
Gateway Monument work underway in Galena Park

GALENA PARK - Work


GALENA PARK – Work is underway on the construction of a "Gateway" monument, marking the entrance to Houston through the Port.

This is one of nine similar gateway projects, paid for primarily by the EconomicAlliance, a consortium of Ship Channel industries. The Alliance provided each community with a \$125,000 grant, and a matching grant of \$25,000 was required.

Each gateway design is different, related to the community in which they are built. Design work was by Bryan Janhsen of Knudsen landscapre architects. Also planned is a plaza with statues honoring Veterans, Firefighters, and Police.



What employers should know about child support

More than 1.6 million Texas children are being raised by a single mom or dad. In most instances, one parent is obligated by court order to provide financial and medical support to the parent with primary custody. By deducting child support from employee paychecks, Texas employers play a key role in improving the economic security of children who rely on child support to cover their basic needs.

For the state fiscal

their basic needs.
For the state fiscal year that ended Aug. 31, the Attorney General's Child Support Division served more than 1.5 million families and collected a record-breaking \$3.9 billion in child support.

Achieving that milestone would not have been possible without the help of Texas employers.
Money that employers
withheld from employee paychecks account for 78 percent of the \$3.9 billion collected. unted 53.9 billion collected.
In addition, employers responded to 157,039
National Medical Support Notices. With the help of employers, 63,814 children on the child support caseload were enrolled in employer-sponsored employer-sponsored health plans.

Deducting child support payments quickly and regularly has a direct and has a direct and significant impact on child and family well-being. The process helps paying parents in assuming responsibili-ty for their children, and reduces the likelihood of falling behind on payments. Children id economic hardship because their ongoing needs are being met.

To facilitate the timely processing of wage-withholding orders, employers are required by federal law to report the names of all newly-hired individuals to my office's Child Support Division. All employers, from small "mom and pop" operations to big box stores, are required to report newly-hired and rehired employees To facilitate the report newly-hired a rehired employees within 20 calendar days of the date the employee begins working for wages. All employees must be

reported, including seasonal, part-time, temporary and contract labor.

The reports we receive from employers are critical because they help us locate working parents who owe child support and send wage-withholding orders to their employ-ers. The efficient processing of wage-withholding orders gets payments to families more quickly, which is especially important during the holiday

New-hire reporting also aids the Child Support Division in locating parents for the purpose of establishing paternity, setting child support and taking enforcement actions for pareners which was a set of the purpose noncompliance.

The regular reporting of new hires not only benefits children and families, but also improves the bottom line for employers and taxpayers. The state of Texas cross-matches new-hire data against workers' compensation, unemployment and public assistance claims to detect unintended overpayment and fraudulent receipt of benefits. Overpayments are recovered and returned to the state.

To ease the administrative burden placed on employers, the Child Support Division offers a variety of electronic methods for responding to incomewithholding orders, reporting new hires and complying with other legally mandated duties. Most employers who use online reporting methods incur little or no significant costs to their operations. Paxton files brief supporting religious non-profits

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Jan. 11 filed a friend-of-the-court brief with the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of 20 states supporting the right of re-ligious nonprofits to exer-cise religious beliefs.

sincerely held beliefs.

"The principles of our nation, not to mention federal law, provides that the government must respect the closely held religious beliefs of its citizens," Paxton reasoned. "These non-profits, driven by faith and sincere convictions, serve our communities in important ways, from education to health care to earing for the elderly. It's paramount that that they continue their contributions to society and Texas will contintheir contributions to society and Texas will continue to fight any impediments imposed upon these organizations by the Obama Administration."

Safety campaign continues
The Texas Department of Transportation's state-wide "Plan While You Can" campaign reminds football fans to make a sober ride part of their game-watching plans for the NFL playoffs. The campaign runs through Super Bowl Sunday, Feb. 7.

