# Flood of Celebrities at Chamber Gala

The North Channel Area Chamber of Commerce held their 41st Annual Awards Ceremony and Swearing-in last Friday, January 19th at the Houston Hobby Airpost Marriott.

It was a night sparkling with good food and great friends, dressed like Hollywood stars.

The featured speaker was Meteorologist Jeff Lindner of the Harris County Flood Control District, and a celebrity spokesperson for the Office of Emergency Management, after the flooding and devastation of Hurricane Harvey. Lindner's face became the most familiar on television, as he reported on the effects of

the hurricane and the subsequent flooding throughout the county.

Lindner's account of the flood was a painful reminder to many in the audience, who had suffered personal loss at their homes or businesses. But his talk brought a new insight into the pitfalls of trying to predict the weather and warn residents of potential dan-

As Lindner said of the Hurricane, there was "Nothing comparable in U.S. history." It covered 2000 square miles, and dropped 43.7 inches of rain over several days. This was 12 inches more than the previous record.

# San Jac Baseball opens 2018 season atop the PerfectGame Preseason Top 25

HOUSTON - The San Jacinto College baseball team is no doubt one of the best teams in the country year in and year out.

Brian Sakowski, Perfect-Game's National Scouting Supervisor, says this year's San Jacinto College baseball team has pitching depth and "looks impressive," making it the PerfectGame preseason pick to win the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) World Series. He notes that at least five San Jac players are among the top 60 PerfectGame Junior College top prospect list. That includes INF/RHP Sergio Macias (Laredo, Texas / Alexander HS), C/1B Herbert Iser (Kissimmee, Florida / Osceola HS), LHP Jacob Cantleberry (Greenwood, Indiana / Center Grove HS), OF/INF Alerick Soularie (Humble, Texas / Atascocita HS) and OF/IF Matt Goodheart (Magnolia, Arkansas / Magnolia

San Jac opened the 2018 season last weekend on the road against Panola College and Baton Rouge College in Louisiana. The first home game of the season will be Friday, Feb. 2 against Bossier Parish Community College in a doubleheader. In total, San Jac will play 18 home games this season at JR Harrison Field at Andy Pettitte Park.

Head Coach Tom Arrington is entering his 18th year at the helm of the program. He has guided San Jacinto College to 13 conference titles, 11 regional championships, six national runner-up finishes at the JUCO World Series, four third-place national finishes and one fifthplace national finish. His 37 wins at the JUCO World Series is an all-time record, as is his 59 total games played at the national tournament. This summer, he will enter the NJCAA Baseball Hall of

San Jac returns nine players from last year's team, which finished as the national runner-up and an overall 48-18 record. Arrington has added 10 transfers and a slew of freshmen to this year's roster, one that is poised for a



# Susan G. Komen Casino Night charity gaming fun



He said that even in the Emergency Center, the staff had a hard time perceiving the strength of the storm, and the disaster to the public. And the magnitude of the disaster was measured by 8900 calls to 9-1-1 asking to be rescued from flood waters.

The Hurricane affected everyone from Victoria to Louisiana. In Harris County, Hunting Byou, Greens Bayou, Buffalo Bayou, Luce Bayou, and the San Jacinto River all overflowed their boundaries.

Lindner recounted the worry that pervailed at the Emergency Center, as the rain continued through the September 2nd weekend, and then on Sunday September 3rd flooding hit. On that day all Houston freeways were under 8 to 10 feet of water in some sections, and travel was im-

possible, including emergency vehicles. The decision was made by the OEM to ask the public for help since all resources had been deployed. The OEM estimated that between 15,000 and 25,000 people were at risk that Sunday.

He told of the difficult decision that was made, to open the gates on the two reservoirs in West Houston. He said this was to save lives, irregardless of damage to property. These dams were built in the 1940s, and not adequate for today's runoffs.

Lindner thanks the traditional media, and the new social media, especially Twitter, for helping to communicate to the public. He said that pictures of the flooding were helpbul.

Lessons have been learned from this hurricane and flood, and he said that on January 1st of this year, new county regulations require bulding 36" above the 100 year flood plain.

