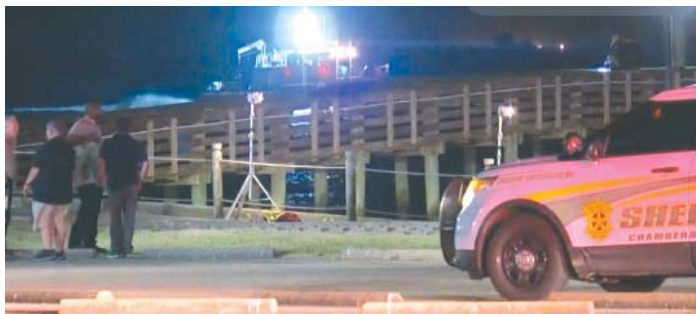

Sheriff Hawthorne reports that on Thursday, August 8, at approximately 7:28 p.m., the Chambers County Sheriff's Office was notified by the LaPorte Police Department of a possible multi-fatality drowning at Sylvan Beach Park.

Sylvan Beach Park is a county park within the city of LaPorte, Texas, and Harris County, however, the bay waters that border the park are wholly within Chambers County.

Upon arrival of the Chambers County deputies it was learned that a family from the Houston area were swimming in the park when an otherwise beautiful afternoon took a tragic turn.

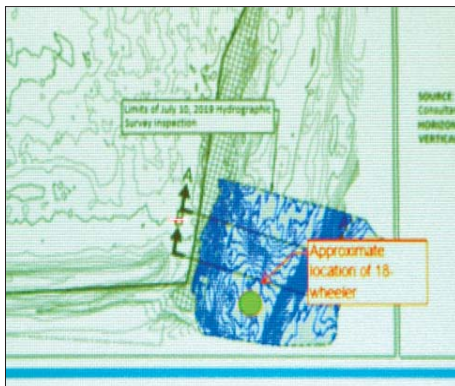
Six members of the family, including the Mother, Father and four children ranging in age from 7 to 13, began having trouble in the water. The Mother and Father, along

EPA sets community meeting Sept. 24

HIGHLANDS – The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), in cooperation with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ), Federal, State and Harris County agencies, local officials and industry, plan to hold a Community Meeting for the San Jacinto River Waste Pits Superfund site.

During the meeting an update will be provided on current site activities and the cap inspection data. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 24, 2019 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Highlands Community Center, 604 Highland Woods Drive, Highlands, Texas 77562.

Did Semi crash damage cap?

HIGHLANDS – This month's meeting of the THEA/San Jacinto River Coalition dealt with potential threats to the integrity of the cap over the waste pits, as the community waited for the slow process of removing the toxic waste to go forward.

Jackie Young announced that she had learned that the Pelican Asphalt Permit, wanting to dredge areas near the

Waste Pits, had been approved on July 3 without any further public notice.

She also reported on a discussion with the EPA about the position of the marker buoys in the river, which are to protect the cap from marine vessels. She said they determined they were not in the proper location, and the EPA had them moved.

Jacinto City, TX. – August 12, 2019 - College Student Cinthia Flores in a statement made to NC Star writer Allan Jamail said, "in the first place people should never get a pet if they don't have the means for caring for it properly. But if they get one and then later realize they can't properly care for it, they should give it to someone who will. I'm on a strict college student budget but I still manage to save enough to provide shots, food and a healthy place for my pets."

Dogs kept outdoors are the most common pets to be mistreated, 70 percent of animal cruelty cases is dogs. With daytime temperatures in the 90's and 100's it doesn't take long before a pet can have a heat stroke.

Warning signs of a heat stroke in a dog can be recognized by the early warning sign of their mouth becoming partially open and panting or

Eagle Scout projects planned in Highlands

The scouts explained their ideas about projects that are required to achieve their Eagle scout status. McGregor said that he plans on renovating the “fire pit” in the Park along San Jacinto Street and the railroad tracks, which is used by the scouts for flag burning ceremonies and other types of events. McGregor plans to rebuild the stone perimeter and clean the pit.

Lopez said that his project would be the construction of a wooden fence along the line between the park and the railroad, thus enhancing the park and providing safety for children and others that use the park. He described his fence as about 6 feet tall, and learning how to procure the materials and engineer the construction of it would be part of the learning experience.

