On March 17, 2019, in response to a tank fire at the ITC facility, EPA, TCEQ, along with state and local agencies joined ITC in a Unified Command. EPA and TCEQ continue to be onsite for the emergency response focused on providing the assistance and coordination needed to address any discharges from the site. EPA and TCEQ have been conducting water sampling and air monitoring throughout the affected areas from the onset of the

TCEQ and the EPA have decades of experience responding to natural and

this response with equip-ment and expertise in response management and air and water quality testing and analysis. EPA has conducted ground level air monitoring with hand held equipment and the Air-borne Spectral Photometric Environmental Collection Technology aircraft (AS-PECT). The EPA Trace Atmosphere Gas Analyzer (TAĜA) has also been monitoring for organic compounds in the air. The TCEQ continues to work around the clock, pulling in inspectors from regions around the state to conduct air monitoring and water quality sampling. Test results are being posted to

We know last week was challenging for our neighbors in Crosby as well. We want to again apologize for the inconvenience and worry the incident caused in our community and beyond. We thank so many of you who have expressed your empathetic well wishes and offered your prayers for those most affected.

On behalf of all of us at KMCO, I especially want to extend our deepest appreciation to the Sheriff's Department, the Harris County Fire Marshal Office, Crosby Fire Department, Life Flight crews, hospital staff, all the Harris County first responders, and the mutual aid teams from partner plants, who rushed to the aid of our people and our plant. We will be forever grateful for their courage and their skill in helping us extinguish the fire and care for our injured colleagues.

The facility is stabilized. KMCO is working in close cooperation with the Fire Marshal, federal Chemical Safety Board and OSHA investigators to determine the cause of last week's tragic incident. I can assure the community that no investigation will be more thorough than our own. We never want to see anything like this occur in the future.

Safe and compliant operations are our number one priority every day, and the measure of our ultimate success every night. As we work to remediate and rebuild, we will resume the four-year capital investment program we were implementing to upgrade our facility with the latest technologies, safety systems and training.

The events of last week have been a terrible setback. But while it has broken our hearts, it has not broken our spirit. As one of our employees put it this week, "A New Tomorrow: Stronger, Safer, Better."

We are determined to finish the job we started and fully transform KMCO into a next-generation, best-practice operator that exceeds the expectations of our customers, employees, surrounding communities, regulators and the industry at large.

Safety and security, technology important focus of Channelview ISD's May Bond

With the projected growth facing the Channelview community, Channelview ISD has called for a May bond election. Included in the bond are district-wide improvements to safety, security and tech-nology that will allow the district to continue to pro-vide safe, equitable, updated learning environments for current and future stu-

The bond, which will be on the May 4 ballot, in-cludes district-wide safety and security improve-ments. If approved, the proposition will provide se-curity cameras across the district and upgraded con-trolled entrances at each of CISD's 12 campuses. These upgraded entrances will increase campus-level safety and security by creating a controlled vestibule that will require visitors to be granted access to a reception area and forced to check in before entering any part of the campus.

Additionally, the connection between Channelview High School and the Kolarik Ninth Grade Center will be enclosed, further securing the area by eliminating multiple access points and keeping students under one roof during passing periods. CHS will also receive a new front entry addition with a reconfigured reception area to create a controlled entry vestibule. Exterior door alarms will also be installed for in-

creased campus protection.
"We're proud of the safety plans and measures we currently have in place across the district," Mike Niemever, Assistant Superintendent of Adminis-tration said. "The safety of our students and staff is always at the forefront of our minds, and we recog-

On the technology front, the bond includes updated tools for teachers and students, including a refresh to Chromebooks and classroom projectors. The up-dated technology will help teachers tailor their les sons to each student and allow for more efficient, individualized learning. Likewise, elementary cam puses will receive technology specialized for young learners.

Also included in the bond proposition are cafeteria projectors to be used for programs, performances and assemblies, among other events. These projectors allow the cafeteria to be more than just a place to eat; they turn the cafeteria into an additional learning space that can be used throughout the day

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty – Social Security's "First Year" Rule

Dear Rusty: I've been trying to determine the best way to proceed with retirement and could use some help. I'd like to retire on or about my 62nd birthday this September. Waiting for "full retirement" does not motivate as I have income replacement through my real estate investments. I'll have way over any earnings limits for 2019, but I don't want to have my benefits reduced. Can I apply as SSA suggests three months before my 62nd birthday without running afoul of SSA's arcane benefit reduction rules? Or should I quit first then apply? Please don't refer me to my Financial Advisor or local SSA office, they just confuse. Signed: Anxious to Retire

Dear Anxious: Well I'm afraid I can't offer you any obscure methods to avoid Social Security's rules & regulations, but perhaps I can clarify ome things which will help you manage the timing of your application for Social Security benefits. From what you've said, I assume you mean you plan to retire from your working career in September, but by that time you will have greatly exceeded Social Security's annual earnings limit (which is \$17,640 for 2019). Again, from what you've said, you wish to claim SS as soon as possible but you don't want to lose any benefits because of exceeding the earnings limit. So, if you wish to claim SS as soon as you turn 62, you'll be happy to know that there is a special rule which applies for your first year of collecting benefits before your full retirement age (66 _ in your

