KMCO acquired from bankruptcy by ALTIVIA

CROSBY- ALTIVIA Oxide Chemicals, LLC, an affiliate of ALTIVIA Petrochemicals, Monday announced that it acquired KMCO LP on Friday and its associated chemical ethoxylation manufacturing assets, according to the company in a June 1 press release.

KMCO LP was bought from bankruptcy and the price was low except for over \$600,000 of property taxes and millions of dollars in liabilities to creditors

"ALTIVIA plans a \$25 million process safety and control systems upgrade to the facilities and will start production in two new oxide reactors by the

end of this year." the release stated.

"We have completed a

detailed evaluation of these assets and are looking forward to starting production by year end. The reaction chemistries in Crosby are complementary to ALTIVIA's current product offerings and will provide our customers important sourcing options,' said ALTIVIA's Chief Executive Officer J. Michael Jusbasche. "The market for oxylation tolling and custom manufacturing services will now have available a state-of-the art facility in the U.S. Gulf Coast."

Commissioners Court members said they were impressed with Hollins' credentials, as well as his commitment not to seek the job permanently. "I think his background with McKinsey a global consultancy company will be helpful in getting procedures in place to get through this election process," Precinct 1 Commis-

"We are living in a challenging time. This November, our office will administer the most conse quential election of our lifetime amid a global health pandemic. The right



All Six HCPH COVID-19 Test Sites are moving to new locations

New Test Site Locations Open Tuesday, June 2

Houston – Harris County Public Health's two largest COVID-19 test sites are moving to new locations, in CyFair and Pasadena. These are the fixed sites currently in Baytown and Katy, the last day they testes is was Saturday, May 30. The new locations opened last Tuesday, June 2 at Ken Pridgeon Stadium, 11355 Falcon Rd, Houston, TX 77065 and San Jacinto College Central Campus, 8060 Spencer Hwy, Pasadena, TX 77505.

The four mobile testing sites in Harris County will continue to change locations weekly. Residents from other counties can be tested at any of these six sites. Harris County Public Health encourages as many people as possible to get tested, even if they don't have symptoms. Testing identifies new cases of COVID-19 so contact tracers can determine the sources of infection and

help prevent further spread of this contagious disease. In addition, infected people often don't have symptoms but are still contagious. Without knowing it, they can infect older people and those with underlying health conditions who may get extremely ill or die

Testing is free, easy to register and quick, due to the six drive-through sites in Harris County. Sign up, take the self-assessment and drive to the test site. Register at https://www.readyharris.org, www.hcphtx.org or call 832-927-7575. To get tested the next day, call or register online after 6:30 p.m. Testing will be available 6 days a week, Monday-Saturday. You must take the self-assessment to get an authorization code for a

testing site.

Pandemic drives record unemployment

(AUSTIN) - Businesses across Texas and the nation have been forced to curtail or cease operations in the face of the coronavirus pandemic, throwing millions out of work and prompting a record increase in unemployment claims that is straining the safety net for workers. Nearly 2 million people in Texas filed for unemployment insurance benefits from March 14 through May 9, triple the number of claims filed in all of 2019.

In this issue of Fiscal Notes, we take an early look at the economic pressures now gripping the state. We also examine early impacts on employment and several other measures that can shed some

light on current conditions.
"It's far too early to say
how long these conditions
will last — and how deep
the trough will go," Texas
Comptroller Glenn Hegar

said. "Many economic measures are only beginning to reflect the crisis. It will be months before we can chart its full dimensions. Fortunately, our state's fiscal position is strong enough to support vital programs for the remainder of this year, and our state's "Rainy Day Fund" remains healthy. But the legislative session that begins in January 2021 will face significant and perhaps unprecedented challenges."

Getting Texans back to work will no doubt be one of the bigger challenges. A record 315,167 Texans filed initial jobless claims during the week ending April 4; a comparable week in 2019 saw about 13,000 claims. The spiraling unemployment rate has forced the Texas Workforce Commission to ramp up its web-based and telephone systems, boost staffing and extend operating hours to

ensure claimants get the benefits due them.

The May issue of Fiscal Notes also considers the history of previous recessions and their effect on tax revenues. The current situation is unprecedented in the speed with which it took effect, but the past does provide some important clues for our future.

