The registered voters in the Channelview ISD have the opportunity to vote on a \$195.4 million bond proposal. With the expected growth in the Channelview ISD, Board Members feel there are great needs for replacement schools, program expansions, campus renovations, safety and security improvements as well as technology im-provements, new buses and land purchases for fu-ture school site.

If approved, the estimated maximum tax impact is 11.75 cents for a total tax rate of \$1.5135. (This is approximately a \$9.30 monthly increase for

at \$120,000. Residents who are over the age of 65, who have filed their exemption will not have to pay any additional property taxes associated with this bond. The replacement schools

will address the aging needs of campuses and the need for additional capaci-ty for the elementary lev-el. There will be a replacement school for DeZavala Elementary as well as a replacement school to combine both Cobb Elementary and Schochler Elementary.

The growth and program expansion will include a new Career and Technical Education (CTE) Center Addition as well as a new auditorium and athletic facilities additions the average home valued and renovations.

The safety and security upgrades will address the needs for controlled en-trances at each campus as well as security cameras. There will be an enclosed connections between Channelview High School and Kolarik.

In the ever changing world of technology, there are needs for Chromebook refresh, classroom projector refresh, cafeteria projects and specialized technology for elementary students. With the growth in the Channelview area, it is also necessary to begin to plan for new school sites. The need to purchase land now is very important. 
Historic Crosby (Phase 2)

This week's historical photos of Crosby include some photos that we would like to locate the original photograph of, so that we could hopeful get a better quality

copy.

The first photo is of the Crosby Courthouse and Jail. It was built in 1913, and it was destroyed by a fire on October 21, 1919 when a prisoner named John White from Alexandria, Louisiana tried to escape the wooden jailhouse by setting his mattress on fire with an oil burning lamp. He ended up dying in the fire he started, despite efforts to save him. The courthouse was located on the second floor, and the Judge was Charles A. Tomlinson. The building was located on W. Reidland Avenue behind or near the back of what is today the Connections Coffee Shop. The original image was received from Martin and Mary Wolcik, who lived at 205 Wahl Street in 1976. They had two daughters, Glorine Bessie Harris, who died in 2011 and Lillie Mae Leatherwood who died in 2015. The photo may be still be a part of their family photos. Anyone with knowledge of how to get in touch with members of the family, please contact the Crosby Historical



The second photo was taken in 1910, of the old Crosby downtown area looking south. It is a little harder to describe its location, so I've included a present-day photo taken from the same location and looking in the same direction. In the center of the old photo is the FM 2100 bridge $\,$ over Jackson Bayou. Directly above that is the Gustafson Cotton Gin and Sawmill. That site is currently occupied by the Fuel Maxx convenience store located on FM 2100 between Wahl Street and W. ReidlandAvenue. This photo was loaned to an Adlong family member in the 1990's, who made a copy. The owner of the original is not known. If any

one has any information regarding this photo, would you also please contact the Crosby Historical Society.

This is the second set of photos in a series, of historic photos of Crosby in honor of its upcoming bicentennial. Over the next few weeks, we will hopefully present some more historic photos. Crosby was settled in 1823, making it one of the oldest settlements in Texas. Lifetime resident Jody Fuchs, is preparing a photographic history of the community in preparation for the upcoming event, and is looking for other old or interesting photos of the community. He is working with members of the Crosby Historical Society, Donna Davenport and Klaus Duda. In June, the Historical Society will hold a meeting, where Jody will present some of the 1000's of old photos that he has collected thus far in preparation of this project. The meeting is free and open to any interested persons, so please feel free



Senate adopts comprehensive school safety bill

(Austin) The Senate gave approval on Monday to a bill intended to increase security and prevent on-campus incidents of violence at public schools. In May 2018, eight students and two teachers were killed, and 13 more injured, when a student opened fire on classmates at Santa Fe High School. Following the first major school shooting in Texas in decades, Lt. Governor Dan Patrick and Governor Greg Abbott each appointed an interim committee to study this issue. The bill presented Monday takes ideas from these two studies to improve safety and security at Texas schools. It would rely on faschools. It would rely on fa-cility hardening, mental health services, threat as-sessment and a myriad of other tools to prevent future tragedies. "We've got to do something to make our kids feel safe on their campuses, and not just feel safe, but to be safe" said bill author and Friendswood Senator Larry Taylor, who also represents the city of Santa Fe.

