It is being paid for by funds from the settlement obtained from the PRP (Potential Responsibile tential Responsibile Parties) in the Waste Pits lawsuit. 274-0911 before March 10 to register. Calls will be returned with an acknowledgement.

Testing will be performed at no cost to homeowners, and results will be provided to each.

Qualification Criteria:

- Property Owner must sign a consent form;

- Property must be located in areas shown on the map;

- Drinking water on property must be provided from a single family, privately owned residential well, with no other water source;

- Properties that were previously sampled in Phase I are not eligible for resampling.

Sen. Creighton files prolife Bill protecting doctors

Senate Bill 25 Would Reduce Pressure on Physicians to Advocate for Abortion

Austin, TX – Today, Senator Brandon Creight-on (R-Conroe) took a stand for the unborn with a bill intended to protect doctors from legal pres-sure to recommend abortion. Based on legal precedent, doctors can be assigned liability for children born with abnormalities if they identified those abnor-malities in utero and identified those abnormalities in utero and failed to advocate for termination, resulting in what's termed a "wrongful birth."

ful birth."

"It is unacceptable that doctors can be penalized for embracing the sanctity of life," said Creighton, a father of two. "It is especially disturbing to learn that the case law supporting damage awards for fetal abnormalities leans heavily on a Texas Supreme Court ruling made more than forty years ago. Because so many states have so many states have followed Texas' lead, it's incumbent on us to lead the way to a renewed embrace of life in Ameri-

Sen. Creighton added the bill to his already full slate of proposed legisla-tion that focuses on

economic empower-nent and alleviating on Texas families and job creators.


"It breaks my heart "It breaks my heart that courts have punished doctors for the birth of children with Down Syndrome or a missing limb," concluded Creighton. "Every child is preciou and deserving of our protection."

With damage awards known to reach eight digits, doctors are under pressure to err on the side of advocating for abortion. Creighton's bill, "Prohibited Cause of Action: Wrongful Birth" has been assigned the number Senate Bill 25. It has the support of Lieutenant Governor Dan Patrick.

Federal judge sides with plaintiffs in Planned Parenthood case

AUSTIN - Texans who rely on Planned Parent-hood as a medical care pro-vider won't have to seek those services elsewhere, pending an upcoming tri-al.

In the lawsuit titled Planned Parenthood et al. v. Texas Health and Huv. Texas Health and Hu-man Services Commission, U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks of Austin on Feb. 21 granted a preliminary in-junction to prevent the Texas Department of Health and Human Servic-es from eliminating fund-ing for Planned Parenthood in the state's 2017-18 budget.

Parenthood in the states 2017-18 budget. "There is no legitimate public interest in allowing Texas to complete its planned terminations (of funding) based on the cur-rent facts," wrote Sparks. "Instead, the public inter-

"Instead, the public interest favors enforcing the individual plaintiffs' rights and avoiding disrupting the health care of some of Texas's most vulnerable individuals."

Sparks found that an injunction would ensure that Medicaid recipients in Texas "will continue to have access to medical care at their chosen providers" and the Texas Department of Health and Human Serof Health and Human Ser-

of Health and Human Service's termination of Planned Parenthood's provider agreements likely violates federal law.


Sparks ordered the plaintiffs and defendants to work out a schedule for presenting arguments within 30 days. The court will then schedule a trial date.

Legendary jurist dies

Noted Texas jurist Jack Pope of Austin died at age 103 on Feb. 25.

Born in Abilene in 1913, Pope helped establish formal judicial education for Texas judges, fought for a voluntary judicial ethics code when judges had none and fought again to make that code mandatory and enforceable. He served for 38 years as a district court 38 years as a district court

as years as a district court judge, court of appeals justice and on the Texas Supreme Court, the last two as chief justice. His judicial tenure, as a whole, was the longest of any Texas Supreme Court justice.

As a court of appeals justice, Pope's reassessment of water rights conveyed by Spanish and Mexican land grants changed Texas water law forever. As chief justice he forged a way to guarantee income to finance legal assistance for the poor. Consistance for the poor. Concerned with double litigation in the same case, he won legislative support for statutory changes to thwart "forum shopping" for favorable judges.

Still, other historical groups took this lore even further, using aquamarine as gifts to the bride at a wedding in order to symbolize long unity and love. Some even believed it could re-awaken love between two people.

The Sumerians, Egyp-The Sumerians, Egyptians, and Hebrews all admired aquamarine, and many warriors would wear it into battle to bring about victory. Many ancient medicines used powder from aquamarine to help cure all manner of infection, but it was said to be particularly good for eye ailments. The stone is also considered to be a great addition to mental health and is used widely as a symbol in Tarot as well as a meditation aid and is said to help one cultivate more inner

BLOODSTONE OVERVIEW

The second birthstone for March is bloodstone, a dark-green stone flecked with vivid red spots of iron with vivid red spots of iron oxide. Generally found embedded in rocks or in riverbeds as pebbles, primary sources for this stone are India, Brazil, and Australia.

Bloodstone is also called heliotrope, a word from the ancient Greek that means 'to turn the sun." Many believe it was probably named such because of ancient ideas about how minima the control of the sun of the control of the sun."

Bloodstone is sometimes also known as another name, Blood Jasper. But really these stones are chalcedony, a crypto crystalline quartz. There are two forms of bloodstone: one is more transparent (heliotrope) with red spots while the other is more opaque (plasma) and has little or no red spots.

For those looking for a good quality bloodstone, it is generally considered that a solid green color with visible veins of red is best. It also comes in many shapes and cuts including traditional cuts like emerald, oval, and cushion.

Bloodstone may not have the overt beauty of aquamarine, but many prize this stone for its symbolism and other properties.

BLOODSTONE HISTORY

This ancient stone was used by the Babylonians to make seals and amulets and was believed to have and was believed to have healing powers — especially for blood disorders. It is sometimes called the martyr's stone as legend tells that it was created when drops of Christ's blood stained some jasper at the foot of the cross.

Many other ancient cultures believed bloodstone had magical powers, with some references to its ability to heal dating back to 5000 BC.

The Babylonians used bloodstone in their divina-

The Babylonians used bloodstone in their divina-tion. The Egyptians prized bloodstone because they believed it helped them to magically defeat their en-

emies. They also believed it increased their strength

or made them invisible. Still others believed Still others believed that bloodstone could help control or change the weather, win legal battles, or give the gift of prophecy. It was so loved for its properties, many used the stone in jewelry, signet rings and even small cups or statues.

Today, many still cherish bloodstone as a lucky charm or amulet and is prized by athletes or those who wish to increase their personal strength. Some believe it helps with men-



into every match and also carry that same philosophy into their academic studies."


