# **HURRICANE LAURA HITS TEXAS & LOUISIANA**

Greg Abbott today held a press conference at the Alternate State Operations Center in Austin where he provided an update on the state's response to Hurricane Laura. This hurricane is expected to bring heavy rainfall, flooding, high winds, and storm surge. He announced that he has added 36 counties to his State Disaster Declaration due to the threat of severe rain, wind, and flooding.

During the press conference, Governor Abbott announced that reception centers in San Antonio, Dallas-Fort Worth, and Austin are open. The state is providing buses to transport Texans that are evacuating. There are also over 225,000 hotel rooms available across the state to pro-



This map from the National Weather Service shows the likely path of Hurricane Laura, and how it is gaining strength as it crosses the Gulf of Mexico. It is expected to be a Category 4 hurricane, with winds of at least 145 mph with gusts to 175 mph. The expected landfall is the border between Texas and Louisiana, but the cone of possibility indicates Houston may feel some or all of the effects of the storm.

full list of mandatory and voluntary evacuations can be found on the Texas Hurricane Center web page. Governor Abbott urged Texans to take action now to protect themselves and their property.

"Hurricane Laura is rapidly intensifying and poses a major threat to communities in Southeast Texas and along the coast, said Governor Abbott. "Texans in the path of this storm should waste no time preparing for the impact of Hurricane Laura and take immediate action to keep themselves and their loved ones safe. I urge our Southeast and coastal communities to heed the

# Hurricane evacuations underway

SOUTHEAST TEXAS -Counties and cities from Chambers County to Louisiana were issuing evacuation notices, in the anticipation that the coming Hurricane Laura would bring high winds and heavy rains, with flooding similar to previous devastating hurri-

Mandatory evacuations

have been issued for Galveston, Chambers County if you live in a flood-prone Galveston County for lowlying and beachfront areas, Jefferson County, City of Kemah, Orange County, and City of Port Arthur.

Also, voluntary evacua-tions have been ordered in parts of Baytown, Harris County flood-prone zones,

La Porte, Lake Jackson, League City, Nassau Bay, and Seabrook. Although all of these areas will require shelters after the evacuation, in general they have not been designated as yet.

School districts and COVID-19 testing sites have shut down for the next three days. This includes schools in Barbers

Hill, Anahuac, Chambers County, Goose Creek, and Crosby, as well as many others. Community Colleges have also closed on Wednesday and Thursday, and some on Friday. This includes Lee College and

San Jacinto College. First responders and Emergency Management personnel have pre-posirescue vehicles, as were needed in the last few hur-

Authorities have urged residents to prepare for several days away from home, by packing a "to go" kit with necessary items. See a list of suggested items on page 6 of this issue of the newspaper.

# Highlands man shot at softball game

HOUSTON - A man from Highlands was gunned down at Houston Sportsplex on August 13.
According to Houston

Police Department, the shooter claimed it was a

case of self-defense. Shepherd Schumaker, 32, expired at a nearby hospital from gunshot wounds. Detectives say the shooting at 12631 South Main Street began at about 10:40 p.m.

fight errupted inside the parking lot of a softball Shepherd Shumaker game following a game.

Witnesses indicated a

Witnesses told police that Schumaker drew a pistol and threatened several by pointing the weapon at them. Among them a 45year-old suspect that witnesses indicated was trying



to break up the fight.

The suspect then drew his own pistol and shot Schumaker at point blank

Houston Police indicate

that Schumaker was transported to the hospital and pronounced dead sometime after. Some 300 people were still at the scene when po-lice arrived and about that number were there when the shooting started. They are looking for anyone that would speak of or may have video recorded the shooting

The 45 year old stayed at the scene and cooperated with investigators. His statements to police indicated that the suspect shot Schumaker in fear for his

case to the District Attorney's Office without charges. A grand jury will make the decision of whether to charge the suspect in the

# County urges schools to stay closed for in-person

Harris County Public Health (HCPH) has made it abundantly clear that current indicators are not safe to resume in-person school activities in Harris County due to COVID-19. HCPH has taken into consideration a variety of factors in making this decision including the importance of in-person activities for students. In-person activities for schools are indeed valuable for the social fabric of children and communities. Data and evidence remain the cornerstone of decision making.

