changed at Furr High Houston ISD officials released a statement last Tuesday, May 22 reporting on the results of an eighth month

day, May 22 reporting on the results of an eighth month investigation of academic conditions at Furr High School. The probe was led by outside attorneys for the school district.

The report said that administrators at the school changed grades to ensure that students passed classes and therefore the results would be more favorable. The officials also said that teachers were instructed not to assign grades below 50 percent, and to alter attendance records, thereby awarding students who otherwise would not meet attence requirements.

This report is an amazing turn of events for a school under its well-known principal Bertie Simmons, had won a \$10 million dollar grant from the XQ Foundation of Apple founder Steve Jobs.

HISD officials did not name anyone responsible for the manipulations, but principal Simmons has been on forced leave since eight months ago. After she left, six other administrators left too, but HISD does not implicate anyone in the mis-

conduct.

Simmon's attorney said that she denies any allegations of misconduct, and will fight the charges and dismissal in court.

GUNS, THREATS AT LOCAL SCHOOLS Police investigate at Huffman, Crosby

CROSBY – In the wake of the shooting at Santa Fe High School, an incident in which a student brought a pistol to Hargrave High School in Huffman – Crosby was taking nothing for granted when a threat was found to be written on a bathroom wall indicating there would be a shooting at Crosby High School on May 30, later that threat would allegedly be moved up to May 22.

The Superintendent's Office issued the following statement at 11:55 on May 21.

"We have received a report this morning that a threat was written on a bathroom wall at Crosby High School. The threat alleges a shooting that would take place on May 30th. At this time, administrators and our school resource officers are investigating the threat to determine its source. We are asking that our staff, par-

ents, and students be especially vigilant in the coming days. In the aftermath of any school shooting, hoax threats are often made. However, we are not taking lightly any threat made against student safety. The threat did not name a specific student or group of students. A thorough investigation is in progress and appropriate consequences will be taken once we have more information. We strongly encourage you to directly report any information you have regarding this or other safety threats directly to the school district or you can use the Crosby ISD app, which has an anonymous tip line for the reporting of information related to any type of threat. We will keep you updated on the situation." Later on June 21 at

Five arrested for Crosby Kroger robbery



Five were arested by a combination of Harris County Sheriff's Deputies and Houston Police Department on US 90 for their role in a robbery of the Kroger store in Crosby. At about 9:17 a.m. five men armed with weapons and crowbars arrived riding in a maroon van. They went straight to the cash drawers and left the store after terrorizing everyone inside. The crew drove to the Crosby Meadows Apartments on Krenek Road behind the CVS Pharmacy; abandoned the van and boarded a white Ford Crown Victoria. They then headed to US 90 on Krenek. Robbery investigators recovered three cash drawers with cash still inside. Multiple law enforcement vehicles were present at the arrest.

Harris County releases Hurricane Harvey "After Action Report"

(Houston, TX) - The Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HCOHSEM) has released its Hurricane Harvey After Action Report (AAR) which reviews the county's overall response efforts. Some of the items listed are quick fixes, while others will require a major long-term investment of time and money.

"Planning and practice pay off, but real events show how ready we truly are," said Harris County Judge Ed Emmett. "Hurricane Harvey's test of our emergency response highlighted remarkable successes and areas for improvement. Applying those lessons will certainly make us better prepared for the next disaster."

The AAR was created with the input and collaboration of numerous local, state, federal, private and non-profits organizations. According to the report, the overall response and recovery efforts by HCOHSEM and its partners demonstrated professional and well-practiced levels of planning, coordination and collaboration.

Some of the major strengths that were listed as sustains include:

• Pre-positioning county, state, and federal assets enabled quick deployment

• Pairing civilians and resources with skilled professionals to assist with rescue operations

• Utilization of First Contact Program to provide immediate essentials • Support from regional public safety information officers in the Regional Joint Information Center

The report also identified some primary areas for improvement including:

• Developing a countywide Continuity Of Operations Plan

• Training non-traditional support personnel who may be involved in disaster response operations

• Transitioning from response to recovery operations in the Emergency Operations Center

• Working with the City of Houston to address the current Donations Management strategy

"The Harvey report represents a substantial effort by both the county and its partners, but it is only one of many tools we will use to better serve our residents," added Judge Emmett. "Many of the lessons outlined in the report are already in place, and the process for identifying the next steps continues."

Furthermore, Harris County also conducted an AAR on Regional Joint Information Center operations, and other county departments have conducted internal reviews as well.

While Harris County works to improve its response to future disasters, it continues to focus on the long road to recovery facing our most devastated communities.



Governor speaks about issues related to shooting at high school

AUSTIN — Local, state and federal law enforcement on May 18 responded to a shooting that left 10 people dead and 10 others injured at Santa Fe High School near Galveston.

One of the school's 1,400 students was taken into custody, authorities said.

