Alcohol Sales on Ballot in Galena Park

Man found dead on Wallisville Rd. Houston police are await-

ing autopsy results in the death of a man found at 12800 Wallisville Road about 8:25 a.m. on Monday, October 16.

According to Houston Police Officials, a motorist driving on Wallisville Road saw what he believed to be a body floating in Greens Bayou as he crossed a bridge. The passer-by then called police. HPD Dive Team personnel responded to the scene and recovered the body.

An autopsy conducted by The Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences positively identified the man as Mario Garduno, 58, reported missing on October 14.

The cause of death of Gar duno is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

The elec-tion dates are October 23rd. through Friday, November 3rd. for Early Voting and Election Day Tuesday, November 7, Tuesday, November 7, 2017 from 7 AM to 7 PM. After three days of voting (October 25th.) according to City Secretary and Election Judge Mayra Gonzales there's only been about

North Channel Star writer Allan Jamail reached out to each of the elected officials and asked how they'd be voting, Commissioners Eric Broussard, Barry Ponder and Oscar Silva Jr. didn't give their decision.

Mayor Esmeralda Moya said she didn't want to influence voters either way and she'll honor the voter's decision regardless of the outcome. She said, "If the sale of alcohol is approved I'll make sure all the laws and regulations are being obeyed and the citizens will be safe and their wellbeing will be maintained."

Commissioner Rodney Chersky said, "I'm highly

in favor of the legal sale of alcohol in the city. In the event it passes we've already put laws and zoning regulations in effect to make sure no beer joints, cantinas, night clubs or sexually oriented busi-nesses will be allowed in the city. I will personally vouch for this; rest assured

it will not happen. Chersky stated if alco-hol sales are approved there are only about three places that'll qualify to apply for a license. If the store or gas station is within 300 feet of a church (religious establishment), school or hospital they'll not be eligible. He said restaurants

Additional repairs required for San Jacinto Waste Pits Superfund Site

2017) - Today, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved a plan for further repairs to stabilize the riverbed near the San Jacinto River Waste Pits Superfund Site in Harris County, Texas that was damaged by Hurricane Harvey. Following the hurricane, EPA has been conducting an assessment of the site to determine the extent of damage caused by the storm, and the potentially responsible parties found erosion of the river bottom adjacent to the temporary armored cap. EPA directed the potentially responsible parties to stabilize a 40-foot by 400-foot area adjacent to

prevent future undermining of the armored cap.The temporary armored cap has not been damaged in

Since the hurricane, the survey of the San Jacinto riverbed found erosion of the river bottom up to 12 feet deep near the cap. The total area of river bottom eroded in the vicinity of the cap was over 20,000 square feet. The stabilization work approved today includes placement of a geotextile fabric layer covered with at least three feet of

Automobile Theft Prevention

With the holidays quickly approaching I wanted to give you some pointers so your vehicle is not broken in and stolen. Do you know that the first step of violent crime and high impact crime often begins with a

stolen vehicle? Criminals will steal our vehicle to commit robberies, home invasions, shootings. Homicide, drug trafficking, and terrorism. I will provide you with a few pointers to keep you and your vehicle safe:

1. Keep your vehicle locked at all times, even while driving.

2. When parked, never leave your keys in the car. Close all the windows and the sunroof.

3. Never leave your car running and unattended. 4. Avoid leaving valuables inside your vehicle where passersby can see

5. Do not leave your vehicle title in the car. Too often a car thief is pulled over and gets away from the police because he or she can produce the auto registration. (If multiple drivers use the vehicle, the best suggestion would be to hide the registration in a secret location in the car that only the owners know.)

6. Know where you're going. Avoid known high crime areas even if the alternate route takes longer

7. Install an anti-theft system in your vehicle if it doesn't have one. Thieves

cles if they know the cars can be recovered quickly. Many insurers offer discounts for the types of systems listed below.

8. Thieves prefer to work in the dark. Be particularly cautious at night about where you park your car. Park it in a well-lit area if possible.

