitution; - Give state officials the

power to sue in federal court

power to sue in federal court when federal officials overstep their bounds; and - Allow a two-thirds majority of the states to overide a federal law or regulation.

Garcia added: "America added 292,000 new jobs in December. Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton also reacted, saying, "I stand ready to fight back against any overeach that will deny or infringe on (gun owners') rights."

Sales tax revenue drops
Texas Comptroller Glenn
Hegar on Jan. 6 announced
that sales tax revenue for
the state in December was
\$2.33 billion, down 1.1 percent compared to December
2014.

"As with the previous two

"As with the previous two months, December sales tax revenue was down largely due to spending reductions in oil and gas-related sectors," Hegar said. This was expected, given ongoing weakness in oil and natural gas prices. Remittances from other sectors, such as construction and information, continued to grow." Also, Hegar said, the Office of the Comptroller is sending cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$617.2 million in local sales tax allocations for January, 0.1 percent less than in January 2015. The allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

"Don't Mess' turns 30

The Texas Department of Transportation on Jan. 3 announced the "Don't Mess With Texas" anti-litter campaign had reached its 30th anniversary.

For more than 30 years, according to the announcement, the iconic Don't Mess With Texas campaign has reminded people to put litter in a trash can instead of tossing it out of their vehicles.

"Researchers estimate that nearly a half a billion (435 million) pieces of visible litter pile up along statemaintained highways annually. Small bits of trash can add up to one big litter problem, especially when napkins, wrappers and cigarette butts make up 70 percent of all litter found along Texas roads. In 2014 alone, the state spent \$35 million in highway cleanup costs," TxDOT said.

How to really cut down on gun deaths

"Instead of arguing at the margins, politicians on both sides should be addressing the funding, access, and quality of our mental health system...
With the Presidential campaigns in full swing, it is little surprise that President Barack Obama's recent proposals on gun access have been met with political spin instead of objective analysis. Both sides are looking to make over generalizations without looking at the practical numbers behind the real issue that should address: our mental health crisis.

that should address: our mental health crisis.

Any conversation on gun violence should start with a basic set of facts in order to see the complete picture. Looking at the number of gun deaths, then moving to gun violence and mental health connections, and mental health connections, and inally to where real bipartisan progress can be made in expanding access to mental health care can give depth to the otherwise shallow arguments made in today's debate.

When looking at the actual

made in today's debate. When looking at the actual occurrence of gun deaths in the United States, there is a very prominent role for those experiencing a mental illness, and it is not mass shooting settings. The point about gun access and suicide is clear in these statistics:

- More than 60 percent of

- More than 60 percent of people in this country who die from guns die by suicide.
- According to Harvard School of Public Health, in 2010 in the U.S., 19,392 people took their own lives with guns, compared with 11,078 who were killed by others.
- Over 90 suicides happen every hour, and 90% of these deaths are related to mental illness.

The Hogg Foundation for Mental Health recently hosted a forum about violence preventior and mental health at the Texas Capitol in February of 2015. Some interesting stats mentioned by Dr. Joel Dvoskin from the University of Arizona included:

- People suffering from a Severe and Persistent Mental Illness are 11 to 12 times mor likely to be victims of a violent

inkely to be victims of a violent crime

- If all violence related to mental illness were to go away, the overall reduction in violent crime would be only 4%

- The odds of someone with

I ne odds of someone win schizophrenia killing someone is approximately 1 in 140,000 In mental health access, the media would be well served to remember Texas ranks 49th in the nation for public funding for mental health (Kaiser, 2013). In Harris County, even with massive increases in the state burdent in the last two lenislative massive increases in the state budget in the last two legislative sessions, there is a striking gap of mental health access for residents. According to the 2015 report of the Mental Health Needs Council of Harris County:

142,930 adults had a serious mental illness in Harris County.

- 89,579 individuals with

serious mental illness had no public (Medicaid or Medicare) or private health insurance and were exclusively dependent on the public mental health

service system for treatment. -The Harris Center is able to

treat between 11,000 & 12,000 per month, covering only a fraction of that population Like clockwork, whenever the debate over gun control happens there will be questions around the mental healthcare system with calls to improve it. When enough time passes for the debate over guns to die down, the bipartisan calls for mental health care also fades from the headdines.

mental health care also fades from the headlines. Instead of arguing at the margins, politicians on both sides should be addressing the funding, access, and quality of our mental health system and not change the subject from the need for additional resources. The biggest impact in reducing gun deaths in the United States is effective suicide prevention and improved mental healthcare, and that's not debatable.


A man died last Wednesday night, January 6, after throwing himself at a moving car in a parking lot in east Houston, authorities said.