# Patriots want to tie Steelers with 6th Lombardi prize: Eagles looking for backup Foles to carry them to title

One of the most tumultuous seasons in NFL history (players protesting the National Anthem, declining at-game attendance and TV ratings, continuied serious injuries to star players) comes to a conclusion on Sunday in Minneapolisat U.S. Bank Stadium when the New England Patriots take on the Philadelphia Eagles in Super Bowl I II.

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell has to hope this ultimate game of ultimate games is the best ever, and it has a good chance of being just that

chance of being just that.


And it's a good thing they are playing this game indoors.

The projected high temperature for Sunday is 13 degrees, with a projected low of -3. Tell me again why playing in a cold weather city is a good idea?

The Patriots, led by head coach Bill Belichick and quarterback Tom Brady, will be looking for their sixth Lombardi Trophy, which would tie them with the Pittsburgh Steelers for the most in NFL history. The Eagles, who were the best team in the NFL (that's tough for the Cowboy fan to admit!) until Dec. 10 when quarterback Carson Wentz was lost for the season with a torn ACL injury, have rallied behind back-up quarterback Nick Foles to reach their third SB in team history.

third SB in team history.
Foles struggled a bit after taking over for Wentz, but he came through when his team needed him the most in the NFC title game against the Minnesota Vikings and their No. 1 ranked defense. Foles, an Austin Westlake product, threw for 352 yards and three touchdowns to lead Philly to a 38-7 route of the Vikings and a spot opposite Brady and Co.

Should Foles pull off a third



straight underdog win (the Eagles were underdogs in both of their home playoff games against Atlanta and Minnesota and will enter as the underdog in this one), he would become the second Westalke quarterback to win a Super Bowl, the first being Drew Brees, who led the Saints to the Lombardi Trophy with a win over Indianapolis in 2010 following the 2009 season.

The Patriots are looking to become the only team in NFL history to win back-to-back Super Bowls twice. They won in 2004 and 2005 and are the defending champs heading into No. 52 after rallying from a 28-3 deficit at NRG Stadium last February

February New England had to rally from a 10-point deficit with less than 10 minutes left in the AFC Championship game against Jacksonville to return to defend their title as Brady connected with wide receiver Danny Amendola (7 receptions, 84 yards, 2 TDs) for two fourthguarter scores to save the day for NE fans. The Patriots won without the services of All-Pro tight end Rob Gronkowski (69 receptions, 1,84 yards, 8 TDs) who sustained a concussion late in the second quarter and did not return. Gronk is in the NFL's concussion protocol, but he should be good to go come

Even without his top offensive weapon, Brady was still able to pull out the victory and that's what makes him perhaps the GOAT (Greatest Of All Time). He is a master at taking what the defense gives him, so if that means using his running backs as recievers, so be it, or dinking and dunking to his wide receivers. When a big play presents itself, you can be sure Brady (4,577 yards passing, 32 TDs) will be ready to strike.

Brady will be facing a very good Philly defense on Sunday. The Eagles can bring pressure from their front four and have fast an quick linebackers who can drop into coverage. Their secondary is solid as well and loves coming up with the big turnover to turn games in their favor. In the NFC title game, defensive back Patrick Robinson's 50-yard interception return for a touchdown turned the game in the Eagles favor and it was pretty much lights out for the Vikings after his pick six. Robinson's score tied up the game and it was all downhill for the Eagles after that.

Offensivley, the Eagles have plenty of weapons for Foles to turn to. They have two capble and productive running backs in Jay Ajayi (946 yards, 1 TD) and LeGarrett Blount (766 yards, 2 TDs). Philly acquired Ajayi from the Dolphins after he sulked his way out of Miami. He gives the





Eagles the speed threat at running back, while Blount is used in short-vardage situations. After a slow start to the season, the New England defense improved greatly behind defensive coordinator Matt Patricia's guidance. This will be Patricia's last game as Belichick's DC, as he will become the head coach of the Detroit Lions once this game concludes. The Patriots are tough against the run, which means Philly head coach Doug Pederon, a former backup QB to Brett Favre, might want to attack

a suspect NE secondary. Foles has plenty of options in the passing game. He has two solid wide outs in Alshon Jeffery (62 receptions, 874 yards, 11 TDs) and Nelson Agholor (62 receptions, 827 yards, 8 TDs) and one of the best tight ends in the league in Zach Ertz (74 receptions, 824 yards, 8 TDs). In the NFC title game, Jeffery caught five passes for 83 yards and two touchdowns, the biggest being a 53-yard score late in the second quarter that turned the game into a route. Ertz had eight catches for 93 yards in the title game and will be motivated to out do Gronk in the biggest game of the year.