9. Look around. Be aware of your surroundings, especially in garages, parking lots and gas sta-

10. Have your car's vehicle identification number (VIN) etched on each of the windows. Car thieves want to get off cheap. They don't want to go to the expense of replacing all the glass.

11. On an incline, leave your car in park or in gear with the wheels turned toward the curb or some other obstruction. This makes it harder for thieves to tow your vehicle.

12. If confronted by a carjacker, do not resist. Cars can be replaced; you

ahead if you need to.
If another car bumps yours and you feel threat-ened, drive to a populated area or, if you have a cellular phone, call the police for assistance.

EPA Administrator Pruitt Commits to Dioxin Cleanup in meeting withCounty **Attorney Vince Ryan**

At a meeting hosted by Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan, Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Scott Pruitt committed to using the full authority of the EPA to remove dioxin from the San Jacinto River Waste

Ryan, members of the County Attorney's Office, and other stakeholders met last Thursday with Pruitt to discuss the clean up. Last week Pruitt signed a Record of Decision that approved a \$115 million cleanup plan of the toxic site that will remove highly contaminated material and secure the less contaminated areas.

Pruitt said that the EPA would be negotiating with the responsible par ties to design a remedy. If the parties fail to develop a plan acceptable to the EPA, the agency can impose a solution. "I can assure you from the EPA perspective that we are going to use every bit of jurisdiction, every tool under the statute to get this area remediated," Pruitt said.

Pruitt also said repairs will begin in about four

weeks to stabilize an area on the east side of the cap that was damaged in Hurricane Harvey. EPA dive teams earlier reported collecting samples after the flooding caused by Harvey that showed that the pro-tective cap over the waste site "had been damaged and the underlying waste material was exposed." The EPA found that one of its samples showed dioxins at 70,000 parts per trillion; EPA's clean up level for the site is 30 parts per trillion. Construction is expected to take about three weeks to complete, weather permit-

require the companies that deposited the waste to re-move it at the companies' cost. The approved plan would require removal of an estimated 212,000 cubic yards of material contam-inated with dioxin at the I-10 bridge. The plan will ensure no chemicals are released during this process and that the contaminated material will be put

On September 28, shortly after Hurricane Harvey. EPA received preliminary data from sediment samples collected by EPA's dive team from 14 areas at the site. Samples from one of the 14 areas confirmed the protective cap had been damaged and the underlying waste material was ex-

posed. Repairs to add armored rock to the cap were completed shortly after the sampling was conducted. All repairs to the damaged cap from the storm are now complete. EPA directed the potentially responsible parties to collect additional samples near the damaged area, and sampling has also been completed. Six additional samples were collected and preliminary results did not show elevated levels of dioxins in nearby sediments. Final quality-assured data should be available within

two weeks.

EPA added the San Jacinto Waste Pits site to the National Priorities List of Superfund sites in 2008, after testing revealed contamination from dioxins and furans near the waste pits. The Superfund site

In 2011, the impoundments were covered with an armored cap as a temporary way to contain the contaminants. EPA is the lead agency for addressing the site and ensuring that the potentially responsible party cleans up the contamination, with support from several state Army Corps of Engineers.

Hotel stays for Harvey survivors extended

New checkout date is Nov. 7

AUSTIN, Texas - Hurricane Harvey survivors who need more time to find housing are getting an extension to stay temporarily in hotels while they look for an alternative place to

live.
The Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA) program, which pays for short-term hotel stays, has been extended. The new checkout date is two weeks away on Nov. 7. Participants eligible to continue in the program will receive a phone call telling them what they need to do to re-main at their current hotel or find a new hotel. Applicants must meet certain requirements to remain eligible.

Hurricane Harvey survivors who recently applied for assistance will be notified automatically of their eligibility. To be considered for TSA eligibility disaster survivors must be registered with FEMA for disaster assistance.

