Protecting Our Retirees
The state will increase its contributions to the Employee Retirement System (ERS), putting the fund closer to full financial health and strengthening retiree benefits.

benefits.

Cracking Down On Human Trafficking
Human traffickers will face increased criminal and
civil penalties; these include stricter felony counts and
seizure of traffickers' financial assets hidden behind
shell corporations. Additional help and resources for
trafficking victims will also be established.

Employer Requirements for Working Mothers
All public employers in Texas, such as school districts
and state agencies, will now be required to provide accommodations for employees that need to pump breast
milk at work. This will help retain talented employees
by making workplaces more mother-friendly.

milk at work. This will help retain talented employees by making workplaces more mother-friendly.

Faster Access to 911

Multiline telephone systems — like the ones in hotels and offices — where you would normally have to dial another number first to get an outside line, will now be required to have direct 911 dialing services.

Controlling Prescription Medicine Costs

Law enforcement to crack down on drunk drivers during Labor Day holiday

AUSTIN – The Texas
Department of Transportation reminds drivers that law enforcement officers across the state are out in full force looking for drunk drivers in the weeks leading up to Labor Day, Sept.

7. Last year in Texas, 21 people were killed and 42 were seriously injured in 338 alcohol-related crashes over the Labor Day holiday.

"Labor Day weekend is a fun time for family and friends to celebrate, but you absolutely must have a sober-ride plan if you're going to consume alcohol," said TxDOT Executive Director LtGen Joe Weber, USMC (Reft). "Too many people are killed on our roads each year – especially during holidays – due to

ENVIRONMENTAL DAMAGES LIMITED TO \$2 MILLION

House Bill 1794 will curb county lawsuits

House Bill 1794, became law on Sept. 1, it sets a five-year statute of limitations and cap payouts at about \$2 million when

about \$2 million when counties sue companies that have fouled their water or air. Gov. Gregg Abbott signed the bill in a public ceremony.

Rep. Charlie Geren, R-Fort Worth, and Sen. Kelly Hancock, R-North Richland Hills, pushed the bill through both the House and Senate, drawing little debate.

Proponents say that curbing the civil penalties assessed on top of those state regulators issues will help the economy of certain companies.

Home to the nation's largest petrochemical complex, the county receives about 1,500 citizen complaints about pollution each year, and employs four attorneys to handle environmental litigation and compliance. Smaller counties typically rely only on outside legal help in environmental cases.

About 50 years ago, Texas lawmakers gave local governments the power to bring civil suits against companies for violating environmental laws, and Harris County has often used that authority.

State environmental vi-

olations that result in a law suit requires the state to join in as a "necessary and indispensable party."

In the past five years, Harris County has brought about 10 such cases per year, with penalties averaging about \$61,000 per case. But several high-profile environmental cases have resulted in bigger settlements with the county, including a January agreement with AT&T for about \$5 million over leaking storage tanks.

In the last year, Harris County won a lawsuit against polluters in the San Jacinto River, extracting \$29.4 million in a settlement.

Get Ready for Higher Tax Bills More costly to live, do business in Houston

Harris County Tax Assessor-Collector Mike Sullivan says living, building and working in Houston has become increasingly expensive.

"The Harris County Appraisal District (HCAD) certified the 2015 appraisal roll. Be on the lookout for tax bills in the mail, the first week of November," said Mike Sullivan.

According to HCAD Chief Appraiser Sand Stiefer, the total taxable value for property in Harris County has increased 12% since last year. In 2014, the value was \$349.9 billion. In 2015, that number climbed to \$392.2 billion.

The average residential home tax bill will increase approximately \$310.

Residential properties, which are single family homes, make up 41 percent of the county's tax base, apartments are 8 percent and commercial properties are approximately 25 percent.

The Harris County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office Property Tax Division maintains approximately 1.7 million tax accounts and collects property taxes for 71 taxing entities including Harris County. For the 2014 tax year, the Tax Assessor-Collector's Office collected more than \$5 billion in property taxes.

San Jacinto College's pipefitting program prepares graduates to enter the construction industry as entry-level pipefitters or pipefitting fabricators—workers who fabricate, install, and maintain pipes that carry chemical products, steam, acids, and gases. Such pipes are mostly used in manufacturing, commercial, and industrial settings. In general, a pipefitter maintains and repairs existing pipe systems, whereas a pipefitting fabricator can provide maintenance, and can also

According to Texas
Workforce Commission
(TWC) data, the average
salary for pipefitters in the
Texas Gulf Coast region is
\$24.21 per hour, or \$50,349
per year. According to the
TWC labor market site, the
demand for pipefitters in
the Gulf Coast region is
above average.

demand for pipetitiers in the Gulf Coast region is above average.

