Federal Road reconstruction begins



Federal Road to be under construction beginning Oct. 22

GALENA PARK, Texas – Commissioner Jack Morman is excited to announce the start of the Federal Road Reconstruction Project for Monday, October 22nd. Improvements include demolishing the roadway to stabilize the subgrade, conducting

drainage improvements, and pouring fresh concrete for a new, smooth road-

way.

The \$3.8 million project will improve the roadway from the Washburn Tunnel traffic circle to the new bridge being built over the railroad tracks.

"The new bridge is a great project on its own, but we wanted to take improvements to the next level by completely redoing the roadway leading to it," said Commissioner Morman. "We have asked the

Friday, October 12, 2018 at the Galena Park ISD football stadium the home team Northshore Mustangs once again proved why they're number 2 ranked in the state and 13th in the nation. The

Deer Park Deer ran for lots of yards but not while carrying the football, they ran chasing the Mustangs who had the ball and scored 10 touchdowns for 75 points to

the Deer's 13.

Coach Jon Kay's undefeated Mustangs haven't had any strong competition yet in district play which

could end up hurting them when they get into playoffs. One loss in the playoffs ends the season and the chances of a state title. Normally teams have enough serious district competition that'll prepare them for the tougher playoff teams they'll be challenging.

The district title showdown will probably be when the Beaumont West Brook Bruins come to play Northshore Friday, October 26th. The Bruins 6 foot 1 senior quarterback L'Ravien Elia as a junior amassed over 2,000 offensive yards with 27 touchdowns in just 9 games, as a senior he's gotten better. Rep. Green's Paying for College Workshop focuses on FAFSA, awards students college scholarships

HOUSTON, TX - Congressman Gene Green hosted Houston-area students and parents at his Paying for College Workshop on Monday, October 15th at North Shore High School

During this free event, a representative from The Sallie Mae Fund and Project GRAD Houston spoke to families about how to apply for scholarships, financial aid, and the important factors to consider when selecting the school that fits them. Students were also reminded that this year's Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) was made available on October 1st, three months earlier than the traditional January 1 date.

"I want every student to have the option to attend college, regardless of financial background," said Rep. Green. Panel hears about what's being done to 'harden' school campuses

AUSTIN — The Texas House Committee on Appropriations met Oct. 9 to hear ideas on improving school safety in the aftermath of the May 18 Santa Fe High School shooting that left eight students and two teachers dead and 13 injured.

"It's an unbelievable reality that shootings in schools are occurring more frequently," said state Rep. John Zerwas, chairman of the powerful, state budget-writing committee. "As a Legislature we must do what we can to ensure our schools are places of learning and not places of fear."

During the four-hour hearing, the committee heard invited testimony from representatives of the Texas School Safety Center at Texas State University, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, the Texas Education Agency, the Office of the Governor, the Legislative Budget Board and others. Santa Fe Independent School District Superintendent Leigh Wall testified that federal and state grant funds are being spent in his district on items such

- Architectural redesigns to accommodate metal detector units;
- Panic buttons and automatic locks;
- Mental health services;
- Staff training; and
 Adding security personnel.

Safety grants are awarded

Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath on Oct. 8 announced the Texas Education Agency has received two federal grants under the Students, Teachers and Officers Preventing (STOP) School Violence Act

Both grants, worth \$1 million each, will be used to support mental health training for Texas school districts, as well as establish effective campus threat assessment practices across the state.

"Texas remains committed to providing a safe learning environment for every student on every public school campus



across our state," Morath said. "By focusing on these two key areas of mental health and preventative measures, we strengthen our state's ongoing commitment to school safety."

Anti-drug funds

to come
Drug deaths in Texas
have been increasing and
nearly half of them are attributed to opioid overdose,
according to the Texas Department of State Health
Services.

On Oct. 9, the DSHS announced the receipt of a \$2.66 million grant to help fund the expansion of the state's public health response to opioids over the next year.