FEMA pays the hotel for the room and any applicable taxes (including non-refundable pet fees up to the maximum allowable room night charge). Applicants are responsible for all other incidental costs (meals, transportation, etc.). Hotels require a government issued photo ID at time of check-in, survivors must adhere to any hotel check-in requirements and may be re-

quired to provide a credit card for incidental expens

A household of four or fewer members is authorized one hotel room and a household of five or more will be authorized additional rooms (limit four people per room). One member of each household, 18 years or older, must reside in each room.

TSA-eligible applicants must find and book their own hotel rooms. The list of participating hotels is available





Portal enables donors to help Harvey-stricken schools

AUSTIN — Texas Education Commissioner Morath on Oct. 17 announced that school systems needing instructional materials — either because of enrollment of students displaced by Hurricane Harvey or from property damage caused by the hurricane — can create an online list for donors to access.

Potential donors can find the lists through the Texas Education Agency's Instructional Materials Assistance web page tea.texas.gov/Academics/Hurricane_Harvey_Instructional_Materials_Assistance/.

"From the initial days of the hurricane, many people have stepped forward wanting to help. The TEA Instructional Materials Assistance web page provides a way to see what school districts truly need and then allow for those needs to be met," Morath said.

Morath called the electronic system a type of "wedding registry" where school districts can post their instructional materials needs. Donors can elect to fulfill a district's needs list completely or in part, and the agency's educational materials ordering system updates the list to help avoid duplication of supply donations.

supply donations.

To date, 14 school districts have created needs lists in the system. The materials on those lists total approximately \$1.2 million.

The system has paired three potential donating districts with three districts in need. One district has already indicated all its identified needs are filled.

Abbott suspends

Gov. Abbott on Oct. 16 extended for 30 days a temporary waiver suspending vehicle registration and inspection rules for victims of Hurricane Harvey.

The extension allows

The extension allows Texans who reside in any of 48 counties included in the federal disaster declaration to avoid penalties for failure to timely register a vehicle or obtain a vehicle inspection.

Debris removal continues

The Texas Division of Emergency Management on Oct. 20 reported that nearly 7.5 million cubic yards of Hurricane Harvey debris had been collected so far.

The Texas Department of Transportation, individually, reported on Oct. 16 that its employees had removed more than 10 million cubic feet of debris in the four districts most impacted by Hurricane Harvey since landfall Aug. 25

From Corpus Christi to
Beaumont and towns in
between those cities, TxDOT crews, composed of
more than 600 employees
working in weekly rotations, have worked to help

clear roadways and help citizens in their ongoing recovery efforts.

Former justice dies

Texas Supreme Court Justice Ted Z. Robertson, 96, who served on the high court from 1982 through 1988, died at his home in Dallas on Oct. 13.

Robertson served as a Dallas County probate and juvenile judge and as a state district judge in Dallas County before he was elected to the Texas Supreme Court.

October 20, 2017 – Halloween is creeping up on us. The rush is on to find the perfect pumpkin, the spookiest costume, and the best candy for trick-or-treaters. However, along with all this excitement comes potential fire hazards related to seasonal decor and costumes. Fortunately, fire risks can be avoided by following the National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) Halloween safety precautions.

"Halloween brings out creativity in people of all ages. Children enjoy dressing up and going door-to-door collecting candy, and adults go all out decorating their homes with spooky accents," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "The festivities, however, can be dampened if the proper safety measures are not put in place ahead of time and while out canvassing the neighborhood for treats."

From 2011-2015, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 840 home structure fires per year that began with decorations. These fires caused an average of 2 civilian deaths, 36 civilian injuries, and \$11.4 million in direct property damage, per year. Fire can start when candles are too close to decorations or when long, trailing costumes come into contact with candles.

To safely enjoy the Halloween holiday, NFPA has created a Halloween safety video that emphasizes preparedness and the importance of flameresistant costumes and decorations. NFPA also offers parents and teachers tip sheets, kids' activities, a pumpkincarving template and more at the Sparky the Fire Dog@ website. NFPA's simple Halloween fire safety tip graphic is also great for sharing on social media so that people can enjoy a spooky and safe Halloween.