Fiscal Notes furthers the Comptroller's constitutional responsibility to monitor the state's economy and estimate state government revenues. It has been published since 1975, featuring in-depth analysis concerning state finances and original research by subject-matter experts in the Comptroller's office.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$2.6 Billion in May

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.61 billion in May, 13.2 percent less than in May 2019 and the steepest year-over-year decline since January 2010.

The majority of May sales tax revenue is based on sales made in April and remitted to the agency in May. Widespread social distancing requirements were in place across much of the state throughout April.

"Significant declines in sales tax receipts were evident in all major economic sectors, with the exception of telecommunications services," Hegar said. "The steepest decline was in collections from oil and gas mining, as energy companies cut well drilling and completion spending following the crash in oil pric-

es.

"The business closures and restrictions and stayat-home orders due to the COVID-19 pandemic spurred deep drops in collections from restaurants, amusement and recreation services, and physical retail stores. These declines were offset in part by increases from big box retail-

ers and grocery stores that remained open as essential businesses, online retailers and restaurants that could readily pivot to takeout and delivery service. "With the easing of state

and local government social distancing orders beginning in May, business activity in the sectors most affected by measures to curb the pandemic should begin to slowly recover, but operations resuming at reduced capacity will result

Harris County \$30 Million COVID-19 relief fund established to support most vulnerable in County

Resources on the way to the most vulnerable through local community-based

HOUSTON, TX (May 28, 2020) - Harris County has established the Harris County COVID-19 Relief Fund to provide much-needed relief to Harris County residents most impacted by the global pandemic. The \$30 million fund, which will be administered by Greater Hous-Community Foundation, aims to stra-

tegically serve a large number of the most vulnerable people, in particular county residents who may not be eligible for other COVID-related funding and/or who cannot afford to wait for assistance. The Harris County COVID-19 Relief Fund is expected to assist about 20,000 households to provide support with housing, electricity, food, childcare, and other essential needs.
"Harris County on its

own can't unilaterally turn around the economic fallout from COVID-19, but we are committed to running the most impactful, targeted program to sup-port the hardest-hit families in our community," said Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo. "If we want the entire community to get through this, it means helping the most vulnerable among us.'

Funds will be disbursed in two ways to help ensure equitable distribution. First, the Fund will part-ner with trusted, high performing community-based organizations that are already actively supporting the community and have deep relationships and understanding of families with emergency needs. These organizations will work with eligible individuals and families to complete a simple application, verify eligibility, and provide financial assistance. The first round of grants to timated to disburse in

missioner Rodney Ellis said. "Our communities are hurting. And it is our duty as public servants to make sure that our most vulnerable residents, who were already living paycheck to paycheck, do not lose everything in the midst of this crisis. Advancing a relief fund with enough resources - and structure to ensure those resources reach the most vulnerable in our community - was a key priority for our Coun-

Second, the Fund will invite all eligible low-income Harris County residents to complete an application through a multilingual call center and/or website to participate in a fair, randomized process. Given the incredible need, Harris County knows resources will be insufficient. That is why a randomized process will be used to select eligible households to received financial assistance. Eligible individuals will be matched with a community-based organization to understand their needs, verify eligibility, and provide assistance. The public will be given a minimum of one week's notice for when this process will be opened.

"Right now, the focus of our work is to get the Harris County COVID-19 Relief Fund up and running as quickly as possible. Much like previous relief efforts, such as the Harris County Small Business Loan program, our goal is to expedite the process and get money into the hands of our most vulnerable residents fast while also making sure it's done right," said Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia. "I have total confidence that our partners at Greater Houston Community Foundation will be successful in this endeavor. The Foundation is a recognized leader in disaster recovery efforts, and their performance managing the Bush-Clinton Katrina Fund as well as the Hurricane Harvey Relief Fund proves they are the right organization for the job.

The Fund is open to Harris County low-income

residents, including those excluded by the CARES Act or immigrant households, adults listed as dependents, and people who may receive Pandemic Unemployment Assistance but cannot afford to wait for months. Eligibility and disbursement guidelines for the Fund include:

- Those who have experienced adverse economic impact related to COVID-19; AND are:

- · Households below 60% of the Area Median Income (AMI), or are accessing public benefits that already confirm they are very low-income; or · Survivors of domestic
- Youth aged out of fos-
- ter care, or • Those in homeless shelters.
- Applicants cannot have received benefits from any City of Houston or other Harris County program administered for
- the same purpose.
 Prioritized consideration for:
- Applicants ineligible for unemployment insurance or have applied and will take too long to receive assistance to meet basic needs.
- Applicants ineligible for CARES Economic Impact Payments, or have not yet received a payment and cannot wait for the assistance to meet basic needs

"Our biggest priority is to get money and assistance to those who need it the most as quickly as possible," said Stephen Maislin, President and CEO of Greater Houston Community Foundation. "We know people need help and we are committed to working closely with Houston-area community-based organizations through a datadriven process to quickly and effectively deploy these funds to as many people in need as possible. We are honored to work with Harris County to support these critical efforts."