Gov. Greg Abbott ordered flags to half-staff until May 22 in memory of those who lost their lives in what he called "probably the worst disaster to strike this community."

During a news conference at the high school, Abbott said he plans to work with members of the Texas Legislature and with educators, parents and students across Texas "on swift solutions to prevent tragedies like this from ever happening again." He mentioned background checks and "strategies to keep guns out of the hands of those who pose an immediate danger to others." He also suggested more safety personnel and mental health intervention capabilities on school campuses.

researching best policies and practices from other states and providing recommendations for any rule changes that would support a professional work environment. "This is the next step in our effort to make sure that sexual harassment is not tolerated at the Texas Capitol. Now that a stronger and more transparent sexual harassment policy is in place, this workgroup will recommend additional ways to make the legislative work environment safer," Straus said. The House Committee on Administration adopted a sexual harassment policy in December, clarifying ways Texas House employees can identify and report sexual harassment and get assistance. The policy also requires House staff to undergo new anti-harassment and anti-discrimination training. All current members of the Texas House have completed that training, Straus said.

Straus named state Reps. Linda Koop, R-Dallas, and Donna Howard, D-Austin, as co-chairs of the workgroup. Other members include Reps. Angie Chen Button, R-Richardson; Tony Dale, R-Cedar Park; Nicole Collier, D-Fort Worth; Lina Ortega, D-El Paso; Abel Herrero, D-Corpus Christi. Tom Oliverson, R-Houston, Gary Van-Deaver, R-New Boston; and Gene Wu, D-Houston.

15,000 Hurricane Harvey-stricken homes have received repairs through the Partial Repair and Essential Power for Sheltering program in coordination with the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency.

The program provides basic repairs that allow homeowners to live in their homes and their communities as they make more permanent repairs to their homes. Up to \$20,000 in repairs, including restoring electricity, air conditioning/ heating and hot water, debris removal, limited drywall and insulation and restoring functional bathroom and kitchen facilities, have been provided to return the homes to safe, sanitary and secure standards, the officials said.

Paxton files

AG Paxton reminds Texans of May 31 deadline to claim Western Union refunds

Austin, TX. May 21, 2018 – Attorney General Ken Paxton today reminded Texans of the May 31 deadline to submit claims in a \$586 million settlement with Western Union affecting consumers who were deceived into sending payments to scam artists using the company's wire transfer service. As many as 39,000 Texans are eligible for refunds.

"Texans who were tricked into sending funds via Western Union and qualify for refunds deserve justice, but many may not know about this opportunity," Attorney General Paxton said. "My office is reminding affected consumers that May 31 is the deadline to submit a claim so they can get back funds lost to wire transfer scams."

Texans who were a victim of a fraudinduced wire transfer using Western Union between January 1, 2004, and January 19, 2017, may file a claim online at http:// www.westemunionremission.com

Last year, Attorney **General Paxton** announced a multistate settlement with Western Union over complaints by people who were tricked into using the company's wire transfer service to send money to third parties involved in various schemes to defraud consumers. Western Union agreed to establish an antifraud program to deter such criminal activity in the future. The settlement is being administered by the U.S. Department of Justice's Victim Asset Recovery Program, which will be reviewing all claims submitted by consumers. The global settlement requiring Western Union to forfeit \$586 million dollars was entered with the Federal Trade Commission and Department of Justice. The multistate settlement included Texas, 49 other states and the District of Columbia.

Straus tasked the workgroup with reviewing existing sexual harassment policies, businesses can save on the purchase of certain water and energy efficient products during the state's "Water-Efficient Products" and "Energy Star" sales tax holidays.

The state comptroller's office estimates that shoppers will save more than \$10 million in state and local sales tax during the Memorial Day weekend May 26-28.

As of May 1, more than 60 percent of the state was in abnormally dry or drought conditions, and the upcoming summer heat puts a strain on the power grid. Those factors make it a good time to upgrade outdated water systems and inefficient appliances, Hegar said.

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 15 announced that his office had filed a consumer protection lawsuit in a Travis County state district court alleging that Purdue Pharma violated the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act relating to the company's manufacturing and marketing of prescription opioids, including OxyContin.

The attorneys general of five other states took similar legal action on May 15 against the Stamford, Connecticut-based company.

"My office is holding Purdue Pharma accountable for fueling the nation's opioid epidemic by deceptively marketing prescription painkillers including OxyContin when it knew their drugs were potentially dangerous and that its use had a high likelihood of leading to addiction," Paxton said.

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

about 4:07 p.m. "The threat that was discovered in a boy's bathroom this morning at Crosby High School is still being investigated. Because so many students had already accessed that bathroom before the threat had been reported, it has proven difficult to narrow down the person who might have originally posted the threat. Regardless, administrators and our school resource officers are exhausting all avenues to determine the source of the threat. We will update if there is new information."

