Emmett, Culberson announce \$5 billion more for flood work

Funding will Complete all Federally Authorized Flood Control Projects in Houston and Harris County

HOUSTON, TX - Congressman John Culberson (TX-07) and Harris County Judge Ed Emmett last week announced the influx of more than \$4.5 billion in federal aid headed to Texas for flood prevention and mitigation efforts.

"This funding was secured as part of the hurricane relief bills I helped shepherd through Congress and, as promised, allows the Harris County Flood Control District to finish every federally authorized flood control project," Congressman Culberson said. "We know this money is vitally important, but it is only part of the solution. I will continue to fight for legislation that will help protect families, homes and businesses in the future.

Judge Emmett joined Congressman Culberson at the Jewish Community Center, which is located close to Brays Bayou. It suffered extensive damage because of flooding during Harvey. The current project underway by the Harris County Flood Control District is purposed to reduce flooding along the Brays Bayou and will receive \$75 million. The other projects receiving money are:

--Buffalo Bayou and Tributaries - \$1.4 million

--Clear Creek - \$295 million

--Hunting Bayou - \$65

--Sabine Pass to Galveston Bay Costal Storm Risk Management and Ecosystem Restoration Project - approximately \$4 billion

--White Oak Bayou -\$45 million

Precinct 2 begins road improvements in Crosby Area

CROSBY, Texas – Commissioner Jack Morman announced the start of construction on a new BetterStreets2Neighborhoods (BS2N) project for Monday, July 16th along various roadways throughout the Crosby area. BS2N is a Precinct 2 program dedicated to preserving asphalt roadways by conducting base repairs, asphalt milling and overlay, as well as roadway button and striping replacement.

This \$2.8 million project will repair nearly 14 miles of roadway, including Runneburg Road, Kennings Road, and Reidland Road, among many others. Construction is expected to be complete in the fourth quarter of this year. Roadwork will require singlelane closures, so drivers are encouraged to plan their commutes accordingly and drive with caution through the construction

Over the last year, Commissioner Morman's BS2N program repaired nearly 70 miles of roadway throughout East Harris County. He currently has plans to repair more than 60 additional miles by the end of the year.

New ER Facility offers Medical services

Pictured on this page is some of the medical equipment and treatment facilities that is found in the new ER-24/7 Emergency Room that was just opened by Bayshore Medical Center. The ER facility is located on Beltway 8 East near Wallisville Road, and can be accessed from either roadway.

Seen at right is a CT scanner, used to examine internal injuries from falls and other causes. It has other diagnostic uses as well, and is the major piece of equipment in the new ER.

At right in the second photo is a typical treatment room, used by the doctors and nurses for medical procedures after a patient has been diagnosed in what is known as a "triage" procedure. The new ER has five of these treatment rooms, and then a patient is located in an adjacent recovery or waiting room until they are judged well enough to be released.

Also housed in the ER building are lab facilities, blood draw room, nursing station, and staff offices and lounges. The ER functions much as a hospital, except it does not have equipment for extreme situations that might require surgery, and recovery, with no overnight beds.

Patients can arrive by private auto, or there is an ambulance emergency entrance. Also possible is arrival or transfer by medical helicopter, as shown by this PHI LifeFlight in the landing area behind the ER that was present at the opening.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), as the lead agency, is proposing improvements to Farm-to-Market (FM) 2100 from Huffman-Cleveland Road (North) to FM 1960 in Harris County, Texas. This notice advises the public that TxDOT will be conducting a Public Hearing on the proposed project. The hearing will be held on Thursday, August 2, 2018, at Hargrave High School, 25400 Willy Lane, Huffman, Texas 77336. Displays will be available for viewing at 5:30 p.m. with the formal hearing starting at 6:30 p.m. The purpose of the hearing is to present the planned improvements and to receive public comment on the proposed project.

The proposed project area includes 4.5 miles of existing roadway and proposes to reconstruct and widen the existing facility from a two-lane roadway to a four-lane divided roadway with a raised median. The proposed improvements would accommodate expected traffic demand and growth in the region, while enhancing safety by providing a divided highway with raised medians and dedicated left turn lanes at select intersections and cross-streets. The proposed roadway design would include one 12-foot travel lane and one 15-foot outside shared-use lane in each direction, as well as sidewalks in each direction. Additional design features would include a storm sewer drainage system and detention ponds.