Since issuing the Harris County School Reopening Roadmap, HCPH has received a joint letter from several Harris County ISDs. In its guidance HCPH has recommended that in-person activities be phased-in until communi-ty spread of COVID-19 declines. To monitor and inform phased-in approaches for in-person ac-tivities, HCPH has recommended a set of benchmarks and metrics to monitor for public health trends. These indicators do not mean that in-person activities for schools will be closed indefinitely until a vaccine is available and the pandemic is over. Rather it is up to all of us to as-sure that our schools can

go back to in-person learning sooner than later.
These recommendations

are not taken lightly but are offered with the full Harris County community in mind. Ultimately, school leaders and administrators are responsible for using these metrics and making the decisions to resume in-person activi-ties in a way that keeps schools, students, faculty and staff safe. HCPH remains committed to working with its partners in helping Harris County move forward with its goal of reopening schools safely, responsibly and sustain-

### Judge rules Barbers Hill ISD's dress code discriminatory

Barbers Hill ISD Student Hair Controversy HOUSTON - After

three days of consideration, a judge ruled Monday night that the Barbers Hill Independent School District's dress code is discriminatory after two Black students were suspended over the length of their dreadlocks.

The lawsuit was filed after Deandre Arnold, a former Barbers Hill High School student, was suspended his senior year over the length of his hair. Arnold, his mother and other family members, filed the lawsuit against the district, alleging the following causes of action: intentional race discrimination, intentional race discrimination, sex discrimination, retaliation in violation of the First Amendment and several other violations under the U.S. Constitutional Amendment.

How the dreadlock controversy began Barbers Hill ISD re-

vised its dress code policy over winter break. Arnold. a senior in the class of 2020, who is described as an A and B student, was sent to in-school suspension and told he could not walk at graduation until his dreadlocks were cut short to meet the new dress code. Arnold took a stand and refused to cut his dreads due to his Trinidadian background.

Members of the Black Lives Matter organization along with Arnold's parents and several activists attended a school board meeting to voice their displeasure with the revised

dress code, but the board members chose not to bring the topic up for discussion during the meet-

Barbers Hill ISD released a written statement at the time:

"We do have a community supported hair length policy & have had for decades. Barbers Hill is a state leader with high expectations in all areas!"

Arnold's mother Sandy Arnold chose to withdraw her son from the school district in his final semester of high school due to the response from the school district.

As the controversy brewed, more Barbers Hill High School students and their parents gathered to show support, saying Arnold was not the only one being targeted by the dress code. Other male students said the district's policy is biased against boys. Many students said the district didn't start cracking down on the dress code until after the Christmas break for one main reason.

"Once we first got on the news with Deandre (Arnold) then it just started becoming a problem," said student Brandon Hernan-

#### Storms near the San Jacinto River require better protection from disaster

With the approaching storms possibly headed directly to our community we ask what precautions, preparedness, marine industry instruction and community alert systems are currently being worked on or put in place to protect the I-10 East San Jacinto Bridge, the San Jacinto Waste Pits Superfund Site, River Terrace Park, and the residents in the immediate areas adjacent to the San Jacinto River and Old River along Lakeside Dr.? Among other marine incidents, during Hurricane Harvey a multitude of barges broke loose and traveled freely down Old River towards River Terrace Park endangering the immediate residents and homes along Lakeside Dr. and the surrounding neighborhoods and communities.

".....Prepared as we were, our tugs rescued 30+ barges at an adjacent company which had come loose from their moorings. At least twice, the barges came down in groups of eight and once, even a group of 13 barges came down on our fleet. ..." Harley Marine Gulf newsletter Soundings September 2017 issue.

As these incidents occurred no effort was was made by the marine companies involved or responding nor by any emergency or governmental entity to alert the residents in their homes just a few feet away of the platoons of barges traveling freely through the waterway filled with barges containing a hazardous cocktail of chemicals, hydrocarbons and compressed gases, in essence a floating chemical storage facility, of the fact they were one barge strike away from disaster.