Senate Bill 11 would direct the Texas Education Agency to develop rules for hardening existing campuses and ensuring future facilities are built with safety and security in mind. It would require that each district develop a multi-hazard disaster response plan, one that addresses prevention, preparedness, and recovery. Districts would co-ordinate and file plans with the Texas School Safety Center, a school security think tank located in San Marcos. To

oversee these plans, each district would create a dedicated school safety committee that would review and amend these plans at least once per semester. School officials would be required to coordinate with local law enforcement agencies to de-velop plans to increase police presence on campuses. Districts would also form risk assessment teams at each campus, to monitor school climate and student activity to head off any problems before they reach a crisis point. Taylor says school shootings and other violent tragedies rarely come out nowhere. "Generally the people who have done these acts...[other] people had some hint, some idea that they were going to do it be-fore," he said. "This bill is designed to help us recognize those people early on before they get to that point." Teams would be trained at the School Safety Center not just to recognize potential violent threats, but also students who may be at risk for suicide or self-harm or substance abuse problems.

The bill includes a number of provisions relating to mental health, in order to identify students approaching crisis and intervene before the breaking point. "The best thing you can do in this situation is prevent," Taylor said. "Because once it starts happening, nothing good happens after that. So this bill is designed to try and reach out and grab these students before they get to this point." Regional

school resource centers would be directed to partner with local mental health authorities to provide optional counseling and sub-stance abuse assistance to the campuses they serve. It would require districts to train staff in trauma-informed care, a method to help people experiencing grief and trauma without exacerbating it, as well as guiding students affected by grief or trauma to available counseling services. Taylor said the trauma-informed model is helpful even in nonviolent situations, like nat-ural disasters. "It's just being able to recognize that kids have had different ex-periences," he said. "Recentwe had Hurricane Harvey. We have a lot of kids now who react to strong thunderstorms differently than they would have be-fore, and it's affected some of them." He says it's important that teachers, counsellors and administrators can recognize signs of trauma in order to find ways to help students cope positive-

Taylor said that dealing with the aftermath of this tragedy is one of the hardest things he's ever had to do as a lawmaker. "When you go to multiple young peoples' funerals, back-to-back, within a few short days it's very difficult and you don't want to do that again," he said. "That's why we have to get this done."
The bill now heads to the

House for consideration. The Senate will reconvene Tuesday, April 30 at 11



Top issues remain in play as Legislature enters final month

AUSTIN — Only a month is left for lawmakers to get the state's business done in the 86th regular session of the Texas Legislature.

Still unfinished are the issues at the top of a list shared by Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Dennis Bonnen: the passage of a state budget for fiscal years 2020-2021, property tax reform and school finance reform.

Last week, a confer ence committee of 10 House and Senate budget writers began negotia-tions over the two chambers' budget bills. While the negotiators have agreed on \$9 billion to spend on property tax relief and education finance reform, the two versions are about \$400 million apart on state revenue spending and \$3.2 billion apart, out of a total of about \$250 billion in all funds, according to the Senate News Service. "This process is made easier by the fact that both chambers are prioritizing three key issues: that's certainly property tax relief, education reform and teacher salary," said Senate Finance Committee Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound. "The good news," she added, "is that both chambers have demonstrated their commitment to our top priorities."

Any differences in the House and Senate budgets must be resolved before a final version can be presented for an up or down vote in each chamber before the session ends on its 140th day — Monday, May 27.

Web sales tax bills

Means Committee Chair Dustin Burrows, R-Lubbock.

"This legislation paves the way for Texas to fairly collect online sales tax within the parameters outlined by the Supreme Court," Nelson said. "These bills ensure that no undue burdens are placed on remote sellers."

SB 70/HB 2153 would allow for the establishment of a single local use tax to avoid placing an undue burden on remote sellers. The comptroller's office projects that the change would generate \$300 million over the next fiscal biennium.

