Celebrating National Hispanic Heritage Month

National Hispanic Heritage Month September 15 – October 15

Today, September 15, 2020 marks the beginning of a month long celebration recognizing the contributions Hispanics have contributed to the United States. National Hispanic Heritage Month is celebrated from Sept. 15 through Oct. 15.

Allan Jamail, North

Channel Star writer said, "I write this article to honor Puerto Rican civil rights pioneer Felicitas Méndez." She is a Puerto Rican immigrant and her husband Gonzalo took on California school segregation laws after their three children were denied entry at a local elementary school because of their skin color in 1944.

The success of the Méndez v. Westminster case made California the first state in the nation to end segregation in school. This paved the way for the better-known Brown v. Board of Education when Blacks

were also denied an education in a segregated White school. It was this case which would bring an end to school segregation in the entire country.

In 1968, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed a proclamation to establish Hispanic Heritage Week. In the proclamation, the 36th president wrote, "The people of Hispanic descent are the heirs of missionaries, captains, soldiers, and farmers who were motivated by a young spirit of adventure, and a desire to

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Census Parade emphasizes the need to Be Counted

Sylvia Garcia, County and City leaders join in effort

Garcia was talking at the BakerRipley center in East Aldine, along with others including East Aldine's Richard Cantu, Sheriff Ed Gonzalez, Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner, Pct. 2 Harris County Commissioner Adrian Garcia, Pct. 1 Commissioner Rodney Ellis, State Representative Armando Walle, and BakerRipley president Claudia Aguirre.

HARRIS COUNTY – U.S. Congresswoman Sylvia Garcia has organized an intense public effort to count as many residents of the area as possible, stating that federal dollars that are sent to the state, county, and city are dependent upon the number of people counted and living in the area.

To draw attention to the need to sign up in the Census, Garcia and other community leaders have organized "Census Caravans" that drive through neighborhoods and urge residents to complete their

census forms. Garcia says it only takes 5 minutes to complete the questionnaire, and can be done in several different ways.

Last Saturday the Census Caravan drove through the streets of East Aldine. Authorities have noted that this is one of the areas where only a small percentage of the residents have registered.

Prior to the Caravan leaving on its neighborhood tour, community leaders spoke on the importance of a complete census count.

Mayor Turner noted in his remarks that only 40%

of the eligible residents in the city have been counted so far. Only a few weeks remain until September 30, when the Census Bureau stops its field activities of counting. This includes door-knocking, online responses, over the phone, and by mail. After that the bureau will make adjustments and assumptions, and deliver a final count by December 31.

Sylvia Garcia had this to say in her remarks:

The Census will determine how billions of federal dollars will be allocated

Harris County Approves Historic Investment to Improve Access to Voting

- drive-thru voting;

Since 40% of people infected with COVID-19 don't have any symptoms, you could have it without knowing it and be spreading it to family and friends. Digital Access Program provides Computer Devices and Hotspots

Keeping our children home from school is a smart move to protect them from COVID-19, but many Harris County families don't have the means to get their kids connected virtually and learning online. In Texas, one in four students do not have devices at home for virtual learning, and 34% of these students lack adequate access to the internet. 66% of these students are African-American, Hispanic, or Native American.

To begin to address these substantial inequalities, Harris County Commissioners Court approved the creation of the Digital Access Program in early August. The program designates \$32 million in Federal Cares Act dollars to provide 82,000 WiFi hotspots and 211,000 devices to families in need. Harris County will partner with Texas Education Agency's "Operation Connectivity" and T-Mobile's "Project 10 Million" for distribution of the devices and hotspots, respectively.

COVID-19 Relief Fund Distributes Funds to Over 20k Households

The Harris County COVID-19 Relief Fund is in the process of distributing its final grants and is close to completion. The \$30 million fund opened its application in late June for the most vulnerable residents of Harris County suffering the financial effects of COVID-19. Over the span of two days, the fund hosted 1,898,555 sessions on its website (including visitors who visited the website multiple times), and assisted 24,136 people over the phone. All \$30 million has been released to intermediary organizations to distribute to families, and 20,618 households have been served by the fund to date. An estimated 400 to 450 additional families will receive re-granted funds that could not be distributed. A final count of all families served, as well as an evaluation and assessment of the program will be available in October.