During last summer's Tropical Storm Imelda barges broke loose striking and lodging on the SJR Waste Pits Superfund site and striking and damaging the I-10 East San Jacinto bridge resulting in several months of impaired and lost of use a major Texas & National traffic artery severely handicapping and endangering the surrounding communities of Channelview, Highlands, Baytown, Barrett Station and Crosby making it nearly impossible for the residents to conduct commerce, obtain health, social and emergency services, and travel to and from their places of employment.

Since these events the marine industry and barge and tug mooring within the San Jacinto River and Old River waterways has increased substantially. Old River inclusive of Market St., River Terrace Park and Lakeside Dr. is a continuous row of barges multiple barges deep along the banks extending far into the waterway and a maze of moored barges in the waterway itself difficult to traverse in fair weather conditions and a danger filled obstacle course for any marine vessel out of control, especially in foul weather. The barge fleeting and mooring on the north and south sides of the I-10 bridge have been allowed to remain and expand. These conditions are increasing the potential for a more devastating and dangerous event resulting in extensive loss of life, health, property and irreparable damage to the environment. For your reference and use are photos taken today, 08/21/20, depicting some of the current dangers and conditions are attached, but we adamantly request you visit these areas for the best understanding of the dangerous conditions in place.

As residents and community members in close proximity to and therefore directly affected by any adverse outcome of any incident occurring within the San Jacinto and Old River waterways we feel it is our duty to make you exceptionally aware of these potentially dangerous conditions and feel it is our right and a necessity to be informed prior to, during and after what measures are being taken to ensure our health, safety and welfare.

As the storms are expected to arrive Tuesday your expedient attention and response to this matter is a necessity.

# School year brings an Apple for Students, too

Students across Texas returned to campuses last week as schools and universities scrambled to put into place new lesson plans that best accommodate a pandemic.

For example, Goose Creek Consolidated Independent School District east of Houston announced plans to buy 16,000 iPads for almost \$3.1 million. The Texas Education Agency's statewide initiative, Operation Connectivity will pay half the cost



Lori is my husband, Peter's, older sister. She has cancer and has been battling it for a while now. She uses oxygen to help out and catching this virus would be terrible for her, so Peter and I are extra careful, in large part because I'd like to keep reading to Lori.

I've been writing a novel. It's the first time I've written fiction, so I honestly don't have any idea what I'm doing. It's the sort of thing a person learns how to do by doing — and so I've been doing it, pretty much alone, since the end of January. Except that, sometime in there, I started reading it to Lori.

Peter has been cooking. Peter is an excellent cook. I strongly recommend, if you are a writer and it's not too late, you marry someone who cooks because sometimes I get so wrapped up in my imaginary little world, I forget about cooking meals and, when I come downstairs, Peter always has a pot of something on the stove. He's good about things like that and, since about the first of the year, Peter has been bringing food to Lori.

Unlike me, Lori has a good excuse not to be cooking. She's not always hungry and her diet is restricted and sometimes, she just doesn't have the energy to think about making food. Peter brings over food and when he does, I read.

As this virus has stretched on, these days of reading have become more important to me and, I suspect, to all of us. Sometimes I dress up a little. It feels good to put on a sundress for a change. We sit outside on opposite sides of her deck. Lori's husband, Robert, puts Peter's food in the fridge, and we find out how Lori's been feeling and what treatments she's

been on most recently.
"Shelley called," Lori
will say. And she'll tell us
about phone calls she's had
from family.

Then the conversation sort of winds down because, let's face it, none of us are doing much these days. That's when I'll read a chapter or two.

a chapter or two.

Sometimes the neighbor mows the lawn and I have to speak up. Sometimes we get some competition from ravens squawking in the trees. Occasionally, a little rain comes in. Lori and Robert sit under the patio umbrella and Peter and I sit under the overhang of the house. We let the rain pass and I keep reading.

Lori laughs out loud—which makes me happy. She laughs at both the funny and the gruesome parts. When I am finished, she and Robert ask questions and Robert (who is not generally a fiction reader) asks some excellent ones.

We leave before it gets too late. I have a hike to take. Lori gets tired. Robert needs to heat up whatever Peter has brought for dinner. And when I get home, I always feel better than when I left.

I've come to think of the little gatherings on Lori's deck as a sort of distillation of everything we need as humans. We need nutritious food and we need to sit together and we need to share stories. And we need to laugh. We need to laugh a lot more than we have recently.