SB 890/HB 1525 would allow marketplace vendors to collect sales tax from third-party remote sellers. The comptroller's office projects that the change would generate \$550 million in the next two-year budget period.

Time change bill

Should Texas do away with "falling back" in November and "springing forward" in March and instead keep clocks on Standard Time or Daylight Saving Time year-round?

On April 23 the Texas House approved, on a vote of 133-9, a measure that would put the question to Texans in the form of a constitutional amendment on the November 5 ballot.

The measure, House Joint Resolution 117 by Rep. Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio, now moves to the Senate for consideration. If the Senate also approves and a statewide ballot measure passes, Congress still would have to amend the Uniform Time Act of 1966 before Texas could stop springing forward and falling back.

"The process of changing our clocks twice each year is primitive and illogical," said Larson.
"Time is a human
construct. With the
passage of this resolution,
Texans can decide which
time to stick with. We
could maintain our sleep
schedules, feeling
healthier and happier as
a result. We could end a
senseless practice that
has many drawbacks and
very few, if any, positive

Opponents of HJR 117 cited concerns such as safety issues, confusion in scheduling and breaking with tradition.

Jobless rate remains

The Texas Workforce Commission on April 19 reported the Lone Star State added 22,600 seasonally adjusted nonfarm positions in March. The state's unemployment rate stayed at 3.8 percent.

Commission figures also show March marked the 107th consecutive month of annual growth for total non-farm employment. The month proved to be historically significant for the Texas economy, as the civilian labor force reached a record high of more than 14 million workers.

"Texas' economic miracle is a testament to the unmatched innovation of our Texas employers and their dedication to creating jobs and investing in communities across the state," said TWC Chair Ruth Ruggero Hughs.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics, the Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area had the lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs in March with a nonseasonally adjusted rate of 2.1 percent, followed by the Odessa MSA with 2.5 percent. Tying for third were the Amarillo, Austin-Round Rock and College Station-Bryan MSAs with 2.7 percent unemployment.

asthma attacks

BAYTOWN — (April 12, 2019) — For people living with asthma, the sneezing and wheezing that affects millions during the spring allergy season can trigger potentially serious asthma

'Whether it's pollen, mold, hay fever, dust mites or any of the countless allergens drifting through the air this season, the itchy eyes, sneezing, runny nose and nasal congestion that many allergy sufferers endure, can also lead to an asthma attack, or flare-up, in individuals with preexisting asthma or those with undiagnosed asthma," said Houssam Oueini, MD, a pulmonolo-gist at Houston Methodist Baytown Hospital.

Oueini says asthma patients should develop a comprehensive approach to managing the condition, including being prepared for allergy season.

"Asthma can't be cured, but it can be managed so you can live a normal, healthy life. A comprehensive approach to managing asthma is required because it's a complex, chronic disease and it's different for every person," Oueini said. "For people affected by seasonal allergies, great care should be taken to prevent potentially dangerous attacks from occurring or reducing their severity."

The chemicals released

by the immune system lead to allergy symptoms, such as nasal congestion, runny nose, itchy eyes or skin reactions.

"For some, this same reaction also affects the lungs and airways, leading to asthma symptoms,"

Oueini said.

Identifying and focusing on ways to reduce exposure to asthma triggers can help minimize flare-ups, but avoidance can be especially difficult during allergy season. In addition to using asthma medications, including quick-relief medicines to stop asthma symptoms and long-term

control medicines to prevent symptoms, some asthma patients may be helped by a regimen that includes using daily pills called leukotriene modifiers to control immune system chemicals.

Allergy shots (immunotherapy), administered over time through regular injections, help the immune system build a tolerance to the allergens. Anti-immunoglobulin E (IgE) therapy works to reduce the immune system's release of IgE-an antibody used to fight against allergens.
In addition to allergens,

other common asthma triggers include air pollution; certain medications, including aspirin and betablockers; medical condi-tions, such as colds, flu and sinus infections; smoke from cigarettes or campfires, and weather conditions, such as cold, dry air or high humidity.

Oueini said maintaining a healthy lifestyle, including getting proper rest, eating a balanced diet and getting regular exercise, are not only good for your overall health, but also can help you manage asthma.