To ensure that your loved ones and home are free of fire this Halloween season, follow these safety guidelines:

Candles

- Refrain from having an open flame.
- Use battery-operated candles or glow-sticks in your jack-o-lanterns.

Costumes:

• Choose the right costume. Try to stay away from long or flowing fabric, and remain vigilant of extraneous costume pieces.

Decorations:

• Avoid flammable decorations including dried flowers, cornstalks and crepe paper that are highly flammable.

• Keep decorations away from open flames and other heat sources, including light bulbs and heaters

Exits:

• Remember to keep all decorations away from doors so that they are not blocking any exits or escape routes.

Smoke Alarms:

- Make sure all of your smoke alarms are working and up to date. Visibility:
- Provide flashlights to children or have children carry glow sticks as part of their costumes.
- Make sure if a child is wearing a mask that the eye holes are large enough so he or she can see out of them.

Fishing banned in waters near the San **Jacinto River Waste Pits**

EAST HARRIS COUN-TY - Concerned about the potential release of toxins into the San Jacinto River from the Superfund Waste Pits, Pct. 2 official Jeremy Phillips has ordered a "NO FISHING" ban in popular fishing spots around the

vaste pits site. Phillips told the news aper that his decision came after EPA revealed that their tests of the site and the surrounding waters indicated higher levels of the toxic substance Dioxin, a known carcinogen causing

cancer in humans.
The tests came after the Hurricane Harvey had made the river flood, and disturbed the cap over the waste material. Visual inspection, and 14 probe tests of the pits indicated that the cap had been dis-

turbed and was leaking.
Phillips has posted 12

signs at and around small ponds and inlets in parks around the pits, saying No Fishing and No Crabbing allowed. The signs are posted in Meadowbrook Park, Moncrief Park, Rio Valley Nature Trail, and River Terrace Park.

Phillips said that law enforcement officers and Park patrol officers will be asked to help enforce the ban. They will warn people that they see fishing that there is a ban, and advise them non to fish there.

Phillips said he was concerned about the "potential impacts" that fishing and crabbing could have to peo-ple's health after a breach of the cap, and the danger could be both upstream and downstream from the waste pits, especially if another storm such as Harvey hits the river or surrounding areas.

3. The Magnification
Once you have the Rolex on you and you can view it with your own eyes, there a lot more ways to tell if it's genuine or fake. On Rolex watches with a date (DateJust, Submariner, etc...) the date has to be very small to work properly. Rolex adds a magnification glass to allow the wearer to see it more clearly. On all Rolex models the magnification is 2.5X so with the proper 2.5x magnification of a Bolex the date really jumps out at you. On fake Rolex watches the mag-nification is often 1.5X so the date looks kind of small. This is a huge tell-tale sign of a fake Rolex.

4. The Resilience to Water

Although Rolex Submariner watches are the only watches designed for deep sea diving, all Rolex models are waterproof and perfectly sealed. Once you have the watch, dip it in a cup of water for a few seconds and take it out. If there is any leaking of water into the watch on the dial or crystal, the watch is definitely a

5. The Model Number Compared to the Metal

Oftentimes, Rolex counterfeiters will try to cheap out by making a normally ex-pensive model in cheaper metals to gain more profit. You should always check

6. The Writing on the Dial

Everything on a Rolex is made to perfect tion. Without having to open up the watch it is easy to see this from the writing on the dial distinguishing the model and other features. With a magnifying glass examine all the lettering on the dial. The writing should be convex (outward) and there should be no bubbling. It should be relatively pristine. If the writing is far from perfect then you know you are not dealing with a genuine