Those in need of immediate assistance are encouraged to call 211 Texas/ United Way helpline to find an organization in your geographic region that can serve you.

The Harris County Flood Control District reminds residents to prepare as Hurricane Season approaches

The 2020 Hurricane Season begins June 1 and forecasters are predicting an above normal storm eason. The Harris County Flood Control District encourages Harris County residents to take time to prepare their families and homes for severe weather and related impacts. Preparedness is the key to pro-

tecting life and property.
"The Harris County
Flood Control District's Flood Watch Team will monitor rainfall trends and check the gauges that measure rainfall amounts and water levels in bayous and creeks. In addition, our construction contractors will be actively working to ensure our channels are clear and functioning, however, residents still need to be prepared," said Jeff Lindner, Harris County Flood Control District Meteorologist.

As a storm approaches, it is often too late to get ready. Now is the time to prepare. Before Hurricane

Complete a family communication plan. Plan how you will assemble your family and loved ones, and anticipate where you will go for different situations. Get together with your family and agree on the ways to contact one another in an emergency, identify meeting locations, and make a Family Emergency Communication Plan.

. Purchase flood insur-ance. Harris County Flood Control District recommends that all Harris County residents become informed about their flood risk and have flood insurance no matter where they reside in Harris County Flood insurance accelerates the rebuilding and replacement of personal property and fosters community resiliency as a whole. . Know if your home is at risk of flooding. You can view a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM or floodplain map) at the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Map Service Cen-

storm hits: . Turn Around, Don't Drown: If heavy rainfall occurs in an area where you are traveling, or near homes and places of work, you are urged to avoid high water and flooded streets throughout the county and proceed with caution when driving on area roadways.

Stav Home, Don't Roam: When faced with a flooding situation, stay put wherever you are, unless your life is threatened or you are ordered to evacuate. Never drive or walk into high water areas. If you must venture out, avoid driving into water of unknown depth. Moving water can quickly sweep you and your vehicle away.

Open your Business and Persevere! MAGA my Friends!!!

1. At our 1st Saturday staff meeting prior to the required closings, I informed my staff that their pay would continue even if I had to cut off the utilities and rent...and my own pay. We continued to work on inventory, updating records, displays, A/R, and a myriad of other things. We planned...and persevered...

2. We chose to begin sidewalk service...something almost unheard of in our business. We were working the sidewalk...with two of us armed...delivering repairs and taking in repairs, watches, etc....and continuing our "buying" as normally as we could muster. Police units sat in cars across the street and monitored us...while criminals were being set free. But we followed the rules...and we persevered.. 3. We filed a request to

Harris County to allow us

to open the store as an "essential business"

because our customers who needed to sell TO us were unable to sell precious metals to the bank in order to buy food, pay rent, etc. In some instances. Pineforest Jewelry IS their bank! It took THREE WEEKS before the county allowed us to open...with the asinine statement that we could only allow 10 folks into our 7200 SF store at a time...and that included employees (I have 12). In addition, we were barred from selling jewelry...but WERE allowed to buy gold, silver, diamonds...and replace watch batteries. Absurd! As if someone would catch Covid-19 if they purchased a diamond...but were "safe" if they only purchased a battery. And as if the powers that be thought we could run our business off of buys and watch batteries. Police that should have been investigating crime were still assigned the brave duty of sitting nearby in their vehicles to make sure that we did not "open for business". But we followed the rules...and we persevered..

4. We put up signage regarding masks, social distancing, and use of hand sanitizers. We measured and taped zoned areas, and installed Plexiglas on our counters. Proclamation allows more services, activities to resume

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on May 26 issued a proclamation giving the green light to more services and activities in a second phase of the state's plan to reopen from man-datory pandemic closures.