That "first year rule" essentially says that if you start benefits in midyear, earnings prior to the month your benefits start don't count; instead you'll be subject to a monthly earnings test for the remainder of that year, once your benefits have started. So in your case, your first month of eligibility for SS would be the month of October (you must be 62 for the entire month to be eligible for benefits), and your benefit payment for October would be paid the following month (the payment date will be either the 2nd, 3rd, or 4th Wednesday of the month,

depending on the day of the month you were born). Then, starting with the month of October, if you do not have earnings from working which exceed \$1,470 in any of the remaining months of 2019, your benefits will not be cut; but if you have earnings from working which exceed that monthly amount in any month for the rest of 2019, then you will not be entitled to SS benefits for that month. Exceeding the monthly limit by any amount (even by \$1) will cause Social Security to take back the full benefit for that month. So, if your plan is to retire from your working career in September and depend upon your savings and invest-ments for income, and if vou claim Social Security as soon as you're eligible in October and you have no further earnings from working, you'll not suffer any loss of benefits in 2019.

But just as a caution, after 2019 you'll still be subject to the annual "earnings test" because you're claiming Social Security before you reach your full retirement age, and the annual earnings test will apply until the month that you reach your full retirement age (after that, there is no longer a limit to what you can earn). As for when you should apply for benefits, Social Security recommends that you apply 3 months before you wish your benefits to begin. When applying, you can specify the month you want your benefits to start, so if you wish that to be at age 62 simply specify October 2019 as your benefit start month. Applying prior to September and specifying October as your benefit start month will not expose you to any extra earnings limitations over those explained above.

House passes legislation to reform school finance, property taxes

AUSTIN - The Texas House of Representatives on April 3 approved much-anticipated legislation written to revise the state's public school finance system. The vote was 148-1, and the bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

House Bill 3 would increase pay for public school classroom teachers, librarians and other full-time personnel and also would enable property tax relief. Primarily authored by House Education Committee Chair Dan Huberty, R-Houston, joint authors include Reps. Diego Bernal, D-San Antonio; John Zerwas, R-Richmond; Ken King, R-Canadian; and Alma Allen, D-Hous-

HB 3's estimated net cost would be \$9.5 billion, covering the fiscal biennium that ends Aug. 31, 2021. In addition to pay increases and incentives, HB 3 would reduce recapture and enable some \$2.7 billion in property tax relief. The legislation, among its general provisions, changes the order in which the Foundation School Program is financed so that stateavailable school funds would be applied before locally generated property tax revenue.

After the House voted. Gov. Greg Abbott applauded lawmakers for their work and said, "Texans are demanding meaningful reforms to our school finance system, and today's passage of HB3 in the House is a vital step toward that goal. By reducing recapture, investing more money in our schools and in our teachers, the Legislature is making changes that will have a lasting impact on our education system, and more importantly, our students."

State Rep. Gina Hinojosa, D-Austin, chair of the House Democratic Caucus Special Committee on Education, in an April 3 news release called HB 3 "the bill we have been working for."

Meanwhile, the Senate Finance Committee on April 3 unanimously approved a budget bill that matches the House's appropriation on two of the session's top priorities: education finance and property tax reform.

A report filed by the Senate News Service points out that while the House and Senate have settled on \$9 billion in additional funding toward those priorities,

exactly how the funds would be spent is still up for debate.

Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, said, "We continue to negotiate this issue with the House, but both chambers have now reached \$9 billion set aside for whatever agreement we reach."

Revenue increase noted

State sales tax revenue totaled \$2.6 billion last month, an amount 9 percent greater than the amount calculated for the month of March 2018, Texas Comptroller Glen Hegar announced April 2.

The comptroller's office reported increased collections in all major economic sectors, including retail trade, information services, oil and gas and restaurants. "Much of the increase stemmed more from consumer spending rather than business spending," Hegar said.

Furthermore, total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in March 2019 was up 7.3percent compared to the same period a year ago, according to agency sta-

RRC marks annıversary

On March 31, 1919, the Texas Legislature enacted a statute giving the Texas Railroad Commission regulatory authority over the oil and gas industry in the Lone Star State.

Railroad Commissioner Christi Craddick wrote an April 1 editorial commemorating the milestone. Among the points she made was that the commission's well-plugging program is hitting historic numbers. In fiscal years 2018-2019, the Texas Legislature set a performance goal for the agency to plug 1,958 abandoned wells. However, Craddick said, the commission is on track to plug about 3,000. Craddick pointed out that funds to plug the wells come from fees paid by the energy industry, not from Texas taxpayers.

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



It joined the Chamber as a first step, and then donated \$65,000 to its scholarship fund. They also gave \$100,000 to employee families that were affected by Hurrican Har-

At last Friday's monthly luncheon of the chamber, Robert Guerrero of the company told the audience at San Jacinto College about the history and growth of SeAH, starting in Korea in 1960 and now growing to multiple plants worldwide, and 49 afiliated firms.

The company has grown rapidly, partially because of technological develop-ment of welding technics, and colorization of steel.

The company now has 240 employees in Houston and expects to open another plant with 50 workers.

Their primary product in the Houston plant is Casing and pipe, cut to length in 40' to 44' lengths. Their plant is off US90 near Sheldon Road.

other," Commissioner Garcia said.

ITC continued to be addressed in meetings with Speaker Nancy Pelosi's team, Senator John Cornyn, various members of Congress and the American Chemical Council.