The grant comes from the Atlanta, Georgia-based U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The funding will help local health departments and health care providers prevent overdose deaths, enhance the available data on opioid use in Texas and expand the prescriber network for

medication-assisted treat-

The funds will improve the state health department's ability to track opioid-related illnesses and other conditions being seen in emergency rooms around Texas. It will also provide researchers and the public with more information on opioid use and its consequences via the DSHS Texas Health Data website, allowing access to more data more quickly down to county and ZIP code levels.

"Having more information on where opioids are being used and their effects on communities will let state agencies and our partners in cities and counties focus their efforts where the needs are most pressing," said DSHS Commissioner Dr. John Hellerstedt. "Using data to better understand and respond to the opioid crisis will ensure that resources provide the

most benefit for the people of Texas."

Additional funds will be used to train public health personnel at the community level on when and how to properly administer naloxone, a drug that may be administered to prevent someone who has overdosed on an opioid from dying.

Fraud unit

makes arrests
Texas Attorney General
Ken Paxton on Oct. 12 announced that four individuals have been indicted on
30 felony counts of voter
fraud and arrested following an investigation by his
office's Election Fraud
Unit.

The defendants, Paxton alleged, were paid to target elderly voters in certain north-side Fort Worth precincts in a scheme to generate a large number of mail ballots and then harvest those ballots for specific candidates in 2016.

"Ballots by mail are intended to make it easier for Texas seniors to vote. The unfortunate downside is their extreme vulnerability to fraud," Paxton said. "My office is committed to ensuring that paid vote harvesters who fraudulently generate mail ballots, stealing votes from seniors, are held accountable for their despicable actions and for the damage they inflict on the electoral process."

Tax revenue will be sent

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Oct. 10 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts some \$736 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of October.


The amount, Hegar said, is 11.4 percent more than his office reported in October 2017. Allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly, he added.





Dear Rusty: I've never been a fan of socialized medicine, so wasn't happy with that whole "Great Society" thing that happened back in the 1960's, which is where Medicare started. Just on principle, I refused to sign up for Medicare when I turned 65, but with age comes wisdom, I guess, so now I find that maybe I should have. I'm 68 now and starting to develop some health issues, but my insurance agent says that because I didn't sign up for Medi-care when I was 65 there's going to be penalties. We didn't talk about how much, but I'm hoping you can give me some insight on what I'm up against. Signed: Wiser Now than Before

Dear Wiser: While I always admire one who sticks to their principles I also believe, to coin a phrase, that wisdom is the better part of valor. You've been lucky healthwise and avoided a major health crisis for the past several years, but with the wisdom gained by age now realize that the Medicare you paid into over your lifetime isn't such a bad thing after all. The problem is, the law requires that you enroll in Medicare at age 65 unless you have other "creditable" coverage (e.g., from an employer or the VA). To have not done so does, indeed, mean that by enrolling now you'll have to pay a "late enrollment penalty," at least for Medicare Part B (doctors and outpatient services) and Part D (Prescription Drug coverage). Assuming you're eligible for or collecting Social Security, your Part A (hospitaliza tion) coverage should be free, even if you didn't enroll during your "initial enrollment period" (IEP), which started 3 months before the month you turned 65 and lasted until

3 months after. The Part B penalty for late enrollment is applied as a supplement to the base Medicare Part B premium amount which, for 2018, is \$134 per month if you earned less than \$85,000 as a singlefiler in 2016 (the premium is higher if you earned more than that). The late enrollment penalty for Part B is 10% additional for each full year after the end of your initial enrollment period, so \$134/month plus 30% means you'll be paying \$174/month instead and the penalty is recurring every year. In fact, if the art B premium goes un (as it periodically does). so will your penalty because the base number is higher.

