Mainte-nance work also requires a nation-al certification in a technical field such as machinist or electrician. Me-chanical aptitude is needed. Plants also look for people with qood

chanical aptitude is needed. Plants also look for people with good math and science skills.

Applicants must be drug-free, able to pass a background check, and able to obtain a Transportation Worker Identification Credential from the Transportation Security Administration.

Making a good impression is essential if granted an interview.
Good communication skills, a pleasant attitude. Professional appearance is important: dress appropriately in clean clothes, avoid or at
least hide tattoos and piercings, sit
up straight, and look at the interviewer.

Often, a good way for an applicant to get a foot in the door is to cant to get a foot in the door is to work for a contractor at one of the plants, especially in maintenance positions such as millwrights, bollermakers, etc. This will give the future applicant a chance to learn about the plant culture, working conditions, employee attitudes and a chance for the plant personnel to witness your work ethics.

Companies told the CIP that they post their job openings online, and application must be made online. Some companies may also post job notices in community newspapers and at community colleges in the area. Those seeking work should check company websites frequently. EAST HOUSTON HOSPITAL Scott Stephens partners with local hospital for heart screenings

Houston, TX - Art Garza, Chief Operating Officer of East Houston Regional Medical Center announced the East Houston Regional Medical Center's partnership with the Cody Stephens "Go Big or Go Home" Memorial Foundation and area independent school districts to provide electrocardiograms (EKGs) for students who participate in school sports and other extracurricular activities. In 2012 with only two months before the 69" 289-pound Cody Stephens was slated to join a college football team, he sat down to rest and died of sudden cardiac arrest. He was 18 years old, and he would have received a required EKG by his college football team, a procedure which might have identified his heart problem.

Scott Stephens, Cody's father, approached East Houston Regional Medical Center with a proposal that resulted in 2,216 EKG screenings last year.


The show's big finale was the annual auction. Sheldon stu-

Many registered but few voted in primaries

AUSTIN — Looking back at the March 4 primaries, Texas boasted 13,601,324 voters reg-istered in time to cast a bal-

An estimated 9 percent of the overall number of regis-tered voters (about 1.3 million)



voted in the Republican pri-mary and 4 percent (500,000) voted in the Democratic pri-

mary and 4 percent (500,000) voted in the Democratic primary.

Runoffs between the top two vote-getting candidates in a number of contests are scheduled for Tuesday, May 27, the day after the federal holiday, Memorial Day. Votes count big in any election, but as historic participation records reveal, the portion of the electorate that actually votes in runoffs is an even thinner slice of the whole. And voter turnout is especially low in mid-term (non-presidential election year) runoffs, as those set for May 27 will be. Usually about 2 percent of registered voters cast a ballot in those.

Next, let's look at the final component of the March 4 primary ballot — propositions — reflecting interests of the Texas Democratic and Texas Republican parties. Propositions and percentages of votes in favor or against each, as posted by Office of the Texas Secretary of State's Elections Division, are as follows.

Tax revenue increases

Protection ruling to come

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing to protect the lesser prairie-chicken as threatened under the Endangered Species Act and a ruling on the bird's status is expected March 30.

The bird's Texas habitat includes short grass and mixed grass prairies in 24 counties of the Panhandle region, where energy companies have interests.

where energy companies have interests.


A lesser prairie-chicken advisory committee that first met in February 2010 produced a list of recommendations, and one was that industries operating in lesser prairie-chicken habitat develop best management practices to minimize impact. Many oil and gas companies reoil and gas companies re-sponded, saying they voluntar-ily would enroll acreage in a habitat conservation plan for

the bird.

In 2012, a conservation compromise was struck between the State of Texas and the federal government over the listing and proposed protection of the dune sagebrush lizard and its West Texas shinnery oak dunes habitat where oil, gas and wind energy development operations are sited.

up Texas Department of Pub-lic Safety on March 6 announced a planned increase of DWI patrols, before, during and after spring break, running from March 7 to March 23. For the duration of the enforcement period, state troopers' focus has been on high-risk locations' at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent.

when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent.
During last year's spring break enforcement period, the agency reported, more than 1,000 DWI arrests with enforcement also were made, resulting in more than 11,400 speeding citations, 1,600 seat belt/child safety seat tickets, 552 fugitive arrests and 463 felony arrests during the period.

The treated effluent is discharged to an unnamed drainage ditch along Saralla Road; thence to unnamed drainage ditch along Farm-to-Market Road 1942; thence to Harris County Flood Control District (HCFCD) Ditch No. Q122-00-00; thence to Cedar Bayou Above Tidal in Segment No. 0902 of the Trinity-San Jacinto Coastal Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are minimal aquatic life use for the unnamed drainage ditch along Saralla Road and unnamed drainage ditch along Farm-to-Market Road 1942; limited aquatic life use for the HCFCD Ditch No. Q122-00-00. The designated uses for Segment No. 0902 are high aquatic life use, public water supply and primary contact recreation. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

Angel Flight South Central provides free air transportation for medical and humanitarian purposes.


The organization's goal is to remove the transportation burden from patients es they