Safety measures were offered on May 22 they were and related to May 29 and next year.

"School resource officers are on-site at CHS and CMS. We will also have school resource officer presence on each of our elementary campuses. Our SROs are no longer on traffic duty in the morning in order to allow them to be on campuses.

We are employing additional School Resource Officers to increase presence at each campus through the end of the school year.

- K9 units conducted a sweep at Crosby High School this morning and nothing was found to indicate an imminent threat.

Beginning this week, Crosby Middle School campuses will not allow students to bring backpacks to school for the remainder of the year. Teachers will provide necessary resources to students in class.

Beginning Tuesday (May 29th) of next week, Crosby High School campus will not allow students to bring backpacks to school for the remainder of the year. Teachers will provide necessary resources to students in class. Female students will be allowed to bring a small purse for personal items. Any students in athletics can keep their workout clothes or needed items in their athletic locker. Students are completing Mac-Book turn-in this week, and next week will be finals week with early release each day All campus main entrances are secured and do not allow open access to student areas without appropriate screening. Periphery doors around each campus are locked regularly to prevent unauthorized entry and are only accessible by staff members with appropriate entry credentials.

Operations Plan will be aligned to match NIMS strategies and available to key staff via MyEOP app.

We will be implementing a Threat Assessment Team to provide a vehicle for staff to refer students who exhibit concerning behavior.

Crime Stoppers will renew efforts in the fall to promote student reporting efforts and to publicize available tip lines. This summer, we would like to host a community forum to discuss potential solutions moving forward. This is an extremely complicated issue with no clear answer and we want to work in collaboration with our community and field experts to determine the best solutions for the safety of our students and staff.

A special called Crosby ISD Board of Trustees meeting was called for May 24 at 7:00 in the Operations Building.

Crosby's Interim Superintendent Kirk Lewis issued the following statements concerning preparedness.

"It's hard to believe we find ourselves mourning again the loss of life inside a school. That this one is so close to home drives the loss more deeply in our hearts. Our prayers go out to the Santa Fe community and the parents of those lost.

Since the tragedy in Florida in February, Crosby ISD administrative teams and teacher leaders have been conducting response training. Members of our senior staff have learned from presentations from local law enforcement officials to the Secret Service. Much of the information we've been given is being incorporated into a complete revision of the district's Emergency Operation Plan currently being drafted by experts in school safety at the Harris County Department of Education.

Our principals and teachers have conducted multiple trainings of staff since February ensuring that our staff fully undersituation and appropriately respond to it. Our initial training has been focused on preparing our people. Our training and drills will extend to students at an age appropriate level in the days to come. In the event of an incident on one of our campuses today, I believe our teachers are much better prepared to provide the instructions our students need as they deal with the threat.

Please understand the reality of what we know. Most of these active shooters were students who most likely sat through active shooter drills and were fully aware of what students were being told to do. That reality means our teachers and staff must be fully trained and ready to react to very dynamic and fluid situations. It also must temper, to some extent, what we share students.

In light of this most recent occurrence, however, we will conduct a basic, active shooter drill before the end of the school year at our schools and follow up with more specific training as school begins next year.

Our heart's desire and fervent prayer is that our schools and our students and staff will never face this kind of threat. Yet, we must prepare as if it could happen any day.

This is certainly not the message I prefer to send out this time of year. I'd much rather extol the achievement of the Crosby students as we prepare for the end of school and for graduation. Amid the tragedy, we will pray, do the things we can do, and find the heart and will to still celebrate the joy of this time of year."

On Monday, May 21, officials at Huffman ISD confirmed that a student was arrested with a gun in his backpack at Hargrave High School. School officials had gotten a tip concerning a male with a pistol in his backpack and intent to harm himself. Huffman went on a brief lockdown as a precaution. while a K-9 Officer swept the high school. Parents were then allowed to pick up their student. Students and administration were congratulated on making the tip count and no one was injured.

The qualities that determine the overall value of a natural or cultured pearl or a piece of pearl jewelry are size, shape, color, luster, surface quality, nacre quality, and—for jewelry with two or more pearls—matching.

Size: When other value factors are equal, larger pearls are rarer and more valuable than smaller pearls of the same type.

Shape: Round is the most difficult shape to culture, making it the rarest cultured pearl shape and—if all other factors are equal also generally the most valuable. There are exceptions, though. Well-formed pear, oval, or baroque (irregularly shaped) cultured pearls are also prized by pearl lovers.

Color: Natural and cultured pearls occur in a broad range of hues. There are warm hues like yellow, orange, and pink, and cool hues like blue, green, and violet. Pearls have a wide range of tone from light to dark. Pearl colors tend to be muted, with a soft, subtle quality Pearl jewelry is classy, tasteful, and never seems to go out of style. Pearls will always look good on her whether she's wearing blue jeans or that little black dress. From casual to formal, pearls easily make the transition.
