Workforce Development Programs

As a followup to recent plant presentations on how to get a job in a chemical plant, refinery, or terminal, members of the Galena Park-Jacinto City Community-Industry Partnership (CIP) asked representatives of Galena Park Independent School District (GPISD) and San Jacinto College to explain what their institutions do to help prepare the future industry workforce.

Elizabeth Lalor, GPISD Executive Director of Educational Support, described partnerships with businesses and other groups that introduce students to industrial, construction, and maritime work. The district also partners with San Jacinto College to allow students to graduate with both a high school diploma and an associate's degree.

San Jacinto College Vice-Chancellor Allatia Harris said growth in the manufacturing industry means there is a greater need for engineers and other 4-year-degree careers. But there are now a great many jobs that require "middle skills," meaning education beyond high school but not a bachelor's degree. She strongly recommends that students look at

Greens Bayou Corridor Coalition Annual Meeting

Emmett keynote stresses cooperation

HOUSTON – The Greens Bayou Corridor Coalition (BGCC) held its annual report to the public, with a keynote address from County Judge Ed Emmett, and remarks from Houston Mayor Annise Parker last Thursday, March 20.

Chairman Bill Franks acted as Master of Ceremonies, and Executive Director Jill Boullion presented an overview video on the state of the coalition and its accomplishments in the last year.

ments in the last year.

Boullion had a lot to present, as the Coalition currently has about 40 projects, taking place in four distinct areas or "reaches" around the North and East sections of the County. The Coalition partners with a number of other organizations to accomplish its work, and this idea led to Emmett's keynote theme, partnerships.

Boullion pointed out that

the Coalition covers approxi-

mately 45 miles in length, and its goals are recreation, economic development, and enhanced quality of life. In addition, it works to remediate flooding and other threats to the bayous.

GBCC is concerned with

GBCC is concerned with Greens Bayou, Halls Bayou, Garners Bayou and Reinhardt Bayou.

GBCC is funded by memberships and grants. It works with the help of the National Park Service, Texas Parks & Wildlife, and a number of corporate and organizational sponsors.

APPEAL DENIED: Judge upholds enforcement of Game Room Regulations

State District Court Judge Al Bennett denied an attempt to further delay the enforcement of new regulations aiming to crack down on illegal game rooms. Following a hearing held this afternoon, Judge Bennett denied a request for a temporary injunction to prevent enforcement of the regulations.

The office of Harris County
Attorney Vince Ryan defended the game room regulations
citing the lawfulness, constitutionality and enforceability
of the regulations passed by
the Harris County Commissioners Court in December
2013.

"We are pleased with the ruling and look forward to working with Harris County Sheriff's Office, the Constables, and other in implementing and enforcing these game room regulations," Ryan said.

Under the new regulations, game room operators must obtain permits, pay a \$1,000 annual fee, shut down between 10 p.m. and 8 a.m., maintain transparent windows, and are banned from requiring a membership for entry. New game rooms must be located at least 1,500 feet from schools, churches and residential neighborhoods. Violators

could be charged with Class A misdemeanors and could face fines of up to \$10,000 and jail time

A supplier of video poker machines sought the temporary restraining order and a permanent injunction against regulations relating to establishments that house six or more video poker machines. Such establishments are often known to be hotbeds for illegal gambling, armed robberies and other criminal activity. There are approximately 360 game rooms in Houston, and about 300 more in the unincorporated county.

Lockdown at two local daycares

CROSBY-Two local child care centers went on lockdown March 19 when an armed man tried to enter one of them.

Harris County sheriff's deputies say the 26-year-old man suf-

fers from bipolar disorder.

When he became agitated and combative at his home that day, his mother decided he needed hospitalization, according to reports. Just after 3 p.m. they left to go but he jumped from her moving car near 5700 FM 2100 and ran up to the door of Growing In Graces Child Care Center with a 9mm Glock pistol, acceptable after search. cording to reports.

A daycare client saw him dashing for the daycare and yelled, There's a guy with a gun,"

When he found the door locked, reports say the man threw

the pistol in some bushes in front of the daycare center, and got back into the the car with his mother, who was following him to

the building. As they continued north on FM 2100 the man jumped from the car again, lacerating his head as he exited the car. He ran past the Crosby Christian Academy daycare near 5500 FM 2100, and on down Main Street, officials said. He was captured by deputies about a quarter mile from there.

Both daycare operators performed admirably at the right time. The suspect was arrested but not charged. Instead a judge issued an emergency detention order. The man is now being treated at the Harris County Psychiatric Hospital. His observation lasts 90 days. Sheriff's deputies said he may still face criminal charges after that.

PASADENA, Texas - Highlighting the critical impor-tance of improving student success in America's commu-nity colleges, the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program has named San Jacinto College as one of the na-tion's top 150 community colleges eligible to compete for the 2015 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence and

\$1 million in prize funds. "It's an incredible honor to be selected for a second year as one of the top community colleges in the country," said San Jacinto College Chancellor Dr. Brenda Hellver. "This recognition is due to the vision and leadership of our Board of faculty and staff that work diligently each and every day to ensure that our students are completing their goals, gradu-ating with a certificate or degree, and moving on to the next phase - either transfer-

ring to further pursue their education, or entering the workforce with the skills they need to succeed."

