First responders sue over Arkema fumes

CROSBY - Seven first responders and as many as 20 homeowners have filed suit over fumes from the Arkema plant explosions on Sept. 7.

The suits allege gross negligence and demand at least \$1 million in damages in Harris County District Court.

Fifteen Harris County deputies and eight ambulance crews including the $\,$ Medical Service Director were hospitalized on Sept. 3 after the last of refrigerated trailers exploded at the Arkema

Reports indicate that ambulance personnel flung themselves onto their own ambulance gurneys and deputies vomited on the spot but most refused to be taken by ambulance to the hospitals because they would not vacate their vehicles due to munitions aboard their patrol units and elected to drive themselves to the hospitals.

The suit alleges that Arkema had days of warning to be prepared for the disaster. It was

over 500,000 gallons or organic peroxides within the nine refrigeration trailers that without the refrigeration capacity were expected to explode said the company. On August 31, the first of a series of explosions of the trailers dispersed throughout the plant's property went off.

Although the Harris County Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security in-

Hurricane Recovery Event held at Galena Park

To combat the health problems brought on in neighborhoods flooded by Hurricane Harvey, the Harris County Public Health Department has put together a Mobile Wellness Unit, and dispatched it for a day into neighborhoods with significant flooding.

ENVIRONMENTAL THREAT Oil spill into Ship Channel from Magellan/Galena Park

GALENA PARK - Authorities are investigating a major gasoline spill from two storage tanks in Galena Park, damaged by flood waters from Hurricane Harvey. The tanks belong to Magellan Midstream, in Galena Park. The spill happened on Thursday, August 31 but was just recently reported.

The size of the spill,

11,000 barrels or 461,000 gallons, makes this a major environmental prob-

lem. However, the company said that they were able to contain the spill almost immediately, and only a small amount leaked into a drainage Channel. Spokesperson Bruce Heine said that the company covered the spill

with firefighting foam to prevent harmful vapors from escaping into the air, and used containment floats to keep the liquid from spreading, and then it was recovered. They are currently excavating contaminated soil and trucking it to an approved landfill.

The Magelan terminal

is near Hunting Bayou and the Ship Channel in Gale-na Park. The original estimate of the size of the spill was 1000 barrels, but raised when officials were able to access the area.

On Tuesday, September 05, 2017, Deputies with the Harris County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to a Fatal Crash in the 6000 block of E FM 1960. During the investigation it was determined that the com-plainant was traveling east the eastbound number 2 lane on his 2008 Suzuki VS800 motorcycle in the 6000 block of E FM 1960. Traveling east behind the motorcycle in number 2 eastbound lane in the 6000 block of E FM 1960 was a silver 2002 Ford Crown Victoria. Witnesses to the crash advised the motorcycle was driving erratically and was observed to not have any lights illuminated on the motorcycle prior to the crash. This section of E FM

1960 has no artificial lighting and was extremely dark. The Ford struck the motorcycle in the tire with its front left as they both traveled eastbound. During my on scene investigation I determined the complainant operated his motorcycle at nighttime hours with no visible illumination on the motorcy cle. Due to not being visible at nighttime hours the motorcycle was struck by the front left of the Ford. The complainant while operating the motorcycle sustained serious bodily injuries, which ultimately caused his death. This crash remains under investigation by the Harris County Sheriff's Office, Vehicular Crimes Division.

Governor suspends waiting period for insurance to pay claims for vehicles

AUSTIN - Governor Greg Abbott today took action to expedite insurance claims for Texans whose vehicles have been totaled by Hurricane Harvey. Working with the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (TxDMV), the Governor suspended a statute and rule requiring a 30day waiting period and notification requirements for insurance companies that are unable to obtain current vehicle titles prior to paying claims on nonrepairable vehicles. This suspension will alleviate the burden on vehicle owners and will expedite the claims process, resulting in a faster claim payments from the insurance companies to the owners of nonrepairable vehicles. The

TxDMV estimates that over 500,000 vehicles were damaged by the storm.