O'ver the next few days,

I write a little more and Peter keeps on cooking, and we keep in touch with Lori by sending a text or two.

Then Peter will ask, "When would you like to read to Lori?" "Anytime," I say. "Any

day that works for her."



On the night of Aug. 25, 2017, Hurricane Harvey roared into Texas as a Category 4 hurricane leaving a path of devastation in its wake. Three years later, work to repair Harvey's damage remains, but with great determination and perseverance, Texas communities have made strong progress in their recovery.

According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Harvey is the second-costlest U.S. natural disaster only Hurricane Katrina that struck the Gulf Coast in 2005 caused more damage. Although the damage estimates are high, federal, state and local funds along with non-profit assistance, volunteer hours and donations have helped Texans continue their recovery.

Texans to date have been provided with \$14.5 billion in federal funds including grants, loans and flood insurance payments to assist in repair and re-placement of their homes and their belongings. FEMA Public Assistance has awarded, and the Texas Division of Emergency Management has disbursed, more than \$2.1 billion in grants for debris removal, measures taken to prepare for Harvey and permanent repair or re-placement of public infrastructure. And. FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program has funded \$246 million for projects to limit damages caused by future disasters.

Three years after Harvey, Texans find themselves in the midst of another hurricane season. This should serve as a great reminder to buy or renew a policy with the National Flood Insurance Program. After the storm, about 92,000 Texans received flood insurance payouts for an estimated \$9 billion. Many Texans without flood insurance, however, had to rebuild their lives with personal savings and whatever federal assistance they were eligible to receive.

# Forty Years

As the possibility of Tropical Storm Laura impacting Harris County, I sat down with my son and his wife to discuss plans for the next few days. By the time the National Weather Service upgraded the storm to Hurricane Laura, I found myself driving to Austin with my daughter in love as well as my two grand-daughters.

On the road again, heading west and reflecting on how many changes have happen in the 40 years since I moved to Austin to attend the University of Texas after graduating from North Shore Senior High. In August 1980, I found myself moving into a private dorm with almost 300 strangers. Fortunately, I knew my roommate, who had graduated from C.E. King High School. # Help Available for Irritable Bowel Syndrome

BAYTOWN — (August 13, 2020) — Frequent bloating, cramps and unpredictable bowel movements force millions of Americans suffering from irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) to stay close to a restroom at all

Often called "spastic colon," IBS is a common intestinal disorder that causes abdominal cramps, diarrhea, gas, bloating and constipation. Although help is available, embarrassment causes many people with IBS to suffer in silence rather than seek treatment.

The Root of the Problem

"The condition occurs when the delicate interplay among the nerves, hormones and electrical activity that link the bowel and the brain is disrupted," said Dr. Yassir

If you never thought about the connection between the brain and the stomach before, just magine the butterflies you feel before making a speech or the bellyache that might come on during a heated argument.

"In IBS, pain sensors in the colon are more sensitive than normal, causing them to respond strongly to stimuli that don't affect most people," Ashraf said. In short, a breakfast of scrambled eggs and milk can spell disaster for those with the

Ashraf suggests taking these steps if IBS symptoms are beginning to disrupt your life:

· See your physician as soon as symptoms appear. Your physician will know what treatment course is best for you. And since the signs of IBS may mimic those of a serious disease, it's important to rule out any underlying disorder.

that seem to bring on symptoms and discuss your findings with your doctor. Once you identify the foods that trigger symptoms, scale back your intake. Common culprits are dairy products, caffeine, beans, cabbage,

· Write down the foods

fat and alcohol. Remember that many of the nutrients you need may be in the foods you are avoiding, so be sure to make healthy substitutions.

- · Limit spicy foods.
- Since large meals often cause cramping and diarrhea, try eating a few small meals throughout the day instead of three large courses.
- Control tension levels. Because of the brain-bowel connection, high stress levels can trigger IBS symptoms. To unwind, go for a daily walk, talk with a friend, dust off an old hobby or listen to music.

A l t h o u g h antidiarrheals and laxatives may ease symptoms, they are not a long-term solution. Instead, your doctor may prescribe antispasmodics for relief. In severe cases,

antidepressant medication may help soothe distress.