7. The Case Back (the part of the watch

opposite to the face) opposite to the lace)
Another easy way to spot a fake Rolex is that many have case backs that are made out of glass, plastic, or crystal so you can see the inner workings of the watch. Almost all Rolex watches do not have clear case backs. The only reason we have to say almost is there are two extremely rare models of Rolex from the 1930s that did in fact have case backs made of glass. So if you are buying a relatively modern Rolex with a clear case back it is a fake. Also Rolex does not engrave anything on the case back's exterior. However things are engraved on the interior

3. The Engraving

Again, everything on a Rolex is perfect there are no mistakes or misspellings. The engravings are a perfect example of this. The engravings are a little harder to reach sometimes. (This is why this is number 8 on the top 10 ways to spot a the interior of the band of the watch towards the actual face, but to see the engravings for the serial and model ou have to take off the band

You just need a thumb tack with which the side of the watch, or the bottom of the watch if there are no holes. Once you have it open you should examine the engravings with a magnifying glass.
They shouldn't appear sandy or misshapen. They should be perfectly cut.
Also you should use this model number when you look up the watch to check if it's the right one. The model number is

on the 12 o'clock side of the watch.

9. The Inner Workings
You need special tools to view this one
With special Rolex tools you can unscrew the case back and view the gears and inner workings of the watch. Every-thing should generally be different colors and again everything should be perfect. There should be an engraving on the inside of the watch that says something like Geneva Switzerland, the metal type, and the medal number. This construince and the model number. This engraving should be perfect as well.

10. Ticking
Listen closely. If you hear loud ticking
from your watch, this "Rolex" is a definite fake. Rolex watches do not make the ticking noises common with other watch es. Counterfeiters can't often perfect the gears of a Rolex and so a ticking noise is made which can really help you spot fakes quite easily. Misconceptions: One of the biggest

misconceptions is that the second hand of Rolex watches is a perfect sweep. This is not true! Most models of Rolex tick at eight ticks or movements per second, so it is not a continuous sweep. Also some models move at slower







and in September surpassed the 1.8 million twenty-foot equivalentunit mark.

"We remain confident of continued growth in the container sector, both on the import and export side, during the remainder of this year and into 2018," Guenther said.

Terminal operations recovered very well following the events of Hurricane Harvey, the executive director reported to the Port Commission of the Port of-Houston Authority, during the regular monthly meet-

"We anticipated that we would receive most of the cargo that was initially diverted following the storm...and we did," he stated.

General cargo facilities handled nearly 400 thousand tons of steel, "which is a large volume as we caught up for the week or more of time lost due tothe storm," Guenther shared. "Port Houston's results remain strong overall for the year," he added.

Port Commission Chairman Janiece Longoria lauded the support given by industry and Port Houston employees following the aftermath of HurricaneHarvey.

The commission also acknowledged Hurricane Harvey Relief efforts and relief funds donated by other ports and agencies. Those relief supplies were provided in four twenty-foot equivalent containers and sent to Houston by that port. A portion of those supplies were made available to Port Houston employees impacted by Harvey, and the balance of those items was donated to local relief agencies.


During the meeting, Port Houston employees were also recognized for their donation of about \$120,000 to the Employee Catastrophic Assistance Fund for their fellow employees adversely impacted by the historic weather event

The commission authorized an agreement with the Texas Department of Transportation for the construction and operation of a rail spur across Texas State Highway 146 and

Red Bluff Road, to facilitate in a phased approach future intermodal service to the Bayport Container Terminal.

The Commission also approved an Industry Track Agreement with Union Pacific Railroad for track and switch modifications at the Bayport Terminal. Construction of the spur and crossing and the track agreement support the development of Phase One of the Bayport Master Rail Plan, aswell as rail service to the 56-acres being developed at Bayport South.

Finally, the Port Commission was pleased with Monday's delivery to Port Houston of three super post-panamax wharf cranes. These new cranes bring to seven the total number of cranes with this size and capacity operating at Barbours Cut, and are part of a \$700 million modernization program underway at the terminal to further its increase cargo handling efficiency and capacity.