Brady also has a load of weapons to turn to offensively. Running back Dion Lewis will take care of the running game, while James White, SB Ll's hero, will be the pass-catching back on third down situations. When he

wants to spread the ball out, he can turn to Amendola (68 recepitons, 743 yards, 4 TDs), Gronk, or deep threat Brandin Cooks (65 receptions, 1,082 yards, 7 TDs). In the AFC title game, Cooks had a nice day with six receptions for 100 yards. This will also be offensive coordiantor Josh McDaniel's final game as Belichick's OC. He is expected to be named the head coach in Indianpolis following SB LII.

Don't be surprised if McDaniel calls on a Kenny Britt, Phillip Dorsett or Rex Burkehead to come up with a key play in the game.

This should be a close game that goes down to late in the fourth quarter. The Eagles proved after Wentz went down that they are not a one-man team and have enough pieces in place to pull off the upset. The Philly offensive line is one of the best in the NFL and they should be able to give Foles time to make plays downfield. New England must pressure Foles early. If they let him get comfortable as the Vikings did, that secondary could be in for a long day

But New England has a pretty fair QB themselves in Brady and when your team needs to pull off a drive late in the game, there's no better quarterback in history than No. 12. He's proven it time-after-time and big-game pressure does not phase him, just ask the Atlanta Falcons. Experience could also

play a huge factor in the outcome. The core of this New England team has played in seven straight AFC title games and four of the last seven Super Bowls. During Belichick's reign, the Patriots have played in eight big games in the last 18 years, a remarkable accomplishment in perhaps the most difficult of team sports. The Eagles don't have the playoff experience the Pats do. Defensive end Chris Long played for the Pats a year ago and won his first title Pederson will lean on his knowledge of the team to help the Eagles prepare for this one, but remember, they are taking on the master in Belichick, so that may or may not have much affect on this game.

And there is one other factor to consider in who wins this game. There has been some speculation that this could be the swan song for Belichick and Brady (I don't buy into that one bit) and what better motivation than to go out on top with a sixth Lombard Trophy to hoist. New England will have to replace both coordinators in the offseason, but somethning tells me Belichick has two names already in place.

Again, I expect a competitive game and I think the Eagles have a real shot in this one, but they don't have Brady. Look for No. 12 to be the difference maker once again as the Patriots win Lombardi Trophy No. 6. My pick, New England 27, Philadelphia 24

## Brady Briefing: Building American Prosperity

# Governors urge congressional leaders to pass disaster aid funding

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott and the governors of California, Puerto Rico and Florida on Jan. 24 asked U.S. House and Senate leaders to hurry up and pass supplemental disaster funding, and to send the legislation to

President Trump. "Over the past several months, we have received numerous assurances that adequate disaster funding was imminent," the governors wrote in a joint letter. "Its continued delay only exacerbates ongoing uncertainty in devastated areas. Simply put, the communities devastated by these storms cannot be completely put back together until the federal government makes good on its promise to our citizens. If ever there was a time and role for the federal government to urgently help its citizens rebuild communities damaged by epochal disasters, now is the time to step up and

fill that role.' The letter, signed by Abbott, California Gov. Jerry Brown, Puerto Rico Gov. Ricardo Rosselló, and Florida Gov. Rick Scott, was addressed to U.S. Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Kentucky, Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-New York, U.S. House Speaker Paul Ryan, R-Wisconsin, and House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Califor-



The governors also said in their letter, "While no longer front page news in Washington D.C., ongoing suffering becomes more acute the longer Congress waits to finish its work and pass a substantial disaster supplemental funding package" for critical relief measures in communities damaged by "epochal disasters."

#### Paxton files DACA brief

was joined by 12 other states in filing a court brief urging the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn a lower court ruling that would prevent the Trump administration from phasing out the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program in March.

