

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

# GPISD Board of Trustees recognize Williamson Elementary Volunteer



#### **TEXAS SENATE NEWS RETURNS FOR** THE 2019 LEGISLATIVE SESSION Finance Chair lays out Budget Highlights

(AUSTIN) — January 16, 2019 – The Senate will put more money towards education, mental health and transportation, according to the chamber's chief budget writer, Finance Committee Chair and Flower Mound Senator Jane Nelson. The state is in better shape economically than in January 2017, where state revenue collections had decreased nearly a percent over the previous biennium. Less revenue means a tighter budget, but that's not the case this session, with strong economic growth leading to nearly \$120 billion in available general revenue, according to the Comptroller's office. That's up from a little less than \$105 billion two years ago. The budget filed late Tuesday is an increase of \$8.4 billion over last biennium, for a total of \$112 billion in general, non-dedicated revenue for state services in 2020 and 2021.

In a statement released Tuesday, Nelson said that past conservative budgets have left the state in great economic shape today. "Our commitment to fiscal responsibility is paying major dividends. affording us an opportunity to secure the Texas miracle for generations to come. This budget makes targeted investments in education, including a well-deserved pay raise for Texas teachers, and continues our work on transportation, mental health and other key priorities," her statement read

The Senate's budget includes more funding for public education, including \$3.7 billion for a \$5000 across-theboard teacher pay raise and \$2.4 billion to fund enrollment growth of about 65,000 new students. It also includes \$2.3 billion to reduce reliance on property taxes and recapture, known more commonly as the "Robin Hood" system of public school finance. Finally, it would earmark \$230 million to maintain current premiums and benefits for retired

For health and Senate budget would spend a total of \$7.5


billion across 21 state agencies to improve access to mental health care and reduce wait lists. It would fund women's health programs at a record level of \$285 million and would include funding to maintain current caseloads at Child Protective Services

The Texas Department of Transportation would get more money, nearly half a billion dollars, raising the total appropriation for the agency that oversees planning and construction of state transportation infrastructure to \$31.2 billion. State parks and historical sites would get more money under the Senate plan, with all sporting goods sales tax collections going to the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife and the Texas Historical Com-

Because the Legislature budgets for the future, every session lawmakers have to reconcile accounts between projected costs and revenues and actual costs and revenues. This session the Senate will consider \$4.2 billion for that purpose as detailed in the supplemental appropriations bill, SB 500. That includes \$1 billion for Harvey disaster recovery, \$2.1 billion for the Medicaid Shortfall and \$600 million to address pension shortfalls for teachers and state employees. It would draw \$2.5 billion out of the state's Economic Stabilization Fund to help pay for these and other expenses.

The Governor must sign a budget before the Legislature leaves in late May, and what passes will be the result of negotiations between the House and Senate. In 2017, the Senate proposed spending \$103 billion that January, but the final budget signed by the Governor totaled almost \$108 billion. This year, the House filed budget would spend  $$11\overline{5}$  billion, about \$3 billion more than the Senate. Both chambers historically pass their appropriations bill by late March or early April in order to give House and Senate negotiators enough time to reconcile the two versions of the state budget for the next two years

The Senate will reconvene Tuesday, January 22 at 11 a.m.



## State's top elected officials take oaths of office at inauguration

AUSTIN — Public officials and private citizens gathered at the south steps of the state Capitol on Jan. 15 to for a day's worth of inaugural events, most notably the administering of oaths of office to Gov. Greg Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who were reelected to four-year terms in November. In his inaugural ad-

dress, Gov. Abbott predicted the 86th regular session of the Texas Legislature, which convened on Jan. 8, would be "transformative."
He said that with the help of Lt. Gov. Patrick and newly elected House Speaker Dennis Bonnen, leadership would "usher in a new era for children, teachers and taxpayers.

"We must finally rein in skyrocketing property taxes in Texas," Abbott said.
"To fix this, Texas must limit the ability of taxing authorities to raise your property taxes. At the same time, Texas must end unfunded mandates on cities and counties. And taxpayers should be given the power to fire their proper-

ty tax appraiser."

Abbott touched on a list of other topics, such as job growth, the state's low unemployment rate, the importance of public education and public education reform, the need for teacher pay raises and bet-ter teacher retirement, enhanced school safety and progress in natural disaster recovery efforts

#### Lt. Gov. delivers remarks

Patrick echoed Abbott's call to operate as a unit with Speaker Bonnen. "The people of Texas

didn't elect us to be silent on things that matter," Patrick said. "They elected us to work together and do what is right for the people of Texas. We have a moment in time, right now to set the stage for an even greater Texas for future generations. It is within our grasp The elections are over for now — we will have them again in two years to air out our differences - but for right now. it's time for us to work to gether for all of the people of Texas. I intend to do my

#### Jobless rate stays

low December was the 104th consecutive month of positive employment growth, the Texas Work-force Commission reported Jan. 18.

Texas gained some 38,000 seasonally adjust-ed non-farm positions during the month, pegging the unemployment rate at 3.7 percent and maintaining the same historic 43-year low the state has enjoyed since October 2018.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area recorded December's lowest among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.1 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA and Odessa MSA, which tied for the second lowest with a rate of 2.6 percent. The Austin-Round Rock MSA recorded the third lowest rate of 2.7 percent.



"A Right Honorable

Man"

I find it just and necessary to bring to your attention the selfless works of an exceptional human being. There is a man among us in our community who serves his fellow men and women without seeking praise, glory, nor recognition. For the past three years it has been my sincere pleasure and honor to silently witness the kind and giving spirit of this gentle humanitarian. He has no indication that I'm writing this letter to you, for if he did, I'm certain he would ask that I not pro-

For nearly 40 years, this man has worked tirelessly to become a consummate jewelry professional. GIA educated, he is truly a bril-liant diamond shining brightly among the many other polished professionals within our industry. He re-quires that his entire staff be "diamond certified" through GIA's diamond "Distance Education" courses in order to provide customers with the best possible service.

Insisting that every person who walks into his store receive a "WOW" experience, this man takes genuine customer care to its highest level. It's not at all unusual for him to sit and listen to a longtime customer or a first-time visitor as they discuss the hurdles or obstacles they're encountering in their personal lives. Most people would look for a reason to shorten this type of conversation during a busy day, not this man. Anyone who engages in a conversation with him is without fail the most important person in the room. I find it refreshing that he holds staff to the very same level of ethics that he holds

Just 5 short months ago this jewelry business owner noticed, on one of our security cameras, a young man sitting outside the store on a bench, leaning over with his head in his hands. When he walked outside and approached the young man, he could see that he was upset. It turns out that this young man was a homeless US Army veteran and was struggling to find work. The young man "Michael" was eager and willing to work but, was not finding an opportunity or an open door so that he could prove his worth even though he asked everyone he met if they were hiring. The store owner sat outside and talked with this veteran for nearly two hours.

At 73 years old, the jewelry store owner knows thousands of people such as customers, other business owners and professionals from all over the city and from nearly every industry. In only a few short hours, he had lined up three interviews for this military hero

to attend. Late that evening, this humanitarian went to the store and purchased socks, underwear, shirts, pants and a new pair of shoes for Michael. Two days later, I was outside with the store owner when Michael literally came running up to us, held out his arms and hugged the 73 year old while breaking down in tears. Michael held on tight and would not let go as he cried and thanked the store owner for what he had done for him. As it turns out, Michael secured two jobs...one full-time job and one part-time job recommended by this "old man". As I stood there watching and listening, I couldn't help but to well up with tears myself. My supervisor had just served this military veteran who had already served us during his deployment. Several minutes later, Michael was once again moved to tears as he received the new clothes and shoes that were purchased especially for him. I heard Michael say, "I just can't believe that an older white man like you would help a young black man like me. You are such a blessing. I had lost hope for the future." I left them alone and went

back inside the store. This is just one of many acts of kindness that this man does for friends and strangers alike. As a Rotarian for more than 30 years, this jewelry business own-er sees life a little differently than most. He not only requires a lot of his staff, he demands even more of him-

The man I speak of is James K. Mills, better known to many as "Diamond Jim" of Pineforest Jewelry in Houston. At 60 years old, I have a lifetime of experience working with and for many business owners. Diamond Jim is truly and without exaggeration, one-in-a-million. The fact that he is one of the few survivors of pancreatic cancer and a near fatal car accident only serves to make his selfless acts more noteworthy.

I'll leave you with this last thought. I know that Diamond Jim has helped many people who will never know who helped them or from where the assistance originated It's not in his character to seek praise for helping someone. In fact, I believe he might receive greater pleasure by remaining anonymous.

If your newspaper would so kind as to share this letter with others, I would e very appreciative. I can think of no one more deserving of this acknowledgement than "Diamond Jim"