The last thing the victims of this storm need is the burden of procedural red tape while trying to get their lives back on track," said Governor Abbott "Suspending this rule will make it easier for those currently without transportation to get needed assistance from their insurance companies. As the recovery process starts to take shape in Texas, I will continue to do what I can to make sure Texans are getting what they need in every way possible."

• In person, always ask to see any FEMA employ-ee ID badges. FEMA Disaster Survivor Assistance teams may be in impacted communities providing in-formation and assisting survivors with the registration process or their

County Attorney advises homeowners to beware of contractor scams

its aftermath left more than 100,000 Houstonarea homes flooded. Unfortunately, with every major disaster comes unscrupulous home repair contractors, many from outside of Texas, who prey upon desperate homeowners struggling to make repairs quickly and get back to their normal lives.

The Office of Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan offers the following tips to protect homeowners

· Do NOT do business with a contractor from out going "door to door." Try to do business with reputable local businesses only Get referrals. Check with the Better Business Bureau and Internet complaint boards before hiring a contractor.

- Get a written estimate before you sign a contract. Try to get bids or estimates from 3 different contrac-
- Contact your insurance company before work begins to make sure all procedures under your policy are followed.
- be done is specified and the price is agreed upon.
- Get a copy of the signed contract.
- · Check if your mortgage requires that insurance proceeds be paid directly to your mortgage company subject to periodic inspections of the work. Contact your mortgage company before work be-
- Do NOT assign your FEMA benefits or insurance proceeds directly to

entire job upfront. If necessary, make only a down payment for the contractor to get started. Make only partial payments in proportion to the amount of work done as the job progresses. Pay only by credit card or check.

County Attorney advises Hurricane Harvey Flood victims: Know your rights

The recent floods in the Harris County area have been a nightmare for many families struggling to clean up the mess and have repairs made. The Office of Harris County
Attorney Vince Ryan
offers the following tips to
flood victims who rent their apartments or

- If your apartment is unlivable, you have the right to terminate your lease by giving your landlord written notice and obtain a refund of the unused portion of the rent you have paid plus any security deposit that is owed to you. You cannot be charged a penalty for terminating the lease due to unlivable conditions.
- If your landlord offers you another unit because yours is unlivable, you are not required to accept it. If you do accept a new unit, you are not required to enter into a longer lease for the new
- If your apartment is partially damaged, first provide written notice to your landlord of the repairs needed. Make sure you are current on your rent. The landlord is not required to make repairs if you are not current on your rent.
- If your apartment is partially damaged, you may be entitled to a reduction in your rent in proportion to the extent the apartment is unus-

able. Talk to your landlord. If you cannot reach an agreement, do not withhold any portion of your rent. You may have to file suit seeking a rent reduction. Withhold-ing rent is almost always a had idea

- Your landlord is not required to start making repairs to your unit until after the landlord's insurance company pays him or her for the damage. The bad news is that you must continue to pay rent while you wait for the repairs.
- If the landlord has had a reasonable amount of time but failed to complete repairs, send a second notice to the landlord with a request for an explanation of the delay and explain that you will terminate the lease unless repairs are made or repair the damage yourself and deduct the amount from your rent. You should consult an attorney if you intend to repair the damage yourself.
- You may want to consult the "Tenants' Rights Handbook" published by the Texas Young Lawyers Associa-tion and the State Bar of

Governor Abbott requests federal funding for flood and water infrastructure projects

AUSTIN - September 9, 2017 – Governor Greg Abbott today sent a letter to Administrator Scott Pruitt of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) expressing his support for a request by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) to streamline federal funding for flood and water infrastructure projects related to Hurricane Harvey.