San Jacinto College's pipefitting program enables graduates to earn a Pipefitting Fabricator Marketable Skill Achievement Award. The program includes four courses that contain 64 contact hours each, meaning that the achievement award reflects a total of 256 overall contact hours (actual classroom time). The four courses are: Basic Pipefitting Skills; Pipefitting Fabrication and Blueprint Reading; Advanced Pipefitting Standards, Specifications and Installation, and Advanced Pipefitting Fabrication and Installation. A "fast track" schedule enables students to earn the pipefitting achievement award in one Fall or Spring term.

"We researched the cur-

award in one Fall or Spring term.

"We researched the current job market projections for the program and found that pipefitters are on the Governor's State Targeted Occupations top 25 list," commented Eddie Foster, North Campus industrial technology department chair.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor and Statistics, employment of plumbers, pipefitters, and steamfitters is projected to grow 26 percent from 2010 to 2020, faster than the average for all occupations. The TWC labor market site indicates that from 2010 to 2020 the need for plumbers, pipefitters, and steamfitters in the Gulf Coast area will grow by 2,190 jobs, which is an increase of 21.1 percent. The jobs require a high school diploma and post-secondary training. According to Gulf Coast Workfore Solutions, pipefitters are among the largest and highest paid construction occupations. Ruth Keenan, executive director of the San Jacinto College Foundation, expressed appreciation for the PVF Roundtable. "Support from our industry partners is invaluable to San Jacinto College," Keenan commented. "We are so thankful for this generous gift from the PVF

New DNA database law

CAPITOL UPDATE

HOUSTON, TX-Today, House Bill 941, passed by Representative Ana Her-nandez this year, went into effect. The bill ex-pands the state's CODIS DNA database to include individuals convicted of individuals convicted of

individuals convicted of certain assaultive and sexual offenses, such as Enticement of a Child.

"This law brings twenty-first century technology to bear on serious public safety issues," Hernandez said. "We now have an important tool with which to exonerate innocent persons, bring perpetrators to justice, and prevent future crimes by repeat sexual offenders."

DNA is generally used to solve crimes in one of two ways. In cases where a suspect is identified, a sample of that person's DNA can be compared to evidence from the crime scene. In cases where a suspect has not yet been identified, biological evi-dence from the crime scene can be analyzed and com-pared to offender profiles in DNA databases. Crime DNA databases. Crime scene evidence can also be linked to other crime scenes through the use of DNA da-

Houston, September 1, 2015 - Today, Senate Bill (SB) 1135, the Relationship Privacy Act, went into effect. Senator Sylvia Carries authored the bill to Garcia authored the bill to help stop the disturbing trend of nonconsensual disclosure of sexually extrend of nonconsensual disclosure of sexually explicit images on the internet. This is usually done with the specific intent to gain revenge and harm the depicted person and without the consent of the depicted person. Thus, this practice has been commonly referred to as "revenge pornography." Victims' images are commonly posted along with information such as their name, contact information, and links to their social media profiles. To add insult to injury, "revenge porn websites" are further preying on victims by charging fees to remove the sexually explicit images from the internet. SB 1135 establishes criminal penalties and civil remedies for this reprehensible practice.

"Posting a nude or sex-

ually explicit photo of someone on the internet

an evil and destructive vio-lation of trust. My hope is that the civil and criminal penalties provided for under the Relationship Privacy Act deter this heinous conduct from ever occur-ring again in Texas. How-ever, should some coward choose to defy all decency cnose to dery an decency in a petty attempt to get revenge, I take some comfort in knowing that the Act gives law enforcement and prosecutors the tools they need to get justice for the victims."

"I would also like to again thank the brave vicagain thank the brave vic-tims of 'revenge pornogra-phy' that came forward and shared their stories. This law could not have passed without their courage."

Attorney General Paxton pleads not guilty to charges

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Aug. 27 entered a plea of not guilty on felony charges of securities fraud at his arraignment in Fort Worth.

Tarrant County 396th State District Court Judge George Gallagher gave Paxton until Sept. 30 to answer to the charges.

Paxton is accused of encouraging two individuals to buy stock in Severgy, a Collin County-based technology firm, and being

Colin County-based tech-nology firm, and being compensated for his ac-tions without being regis-tered as an investment advisor in accordance with Security and Exchange Commission regulations. Also Paxton is accused of falsely giving prospective investors the impression that he was an investor in

investors the impression that he was an investor in Severgy.