The Phase II proclamation allowed water parks to open beginning May 29 on condition that the venues limit occupancy to no more than 25% of normal capacity. However, components of water parks that have video arcades must remain closed. Also, starting May 31, recreational sports programs for adults were allowed to resume but games and similar competitions must wait until June 15 to resume. Driver education programs can resume operations immediately.

Food-court dining areas in shopping malls were allowed to resume operations immediately, but malls are encouraged to designate one or more individuals responsible for health and safety practices on premises, including:

—Limiting tables to six individuals; maintaining a six-feet distance between individuals sitting at different tables;

-Cleaning and disinfecting tables between uses; and

-Ensuring no condiments or other items are left on tables between customer uses

In other news, cumulative figures posted on May 31 by the Texas Department of State Health Services showed that some 64.287 people in Texas had been diagnosed with COV-ID-19 and 1,672 deaths resulting from the virus pandemic had been con-

Protests erupt in cities

Crowds gathered in many cities across the nation in recent days to protest the May 25 death of former Houston resident George Floyd, 46, in Minneapolis.

white Minneap police officer, assisted by three fellow officers, arrested and handcuffed Floyd an African-American, then pinned him face down on a paved city street Floyd who was heard saying he could not breathe while he was pinned down, lost consciousness and was later pronounced dead. Video of the incident was captured by a bystander and posted on social media.

Gov. Abbott reacted on May 30, saying, "Texas and America mourn the senseless loss of George Floyd, and the actions that led to his death are reprehensible and should be condemned in the strongest terms possible. As Texans exercise their First Amendment rights, it is imperative that order is maintained and private property is protected."

Some of the protests turned violent. Abbott activated the National Guard and ordered state





resources to Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Austin, he said, to maintain public safety. The Texas Department of Public Safety deployed more than 1,500 officers to assist local police departments and more resources will be provided as needed, Abbott

Paxton applauds court

The Texas Supreme Court on May 27 ruled against a petition by the Texas Democratic Party in an ongoing effort to enable all Texans to vote by mail, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton applauded the ruling written by Chief Justice Nathan Hecht. Hecht concluded that a lack of immunity to COV-ID-19 is not itself a "physical condition" for being eligible to vote by mail under the state election law.

Texas Democratic Party Chairman Gilberto Hinojosa reacted to the ruling, saying, "Now, it is up to the federal court to ensure basic Constitutional rights still exist in Texas and ensure that Texans have a right to vote safely and not put their health at-risk."

Paxton said a voter ill with COVID-19 and who meets legal requirements may apply for a ballot by mail, "but fear of contracting COVID-19 is a normal emotional reaction to the

current pandemic and does not amount to an actual disability that qualifies a voter to receive a ballot by

Plaintiffs have a separate mail-in-ballot case pending in the federal court system.

SOS: Voting guidance

The Office of the Texas Secretary of State in consultation with the Texas Department of State Health Services on May 26 released health protocol guidance for Texas election officials and voters in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Secretary of State Ruth R. Hughs, Texas' chief election officer, said the guidance, available sos.texas.gov, reflects the minimum recommended health protocols to help ensure the health and safe ty of voters, election office personnel, polling place workers and poll watchers.

Unemployment hits high

In April, all major industries in Texas were hit with job losses related to the pandemic.

The Texas economy lost 1,298,900 non-farm positions in the month, the Texas Workforce Commission reported on May 22, causing the Lone Star State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate to rise to 12.8%.

The Amarillo Metropolitan Statistical Area re-corded April's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a nonseasonally adjusted rate of 8.8% followed by the Abilene MSA and the College Station-Bryan MSA, which both recorded 8.9% ond-lowest rate The Lubbock MSA recorded the third-lowest rate of 9.9%.



in continued reductions in employment, income and activity subject to sales tax for months to come."

Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections, but the effects of the economic slowdown and low oil prices were evident in other sources of revenue in May 2020. Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes:

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$265 million, down 38 percent from May 2019 and a modest improvement over April's results:

- motor fuel taxes — \$221 million, down 30 percent from May 2019 and the steepest drop since 1989:

- natural gas production tax — \$31 million, down 76 percent from May 2019; - oil production tax — \$90 million, the lowest

ASK DIAMOND JIM

Diamond Jim: "What is the birthstone for the month of June?"

JUNE BIRTHSTONES

June counts three gems as birthstones: pearl, Alexandrite, and moonstone.