A tax rate of 0.050000 per \$100 valuation has been proposed by the governing body of Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

PROPOSED TAX RATE	\$0.050000 per \$100

The no-new-revenue tax rate is the tax rate for the 2020 tax year that will raise the same amount of property tax revenue for Harris County Emergency Services District 50 from the same properties in both the 2019 tax year and the 2020 tax year.

The voter-approval tax rate is the highest tax rate that Harris County Emergency Services District 50 may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate, unless the de minimis rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50 exceeds the voter-approval tax rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

The de minimis rate is the rate equal to the sum of the no-new-revenue maintenance and operations rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50, the rate that will raise \$500,000, and the current debt rate for Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

The proposed tax rate is greater than the no-new-revenue tax rate. This means that Harris County Emergency Services District 50 is proposing to increase property taxes for the 2020 tax year.

A public hearing on the proposed tax rate will be held on October 05, 2020 at 6:00 PM at 1210 Dell Dale Avenue, Channelview, Harris County, Texas.

The proposed tax rate is greater than the voter-approval tax rate, but not greater than the de minimis rate. However, the proposed tax rate exceeds the rate that allows voters to petition for an election under Section 26.075, Tax Code. If Harris County Emergency Services District 50 adopts the proposed tax rate, the qualified voters of the Harris County Emergency Services District 50 may petition the Harris County Emergency Services District 50 to require an election to be held to determine whether to reduce the proposed tax rate. If a majority of the voters reject the proposed tax rate, the tax rate of the Harris County Emergency Services District 50 will be the voter-approval tax rate of the Harris County Emergency Services District 50.

When Bill returned, Blue ran over to him and leaned his big head against him and wagged his tail.

"You see, Blue?" I said, "I told you everything was going to be fine."

Then Blue did something I didn't expect. He came over to me and leaned his head against me for a long moment. He wagged his tail. Then he returned to Bill.

You can think whatever you like. I'm going to believe that's how Blue says, "Thank you."

Pandemic messes with Texas, prompts new message

Pandemic messes with Texas, prompts new message
Even during a pandemic, it's best to not mess with Texas.

Texas Department of Transportation officials noticed more personal protective equipment—face masks, wipes and gloves—on the side of roads and highways, so they called in the big guns for a new round of "Don't mess with Texas" commercials. The celebrities featured include George Strait, Matthew McConaughey and Eva Longoria. "Find a trash can, or keep a litter bag in your car, and wait to toss it until you get home," Longoria said via her Instagram page. "#Don'tMessWithTexas actually means don't litter!"

"Capital Highlights" reader Anna Blythe, who reads the column in the Weimar Mercury, wrote recently that she thinks the "Don't mess with Texas" campaign needs a reboot. She said she's seen much more litter in recent years along Interstate 10 from Baytown to Flatonia. "I hate to see all the trash on our roadways in our great state of Texas," Blythe said. About 362 million pieces of litter accumulate on Texas roads every year with items discarded from vehicles accounting for half the mess, TxDOT officials report. Those caught littering can face a fine of \$500. If the tossed litter weighs more than five pounds, the fine can increase up to \$2,000. Cotton-packaging problems

Plastic is a serious problem for cotton farmers, too. During the past three years, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has found an increase of plastic in samples that likely originated from the round module wraps used to package cotton, the Texas Farm Bureau reports. Every bale of cotton is graded by the USDA in classing offices across the country. In 2018, the USDA classing office in Corpus Christi received more plastic-contaminated bales than any other classing office in the country. When small pieces of plastic tear from the wear and embed themselves in the cotton lint, that lowers the crop's quality and price. Roadside litter can contribute to the problem. Plains Cotton Growers CEO Steve Verett says the industry is working to fix the problem: "We have to recognize we can't risk the reputation of being one of the pre-

mium fibers in the world. That's what we've lived off of for many years in the U.S., and we can't let this plastic wrap issue become our Achilles heel."

Ag land values remain strong

Despite the recession, the value of Texas agricultural land has increased, according to a new U.S. Department of Agriculture report. The average value of the state's agricultural land, including buildings, is up 2.4 percent this year at \$2,170 an acre in the USDA's 2020 Land Values Report. Across the country, average ag land values are either lower or unchanged from 2019's record highs, according to Morning Ag Clips. The amount of farmable land has decreased because of urban sprawl. Because of this, farmland is appreciating in value, which is good for investors but can be a mixed bag for farmers. In Texas, 236,000 farmers and ranchers paid \$698 million in property taxes, or about \$3,000 each, according to an article by Pew Charitable Trusts. Ag land can qualify for certain tax exemptions.

