Jacinto City buildings suffer storm damage

Jacinto City, Texas — Saturday, May 11, 2019 at about 6 PM during a busy time for shoppers the El Ahorro Supermarket store #6 located at 10341 Palestine Street had about 200 feet of the roof awning covering the sidewalk collapsed. The awning fell on four vehicles while no one was inside them or on the sidewalk.

Jacinto City's Police Chief Joe Ayala and Fire Chief Rebecca Mier both came to the scene and said no one reported being injured.

During the week leading up to the collapse the Jacinto City area had received about 9 inches of rainfall. According to Lon Squyres the City Manager the initial thought is the awning is made of stucco material and it might have

Unified command responding to collision on Houston Ship Channel

HOUSTON — May 10, 2019 – A unified command has been established to respond to a collision on the Houston Ship Channel at Light 71-74 between a 755foot tanker and a tug pushing two barges near Bayport, Texas, last Friday. The unified command

The unified command consists of the Coast Guard, Texas General Land Office and Kirby Inland Marine.

Sector Houston-Galveston watchstanders received a report that the tanker Genesis River and the tug Voyager collided. The tug was transporting two barges loaded with the gasoline blend stock Reformate.

An Air Station Houston MH-65 Dolphin Helicopter aircrew and a Station Houston 29-foot Response Boat-Small boat crew were launched to assess the situation.

A Port Houston Fire Department fireboat plus oil spill response, air monitoring and salvage personnel are responding.

One barge has capsized and one is reported damaged.

An estimated 25,000 barrels of gasoline blend stock were loaded on each barge. An unknown amount of product has been released from the damaged barge.



Survivors testify in support of extending civil liability for child sex abusers

(Austin) Three former members of the U.S. women's national gym nastics team were among those who testified in favor of a bill that would give survivors of child sexual abuse more time to seek civil damages against their abusers and the organizations that enable them. Sisters Tasha and Jordan Schwikert and Alyssa Baumann were three of the hundreds of women who say they were sexually abused by Larry Nassar during the many years he served as a team doctor for USA Gymnastics. Some of these crimes were committed at the Karolyi Ranch, a worldfamous training facility in Walker County, Texas. "When they are ready, all survivors of sex abuse should be empowered to hold their abusers and the institutions where the abuse occurred responsi-ble," said Baumann, a native of Plano who now competes in gymnastics at the collegiate level for the University of Florida. "USA Gymnastics could have prevented my abuse but they failed to take previous allegations of Nassar's conduct serious ly. They allowed him to continue to treat young women and girls for decades without any oversight, and now coming forward with their stories of abuse.

The statute of limitations in Texas for civil liability in cases of child abuse under current law is fifteen years, starting when the survivor turns 18 years old, giving them until their 33rd birthday to file suit. Advocacy groups say, however, that the average age that survivors come forward is between 48 and 52, long after they can seek damages. As the bill, HB 3809, came out of the House, it doubled the statute of limitations to 30 years, giving survivors until they turn 48 years old, but only for suits against abusers and not the organizations that may have covered for

When he became the bill's Senate sponsor, Austin Senator Kirk Watson said that survivors and advocates reached out to his office with profound concerns about the lack of this


provision. "They explained that we must not only hold individual child molesters accountable, but also the culpable organizations $\bar{\text{that}}$ enable them to abuse dozens or hundreds of children," he said. Watson's version of the bill added language that would allow survivors to seek damages from groups that knew, or should've known, about sexual abuse within their organization but did nothing. Furthermore, it would allow a judge to award up to three times the compensatory damages sought if it can be proven that an organization concealed incidents of child abuse.

Nassar was eventually convicted for his crimes and is now serving a minimum of 100 years in prison, but those who testified Monday said that the organizations that turned a blind eye to accusations must also be held accountable "Exempting institutions from liability creates a world where the cycle of abuse can continue," said Jordan Schwikert. "We must also look at the institutions and what they have failed to do, accountability is the only path to real change and we must stand together to demand it." Jordan and her sister Tasha Schwikert filed a lawsuit against USA Gymnastics and the U.S. Olympic Committee last year, seeking damages for years of abuse they suffered while members of the national gymnastics team.

learned of the accusa-tions, said Tasha, the organization didn't report them to authorities for five weeks, leading to more young women and girls suffering abuse.
"They declined to report the abuse because we were winning," she said.
"We were winning world medals and Olympic medals, and winning sponsorships and medals vere more important to them than protect[ing] us." She asked committee members to help ensure that organizations report accusations when they learn of them, to fully vet those they hire to work with children and face consequences when they fail to protect the children under their supervision "We cannot allow enabler organizations off the hook "she said

Lawmakers remain on threshold of passing major legislation

AUSTIN — Texas lawmakers have yet to cast fi-nal votes on the marquee issues of the 86th regular session of the Legislature the state budget, school finance reform and proper-ty tax relief.

Conference committees named by House Speaker Dennis Bonnen and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, must complete their work on the state budget and the other top issues hastily in order to meet deadlines and deliver the finished products to their respective chambers. While little time remains for the bodies to address other issues, many measures can make it through both houses if Bonnen and Patrick want

The largely ceremonial last day of the session will be Monday, May 27 — Me-

morial Day.