Pearl

Pearls are unique as they are the only gems from living sea creatures and require no faceting or polishing to reveal their natural beauty. In the early 1900s, the first successful commercial culturing of round saltwater pearls began. Since the 1920s, cultured pearls have almost completely replaced natural pearls in the market.

The qualities that determine the overall value of a natural or cultured pearl or a piece of pearl jewelry are size, shape, color, luster, surface quality, nacre quality, nacre quality with two or more pearls—matching.

When other value

factors are equal, larger pearls are rarer and more valuable than smaller pearls of the same type. Round is the most difficult shape to culture, making it the rarest cultured pearl shape and-if all other factors are equal-also generally the most valuable. There are exceptions, though. Well-formed pear, oval, or baroque (irregularly shaped) cultured pearls are also prized by pearl

Natural and cultured pearls occur in a broad range of hues. There are warm hues like yellow, orange, and pink, and cool hues like blue, green, and violet. Pearls have a wide range of tone from light to dark. Pearl colors tend to be muted, with a soft, subtle quality.

Alexandrite

A relatively modern gem, Alexandrite, was first discovered in Russia in 1831 during the reign of its namesake, Czar Alexander II, and is an extremely rare chrysoberyl with chameleon-like qualities. Its color is a lovely green in both daylight and fluorescent light; it

changes color to a purplish red in incandescent light.

Due to its rarity, some jewelers stock synthetic versions of this enchanting gemstone. (Synthetic gemstones are manmade alternatives to the natural material, possessing the same physical, optical, and chemical properties as the natural gemstone.) Alexandrite is also the gem for the 55th wedding anniversary.

Moonstone

The third birthstone for June is the moonstone. It was given its name by the Roman natural historian Pliny, who wrote that moonstone's appearance altered with the phases of the moon belief that held until well after the sixteenth century. A phenomenal gemstone, moonstones show a floating play of light (called adularescence) and sometimes show either a multirayed star or a cat's eye

Considered a sacred stone in India, moonstones often are displayed on a background of vellow (a sacred color) and are believed to encapsulate within the stone a spirit whose purpose is to bring good fortune. Part of the family of minerals called feldspar, moonstone occurs in many igneous and metamorphic rocks and comes in a variety of colors such as green, blue, peach, and champagne. The most prized moonstones are from Sri Lanka; India, Australia, the United States, Mayanmar, and Madagascar are also sources






permanently discharge 0.193 acres of fill material in the form of pilings and rip-rap into 338.4 linear feet (LF) of the San Jacinto River, during replacement of damaged dolphin structures and fender sys-

Four dolphin structures are to be replaced by the proposed project. The existing damaged dolphin structures would be removed by heavy machinery on barges within the River channel and new dolphin structures would be installed in the same locations. Each proposed structure is 30 LF, for a total of 120 LF of impacts. The acreage of each proposed dolphin structure is 0.015 acre, for a total of 0.060 acre of permanent impacts. The fenders of the proposed dolphin structures are 18-inch-diameter steel coated with a marine-grade epoxy coating. It is undetermined if the pile fenders will be braced with either 18-inchto 24-inch-diameter braces and timber railroad ties or plastic lumbers (Concept 1) or braced with 24-inchto 36-inch-diameter bracings with pile fender wraps (Concept 2). Both concepts would include pipe sleeves around the pile and would result in the same amount of permanent impacts to the San Jacinto River.

To repair the navigation fender system, 77 steel pilings would be required. Each piling will be coated with a marine-grade epoxy coating and would measure approximately 1.5 LF, in diameter, and impact 0.00004 acre of the River. Of the 77 fender pilings, 15 pilings would be located within the proposed riprap so the linear feet of impacts are only calculated for 64 pilings as the linear feet of impacts of the 15 pilings within the rip-

rap are included in the riprap linear feet calculations. These pilings would total 96 LF in permanent impacts to 0.003 acre. Approximately 0.130 acre (1,454 cubic yards) of 24inch stone rip-rap and 3-inch bedding material is to be placed along the proposed east fender, extending for 122.4 LF.

pleted within existing right-of-way (ROW). No work is proposed along the banks of the San Jacinto River as the proposed construction techniques would facilitate completion of all work from barges or the bridge structure. No permanent or temporary construction easements are included in the proposed project. The project is considered necessary to increase the safety to ships utilizing the channel and

AVOIDANCE AND MINIMIZATION: The applicant has stated that they have avoided and minimized the environmental impacts by the following construction design techniques:
