Event. Through Texas Mobile
Imaging a mobile medical ultrasound team will be offering
three painless, potentially lifesaving vascular ultrasound
screening for 550 each or a total of \$125 for all three tests.
These tests include a scan of
the carotid arteries of the neck, the carotid arteries of the neck, a scan of the abdominal aorta and a scan of the arteries of the legs.

Additionally, and without

further charge, complimentary ultrasounds of the thyroid, gall bladder, liver, and kidneys will be offered.

All tests are noninvasive but All tests are noninvasive but are invaluable in recognizing a major physical abnormality before it becomes life threatening. Scans may detect plaque buildup in the carotid arteries of the neck which could choke off oxygen supply to the brain, and abdominal aortic aneurysm which is often fatal, or blocked arteries in the legs. The complimentary additional tests could recognize stones, cyst, or tumors with recommended referral to a physician for fol-

or tumors with recommended referral to a physician for follow-up diagnosis and necessary treatment.

Act Soon to Close Your Insurance Gap

If you work for a fairly sizable company, you may be entering your open enrollment season, when you can add or adjust your employer-sponsored benefits. While you probably should review all your benefits, you may want to pay special attention to your life insurance to determine if you and your family are adequately protected.

Therefore, include "surviving spouses more item on your insurance estimate worksheet.

TxDOT offers free child safety seat inspections to save young lives

Child deaths on Texas roadways up 25 percent in 2014

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Transportation offers free child safety seat checks at the agency's 25 statewide district offices and encourages all caregivers to make an appointment as part of national Child Passenger Safety Week, Sept. 13-19 Week, Sept. 13-19.
TxDOT reminds all
Texans that properly
restraining their
children while riding in
vehicles is an everyday,
year-round responsibility. It's also the law.

"We're not going to stop until every child in Texas is buckled into the correct safety seat for their age and size," said TxDOT Executive Director LtGen Joe Weber, USMC (Ret). "It's not only the law, but it's also unacceptable for any child to die able for any child to die or be injured on our roads – especially if those deaths and injuries could have been prevented with the proper use of a safety seat."

safety seat."

In 2014, crashes on Texas roads killed 81 children younger than 8 years of age. In 2013, that number was 67.

Texas law requires all children under 8 years old – unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches – to be in a child safety seat whenever they ride in a passenger vehicle. Failure to properly restrain a child can result in a ticket up to \$250.

The National High-

The National High-yay Traffic Safety Administration reports most parents are confident they have connectly installed their child's safety seat, but 59 percent have not. Common child safety seat errors include: installing the seat too loosely; putting the harness straps through the wrong slots; leav-ing harness straps too loose; positioning the chest clip incorrectly; and using the wrong seat belt path.

Drivers should refer to their specific child safety seat manufacturer's manual for instructions on how to install the safety seat. The vehicle owner's manual also includes information on the proper placement of the safety seat and proper use of the seat belt or LATCH system.

Neighbors agree to work on trade, energy projects

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott traveled to Mexico last week to meet with President Enrique Peña Nieto and other officials in Mexico City. On Sept. 8, the gover-nor's office announced an agreement between the

agreement between the Texas Department of Transportation and the Ministry of Communications and Transportation of the United Mexican States "to promote and increase bilateral collaboration on future border infrastructure projects." Also announced was the creation of an energy task force "to foster economic growth on both sides of the border by finding new and innovative energy solutions."

Abbott said the agreements signify Texas' and
Mexico's "intent to expand
highway infrastructure,
encourage economic development and facilitate bilateral trade on both sides
of the border."


The governor's office quoted Claudia Ruiz Massieu, Mexico's secretary of foreign affairs, who said "such a deep and diverse relationship as the one Mexico and Texas share flourishes when there is communication and mutual understanding. Governor Abbott's visit reflects the will to take that path."

On Sept. 6, the governor's office announced that in 2014, Texas exported

nor's office amnounced that in 2014, Texas exported more than \$100 billion in machinery, technology and other commodities to Mexico, about 35 percent of the state's total exports. And, it was said, those exports "sustain tens of thousands of small- and medium-sized businesses in Texas and more than 11 million and more than 1.1 million jobs."

Perry suspends campaign
Rick Perry suspended his campaign for the presidency on Sept. 11.
Perry, who served as governor of Texas from 2001 to 2015, made the announcement at a rally of the conservative Eagle Forum in Missouri.
Perry's first run for the presidency was in 2012. Mitt Romey, a former governor of Massachusetts, won the Republican Party's nomination and lost to Democrat Barack Obama in the general election.

The town hall tour is intended to facilitate those efforts and help keep Texans informed of economic issues in their own backyards."

Sales tax revenue is down
Comptroller Hegar on Sept. 10 reported state sales tax revenue in August was \$2.6 billion, down 0.4 percent compared to August 2014.
"The slight decline in sales tax revenue was due to reduced receipts from oil and gas-related sectors, offset by growth from other sectors," Hegar explained. Higher collections from retail trade, restaurants and services indicated continued growth in consumer spending, while receipts from construction also grew, he added.
Cities, counties, transit

systems and special purpose taxing districts will receive \$638.1 million in local sales tax allocations for September, an increase of 1.7 percent compared to September 2014.

Texas' fiscal year ended Aug. 31. Hegar said "All Funds" revenue for the year finished at \$109.5 billion, slightly less than the \$109.7 billion projected in the comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate. Also, sales tax revenue for the year was 0.6 percent below estimate, at \$28.9 billion. The forecast was \$29.07 billion.




