
Rotary Club gives out Backpacks & Supplies Saturday Sept. 26th

Cities and the drone operator can be sued if a person's constitutional rights have been violated by the illegal use of a drone.

She also faulted the study for characterizing the toxic waste as too low a type of hazardous industrial waste, and calls for the sampling and classification to be done again. She notes that the PRP asked the consultant to omit certain test results. without explanation or reason.

In addition to the Northern Impoundment, Jackie spoke of the Sand Separation area. Although the RD calls for monitoring natural remediation, with no interventiion or removal, she said that sampling had revealed "hot spots" and

ASK DIAMOND JIM

Diamond Jim:□"How Old are Natural Diamonds?"

Most natural diamonds are formed at high temperature and pressure at depths of 140 to 190 kilometers (87 to 118 mi) in the Earth's mantle. Carbon-containing minerals provide the carbon source, and the growth occurs over periods from 1 billion to 3.3 billion years (25% to 75% of the age of the Earth). Diamonds are brought close to the Earth's surface through deep <u>volcanic</u> eruptions by magma, which cools into igneous

as kimberlites and lamproites. Diamonds have been treasured as gemstones since their use as <u>religious</u> icons in ancient India. Their usage in engraving tools also dates to early human history. The popularity of diamonds has risen since the 19th century because of increased supply, improved cutting and polishing techniques, growth in the world economy, and innovative and successful ad-

vertising campaigns.
The most familiar uses of diamonds today are as gemstones used for adornment, a use which dates back into antiquity, and as industrial abrasives for cutting hard materials.

The dispersion of white light into spectral colors is the primary gemological characteristic of gem diamonds. In the 20th century, experts in gemology developed methods of grading diamonds and other gemstones based on the characteristics most important to their value as a gem. Four characteristics, known informally as the four Cs, are now commonly used as the basic descriptors of diamonds: these are \underline{carat} (its weight), cut (quality of the cut is graded accord-

ing to proportions, symmetry and polish), color (how close to white or colorless; for fancy diamonds how intense is its hue), and clarity (how free is it from inclusions). A large, flawless diamond is

known as a <u>paragon</u>.

Not all diamonds found on Earth originated on Earth. Primitive inter-

found to contain carbon possibly in the form of diamond. A type of dia-

mond called <u>carbonado</u> that is found in South America and Africa may have been deposited there via an asteroid impact (not formed from the impact) about 3 billion years ago. These diamonds may have formed in the intrastellar environment, but as of 2008, there was no scientific consensus on how carbonado diamonds originated.

Misconception about diamonds forming from compressed coal Few diamonds are

formed from highly compressed <u>coal</u>. More than 99% of diamonds ever mined have formed in the conditions of extreme heat and pressure about 90 miles (140 km) below the Earth's surface Coal is formed from prehistoric plants buried much closer to the surface and is unlikely to migrate below 2 miles (3.2 km) through common geologi cal processes. Most diamonds that have been dated are older than the first land plants and are therefore older than coal. It is possible that diamonds can form from coal in $\underline{subduction\ zones}$ and in meteoroid impacts, but diamonds formed in this way are rare, and the carbon source is more likely carbonate rocks and organic carbon in sediments, rather than coal. Ike Dike moves forward

As Hurricane Sally hammered nearby states, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn touted in a news release the progress of a massive flood mitigation project along Texas' Gulf Coast.

The Sabine Pass to
Galveston Bay project,
sometimes referred to as the
Ike Dike, is intended to
protect nearly 4,000 square
miles from Brazoria County
to Orange County. Last
month, Orange County voted
to move into the design
phase with the Army Corps
of Engineers. After a design
study is completed in April,
the project will be submitted
to Congress for authorization
and funding.

The Corps also is conducting a Coastal Texas Study with the Texas General Land Office to provide a comprehensive strategy for flood mitigation and coastal protection beyond Houston. "The question isn't if that next bullet will come, but when, and how ready we will be." Cornyn said. "With these projects, Texas will be stronger, safer and better prepared for whatever Mother Nature sends our

way." Cornyn's Democratic challenger in the Nov. 3 election, MJ Hegar, responded to the statement, saying Texas is being pummeled by the effects of climate change "We've had over a decade to act on the Ike Dike, but under Sen. Cornyn's watch it still hasn't materialized perhaps because just six years ago he didn't even know what the Ike Dike was," Hegar said. "We need bold investments in both energy and infrastructure, including but not limited to the Ike Dike, to help Texans on the frontlines of worsening natural disasters and holistically address the climate crisis - something Sen. Cornyn has repeatedly failed Texans on.'


Buffalo: The Rams make



Jackie pointed out that the RD did not call for berms to protect the cofferdams from a barge strike, a design feature requested by Harris County. On Zoom, Carolyn Stone commented that the RD "over-

all had a lack of seriousness about the site." Jackie noted that the EPA had not only granted a 160 day extension to the consultant as requested, but also asked that the TWG (Technical Working Group) be expanded to include Harris County and the Port of Houston. It now officially includes TxDOT, the Coast Guard, Army Corps of Engineers, and TCEQ.

Jackie made the follow-ing statement regarding waste characterization:

Upon our review of the 30% design for the Northern Waste Pits, multiple items raised red flags and prompted our call for in-

It is known that the Pits contain 2,3,7,8-TCDD in concentrations greater than 90,000 parts per trillion (ppt) yet over 75% of the samples taken for "waste characterization" waste characterization contained concentrations of 2,3,7,8-TCDD below 30 ppt. This is in no way representative of the actual waste material that will be removed from the San Jacinto River and permanently disposed of. How this waste will be handled transported, and disposed of, hinges on the waste characterization.
The Waste Pits Super-

fund Site has made considerable progress through the Superfund process in the last decade. Our communities want this process to keep moving forward, as

and the environment remain as long as the Pits are in the river, however adequate work must be done now to ensure remediation is done safely and


with integrity.
In the Southern Impoundment, Jackie noted that the acceptable cleanup level was >240 ng/kg, considerably lower than in the Northern Impoundment, where >30 ng/kg is the standard for material to be removed. She noted that the Southern Impoundment also had "hot. sports" where dioxins had tested to 152,000 ppt (parts per trillion).

She called for new sampling to be done on all the sites, with reclassification standards for the disposal of the waste.

The schedule now calls for the Pre-final Design for the Southern Impoundment to be submitted to EPA by September 2020, and the Northern Impoundment by April 2021

Final Design, which will allow the PRP (Potential Responsible Parties) to negotiate completion of the remediation, is scheduled for the Southern Impound-ment by November 2020, but for the Northern Impoundment is listed as indefinite.