The attendees at the luncheon listened to the proposals with enthusiasm, and after the talk a collection was taken to help the boys pay for the projects, and about \$1000 dollars was donated in just the short time of the luncheon.

Fireworks cause \$70,000 damage to house in Lake Houston area

Houston Firefighters were called to battle a House Fire on August 8, 2019 at about 9:00p.m. The fire was contained in a storage area of the house at the 300 block of Corydon 77336, where fireworks were exploding.

No injuries were reported to firefighters or the home's occupants.

\$80 thousand in estimated property was saved, but \$70 thousand in damage was sustained by the house.

The cause for the fire is being listed as unintentional.

Firefighters arrived on scene to fire from a storage area of a house with fireworks going off. They began an attack on the fire and conducted a primary search. Fire was also found in the attic and once the fire was extinguished crews conducted salvage and overhaul. The resident stated they had a generator running for electricity. Firefighters from Stations 64, 65, 101, 102, 103, 105 and 30 responded to this incident.

Channelview suspect arrested for Dayton Stripes robbery

Second Arrest in Aggravated Robbery Case

On Wednesday, August 7, detectives with the Dayton Police Department's Criminal Investigations Division along with members of the Harris County Pct.3 Criminal Investigation Unit conducted a search warrant and felony arrest warrant at 16119 Palm St. in Channelview.

The warrants were part of the ongoing investigation of an Aggravated Robbery of the Stripes Convenience Store in Dayton. The robbery took place at the Stripes store on Thursday, May 30, 2019 at approximately 2:20am.

The execution of the warrants resulted in the arrest of Daniel Gallegos 18 of Channelview for Aggravated Robbery and the recovery of an AR-15 style rifle believed to have been used in the robbery. Gallegos is a former Channelview High School student, according to authorities.

Gallegos was transported to the Harris County Jail and will be extradited back to Liberty county.

"We would like to extend a special thank you to Harris County Pct.3 Assistant Chief Rick Larkin, Corporal Steven Dugat and the members of their

Criminal Investigation Unit," said Dayton Police Chief Robert Vine. "Working together makes all of our communities safer."

Authorities said that three persons were involved in perpetrating the robbery. They entered the store at the rear, carrying

weapons, and threatened the clerk on duty. The ordered him to open the register, where they took cash, and tobacco products.

They left through the rear, and escaped in a grey or white Ford SUV with a spare tire on the right rear.

Police were able to identify and arrest a second suspect, Gregorio Tapio, 18, of Dayton on Monday, July 29, and are still looking for the third person involved.

If convicted the suspects face five to 99 years in jail, and a fine up to \$10,000.

Cloverleaf road improvements to start

CLOVERLEAF – August 8 – Commissioner Adrian Garcia continues improvements in the Cloverleaf area as the road reconstruction project advances to phase four. The \$1.7 million phase begins construction this month and includes reconstructing nearly four miles of asphalt roadways. The roads to be improved are Brownwood Street, Hershe Street, and Waxahachie Street between Nadolney Street and Manor Street. Drivers are reminded to travel through the work

zones with caution. Construction is expected to be complete by the end of the year.

This multi-phased project was funded by federal grants targeting areas damaged by Hurricane Ike. Phases one through three have improved over 20 miles of roadway in the Cloverleaf area.

Multiple Thefts from Storage Building

Crime Stoppers and the Houston Police Department's Burglary and Theft Division need the public's assistance identifying the suspects responsible for a Burglary of a Building.

breathing with short quick breaths like it's out of breath. If their mouth becomes fully open with rapid pants it means the dog is on the verge of a heat stroke. It must immediately be cooled off by putting it in front of a fan or into air-conditioning and given fresh cool water. If the symptoms persist quickly get it to a veterinarian.

Dogs sweat and cool-off by drooling (dripping) from the mouth, small amounts of dripping from the mouth is normal but a constant large amount of drooling (sweating) is a sign of overheating and the dog cannot cool itself off without help; it will need lots of water to prevent dehydration (inadequate body fluids) and a heat stroke.