As for Medicare Part D, although it's hard to justify paying for pre-scription drug coverage you may not currently need, the sticker shock for enrolling if you need to later is quite severe. Compared to the Part B penalty, the computation for late enrollment in Part D is complicated. You owe the penalty, again on top of your regular Part D premium amount, if you go more than 63 days past your IEP without a creditable Medicare Part D drug plan, a Medicare Advan-tage (Part C) plan which includes drug coverage, or another healthcare plan (such as the VA), which includes creditable prescription drug coverage. Part D premiums are set by the insurance carrier which provides the coverage, but the penalty amount is set by Medicare, as follows: 1%



It's important to note that since you're well past

your IEP, your timing to enroll in Medicare is now limited. You can only enroll in Part A & B during the annual "General Enrollment Period" which runs from January 1 to March 31 for coverage to begin on July 1st. And you can only enroll in a Part D drug plan during the annual Open Enrollment Period which runs from October 15 to December 7.

Here's a Timeline of Jewelr

• 110 000 - 73 000 BC Decorative sea shell beads found in the archeological digs in Morocco. They were probably used as amulets. Drilled shells have also been found in Israel, Algeria and South Africa

- 38.000 BC Beads made from bone and animal teeth found in
- 28.000 BC Fossilized shells and ivory beads found in the East Gravettian culture located in modern Czech Republic
- 4400 BC Around the time of first domesticated animals and invention of wheel, ancient Thracian civilization produced oldest known objects made from gold.
- \bullet 5000- 30 BC Use of copper starts a new era in jewelry production, and secrets of alluvial gold gathering arrives in Egypt around 4000 BC. They quickly start producing glazed steatite beads and countless jewelry designs based on scarab beetles, scrolls, winged birds, tigers, jackals and antelopes Popular gemstones of that time were carnelian, feldspar, amethyst. chalcedony, lapis lazuli and turquoise
- 2750 1200 BC -Ancient Mesopotamia produced wide range of jewelry based on the design of lives, grapes, cones and spirals Gemstones that they used were agate, lapis, jasper

• 1400 - 30BC - Greek jewelry was made in the style of animals and shells and was infused with the amethysts, pearls, chalcedony, cornelian, garnet and emeralds

• 500 BC - 400 AD -Ancient Roma preferred seal rings, brooches, amulets and talismans that were infused with the designs of animals and coiling snakes. Most popular gemstones were sapphires, emeralds, pearls, amber, garnets, jet and diamonds.

- 400 1000 AD In European Dark Ages use of jewelry was not common, except among higher nobility and royalty.
- 1066 1485 Medieval iewelry finally become widespread by the help of religion. The most famous designs of that time were hair and cloth jewelry that was worn during religious ceremonies. They were adorned with gemstones such as rubies, sapphires, pearls, emeralds, semi-precious stones and diamonds. • 1500 -1830 - Arrival
- of Renaissance and Georgian time period brought rise of jewelry use in entire Europe. Necklaces (single or multi strand), earrings (ordinary or with chandeliers), and many other designs were decorated with the images of animals. Intricately designed gemstones became very popular to the point that diamond jewelry became commonly used as a part

of evening attire.

- \bullet 1835 1900 Reign of English Queen Victoria had a profound effect of fashion and jewelry tastes in Europe.
- Early 1900s These years were remembered for the Art Noveau and Edwardian styles
- 1920 1935 Roaring Twenties brought the rise of the Art Deco, which introduced jewelry of vibrant colors, filled with geometrical shapes, abstract designs, cubism, modernism and oriental art. It also popularized wearing of wristwatches.
- 1939 1949 Because of influence of World War II and widespread embargoes on gemstones, popular jewelry shifted to the more metal based designs adorned with patriotic motifs and semiprecious and synthetic gemstones
- 1950s Post war years saw the return of brightly colored jewelry, heavy use of rhinestones and big beads. Diamonds solidified its spot as the most popular gemstone.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST; your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period; and the statement "I[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period. TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit for discharge of wastewater without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

MAILING LIST. If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the executive director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. In addition, you may request to be added to: (1) the permanent list for a specific applicant name and permit number; and (2) the mailing list for a specific county. If you wish to be placed on the permanent and the county mailing list, clearly specify which list(s) and send your request to TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.