Meanwhile, here is a random sampling of bills passed by the House and Senate that have either been signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott or are on his desk, waiting for him to take action on them:

-HB 302 by Rep. Dennis Paul, R-Houston, and sponsored by Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola: Amends law relating to the carrying, storage or posses sion of a firearm or firearm ammunition by certain persons on certain residential or commercial proper-

—HB 547 by Rep. Terry Canales, D-Edinburg, and sponsored by Sen. Charles Perry, R-Lubbock: Amends law by allowing Texans to use as proof of a hunting or fishing license a digital image of the license on their phone.

—HB 793 by Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, and sponsored by Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe: Amends the law relating to certain government contracts with companies that boycott Israel.

-HB 1785 by Reps. Gio-Capriglione, Southlake and Sarah Davis, R-Houston, and sponsored by Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston: Amends the law relating to the information required

ly Powell, D-Burleson, and sponsored by Rep. Will Metcalf, R-Conroe: Amends the law by changing from Feb. 1 to April 1 the annual deadline by which the board of directors of a Type A or Type B economic development corporation is required to submit a certain annual report to the comptroller of public accounts.

—SB 726 by Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, and sponsored by Rep. Stan Lambert, R-Abilene: Amends the law by raising the cap on the aggregate of community development investments to 15 percent of a state bank's unimpaired capital and surplus.
—SB 999 by Sen. Don-

na Campbell, R-New Braunfels, and sponsored by Rep. John Zerwas, R-Richmond: Amends to the law to require the Department of State Health Services to create a state plan for education on and treatment of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders.

Gov. Abbott on May 7 issued a proclamation to raise awareness about the dangers of hurricanes and the precautions Texans can take as hurricane season approaches.

Abbott proclaimed the week of May 5 to May 11 as Hurricane Preparedness Week, and in doing so called Texans to take steps to protect families, commu-nities, neighborhoods and local economies.

Abbott suggested Texans visit https://gov.texas.gov/hurricane to learn more about the steps they can take now to prepare for hurricane season such as:

—Put together an emer-

gency supply kit;

—Create a communica

tion plan with your family; and

–Know where to go.

In observance of National Animal Disaster Pre-paredness Day on May 11, Texas Land Commissioner George P. Bush urged Texans to plan for the whole family, including pets, when preparing for severe

weather. "Hurricane Harvey devastated communities and left thousands of pets in need of rescue," Bush said.
"When severe weather is in the forecast, make sure your pets are prepared by creating an emergency kit." A kit would include such items as:

-Adoption information papers;

—Collars and leashes; —Medicine; and

—Pictures of you and your pet together. "Remember, many tem-porary evacuation shelters don't allow pets, so make sure you have a plan in place for your whole family," Bush added.

revenue Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 8 announced he would send citcounties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$867.7 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of May.

While the company's investigation is ongoing, eyewitnesses have described a sudden, acute failure in a piping component that caused a release of Isobutylene, which ignited minutes later. The failure of this component on the morning of April the 2nd caused the release of flammable gases and resulting fire. There is no evidence to support media speculation that a faulty or leaking Isobutylene valve led to the events on April 2.

The entire KMCO family truly appreciates the outpouring of support we have received from the Crosby community. We continue to mourn the loss of a colleague and recognize that even one injury is too many. Our company and our team continue to stand strong and close in support of our affected employees, families, and community.

For many in the community, they felt that it was a case of harassment and unnecessary use of authority. Most of us have seen one of the videos of the event and there are others who have seen a second video. Did either of the videos show everything?

According to family and neighbors, the deceased was known to all. Neighbors as well as those in law enforcement who had interacted with the woman were aware that she had some mental health issues. Law enforcement officers must yearly attend training on mental health and there are also specialized units that respond when an officer or 911 caller report an incident where there is someone in a mental health crisis.

No matter the amount of training or the amount of living with someone who lives with a mental illness, people never know how they will react if faced with a confrontation. There are planned protests to draw attention to the situation and there are calls for an increased

police presence while it these events are happen-

Is there a better use of ople's time and efforts? Is there a better use of law enforcement resource The debates could last for weeks yet as someone who works for a law enforcement agency and as a mother of a son who has a shared diagnosis of sever bipolar disorder and paranoid schizophrenia, I would like to invite each of you to stop and pray. Ask for direction as to what you can do to help make a difference.

I believe we must have an understanding of others. Over the years, I have attended many workshops and presentations offered by The Center for Healing of Racism, as well as events hosted by Houston Interfaith Ministries which have taught be to open my mind that my way is not the always the right way and certainly not the only way to approach a situation. In addition, NAMI (Nations Alliance on Mental Illness) offers many free educational classes as well as support groups for those interested in learning more about mental illnesses. In addition, check out the many offerings held by Crime Stoppers as well as by the different law enforcement organizations in our community.

The key to understanding is learning that we all need to respect others and make a conscientious effort to treat others as we want to be treated. Be blessed and make a difference today.