Abandoning an animal unreasonably and or leaving it in a hot vehicle, transporting or confining it in a cruel manner, permitting unjustified or unwarranted pain or suffering or failing to provide fresh cool water, food and shelter for a animal to maintain a state of good health, are crimes.

Texas law provides filing animal cruelty charges either as a felony or misdemeanor, the severity of cruelty will determine which of the two types of charges will be filed against the pet owner or keeper of the pet. If convicted of felony animal cruelty punishment can be up to two years in jail and or a \$10,000 fine. Also any animals in your direct care may be removed by a local humane society or law enforcement. You may be prohibited from owning animals in the future. Persons convicted under the age of 18 are also required to undergo counseling.

ATM theft on Normandy

Crime Stoppers and the Harris County Sheriff's Office Burglary and Theft Division need the public's assistance identifying the suspects responsible for a Felony Theft.

On Monday, July 29, 2019, at approximately 4:45 a.m., four male suspects burglarized an ATM located in the 700 block of Normandy Street in Houston, Texas. During the incident, the suspects used a stolen 2007, white Ford pickup truck to commit the theft. The suspects then used a chain and large hook attached to the stolen pickup to gain entry into the ATM. The suspects are captured on video surveillance breaking into the ATM and taking an undisclosed amount of money.

Suspect 1: Black male, approximately 17-23 years of age, slim build, wearing a white mask, dark colored hooded sweatshirt and dark colored pants.

Ask Rusty – About Survivor Benefits

Ask Rusty – About Survivor Benefits

Dear Rusty: I am looking for information on my benefits. I am 60 years and 5 months old, and still employed. My spouse died in 2017 and would have been 61 years and 9 months old on July 31, 2019. My husband was the more highly compensated employee and was employed longer than myself. Signed: A Survivor

Dear Survivor: You are eligible for a survivor benefit from your deceased husband because you are now 60, but that survivor benefit will be considerably reduced (by about 28.5%) if you take it now. The survivor benefit is reduced if taken before your widow's full retirement age (which is 66 2/3 for you). Taken at your widow's full retirement age (FRA) you'd be entitled to 100% of the benefit your deceased husband had earned at his passing. But if you take the survivor benefit now - before your normal full retirement age (66 years and 10 months) - and you are working you'll be subject to Social Security's "earnings limit." If you exceed the limit, it will cause Social Security to withhold some of your survivor benefits. The 2019 earnings limit is \$17,640 and it will increase slightly each year until the year you reach your normal FRA, when it will increase by about 2 2/3 times; then when you reach your normal FRA there is no earnings limit. What all of that means is that if you take the survivor benefit now and continue to work and earn, your survivor benefit will be reduced from what it could be, and Social Security will take back some benefits if you exceed the earnings limit (they'll take back \$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit).

Assuming you have earned the requisite 40 credits from your own career, you will be eligible for your own Social Security

retirement benefit at age 62, though your own benefit would also be reduced if you take it early (the reduction for your own benefit at age 62 will be about 29.2%). Since at 62 you will have a choice to take either the survivor benefit or your own benefit, you may want to set a goal of getting the highest possible benefit for the rest of your life. To do that I suggest you determine whether the maximum benefit you can get on your own work record (at age 70) is more than the maximum survivor benefit you can get at your widow's FRA, and then follow a strategy which yields the highest benefit. You can get those numbers by contacting Social Security directly and asking for your own Statement of Estimated Benefits, and also asking for what your maximum survivor benefit will be. You can get the statement for your own estimated benefits online by creating a "My Social Security" account, but you will need to contact Social Security directly to get your maximum survivor benefit amount.

Once you are 62, you will have a choice of which benefit to choose and when to choose it. So, if your own SS benefit on your own work record will be more at age 70 than your survivor benefit will be at your widow's FRA, you should consider taking the survivor benefit first and delaying your own benefit until it reaches maximum, at which point you would switch to your own benefit. However, if your own maximum benefit at age 70 will be less than the maximum survivor benefit you can get at your widow's full retirement age, then you may wish to wait until you reach your widow's full retirement age (66 2/3) to claim the maximum survivor benefit. If you wait until your widow's FRA to claim the maximum survivor benefit, and you need additional income while you're waiting, you can claim only your own SS benefit at age 62 but remember that if you do so the earnings limit will still apply to your own SS retirement benefit until you reach your normal full retirement age.

Dusty Surprises

The surprises just kept coming.

When I moved in with Peter a few years back, I brought my clothes, a few books, and some artwork. I rented out my house, gave away my furniture, and everything else was consigned to "things I'll deal with later," a pile which—mysteriously—did not shrink with time. These stacked plastic boxes were still in my barn, still waiting for me, long after I'd forgotten what was in them or cared.

But I am going to put the property up for sale and it was time for a reckoning with the barn. It took two dumpsters, four days, and two hard-working guys from the appropriately named, "Git-er-Gone Junk & Clutter Removal," to see it to the end.

And, yes, I did think, "Why not just dump it all, sight unseen?"

But then, what to do with all the surprises found in the boxes of photos and letters and trinkets? Obviously, most of them would be thrown away, recycled, or given to the thrift store. But what about that piece of blown glass from Norway, the postcard from grandpa when he served overseas, the bright red wool jacket handsewn by my aunt that was still stylish. Anyone who's done this knows—it's not that easy.

So, I piled a few boxes in my car ("kicking the can down the road" Peter called it, "saving my sanity," is how I described it) to sort through after everything else was out of the barn.

Yesterday I sorted through a box entirely filled with letters. I discovered that I had saved every postcard and letter I had received since childhood. No, I did not read every one. It turns out that descriptions of what happened in school or how someone spent their vacation makes for extraordinarily dull reading forty years later. But I sampled a few letters in each of the neatly stacked piles that filled the huge storage box before I put them in recycling.

But, I have a solution, the letter went on, I'm going to marry a princess of some European country that they forgot to tell us about in 11th grade. Maybe it didn't fight in either of the world wars, or is really small. Anyway, I going to find this country, marry this princess and show all you women a thing or two. So there!

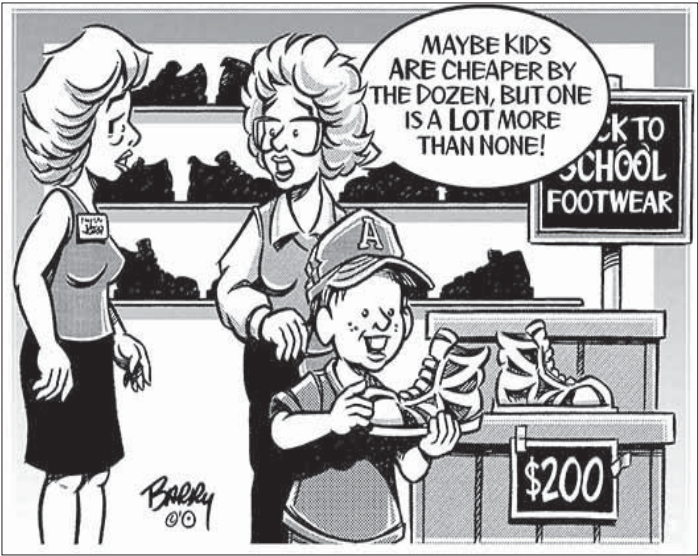
My heart hurt, reading this forty-year-old letter. I wondered if I wrote back. I hoped he was doing well. Then I realized, (unlike forty years ago) this was relatively easy to determine. I logged onto Facebook.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Ed Sterling

Officials meet to discuss public safety following deadly shooting in El Paso

AUSTIN — Following the Aug. 3 shooting that claimed the lives of 22 people and injured 24 others at a popular El Paso shopping venue, Gov. Greg Abbott and a group of officials met in the border city to discuss ways to address violence.

Joined by Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, House Speaker Dennis Bonnen, state Sen. Jose Rodriguez, and area state Reps. Cesar Blanco, Art Fierro, Mary Gonzales, Joe Moody and Lina Ortega, Abbott and the group talked about how to improve public safety.

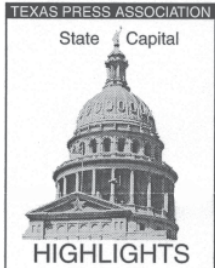
"The entire state of Texas continues to grieve the tragedy in El Paso," Abbott said. "While our hearts remain broken, it is our responsibility to show the resolve that is needed to address this shooting and begin the process of working together to lay a groundwork of how we are going to respond. The people of Texas — including the people of El Paso — deserve to be safe and it is our responsibility to ensure that safety," he added.

Sen. Rodriguez, in a statement on behalf of the El Paso legislative delegation, said: "State leaders pledged to work with the El Paso delegation to address gun violence driven by white nationalism. We all agreed that gun violence and white nationalism are pressing issues. Gov. Abbott, in his remarks, was frank about calling the shooter a white supremacist and his actions domestic terrorism. All leaders, from local to state to federal, must reject the ideology of white supremacy."

Abbott announced the state would provide more than \$5 million in immediate financial assistance through the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Public Safety Office for law enforcement agencies and the community of El Paso.

According to a governor's office news release, the financial assistance will take these forms:

— Psychological first aid and crisis counseling;



— Behavioral health services, including needs assessments, strategic planning and care coordination with local service providers;

— County reimbursements for expert witness and juror fees, investigation, increased security and more;

— School-based mental health services to support students affected directly or indirectly and referrals for youths with certain behavioral health and psychological needs;

— Post-critical incident seminars, emphasizing peer support to assist first responders suffering from traumatic stress; and

— The establishment of a "family resiliency center" to be a focal point for community services including mental health needs, legal services, faith-based assistance and public information.

NEW ACCESSIBILITY RULES SET

House Bill 3163, establishing new rules for accessible parking spaces in Texas, will become law Sept. 1.

According to a governor's office news release, the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation will draft rules that implement the legislation to amend Government Code Sec. 469.052, as follows:

— The international access symbol must be painted on the parking space;

— The words "NO PARKING" must be painted on access aisles next to accessible parking spaces;

— The signs marking accessible parking spaces must include the penalty for parking illegally in the space. Fines and towing are examples of possible

penalties.

Notably, current signs and parking spaces do not need changes until the new rules go into effect. The new rules will be open to receive comment in the Texas Register after drafting and approval, and importantly, the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation anticipates the rules to take effect near mid-2020.

TAX REVENUE IS DISTRIBUTED

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Aug. 7 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$876.8 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of August. That is 4 percent more than the amount distributed in August 2018.

Allocations are based on sales made in June by businesses that report tax monthly and on sales made in April, May and June by quarterly filers.

Details on sales tax allocations to individual cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts can be found online in the comptroller's monthly sales tax allocation comparison summary reports at comptroller.texas.gov.

BATTLESHIP VISITS TO STOP

The Battleship Texas State Historic Site in La Porte will close to the public Aug. 26, allowing staff and contractors full accessibility to the ship to safely perform necessary preparation work ahead of a repair project.

The last day the public may explore the 573-foot dreadnought-class vessel will be Aug. 25, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced Aug. 7.

During the closure, thousands of artifacts on board the Texas will be catalogued and secured and exhibit collections removed before it is towed to another site for repair.

Visitors will continue to have access to the nearby San Jacinto Monument, the San Jacinto Battleground and the park's nature trails during the closure.

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ASK DIAMOND JIM



Diamond Jim: "What is a Lab Grown or Lab Created Diamond?"

The question we get asked most often is "Are lab-created diamonds real diamonds?" The answer is, yes! The only thing that makes a lab-created diamond different from a natural diamond is its origin. A lab-created diamond is "grown" inside a lab using cutting-edge technology that replicates the natural diamond growing process. The result is a man-made diamond that is chemically, physically, and optically the same as those grown beneath the Earth's surface.

"[Lab-created diamonds] are not fakes and they're not cubic zirconia (CZ). They have all the same physical and chemical properties of a mined diamond," states Stephen ?Morisseau, a spokesman for the Gemological Institute of America, a nonprofit organization that oversees the international diamond grading system. Sometimes, lab-created diamonds are referred to as synthetic diamonds. While not technically inaccurate, the term "synthetic" may be the reason people believe lab-created diamonds are "fake." If we compare them to other popular diamond simulants, it's obvious that manufactured diamonds, in fact, are the real deal.