The proposed roadway improvements would be constructed primarily within the existing 150-foot right-of-way (ROW). Approximately 34 acres of additional ROW would be required for drainage, corner clips, and accommodation of the approaches to the bridge crossing at Luce Bayou. Although additional ROW is required, no residential or commercial structures would be displaced. Information concerning services and benefits available to affected property owners and information about the tentative schedule for ROW acquisition may be obtained from the district office at the address listed below.

The proposed project would impact wetlands and would require an Individual Permit from the US Army Corps of Engineers under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. The proposed project would encroach upon the floodplain, however, the base flood elevation would not increase.

Any environmental documentation or studies, maps showing the project location and design, tentative construction schedules, and other information regarding the proposed project are on file and available for inspection Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. at the TxDOT Houston District Office, 7600 Washington Avenue, Houston, Texas 77007. To schedule an appointment at the Houston District, please contact Ms. Wahida Wakil at (713) 802-5513. Information will also be made available for viewing at the North Harris County Area Office, 16803 Eastex Freeway (US 59), Humble, Texas 77396. To schedule an appointment at the North Harris County Area Office, please call (281) 319-6400. This information also will be available for review at the hearing. Verbal and written comments from the public regarding the proposed project are requested and may be presented at the hearing, or submitted in person or by mail to the TxDOT Houston District Office, Attention: Director of Project Development, P.O. Box 1386, Houston, Texas 77251-1386. Comments must be received on or before Friday, August 17, 2018, to be part of the official hearing record. The hearing will be conducted in English. Beaumount Highway reopens to traffic

commuters are relieved now that the Beaumont Highway, known also as old US 90, again provides a relief route to Houston and back, and is now reopened.

Local traffic and industrial trucking puts about 12,000 to 13,000 vehicles on the roadway daily between FM 2100

and Beltway 8.

TxDOT closed the road for repairs in early May on an emergency basis. It was feared that

possible collapse of the roadway might occur. The closure was at Sheldon Road to drivers travelling east and originally at the San Jacinto River Bridge for those westbound, later moving nearer to C.E. King

and then to Beltway 8. Causes for the action were many. Normal wear and tear from erosion under the bridge was one factor. Varied floods last year including Hurricane Harvey

compromised the integrity of the roadway.

Hurricane Harvey added insult to injury with an eroding pounding and a thorough soaking. Parts of the highway was under water from the hurricane until Sept. 2, 2017.

Projections were that it would take until August to open the roadway but construction crews finished ahead of schedule on incentives and a relative dry spell.

2017 Hurricane Season FEMA After-Action Report

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 12, 2018 – The Federal Emergency Management Agency released today the 2017 Hurricane Season FEMA After-Action Report. The report examines the agency's performance during the record breaking season. Last year, hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Maria devastated the nation at a time when FEMA was already supporting 692 federally declared disasters. During response to the three cata-strophic hurricanes, FEMA also responded to the historic wildfires in California. The report captures transformative insights from a historic hurricane seasor that will help FEMA, the emergency management community, and the nation chart the path into the future. The report identified 18 key findings across five focus areas and offered targeted recommenda-tions for FEMA improvements, as well as broader lessons for partners throughout the emergency management

As a cornerstone of the discipline, emergency managers use lessons learned in order to improve outcomes, minimize errors, and better serve survivors. The agency has already taken immediate actions based on the findings from the After-Action Report including updated hurricane plans, annexes, and procedures for states and territories; increased planning factors for the Caribbean and disaster supplies; and updated high priority national-level contracts, including the National Evacuation Contract, Caribbean Transportation Contract, and National Ambulance Contract, FEMA has also tested its response and initial recovery capabilities in the National Level Exercise (NLE) 2018, which occurred in May and focused on areas identified from real-world continuous improvement findings in this report.

Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria caused a combined \$265 billion in damage and each ranked among the top five costliest hurricanes on record. As a result, FEMA coordinated large deployments of federal personnel, both before and after the storms' landfalls, to support response and initial recovery efforts across 270,000 square miles. FEMA facilitated logistics missions that involved more than \$2 billion worth of commodities moving across several states and territories using multiple modes of transportation. FEMA Urban Search and Rescue Task Forces, composed of state and local emergency responders, saved or assisted nearly 9,500 people across the three hurricanes. In total, the hurricanes and wildfires affected more than 47 million people—
almost 15 percent of the nation's population. FEMA registered nearly 4.8 million households for

assistance.
FEMA has incorporated many of the findings from this report into its 2018-2022 Strategic Plan, which will guide implementation of long-term goals to build a more prepared and resilient nation.



