U.S. Army Corps issues dredging permits for Bayport, Barbours Cut channels

Both Channels will match depth of Houston ship channel and accommodate larger ships

HOUSTON, May 12 – The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has permitted construction of the Port Authority's Bayport and Barbours Cut channel improvement projects and approved the federal assumption of maintenance of the channels when construction is completed.

The improvement projects at the Port Authority's two container terminals will deepen the channels from 40 feet to 45 feet, matching the depth of the Houston Ship Channel,

so the container terminals can realize the benefits of the HSC widening and deepening project completed in 2005. The project will also widen or realign the channels by up to 100 feet to better accommodate larger ships that are expected to call with increasing frequency.

"This is great news," said Port Commission Chairman Janiece Longoria, "We are investing in the future of our port. The projects demonstrate our commitment to facilitating commerce. I sincerely congratulate the Port Authority staff for its diligent efforts working with PHA's stakeholders, the community and the Corps to get these projects readied for construction."

PHA expects to award the \$68 million construction contract to Orion Construction this week and start construction and dredging soon afterward. The work includes modification of the existing Bayport and Barbours Cut channels and berths and in

creasing capacity of a placement area for future dredged material.

"PHA is pleased that we will be awarding a contract at an excellent, competitive price," said Executive Director Roger Guenther. "Overall, the project has really progressed at a quick pace. The federal approval of assumption of maintenance, which means the Corps of Engineers will resume responsibility for the channel after PHA's improve-

between the Corps and PHA on a complicated process that has taken only 18 months."

The Port Authority is funding the projects at its sole cost to ensure the channels improvements are available as soon as possible to better accommodate larger, more efficient container ships, and in advance of the opening of an expanded Panama Canal in 2016. The work is expected to be completed in the second quarter of next year.



Crawdads -Part 1

With bucket in hand me and my boy headed down to the duck marsh where we hunt. During the winter, the two acre marsh - which was created by my brother out of a flat bottomland hayfield that lies next to a creek - floods with about a foot of water and creates a wetland habitat that attracts ducks on a daily basis. After duck season, he drains the marsh so moist soil grasses and forbs will grow and provide food for next season's ducks. When the weather warms

where you are from. In Texas all the species are commonly called crawdads or crawfish. In the eastern United States, however, they are commonly called crayfish.

Whatever you call them, crawdads are a species of freshwater crustaceans that live in water that does not completely freeze. As bottom dwellers, they feed off of live animals, carrion, and plant materials. They are an old species and fossil records document their existence



and the water drains away, the flat marsh bottom (made from a thick clay gumbo mud for which the blackland prairies are famous) becomes a popular destination for scores of crawdads.

Mud chimneys are everywhere. At each place a chimney stands, a crawdad carefully dug a vertical burrow that fills with water and then capped the opening with the spoils from its labor: chunks of stacked mud.

We find a big chimney and carefully pluck it apart from the mud. In doing so, we expose a wide and nearly symmetrical hole that plunges deep into the marsh's basin. It's so deep, I can't even see a shiny disk of water down in the hole. However, the dig is fresh so we know a crawdad lurks beneath. So with bacon tied to a string harvested from the end of a feed sack, my boy lowers the bait into the hole and waits for a tug.



Worldwide, over 500 species of crawdads are recognized, 350 of which live in North America. While crawfish are found all over the United States, they are found in greater numbers and species diversity in the southeastern United States in the warmer, wetter areas of the south.

Texas is home to at $\begin{array}{c} least~43~different~species\\ of~crawfish~-~seven~of \end{array}$ which are listed either as endangered or threatened. The most pressing concern for Texas crawfish is habitat destruction due to development and pollution of waterways.

Most of the state's species diversity reside in the southeastern portion of the state where the climate is consistently warmer and wetlands are in more abundance. At least two species exist away from wetlands and burrow into the deep soils of the blackland prairies. These species emerge from the burrows to feed and are equipped to ride out times of drought as they dig their burrow deeper and deeper as they follow a shrinking water table.



Speaker wants highway fund for transportation only

AUSTIN — House Speaker Joe Straus on May 14 said the Texas House of Representa-tives would propose a budget next year that uses all of the money in the state highway fund for transportation in stead of sending chunks of it to other state agencies.

Taxes and fees such as the gas tax and fees on drivers' licenses go into the state high-way fund to pay for transportation, but for almost 80 years, Straus explained, some of that money has helped fund agencies that are not di-rectly related to transporta-

tion.
Using the state highway fund exclusively for transpor-tation would increase funding for roads by about \$1.3 billion over two years, Straus, R-San Antonio, added.

"This approach will make the state budget even more straightforward, just as tax-payers expect. It will also provide needed transportation revenue — without a tax increase — as Texas continues to grow twice as fast as the rest of the country," Straus said.


The runoff election is for races from the March 4 Primary Election where no candidates secured a majority. The top two finishers from those races will now face each other to represent their party in the November election, Berry said.

"That was......awful!" says Betty White at the end of a commercial for the Soul Man TV program. In that commercial Betty and the Soul Man are sitting at a piano with Betty playing a short ditty. The, "that was.....awful, comes at the very end and breaks me up every time I watch.

I like the bit so every time I see it I watch it closely and then give myself a big smile at the end. I'm a great fan of Betty White and have been ever since I first saw her as an enter-tainer. The internet says she has been doing TV since back in the '50s so that has been some long career. Her words, "that was.....awful" brings smiles but it is far from the truth. I don't think anything thing she does is, or ever has been "awful."

Betty has been in a number of TV shows, guests on many others, and a frequent invitee to talk shows and has been on a lot of game shows. I have not seen her perform that I haven't enjoyed the time watching. She is great with script parts and handling the talk show deals as well.

Betty is 92 and in my view is the George Burns of the female set. George was 100 when he died and performed almost to the end. I remember he was sick on his 100th birthday and could not attend his own birthday party. If memory serves correctly he had a date to play at the Palladium in London after he turned 100 but could not meet the date.

Betty While has all the markings of being that kind of entertainer and I can see her working until she is 100 and perhaps beyond. She has aged gracefully and hasn't seemed to have slowed down much physically when on stage. I love her on TV!

She has been a leading character on at least three shows in my past and present. I first remember her on "The Mary Tyler Moore" show, later in "The Golden Girls" and now on the cable show "Hot in Cleveland." I couldn't count the smiles and laughs she has given me as part of those three shows. I credit her with playing the stupid, naive person as well as anyone I have seen.

Her full name is Betty Marion White Ludden and was born in January 17, 1922. I also well remember her third husband, Allen Ludden, who was a TV game show host for a few years. He was taken from us rather early. Betty got her start working as an assistant at a local television station in the early 1950s. She and her family had moved to Los Angeles when she was two.

My research tells me she launched her first television series, "Life with Elizabeth," in the early 1950s. That I don't remember. However I was overseas with the army a portion of that time so that may be why I don't recall the show.

Whatever her future this TV watcher will be looking for more of Betty White, her wit, her sharp tongue, her comedy style and her chemistry in working with others. I hope there is more and more of Betty White's, "that was.....awful!"