The ruling, issued by a U.S. District Court in California earlier in January, blocked the federal government from phasing out DACA, an Obama-era policy.

Paxton, in the text of the 36-page brief, informed the Supreme Court that Texas would be forced to consider whether to file suit challenging the June 15, 2012 memorandum by President Obama that created DACA and provided for its continued implementation. It is furthermore stated that such a challenge would be brought by June 15, 2018, in order to avoid issues about the possible application of a six-vear statute of limitations.

"Without this court's prompt intervention, the district court's injunction could last for over a year, frustrating the very purpose of the executive's de-

cision here of promptly terminating disputes about the legality of a past policy by taking an undisputedly lawful course going forward," Paxton said.

### Special Ed: Survey open

The Texas Education Agency on Jan. 23 made available an online survey to solicit feedback from the public on its draft corrective action plan for special education.

The survey, available on the agency's website, is open to anyone wishing to provide input on the draft plan.

At the direction of Gov. Abbott, the TEA drafted an initial corrective action plan concerning support and delivery of special education services in public schools. The draft addresses issues identified in a recent federal monitoring report, including the proper identification of special education students and assuring access to services at the local level.

### Reported: 6 measles

**cases** ne Texas Depar

The Texas Department of State Health Services on Jan. 23 announced that six measles cases among unvaccinated people in Ellis County were being investigated.

DSHS officials have advised health care providers in the area to take precautions and consider measles as a possible diagnosis in patients with a fever and rash in addition to a cough, runny nose or conjunctivitis.

The highly contagious nature of measles means it is possible that more cases will occur in the community. People involved in the outbreak have connections to Waxahachie and Midlothian, state health officials said.

#### DPS implements HB 1729

The Texas Department of Public Safety on Jan. 25 announced that customers applying for or renewing a driver license, identification card or commercial driver license may donate \$1 or more to the Sexual Assault Evidence Testing Grant program.

As of Jan. 8 the program — administered by the Criminal Justice Division of the Office of the Governor — had received more than 8,900 donations for a total of nearly \$25,000, the DPS reported.

#### Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day, also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is an annual holiday celebrated on February 14. It originated as a Western Christian liturgical feast day honoring one or more early saints named Valentinus, and is recognized as a significant cultural and commercial celebration in many regions around the world, although it is not a public

holiday in any country. The day first became associated with romantic love within the circle of Geoffrey Chaucer in the 14th century, when the tradition of courtly love flourished. In 18th-century England, it evolved into an occasion in which lovers expressed their love for each other by presenting flowers, offering confectionery, and sending greeting cards (known as "valentines"). In Europe, Saint Valentine's Keys are given to lovers "as a romantic symbol and an invitation to unlock the giver's heart", as well as to children, in order to ward off epilepsy (called Saint Valentine's Malady). Valentine's Day symbols that are used today include the heart-shaped outline, doves, and the figure of the winged Cupid. Since the 19th century, handwritten valentines have given way to mass-produced greeting

#### cards. Court of love

The earliest description of February 14 as an annual celebration of love appears in the Charter of the Court of Love. The charter, allegedly issued by Charles VI of France at Mantes-la-Jolie in 1400, describes lavish festivities to be attended by several members of the royal court, including a feast, amorous song and poetry competitions, jousting and dancing. Amid these festivities, the attending ladies would hear and rule on disputes from lovers. No other record of the court exists, and none of those named in the charter were present at Mantes except Charles's queen, Isabeau of Bavaria, who may well have imagined it all while waiting out a plague. Modern times

In the United States, the first mass-produced Valentines of embossed paper lace were produced and sold shortly after 1847 by Esther Howland (1828-1904) of Worcester, Massachusetts. Her father operated a large book and stationery store, but Howland took her inspiration from an English Valentine she had received from a business associate of her father. Intrigued with the idea of making similar Valentines, Howland began her business by importing paper lace and floral deco-

rations from England. Today, jewelry is a great expression of love and a perfect gift for Valentine's Day. Gifts of gold, silver, diamonds and watches last far beyond the vase of cut flowers or the box of "sweet candies for your sweetheart". Fine jewelry offers her a lasting impression of just how deeply you love her, how much she means to you and that your life wouldn't be the same without her by your side.