"Texas has faced an unprecedented natural disaster, and quick action, flexibility and innovation are essential to keeping Texas and our economy strong," said Governor Abbott. "The seamless collaboration between the State of Texas and our federal partners has been imperative to allow these communities to rebuild and recover following Harvey's devastation. I am hopeful that the EPA will continue its ommitment to getting Texans the resources they need to address the urgent needs that will allow for the

pressing water-related concerns.

"The TWDB believes that the SRF funds can provide a critical financing bridge between the immediate need for cities to restore their water and wastewater systems and the delivery of federal disaster aid," said Chairman Bech Bruun. "We appreciate EPA's consideration of this request to allow us to put these funds to work on this recovery as expeditiously as possible.

The TWDB adminis-

ters EPA's state revolving funds, which communities affected by Harvey can use to help finance all phases of water and wastewa-ter projects, including projects related to stormwater infrastruc-ture. The funding will provide timely financing that allows hurricane- and flood-stricken areas of Texas to rapidly repair and rebuild these critical systems and to ensure the future protection of these

nated waters receded and mountains of debris from flooded homes and ruined belongings grew last week, a picture of post-hurricane Texas developed and the process of weighing impacts to lives, property and infrastructure began.

Gov. Greg Abbott delivered a series of announcements and proclamations related to catastrophic flooding and wind damage brought by Hurricane Harvey to more than 50 Gulf Coast and inland counties in late August and early

September. On Sept. 7, Abbott thanked Congress for passing a \$15.3 billion hurricane relief package and called the bipartisan action "an encouraging sign.

On Sept. 9, Abbott wrote to EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt, expressing support for a request by the Texas Water Develop-ment Board to streamline federal funding for flood and water infrastructure projects related to Hurricane Harvey. The board administers EPA's state revolving funds, which will be used to repair and rebuild water, wastewater and storm water systems in communities affected by Harvey.

Also on Sept. 9, Abbott and Texas A&M Universitv System Chancellor John Sharp, who heads the newly created Governor's Commission to Rebuild Texas, met with Beaumont officials along with leaders of many state agencies. It was the first stop in a three-city, five-day trip to discuss the devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey and get input on how the commission can assist in the rebuilding and re-

Paxton applauds ruling Texas Attorney General

Ken Paxton praised a decision Sept. 5 by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit to uphold the state's voter identification law that was blocked last month by a Corpus Christi federal district court.

A three-judge panel of

the Fifth Circuit voted 2-1 to overturn an injunction granted by the lower court. The ruling, Paxton said, means that an interim court remedy is in place for 2017, preserving the requirement of an ID while allowing those without an accepted ID to vote by signing a sworn declaration stating that they have a reasonable impediment to

obtaining one.
Furthermore, Senate
Bill 5, a law passed by the

Sales tax revenue for the year was \$28.9 billion, 0.3 percent ahead of the \$28.8 billion projected in the January biennial revenue estimate, and general revenue-related revenue was \$52.3 billion, or 1.2 percent ahead of the projection of \$51.7 billion. State sales tax revenue for the month of August totaled \$2.48 billion, 0.9 percent less than in August 2016, he said.

Also, Hegar reported that Texas' "all funds" tax collections for fiscal year 2017 came to \$49.6 billion, or 0.2 percent less than his \$49.7 billion projection, and all funds revenue to-taled \$111.2 billion, or 1.4 ercent less than his \$112.8 billion projection.



Open Books courses will save students \$3.5 million

<u>Digital course materials increase opportunities for degree completion</u>

HOUSTON - Today's college students often face the decision of buying a textbook or paying their light bill. As textbook prices continue to rise, college retention rates decrease. Textbook costs remain one of the largest barriers to student success and degree completion.

Since 1978, the U.S. Census Bureau estimates that college textbook prices have risen more than 800 percent. Within the last decade alone, textbook costs have increased by 73percent- more than four times the rate of inflation.