"Crashes caused by drinking and driving are 100 percent preventable," said Carol Rawson, director of TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division. "Before you drink, make a game plan to get home safely. It's a decision that could save a life."

During the 2014 football season (Sept. 4, 2014 - Feb. 1, 2015), there were 10,676 alcohol-related traffic crashes in Texas. Those crashes resulted in 492 fa-talities, an increase of 7 percent over the previous

percent over the previous year.

Central to the campaign is a multicity tour featuring an interactive dodge ball game that uses custom gaming technology to replicate the effects of alcohol on a person's reflexes.

Drivers under the influence of alcohol can face up to \$17,000 in fines, legal fees, impoundment and other costs. TxDOT recommended that citizens visit SoberRides.org to find al-

Airdrops target
rabies
The Texas Department
of State Health Services on
Jan. 11 said its Oral Rabies Vaccination Program
"again takes flight this
week to prevent two "again takes flight this week to prevent two strains of rabies from making a comeback in the state and to resume a study of whether the same approach can effectively fight rabies in skunks."

The program was launched in 1995 in the middle of a massive outbreak of rabies in coyotes and gray foxes in Texas.

and gray foxes in Texas. Each winter since, the department has dropped dos-

Each winter since, the de-partment has dropped dos-es of rabies vaccine from aircraft over wildlife habi-tat in the state. When wild animals eat the vaccine packets, coated in tasty fishmeal crumbles, they become immune and can't spread rabies to livestock, pets or people. "We've been able to eliminate the coyote and gray fox strains of rabies from Texas but need to continue to distribute vac-cine along the Rio Grande to prevent wild animals that migrate across the border from reintroducing the disease," said Dr. Laura Robinson, director of the vaccine program. "We also continue to

Laura Robinson, director of the vaccine program.

"We also continue to evaluate whether the same method can help eliminate rabies in skunks in our test area of east-central Texas," she continued. "If it could be used elsewhere."

The department said the vaccine "has proven safe in more than 60 species of animals and is not a danger to humans, but

a danger to humans, but people should avoid han-dling the vaccine baits beding the vaccine baits because human contact makes it less likely wild animals will eat them. Dogs, cats and livestock that eat the vaccine baits are not considered vacci-nated against rabies."

What to ask your Tax Professional

(NAPSI)—Long before April 18th rolls around, it's smart to invest some time in looking for a reliable tax preparer. Before hiring anyone, howev-er, it can help to ask him or her these four questions

- questions.

 1. How much experience do you have with my type of return? As with any other professional—doctors, lawyers, architects—you want to work with someone who's familiar both with the business in general and with your sort of case in particular. Ask preparers how long they've been doing tax returns and what kinds.

 2. How do you
- 2. How do you determine your fees? Ask for billing and payment terms in writing. Many prepar-ers charge a flat fee based on the complexity of your tax return. Don't work with anyo who wants a percent-age of your refund or tells you what the refund will be before looking at your finan-cial information.
- 3. Have you represented many clients in IRS audits? On the one hand, you want some-one who has had one who has had enough experience with audits to help you if your return is scruti-nized. On the other, you don't want someone who has too much audit history. It may signify someone who claims a lot of questionable deductions.

4. Do you have any professional designations? Preparers who are enrolled agents (EAs) must fulfill continuing-education and licensing requirements and are bound by ethical standards. They're also authorized to represent taxpayers before the IRS in all matters, including audits, collections and appeals. EAs must pass a comprehensive exam administered by the IRS that covers the broad range of tax issues that affect individuals and busiindividuals and businesses and how to represent clients before the IRS.

represent chents before the IRS.

EAs who are members of the National Association of Enrolled Agents (NAEA) must complete 30 hours of continuing professional education each year to maintain membership in the National Association of Enrolled Agents—more than the IRS licensing requirement of 24 hours a year. EAs are also subject to vigorous background checks before they can be licensed and they're required to abide by U.S. Treasury Department Circular 230.