"How are "Lab-Created Diamonds" Grown?" Before we talk about how lab-created diamonds are made, it's important to understand how mined diamonds are formed. The processes are extremely similar - only one happens naturally while the other occurs in a lab.

Mined Diamonds: Geologists believe that diamonds formed deep within the Earth between 1 billion to 3 billion years ago. While they don't know exactly how those diamonds came to be, they believe the process starts with carbon dioxide that is buried roughly 100 miles beneath the Earth's surface. The carbon dioxide is exposed to heat in excess of 2,200 degrees Fahrenheit and put under extreme pressure of roughly 727,000 pounds per square inch. The diamonds are then transported from deep within the Earth's core to the surface by way of deep volcanic explosions.

Lab-created Diamonds: There are two processes labs use to grow diamonds - High Pressure-High Temperature (HPHT) and Chemical Vapor Deposition (CVD). HPHT diamonds are made using one of three manufacturing processes: a belt press, the cubic press, and the split-sphere (BARS) press. All of these processes create an environment of extremely high pressure and temperature conducive to diamond growth.

An HPHT diamond begins as a small diamond seed that is placed into carbon. Using one of the manufacturing processes above, the seed is exposed to temperatures of about 1500 degrees Celsius

and pressurized to approximately 1.5 million pounds per square inch. The pure carbon melts and starts to form a diamond around the starter seed. It is then carefully cooled to form a pure carbon diamond.

A CVD diamond begins as a thin slice of diamond seed, which is often an HPHT produced diamond. The diamond seed is placed in a sealed chamber and heated to around 800 degrees Celsius. The chamber is filled with a carbon rich-gas, like Methane, and other gases. The gases are ionized into plasma using technology similar to that of micro-waves or lasers. The ionization breaks the molecular bonds in the gases, and the pure carbon adheres to the diamond seed and slowly crystallizes.

"Which diamond should I choose...Lab-Grown or Natural Mined?"

As lab-created diamonds continue to grow in popularity, diamond shoppers will be asking themselves this exact question. But, the only one who can answer that question is the shopper. It all boils down to what is important to you. You may choose a mined diamond because you feel they hold a certain significance and are one of nature's miracles with a mysterious origin. If price is a consideration, it's important to note that, due to the shorter supply chain requirements, lab-grown diamonds are often 20-30% (and in some cases, even 40%) less expensive than mined diamonds.

Or, you may be attracted to a lab-created diamond because you feel they signify a modern love and the incredible progression of technology. While some may want to debate which type of diamond is "better," in reality, mined diamonds and lab-created diamonds aren't in competition with one another. Diamonds represent love, and love is love.

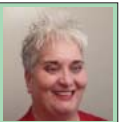

Free Scam Alert Map — The scammers sure have been busy. Is there no end to their creativity? The AARP is helping us to fight back, however, with its Fraud Watch Network's free Scam Tracking Map. You'll find the map on the AARP website (aarp.org) when you put "scam tracking map" in the search box. Be sure to click on the widest possible search area, 200 miles, after you enter your ZIP code. Click first on AARP user-submitted reports. You'll see colored dots where scams have occurred. Click on one and scroll down to see the details. After you view those reports, go back and click on Law Enforcement

Alerts, with authorities warning about scams near you.

The wide variety of scams is surprising. One involved an alleged refund where the thieves wanted to deposit the refund directly into the victim's checking account. Once they gained access, they emptied the account.

Another scam had thieves trying to enter a house by pretending to be from a cable company and needing to fix some wires. The homeowner was suspicious, and rightly so.

Fear is a big factor with threats of arrest. One threatened people with arrest if they didn't give their Medicare number over the phone to buy merchandise. Another threatened arrest for missing jury duty if a fine wasn't paid immediately. Others involve the IRS.

If you're generally safety conscious and not likely to fall for a scam, checking the map once a month should be enough. But if you're not sure (and truthfully, a lot of the scams are hard to identify as such), you might want to consider signing up for the AARP's bi-weekly Watchdog Alerts. If you're ever in doubt after receiving a suspicious call, call the police. They want to know. (c) 2019 King Features
