

holding cells, offices, a workout room, fingerprint lab and a large conference room that will also serve as the Emergency Operations Center during disasters." In addition there will be 9 holding cells, 6 for men and 3 for omen. Architect Ed Gant stated

that the building will be a two story brick design with aluminum framed windows, and a metal standing seam roof. Area of the first floor is 10,710 square feet, with a "Sally port" of an additional 1830 s.f. The second floor is 8,966 s.f., and total building size is 21,506. The second story will allow expansion for future needs. Cost is budgeted at just over \$2 million.

In the parking lot will be space for a "Safe Trade Zone" where security cameras will focus on individuals as they trade items bought or sold online. City Manager Squyres said he expects the building to host regional training activities, and local law enforcement initiatives.

Governor signs 2018-2019, two-year state budget into law

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on June 12 signed Senate Bill 1, legislation that appropriates some \$217 billion to pay for the state's next two-year fiscal period. "I am once again sign-

ing a budget that addresses the most pressing challenges faced by our state. This budget funds a life-saving overhaul of Child Protective Services, ensuring children in Texas' foster care receive the protection they deserve, Abbott stated in his proclamation. "Even in a tight budget climate," he added, "this budget prioritizes the safety and well-being of all Texans. It continues to fund our state's role in securing the border, adding an additional 250 troopers to keep our communities safe. It funds the state's natural disaster response costs to provide state resources when disaster strikes. And it better protects our law enforcement officers across the state by funding grants for bul-

letproof vests. This budget ensures the workforce of today and tomorrow have the resources they need to keep Texas' economy growing and thriving, Abbott continued. "Under Senate Bill 1, all eligible prekindergarten stu-dents will receive a highquality education by increasing standards statewide. And the state will remain competitive on the job creation front with funds to help Texas remain the best state in the nation for doing busi-

"This budget achieves all of these goals while re-straining state-controlled spending below the growth in the state's estimated population and inflation. During the upcoming special session of the 85th Legislature, passage of legislation or a constitutional amendment to ensure the state continues to budget within responsible spending limitations will remain a top priority," added Ab-

List of items are vetoed Gov. Abbott further exercised his constitutional prerogative by vetoing approximately \$120 million in line items from the 2018-2019 state budget.

Examples of funding vetoed by the governor include more than \$86 million that had been earmarked for LIRAP, the Low Income Vehicle Repair Assistance, Retrofit and Accelerated Vehicle Retirement Program; and

- \$6 million to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for air quality improvement programs in certain coun-

\$4.7 million to the Texas Department of Public Safety for safety education;





\$4.2 million to the Texas Lottery Commission for a bonus to lottery retailers;

- \$2.5 million to the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board for water supply enhancement, primarily a brushcutting program conducted on private land;

- \$2 million to the Tex-as Water Development Board to study aquifers and brackish groundwa-

- \$860,000 in funding to the Secretary of State, for aid to colonias, substandard, unincorporated subdivisions. According to the Secretary of State, more 400,000 people reside in 2,294 colonias located primarily along the state's 1.248-mile border with Mexico.

Abbott vetoes list of

bills
In addition to his June
12 vetoes of line items within the state budget bill, Gov. Abbott on June 15 vetoed 50 individual bills that had survived final votes in both House and Senate.

Among them were a felt were duplicative of other bills he had approved.

Examples of other bills he struck down on their own merits were:
- HB 462 by Tony Dale,

R-Cedar Park, relating to the provision of notice of proposed rules by state agencies. Abbott wrote that the bill "has the potential to slow down the executive rulemaking

- HB 1284 by Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston, relating to the licensing and regulation of a jour-neyman lineman. Abbott said he vetoed the bill because he vetoed an identical bill that passed in the 2015 legislative ses-

- HB 2943 by Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio, relating to the use of money in the state water pollution control revolving fund. Abbott said the bill contains mandates that "are unnecessary and tie the hands of program admin-All of the governor's

On June 12, Hegar named Tom Smelker, director of the state's Treasurv Operations, as the first administrator of the Texas Bullion Depositofor the State Treasury for 30 years, including 10 years serving as director of Treasury Operations.

220 Cities, 140 Million Americans to lose Amtrak service

Federal Budget Will Kill U.S. Train

(NAPSI)—This summer travel season may be the last year with train travel as an option for millions of Americans. The Administration's proposed 2018 budget wipes out funding for almost all Amtrak trains except on the East and West coasts. More than 220 cities and towns will lose train service completely and 140 million people will completely lose an entire transportation

"If Congress enacts this budget, our national passenger rail network will largely cease to exist," said Jim Mathews, National Association of Railroad Passengers (NARP) president and CEO. "These cuts will have a profound economic impact both nationally, regionally and locally

Although the trains impacted are often called long-distance trains, they are also local and regional transportation for the areas they serve. In Montana and North Dakota, for example, the Amtrak line goes across both states and connects 19 towns and cities. In Florida, 28 communities are bound together by Amtrak trains that offer a real option for family and business travelers.

This summer, the National Association of Railroad Passengers is organizing Americans across the country to participate in "Rally For Trains" in an effort to demonstrate the significant impact trains have on the lives of Americans

"Rally For Trains' symbolizes the broad support Americans have for trains and passenger rail,' Mathews continued "We will push back until our collective voice is heard, and get the funding passenger rail deserves—and America needs."

Although the White House budget is regularly ignored by the Congress, it is often seen as an opening bid in the federal budget negotiation process. This budget slashes infrastructure investment and completely eliminates funding for long-distance rail across the United States.

Cuts to Amtrak transit, and commuter rail programs, and even air service to rural towns, would not only cost construction and manufacturing jobs, but will place a disproportionate amount of pain on rural and working class communities

The people who will suffer the most are those who rely on passenger rail to get to their job, for an ADAcompliant mode of travel, and for people in so-called "flyover country," where other transportation options are limited.

San Jacinto College students selected to conduct cancer research

CURE program, supported by the National Cancer Institute, selected eight students nationwide for research opportunity

PASADENA, Texas -Conducting cancer research, this is how Trung Vu, Kenley Miller, Kevin Rodriguez and Simon Mendoza from San Jacinto College are spending their summer as the only community college students accepted to the Continuing Umbrella of Research Experiences (CURE)

program.
The CURE program, supported by the National Cancer Institute, and a partnership between the University of Iowa and collaborative academic institutions, is designed to provide an atmosphere to train undergraduate students in cancer research. Once selected, the students are assigned mentors at the University of Iowa Holden Comprehensive Cancer Center, where they study in different labs and work alongside principle investigators as paid undergraduate researchers for eight weeks during two con-

secutive summers. Eight students were selected from across the United States for this summer's program. Miller, who is studying to become a pharmacist, said he looks forward to the research opportunity that could one day change lives. "My mother was diagnosed with thyroid cancer a year ago, and my sister has juvenile arthritis; these factors drive me to seek this type of opportunity to help others," he said.

Prior to the summer, Vu, Miller, Rodriguez and Mendoza spent weeks preparing for the program with their mentor Christopher Wild, San Jacinto College department chair of physical sciences and engineering. Wild has conducted cancer research for approximatemeetings with the four student researchers covered the topics of basic research etiquette, searching and reading