Governor welcomes establishment of Futures Command in Austin

AUSTIN — The U.S. Army on July 12 announced its new Futures Command would be head-quartered in Austin "to better partner with academia, industry and innovators in the private sector, while providing a good and affordable quality of life for Futures Command personnel."

After the announcement, Gov. Greg Abbott said the state of Texas "is proud to partner with the U.S. Army in establishing the Futures Command to harness the cutting-edge technologies needed to build an innovative, research-based foundation for our national defense"

"This sweeping reorganization of the Army's military efforts adds to the historic connection between Texas and the U.S. military, and I am proud of their presence in the Lone Star State." Abbott added

Star State," Abbott added.

As stated in the Army's official news release, the command, which began operations on July 1, will lead the Army's future force modernization enterprise and is expected "to assess the future operational environment, emerging threats and new technologies in order to develop and deliver concepts, requirements, future force designs and modern materiel solutions to meet our soldiers' wartime needs."

The establishment of the command marks the most significant reorganization of the institutional Army since 1973. At full operating capacity in summer 2019, some 500 personnel will be attached to the command.

Paxton supports

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on July 12 announced that he had joined the attorneys general of 25 other states in a letter urging U.S. Senate leaders to confirm President Trump's nomination of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Kavanaugh, 53, currently is a member of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia.

"Throughout his career," wrote Paxton, "Judge Kavanaugh has demonstrated an abiding commitment to the principles and freedoms on which our country was founded, and an unshakable respect for the proper role of the courts within our constitutional structure. The Senate should confirm President Trump's choice without delay."

Joining Paxton in signing the letter were the attorneys general of Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma,

South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, West Virginia, Wisconsin

and Wyoming.

Meanwhile, Texas Democratic Party Chair Gilberto Hinojosa issued a statement referring to Kavanaugh as "a judicial extremist who has no business on our highest court."

"Let's be clear," wrote

"Let's be clear," wrote Hinojosa, "a vote for Kavanaugh is a vote to gut the Affordable Care Act, overturn Roe v. Wade and turn back the clock on our fundamental rights. Judge Kavanaugh has a record of siding with powerful interests over consumers and workers and would fail to be an independent check on Trump."

exceeds estimate

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on July 11 revised his official state revenue estimate, announcing better-than-expected revenue growth in fiscal 2018 and an improved economic outlook for fiscal 2019.

In a letter to state leaders, Hegar said Texas would have \$110.17 billion in general revenue-related

funds available for general-purpose spending for the 2018-19 biennium, resulting in a projected ending balance of \$2.67 billon. In the fall of 2017, Hegar projected an ending balance of \$94 million.

Hegar attributed much of the improved revenue estimate to an economic boost related to rising oil prices and production. Additionally, Texas added more than 350,000 new jobs in the 12 months ending in May 2018 and the state's unemployment rate in recent months has been at or near historic lows.

"Though nearly all current economic indicators remain positive and revenue collections have exceeded our previous expectations, there are significant risks to the forecast," Hegar said. "A trade war, a withdrawal from the North American Free Trade Agreement or a significant downturn in the price of oil would reduce our potential economic growth. The current outlook, however, is for continued growth through fiscal 2019 for both the economy

In other economic news, Comptroller Hegar announced July 11 that anwould send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$759 million in local sales tax allocations for July

The amount is 11.6 percent more than the amount reported in July 2017.

Allocations are based on sales made in May by businesses that report tax monthly.

The Texas Department of Transportation on July 3 announced the awarding of some \$82 million in state and federal grants to fund public transportation providers in rural, small urban and large urban areas of Texas.

Overall, the grants are intended to help pay for maintenance of vehicles and facilities, vehicle purchases and transit facility improvements and regionally coordinated public transportation planning efforts.

A TxDOT statement added that the funding "ultimately pays for resources that give Texans access to transportation so they can get to and from school, job training, health care appointments, businesses and recreational activities"

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans to take extra safety precautions as temperatures and heat indices continue to reach 100 degrees and above in many parts of the state.

"We have already experienced extreme heat in most parts of the state this summer, and DPS wants to remind all Texans that the dangers from sustained high temperatures should not be taken lightly," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Heat-related injuries and deaths are often preventable if we take the necessary steps to protect ourselves and others."