The Prize, awarded every

two years, is the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance among America's community colleges, and recognizes institutions for exceptional student outcomes in four areas: student learning, certificate and degree completion, employment and earnings, and high levels of access and success for minority and low-income stu-dents.

The Aspen Institute identified the top 150 community colleges through an assessmance, improvement, and equity on student retention and completion measures. Together, the 150 community colleges eligible to compete for the Prize represent the diver-sity and richness of the entire

sector. The colleges represent 37 states; urban, rural, and suburban markets; and they encompass large and small community colleges alike.

Why the affordable care act benefits latinos

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) is benefiting Latinos in Houston and across Texas.

Far into this enrollment process, I am hearing multiple success stories from people who have enrolled for affordable coverage and who are already using it to strengthen their families' health. Anyone who says differently has to be com-pletely out of touch with the Latino population.

Latinos are disproportionately uninsured in this state. We are 40 percent of the total Texas population, yet we are 60 percent of the uninsured population. Those of us in the Houston area should be especially aware that we have 22 percent of the uninsured Latino population in Texas

The ACA and other programs like Medicaid and CHIP greatly benefit Lati-nos, and are critical to our community's health. They make health care not only affordable, but also easily accessible. And, they benefit our State's economy

We need to support these programs and encourage our family, friends, and neigh-bors who are uninsured to enroll at the Health Insurance Marketplace at www.healthcare.gov through the March 31 deadline. Already, statewide we have about 300,000 Texans who have found private insurance as of March 1

A health insurance plan will cost about the same as a monthly mobile phone bill. A Bronze plan for a 27-year-old in Houston who makes \$25,000 could be \$89 per month after a tax credit or \$94 after a tax credit for a family of four with an income of \$50,000. Plans vary based on income and the types of coverage selected, and about 80% of Texans who enroll through the Health Insurance Marketplace are receiving some type of financial assistance to ensure coverage fits their budgets.

For example, 24 year old Benito Balderas, who works at a bail bond company in Houston, enrolled in January and happily came out of the process with a Bronze plan that costs him \$44 each month. When asked about his experience, he gratefully says that it was easy for him to enroll with a health care navigator, and it only took about 45 minutes. While he hasn't used his plan yet, Benito says that he signed up because he thinks it's worth it, as he will need it sooner or

As designed, the Affordable Care Act had coverage for every budget, but decisions made in Texas mean that many will fall through the health care coverage cracks. The inaction of our Governor and statewide leaders to accept available federal funding to expand Medicaid in Texas to adults living under the federal poverty level has hurt our

Subsidies in the new Health Insurance Market-place are only available to families above the poverty line (\$23,850 for a family of four). However, Medicaid expansion would have covered those making less than that. Over one million uninsured Texas adults will be unable to find coverage because of this lack of action on Medicaid expansion, and 56% of those one million uninsured are Latinos.

By not expanding Medicaid under the ACA, Texas left federal dollars on the table. On average, Texas would have received a \$9 federal match for every \$1 invested by the State. Expansion would have also provided economic benefits that would have included growth in direct and indirect business activity, job gains and a reduction in uncompensated care costs that are currently paid by local governments. Texas econo mist Ray Perryman estimates that Texas could have realized about \$300 billion in output and 350,000 jobs per over 10 years from Medicaid expansion.

When we don't adequately provide health coverage, everyone is impacted: Latinos and non-Latinos, the uninsured, the insured, healthcare providers, businesses, local governments and tax payers. The bottom line is that we need to support more access to health coverage for everyone. We can do this by enrolling ourselves, our family and our friends at the Health Insurance Marketplace and urging our statewide leaders to support Medicaid expansion

DPS creates center to protect children

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety on March 18 announced the creation of the Texas Crimes Against Children Center within the agency's Texas Rangers Division.

The stated goal is to protect children through the collection and dissemination of vital in-telligence, investigative support and cooperation with victim-assistance counselors by "providing support to local, state and federal partners on investigations related to missing and exploited children, the trafficking of children, child abductions and other high-risk threats to children."

"The exploitation and hu-man trafficking of children is a deplorable crime and it is critical that we use all available resources to keep them safe," said DPS Director Steven McCraw.



For the Senate Committee

on Jurisprudence, charges in-clude monitoring: (a) the implementation of laws passed in 2013 regarding criminal procedures related to children who commit certain Class C misdemeanors; (b) the prosecution of certain misdemean-or offenses committed by children and to school district law enforcement; and (c) the state's new electronic, digi-tized court filing system. The Senate Committee on

Open Government is to "review the Texas Public Information Act to ensure that access to public records and information by the public re-mains fully transparent, but that governmental entities have the authority to protect the privacy interests of citizens, including primary and higher education students, from improper public disclosure." The committee also will review and make recommendations on improving the transparency of information available on state websites regarding state expenditures, reports and contracts, including a comparison of how simi-lar information is provided by other states.

The Senate Committee on Transportation is to evaluate comprehensive development agreements and design/build project delivery methods and make recommendations. The panel also is to examine the implementation of law passed in 2013 to provide "remedies for habitual violators of non-payment of tolls" and "make recommendations for any legislation needed to improve. enhance, and/or complete implementation.



Such are the people, places and things that have touched my life in my home!







