Legislature: Mothers Day Massacre kills 120 local bills

AUSTIN - In the 140 day law passing session known as the the 85th legislative session in the Texas House, the Texas Freedom Caucus has found a way to cut back on all the arguing by stalling to kill local and consent bills.

The Legislature is running a little behind, in fact last May 11, they were still going through May 6's calendar. Then the Freedom Caucus began to delay legislation. The single exception was that following a tearful begging by State Rep. Drew Springer, R., a bill dealing with stem cell

treatment got hustled through. The representa-tive's wife has a spinal injury and the bill passed with seconds left that might be able to treat her ailment.

"The Mother's Day Massacre," pitted factions of the House Republicans as major deadlines closed in

to kill other legislation. House Bill 3476 to ensure echocardiograms for first year athletes before playing sports was dead on the floor without a trial. This was the bill that Crosby resident, Scott Stephens had sought for eight years. Since the death of his son

that bill had been unanimously passed by the House Committee.

In fact most of the bills killed are fairly no issue, consented to without much fanfare, sometimes called local and consent calendar items, so they are passed easily. But they can be filibustered to death just by mumbling words at the podium or finding five signa-

tures in opposition. State Rep. Matt Rinaldi, R. - Îrving Texas summed up the Freedom Caucus reaction, "When you give people nothing, they have nothing to lose and they're going to fight for their constituents and if they can't do it within the system, they're going to do it without the system."

Certainly the similarity to Marx's Communist Manifesto is just coincidental. The Freedom Caucus labelled House Speak-er Straus' followers "Not Conservative Enough, and have been at odds since he became the Speaker in 2009. The conservative group cites that many of their bills were not passed by the House Leadership.

Some concern has been expressed that if the caucus delays the budget and the Sunset Bill (a lawmaker review of state agencies and their improvement) could shutter the Texas Department of Transportation if recommendations are not passed.

Thirty seven of 295 bills on the agenda got passed, after getting stuck on an abortion-related bill and then being held up by overt obstruction in the evening by the Freedom Caucus members, who slowed progress on the floor by proposing amend-ments, debating no issue measures at length and frequently asking ques-



When Free Trade Agreements are not so free

successful businessman and negotiator, President Trump ran much of his campaign ing established international trade agreements to benefit American businesses and their workforces Needless to say, he has taken on a challenge that many of his predecessors, with their focus on diplo-matic relations, were unable to achieve. Time will show whether this $45\mathrm{th}$ president will be able to fulfill this challenge, but many American businesses are relying on him to not only improve their freedom to trade internationally but to protect their assets from loopholes that continue to hurt their business

Omissions and oversights in international agreements can cost millions of dollars and American jobs.

One particular example of what many consider an unfair trade agreement is the Australia-United States Free Trade Agreement (AUSFTA), which lets Australia claim it does not have to resolve any investment disputes with U.S. companies in a neutral forum. This is counter to the majority of the 30 trade agreements between Australiaand other nations that do contain investor-state dispute settlement provisions. The only countries that don't have a specific procedure for investorstate arbitration are Japan and the United

One Firm's Story

Closing this loophole would offer a heavy financial respite for business executives such as John Campion, CEO of APR Energy, a privately owned company that provides emergency electricity to industries and countries around the world.

In late 2013, APR leased \$70 million worth of generators and other facilities to the Forge Group Power Pty Ltd, an Australian company that had contracted with Horizon Power, a stateowned public utility in Western Australia. The project was designed to

address a severe power shortage in that state.

In February 2014, the Forge Group was placed under voluntary administration liquida-tion and all assets were seized by receivers appointed by their largest creditor, the Australia and New Zealand Banking Group Ltd. These assets included the leased property belonging to APR. The receivers claimed title to APR's property based on Australia's Personal Property Securities Act of 2009, under which all leased personal property becomes "owned" by the bankrupt company's estate to the exclusion of the lessor if the lessor does not file a registration statement. The legal claim prevented APR from using its own facility to produce electricity and caused significant financial injury to APR. This injury includes significant amounts of money simply to buy back the facility to use it, tens of millions of dollars of revenue, a substantial loss of value to the company, and layoffs. Moreover, the total economic loss from this specific action exceeds \$260 million for APR.

The recourse APR currently has for this financial loss is uncertain because Australia has rejected APR's demands to submit the dispute to arbitration.

As this suggests, the lack of a defined procedure under the AUSFTA appears to be prejudicial to U.S. companies and banks.

What Can Be Done

It is hoped by many American businesses and financial institu-tions that the recent meeting between President Trump and the Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull will mean the start of a renegotiation of what may look like a minor detail in a large trade agreement but that has the potential to cost company's revenue and American workers their jobs.

Legislature grinds toward May 29 close with much still to accomplish

AUSTIN — With a mere two weeks remaining until the end of the 85th regular session of the Texas Legislature, lawmakers have not yet finalized a state budget for fiscal years 2018 and 2019.

The Legislature's 150 House members and 31 Senate members can work around the clock, if need be. Their only absolutely required accomplishment in the 140-day-long session is to produce that budget and put it on the gover-nor's desk. If they don't, the governor will call them back for a special session.

House floor debates, protracted by Republican intra-party bickering, ate up the clock last week. Sheaves of mostly noncontroversial local and consent bills accumulated and died as deadlines took effect, and chances were reduced for hundreds of other bills to earn a spot on a floor-debate calendar.

Despite the atmosphere in the House, the body tentatively passed House Bill 39, the Child and Family Protective Services and Health and Human Services reform bill authored by Gene Wu, D-Houston; Richard Raymond, D-Laredo; Sarah Davis, R-Houston; Toni Rose, D-Dallas; James White, R-Hillister; and coauthored by Jason Isaac, R-Dripping Springs; and Ina Minjarez and Tomas Uresti, both D-San Antonio. The bipartisan bill seeks to support the existing child protective services system by creating programs and procedures that respond to service gaps, provide resources for parties involved in child welfare and the foster care system, and establish a more efficient case management system. HB 39 still must gain Senate approval before advancing to the governor's



Meanwhile, at the East end of the Capitol building, the Senate unanimously approved SB 1849, the Sandra Bland Act.

Sandra Bland was found dead in a Waller County jail cell in July 2015, three days after a state trooper arrested her in a traffic stop. In September 2016, Bland's family was awarded \$1.8 million from Waller County and \$100,000 from the Texas Department of Public Safety, defendants in a wrongful-death lawsuit

The bill, authored by

John Whitmire, D-Houston, dean of the Senate and chair of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee, would require training for jail officers to teach them to recognize signs of mental illness in newly in-carcerated individuals and take appropriate action, such as notifying a judge in a timely fashion. The bill also would require county jails to install surveillance cameras, if funding allows. On May 11, the bill moved to the House for consideration

AG files preemptive

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 8 filed a lawsuit asking the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas to uphold Senate Bill 4, legislation finally passed on May 4 and signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott

on May 7. SB 4, which takes effect Sept. 1, bans sanctuary cities in Texas and requires all governments throughout the state to comply with immigration law and detainer requests. The law is expected to trigger lawsuits challenging its constitutionality.

"Texas possesses an independent sovereign responsibility to protect the health, welfare and safety of its residents," Paxton wrote, explaining why he filed the lawsuit. "Texas, cognizant of this duty, recently enacted SB 4 to set a statewide policy of cooperation with federal immi gration authorities," he added.

Sales tax checks increase

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 10 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$787.8 million in local sales tax allocations for May, an amount 2.6 percent more than in May 2016.

These allocations are based on sales made in March by businesses that report tax monthly and sales made in January, February and March by quarterly filers.

The cities of Irving, Round Rock, Dallas, San Antonio and Odessa saw noticeable increases in sales tax allocations and the cities of McAllen and Sugar Land saw noticeable decreases, Hegar

application and were drawn from a lottery to be accepted. The school district plans on adding one more grade level a year to complete the middle school academy and progress into the high chool academy in the fu-

Students in this STEM academy will be given a challenging schedule next year that focuses on Project Based Learning in all of its core classes as well as an AVID (Advancement Via Individual De $termination)\, class, a\, STEM$ Lab class, and two other elective classes that they choose. This challenging, yet supportive schedule is designed to not only pre-pare the students by sup-porting them with college readiness standards daily, but it will allow them to learn through experiences with hands-on projects, field trips, STEM career guest speakers and after school STEM activities.

This path will lead the students to take courses that will prepare them for careers in the fields of Computer Sci-

ence, Engineering, Medical, and more. One of the most important tasks to implement this STEM academy was to hire the right teachers. After many interviews they have chosen the 10 educators that they believe are perfect to lead this endeavor and provide the leadership and guidance the students need to be suc-

The first order of business is to provide quality project based learning professional development for these teachers from the University of Texas-Tyler in June, and then follow it up with the summer STEM camp for the academy students from July 31-August 3. This camp is where students will begin to transition from learning in a traditional learning environment to one that challenges them to work within groups to communi-cate and collaborate to solve problems

The community center located in Galena Manor has been closed for nine months; citizens have been coming for months to the council meetings in large numbers requesting information about its reopenThey've said the city hasn't told them why it was closed or what are the

plans to reopen it. City Attorney Robert Collins however says that's not true, he and others including a mold expert have explained to them that the center has dangerous mold in it. Collins says only until a thorough inspection is made to determine the extent as to where the mold is located can a cost be determined and a time to eliminate it can be made. Collins said it's going to be a significant cost and there's nothing in this year's budget to do the

needed work. Kevin Marler of MC Consultants from California, considered an expert in determining costs associated with mold remediation. provided photos from a preliminary inspection of the center. The photos showed mold, termites and locations where rain and mois ture are entering the facility. Collins said the city is looking at three separate phases to get the center opened again.

Phase one will cost about \$65,000 for an extensive inspection to determine the actual cost for reopening the center. Interior walls must be removed and special moisture meters used to determine how much of the interior structure has to be taken out and re-placed with new materials. Rain water is entering from the roof and along the outside at ground level.

A roofing contractor in spected the roof and found signs of hail damage as a cause for some of the rain water to enter. The city is filing a claim with the Texas Municipal League where the city is in a risk pool

with other Texas cities for claims for property damage. This can take 3 or 4 weeks to get a decision on the city's claim.

Click it or Ticket campaign saves more than 5,000 lives

This month marks the 15th anniversary of the "Click It or Ticket" campaign urging Texans to buckle up. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) estimates that since its inception 15 years ago, our life-saving campaign has resulted in 5,068 fewer traffic fatalities However, from 2015 to 2016, deaths among people not wearing seat belts increased 9 percent.

"Wearing a seat belt is the single most important step you can take to protect yourself in a crash, and in Texas it's the law," said Texas Department of Transportation Executive Director James Bass. "People make a lot of excuses for not buckling up,

save your life or prevent you from getting a ticket. The fact is, it only takes a few seconds to buckle up and it could mean the difference between life and death.

According to NHTSA, since its inception 15 years ago, the Texas "Click It or Ticket" campaign has not only saved thousands of lives but also prevented more than 86,000 serious injuries and saved Texas more than \$19.3 billion in related economic costs. When the "Click It or Ticket" campaign launched in 2002, only 76 Ticket" percent of Texans used their seat belts. Today, nearly 92 percent buckle up, but 8 percent still don't and the number of

up doubles to 16 percent at night.

In 2016, 994 people died because they weren't wearing seat belts - an increase of 9 percent over the 908 unbelted fatalities recorded in 2015.

Wearing a seat belt helps keep occupants from being ejected in a crash and increases the chances of surviving by 45 percent in a car, and up to 60 percent in a truck. In Texas, the law requires everyone in a vehicle to buckle up or face fines and court costs up to \$200. Children younger than 8 years must be in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they're taller than 4 feet 9 inches. If they aren't properly restrained, the driver faces

Female bank bandits connected to 5 Chase bank robberies

(HOUSTON, TX) - The FBI Violent Crime Task Force needs the public's help identifying two young female bank robbers with an affinity for targeting Chase banks. Investigators believe the duo is responsible for at least five Chase bank robberies this month. The latest three robberies oc-Crime Stoppers of Houston is offering a reward of up to \$5,000 for information that leads to the identification and arrest of the female felons. Bank surveillance photographs from one of today's robberies are attached at the end of the press release and can also be found on Twitter @FBIHouston and @miF-BIHouston.

At about $2:00\ p.m.$, the female bank robbers entered the J.P. Morgan Chase Bank located at 19507 North Freeway in Houston, Texas. They handed a teller a threatening note demanding

cash. The women left that location emptyhanded. Approximately 30 minutes later, the same women entered the J.P. Morgan Bank located at 929 East Little York Road in Houston, Texas. The female robbers presented a threatening demand note, then verbally threatened they had a gun. No weapon was observed by witnesses and no one was physically hurt. The women left with an undisclosed amount of cash. Investigators believe the same women robbed the J.P. Morgan Chase Bank located at 13706 East Freeway in Houston, Texas in a similar manner a couple of hours later. After presenting a threatening demand note, the women left with an undisclosed amount of cash. No one was physically hurt.

Investigators believe the same two women are also connected to two other Chase bank robberies earlier this month, the

branch located at 10611 Broadway in Pearland, Texas on May 8, 2017 and the robbery of the Chase branch located at 1102 Silber in Houston, Texas on May 1, 2017. In each of these robberies the women got away with an undisclosed amount of cash. No one was physically hurt during either robbery.

The women are described as young, black females, 18-24 years old with skinny builds, one is about 5'4" tall and the

robbery of the Chase other about 5'8" tall. The women were last seen leaving the area in a newer model silver Volkswagen Jetta occupied by two unknown black males.

Crime Stoppers of Houston is offering up to \$5,000 for information leading to the identification and arrest of these bank robbers. If you have any information, please call the Crime Stoppers tip line at 713-222-TIPS (8477). All tipsters remain anonymous.