Extreme temperatures place children at greater risk of injury or death if left unattended in a vehicle. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, temperatures inside a car can rise more than 20 degrees in only 10 minutes. Even with an outside temperature of 60 degrees, the temperature inside a car can reach 110 degrees.

Heatstroke is one of the leading causes of non-crash-related fatalities among children, and every year, children die from heat-related injuries after being left in a vehicle or by entering a vehicle unnoticed. Leaving windows partially rolled down does not help. A child should never be left unattended in a vehicle.

Additionally, extreme heat events or heat waves are one of the leading causes of weather-related deaths in the United States, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Periods of severe heat and high humidity tax the body's ability to cool itself and can lead to heat exhaustion and heat stroke, which can be fatal

DPS offers the following tips for staying safe and managing the heat:

- •Drink plenty of water throughout the day even if you do not feel thirsty; you may not realize you're dehydrated until it's too late. Also avoid alcohol and beverages high in caffeine or sugar during periods of prolonged outdoor exposure.
- Pay attention to your body. Heat-related illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke can develop quickly. Know thewarning signs and seek medical attention if necessary.
- Check on others, especially the elderly, sick, very young and those without air conditioning.
- Don't forget pet safety. Animals are also susceptible to heatrelated injury or death – don't put your pets in these dangerous conditions.
- Monitor local weather updates and stay aware of any upcoming changes in
- Limit exposure to the sun and stay indoors as much as possible. If possible, avoid strenuous outdoor activity during the hottest part of the day.
- Light-colored, loosefitting clothing and a hat are recommended while spending time outdoors.
- Wear sunscreen. Sunburns can affect your body's ability to cool down. Protect yourself during periods of sun exposure by putting on sunscreen SPF 15 or higher 30 minutes prior to going outside.
- Be extra careful when cooking outdoors, building campfires or driving off-road to avoid igniting dry vegetation. Also, stay aware of burn bans in your area and always abide by restrictions on outside burning.

Public Notice U. S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region 6

July 2018

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Region 6, in cooperation with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, has completed the fifth five-year review of remedy implementation and performance at the Highlands Acid Pit Superfund site (Site) in Highlands, Texas. In the 1950s, the area was used for the disposal of industrial waste studge, believed to be spent sulfurie acid from oil and gas refining processes. Waste disposal activities contaminated soil and groundwater with hazardous chemicals.

Cleanup included excavation and off-site disposal of waste and contaminated soil, and backfilling of the excavated areas with clean soil. The long-term remedy for groundwater included installation of groundwater monitoring wells and a 30-year monitoring program for groundwater, surface water and sediments. Monitoring is ongoing.

The five-year review concluded that the remedy for the Site is protective of human health and the environment in the short term. It will be protective in the long term once the following actions are performed: 1) collect additional surface water and sediment samples to determine if the contaminated upper aquifer is

impacting areas beyond the Site, and take appropriate measures to ensure protectiveness; 2) revisit and update the draft institutional control instrument to ensure long-term protectiveness; 3) continue to monitor and evaluate contaminants of concern being detected more frequently in the middle and deep aquifers and determine impacts to long term protectiveness; and 4) compare surface water and sediment sample data to ecological benchmarks and to appropriate human health screening values to determine if further study is needed.

EPA completed the fifth five-year review for the Site in May 2018. The next five-year review is required by May 2023. A copy of the 2018 Five-Year Review Report can be viewed at the following document repository:

That project will feature multiple portable dredges and booster pumps as well as 10 miles of slurry pipe-

ing Plea For Three, the Lake Houston Area Grassroots Flood Prevention Initiative and other landowners called for the project, detention adjustment and regulation of the flood gates.

Specifications include that 1.8 million cubic feet of material be removed over about 270 days.

The series of projects called for by the varied grass roots organizations are to be funded by the \$2.5 billion dollar bond program the Harris County Flood Control District has been compiling including a possible third reservoir in northwest Houston.

als and textbooks that faculty can use and adapt to fit their course's student learning outcomes. These materials are free or low-cost alternatives to traditional textbooks. According to the College Board, for the 2017 - 2018 academic year, the average student was budgeting between \$1,220 and \$1,420 for textbooks and course supplies, making textbooks one of the largest barriers to student success and credential completion.

"San Jacinto College has taken instrumental strides to break down barriers to student success, textbook costs being one of them," said Tonja Conerly, San Jacinto College OER project di-rector and sociology professor. 