The Texas Rangers turned over evidence gathered during an investigation that ensued when a formal complaint against Paxton, the state's top legal officer, was lodged in April by Texans for Public Justice, an Austin-based government watchdog group. Paxton was indicted by a Collin County grand jury on July 28.

Court proceedings were moved from Collin County to Tarrant County because of Paxton's closeness to the courts in Collin County. Paxton served as a state senator representing Collin County from January 2013 until he was elected attorney general in Normaly 2014 Hencound 21 Hencounds.

2013 until he was elected attorney general in November 2014. He served as the state representative for Collin County and part of Dallas County from 2003 to 2013.

UT removes Davis statue

A bronze statue of Jef-ferson Davis, president of the Confederate States of America from 1861 to 1865, was removed from the Main Mall of the Uni-versity of Texas at Austin on Aug. 30. In an Aug. 29 media ad-visory, UT President Gre-gory Fenves said the statue





would be placed in an indoor educational display at the Briscoe Center for American History on the university campus. The decision, in line with a multi-state trend to remove symbols of the proslavery Confederacy from government-controlled properties, was made after Travis County 250th State District Court Judge Karin Crump rejected a petition District Court Judge Karin
Crump rejected a petition
by the Sons of Confederate
Veterans to prevent the relocation of the statue.
Plans are to refurbish the
statute and install it at the
Briscoe Center within the
next 18 months.

Fennes also said the

Fenves also said the statue of President Woodrow Wilson, displayed opposite the Davis statue, is being moved to preserve the symmetry of the Main Mall plaza and will be positioned elsewhere on campus. Statues of Robert E. Lee and three other Confederate figures remain in place on the Main Mall.

"I am seeking clarity "I am seeking clarity and requesting guidance from the Attorney Gener-al's Office. This is a consti-tutional issue that goes to the heart of separation of powers within Texas gov-ernment," Hegar said.

More Hispanics take ACT
Texas Education Agency on Aug. 26 announced that more Texas Hispanic students in the 2015 graduating class took the ACT college admission test than any other student demographic, according to a report released by ACT, the lowa City, Iowa-based organization that owns and controls the test.

Of the 124,764 Texas students who took the test, almost 40 percent (48,934) were Hispanic. "It's the second consecutive year where the number of Hispanic students represented the highest number of examinees of any racial ethnic group," according to the announcement.

Also, since 2011, Texas has seen a 22.8 percent increase in ACT test-taking graduates among all student groups.

Texas Department of Public Safety on Aug. 28 announced the Sept. 1 launch date of the new Impact Texas Teen Driver program requiring driver's launch date of the new Impact Texas Teen Driver program, requiring driver's license applicants who complete a teen-age driver education course to watch a two-hour program that promotes awareness of the dangers of distracted driving and afterward print a certificate of completion.

The Pool Build

- Part 2

When the first bit of dirt was scooped from the red dirt ground, my heart felt like it stopped.

"No turning back now," I thought as back now," I thought as the excavator operator efficiently moved soil from the spot where the pool is to an ever-growing pile of dirt that flanks the hole. Quietly I contemplate the fact that I've never built a pool and momentarily I feel overwhelmed.

The dig goes predictably well as the site is clean and free from any utility lines. In a few short hours, the rough beginnings of a water conservation pool that doubles as a swimming area lies before me.

I spent the next few late afternoons moving dirt around in few late afternoons moving dirt around in order to perfect the site. Ultimately, I want to control the water coming into the pool. Unlike a dirt stock pond which relies on overhead water flowing downhill to fill it, I built the soil up around the hole to make the overhead water run away from the hole. As such, the edge of the pool is the highest point in that part of the yard. Now, any time a deluge happens, excess water runs away from the pool and won't stain the water with soil, grass, bugs, or oner foreign material. Instead, I'll get most of the water from a series of sluices that brings clean rainwater from the roof whenever it rains.

When Saturday came, my brother Bubba

When Saturday came, my brother Bubba and I tackle the project with fervor. We moved more dirt to shape the more dirt to shape the site at large, we installed underlayment and then manhandled the 900 pound liner and worked on the various pool elements one at a time. The progress was predictably slow but there was progress nonetheless.

"Organic" is a term that's way over-used but it is appropri-ate when I think of this pool and how it's been built. Organic can be used to describe the fact that when complete, it uses a natural and organic way to clean the water. Organic can also be used to describe the pool design. Although it started with a broad idea in mind, elements like the shape and associated landscaping will ultimately come together as the sur-rounding landscape speaks to me and aesthetic decisions are made on the fly.