Beginning this fall semester, San Jacinto College's Open Books courses will meet the growing need for quality, affordable course materials that students and faculty have

been waiting for.
"Open Books is a chance for San Jacinto College to help reduce the cost of going to college for thousands of students," said Mark Johnson, San Jacinto College dean of business and technology and Open Books project director. Textbooks can be up to half of a student's cost of attending college. A typical full-time student taking 12 or more credits could easily spend \$1,400 a year on textbooks. The high cost of textbooks can make it impossible for students to attend or stay enrolled in college. We didn't want students having to choose between paying their electricity bill or buying their

chemistry textbook." Funded by a grant from Achieving the Dream, participating San Jacinto College faculty will be provided with an array of open educational resources (OER) that feature peerreviewed, open-licensed digital textbooks and course materials from Lumen Learning. OER includes full courses, course materials, modules, textbooks, streaming videos, tests, software, and any other digital course materials that faculty can use as is, repurpose or adapt to $% \left\{ 1,2,\ldots ,n\right\}$ fit their specific course needs. OER materials also provide more flexibility for faculty as they set the student learning outcomes (SLOs) for their courses. Students also have access

to their course materials on day one, eliminating delays that students experience working on assignments due to the ability to purchase the textbook.

"As a faculty member. Open Books has allowed me to use the continuous academic freedom that our College has always promoted," said Tonja Conerly, San Jacinto College sociology professor and Open Books project coordinator. "I am working with an endless number of peers literally throughout the world, sharing knowledge and different teaching techniques. Open Books really allows our faculty to enhance their pedagogy because they can tailor these unique resources to their specific course's student learning outcomes. At the end of the day, we're providing them with the same quality, peer-reviewed educational resources, but with no cost or a very low cost to our students."

Based on the spring 2017 pilot, 24 San Jacinto College faculty taught 33 sections of Open Books courses saving 687 students \$119,616 in textbook costs. Johnson says the College intends to dramatically increase the number of course offerings by spring 2020, estimating that students could save more than \$3.5 million. This fall, students will also be able to earn associate of arts degrees in general studies and business entirely through Open Books

"After the first year of implementing the Achieving the Dream OER degree grant, San Jacinto College has saved students \$410,000 in textbook costs. We're also watching to see what kind of positive impact Open Books will have on student success in the classroom. Other colleges across the country, like Tidewater College in Virginia, have reported that students enrolled in OER courses have performed 6 percent better in the classroom than students in classes without OER. This is likely because students in OER courses have their course materials on the first day of class.

sisted there were no concentrateed ammonia compounds on the site, worry continued for most people in surrounding communities over air quality and the nature and size of explosions.

Sizes of the explosions were consistent with expectations raised by the company.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Texas Commission for Environmental Quality collected 6 surface water runoff samples on Sept. 1 indicating quantities less than would warrant further investigation after the first explosion. The federal agency sent aerial surveillance aircraft to $test\ resulting\ smoke\ from$ the Arkema fires and "found no exceedance of the Texas comparison values." From August 30 to Sept. 7 no exceedances of the short-term Air Monitoring Comparison Values was found by the TCEQ.

One must assume then that when the tires on the trailers caught fire it must have produced a non-toxic smoke!?

The EPA ordered Arkema to provide a detailed timeline of events and to respond within 10 days to questions about the handling of organic peroxides, the amount of chemicals, and measures taken in advance to guard against flooding and loss of electricity. The U.S. Chemical Safety Board has initiated an investigation at the Arkema Plant.

Experts responded to inquires that the plant had generators and back-up generators at the loca-

tion to provide refrigeration of the chemicals but both went under water due to the unprecedented flood. The diluting of the chemicals was ruled out due to containers being by law so small that the task becomes impossible to perform in time once refrigeration has stopped.

Arkema responded that the suits are mistaken and that the company never failed to warn people nor misled anyone.

A judge granted the plantiffs a temporary restraining order and injunction to keep Arkema from destroying or moving evidence. The Harris County Fire Marshal's Office and Crosby Volunteer Fire Department are looking into the fire at