Some news is hard to digest

Those with a hankering for Luby's square fish or a LuAnn plate may have to seek comfort food elsewhere for the first time in almost a century. Bob Luby opened his first restaurant in San Antonio in 1947. Seventy-three years later, Luby's home-style cooking may be no more. Luby's Inc., now a Houston-based restaurant company, is liquidating its assets, its board of directors announced. The decision also could mean the end for the company's other restaurant, Fuddruggers. Stockholders have yet to approve the liquidation plan, and it's possible a buyer could keep the restaurants open. Cafeteria-style restaurants have been buffeted by the pandemic, as some of the 80 Luby's and Fuddruggers locations were closed soon after the COVID-19 outbreak.

NOTICE OF VOTE ON TAX RATE

If the district adopts a combined debt service, operation and maintenance and contract tax rate that would result in the taxes on the average residence homestead increasing by more than 3.5 percent, an election must be held to determine whether to approve the operation and maintenance tax rate under Section 49.23602, Water Code.

The 86th Texas Legislature modified the manner in which the voter-approval tax rate is calculated to limit the rate of growth of property taxes in the state.

ASK DIAMOND JIM

Diamond Jim: “Is Silver a good investment?”

Silver, like other precious metals, may be used as an investment. For more than four thousand years, silver has been regarded as a form of money and store of value. However, since the end of the silver standard, silver has lost its role as a legal tender in all developed countries, although some countries mint bullion and collector coins like the American Silver Eagle with nominal face values. In 2009, the main demand for silver was for industrial applications (40%), jewelry, bullion coins and exchange-traded products. In 2011, the global silver reserves amounted to 530,000 tonnes (tons).

Millions of Canadian Silver Maple Leaf coins and American Silver Eagle coins are purchased as investments each year. The Silver Maple Leaf is legal tender at \$5 per ounce and there are many other silver coins with higher legal tender values, including \$20 Canadian silver coins. Silver is legal tender in the U.S. state of Utah, and can be used to pay all debts.

PRICE
Like most commodities, the price of silver is driven by speculation and supply and demand. Compared to gold, the silver price is notoriously volatile. This is because of lower market liquidity, and demand fluctuations between industrial and store of value uses. At times this can cause wide ranging valuations in the market, creating volatility.

Physical bullion, in coins or bars, purchased from a dealer, may have a premium of 20 percent or more. For much of 2016 and 2017, physical silver bullion bars have been available for purchase at a premium of less than 7% over the Comex spot price. The paper or computer prices are not the prices for buying actual silver, in your hands. There will always be a major difference between computer traded pricing, and the real, in your hands buying and selling of silver.

BARS
The flat, rectangular shape of silver bars makes them ideal for

storage in a home safe, a safe deposit box at a bank, or placed in allocated (also known as *non-fungible*) or unallocated (*fungible* or *pooled*) storage with a bank or dealer. Silver is traded in the spot market with the code “XAG”. When settled in United States Dollars, the code is “XAGUSD”.

COINS AND ROUNDS

Silver coins include the one ounce 99.99% pure Canadian Silver Maple Leaf and the one ounce 99.93% pure American Silver Eagle. Coins may be minted as either *fine silver* or *junk silver*, the latter being older coins made of 90% silver. U.S. coins 1964 and older (half dollars, dimes, and quarters) are generally accepted to weigh 24.71 grams of silver per dollar of face value, which at their nominal silver content of 90%, translates to 22.239 g of silver per dollar. All U.S. dimes, quarters, halves and 1 dollar pieces contained 90% silver since their introduction up until 1964 when they were discontinued.

The types of silver described here can be a good investment. The choice is yours.

settle freely in a free land. This heritage is ours.”

The proclamation recognizes the fact that five Central American countries — Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua — celebrate their respective Independence Days on September 15, while Mexico celebrates it on September 16. As a result, Congress requested that the President issue an annual proclamation designating the week of September 15 and 16 as National Hispanic Heritage Week.
