Early Voting Oct. 13 thru 30

Election Day is November 3rd

Early voting started Tuesday, Oct. 13 in Harris County, and will continue through Friday, Oct. 30. Election Day is November 3rd. Voters can go to any polling location, which can be located at www.harrisvotes.com. This year you will not be able to vote a straight ticket, so it will take longer to choose each candidate by name.

Important races include President Trump versus his challenger Joe Biden. Also Texas Senator John Cornyn is running against MJ Hegar, a war-wounded veteran.

U. S. Representatives that face challengers include Dan Crenshaw, Sheila Jackson Lee, Sylvia Garcia, and Brian Babin. All of these represent some part of

local districts.

In state races, incumbents Dan Huberty and Briscoe Cain face challengers. Armando Walle, Senfonia Thompson, and Ana Hernandez are running unopposed in their districts.

Several Harris County races are of interest, including District Attorney Kim Ogg with a challenger, County Attorney Vince Ryan is not running so two new candidates are vying for his position, and Sheriff

Ed Gonzalez is running for reelection. Also up for election are the County Tax Collector-Assessor, and the County Clerk.

Two area Constable Districts have candidates running, in Precinct 2 Dan Vela vs. Jerry Garcia, one of whom will replace incumbent Chris Diaz, and in Precinct 3 incumbent Sherman Eagleton is running against Andre Hines.

Several local MUD districts, ESD districts, and school board trustees are also up for election.

After much legal wrangling, the courts decided that mail-in ballots will have only one drop location in Harris County at the NRG Arena, or can be mailed.

NOTICE OF VOTE ON TAX RATE

If the district adopts a combined debt service, operation and maintenance and contract tax rate that would result in the taxes on the average residence homestead increasing by more than 3.5 percent, an election must be held to determine whether to approve the operation and maintenance tax rate under Section 49.23602, Water Code.

The 86th Texas Legislature modified the manner in which the voter-approval tax rate is calculated to limit the rate of growth of property taxes in the state.

The Hope Diamond (VS1 • 45.52ct)

The Hope Diamond may be the most famous colored diamond in the world. A team of GIA gemologists graded it in 1988. Because they were able to weigh the diamond unmounted, they quickly made a notable discovery: the diamond was 45.52 ct, and not 44.50 ct, which had been its previously recorded weight. GIA graders also reported that the Hope Diamond is a cushion antique brilliant. The diamond was color graded as a natural color Fancy dark grayish blue diamond. Since the 1800s, the Hope Diamond had been described as being flawless. Technical specifications aside, the Hope Diamond captivates the imagination like no other gemstone.

The Dresden Green (41.0ct)

In late 1988, GIA gemologists secured permission to examine the famed Dresden Green diamond in the Green Vaults, which was then in East Germany. They were particularly excited, as it promised to provide insight into distinguishing natural from laboratory-irradiated green diamonds (radiation is usually the cause of color in both instances). Because the diamond's history had been recorded since 1741, researchers could be confident that it had not been treated in a laboratory. As the diamond remained mounted upon examination, GIA gemologists were not able to issue a grading report.

Idol's Eye (VVS1 • 70.20 ct)

Another famous diamond shrouded in myth, the Idol's Eye was probably mined in India's Golconda District – an area famed for producing fine diamonds. There are many tall tales about the diamond, including one that says the Idol's Eye is also the Nassak. This has been disproven. The first confirmed documentation of the Idol's Eye was in one of the lots being sold at auction by Christie's London in July 1865.

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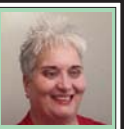

In talking with an older friend recently, they mentioned that each year the responsibilities of planning the family Christmas Gathering are rotated from one “limb” of the family tree to another. One of his grandfather's brothers became a minister and all three of his sons followed in his footsteps and his two daughters married ministers. Sadly, one of his grandfather's sisters had four sons. The sister's husband along with all four made poor choices and ended up serving various amounts of time in prison.

This conversation started me to think about how I want to be remembered and will my children follow my steps.

It just happened that the next day, I ran into some people who were soliciting votes for local candidates. If there is a principal in your community, outside of his responsibilities, what activities are they involved in?

And at the same time, we need to ask ourselves what activities we do outside of our jobs. How are we representing our employer? Do others see us as dedicated to doing good things or do they see us as some sloppy person who is always partying? It is important that we teach our children as well as other young people that while appearance matters, their attitude is also important.

Accusations rock Attorney General's office

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton is battling back against seven top aides who accuse him of bribery and abuse of office.

The aides delivered the accusations in a letter to the agency's human resources director. The Austin American-Statesman and KVUE-TV obtained and first published the letter.

The Houston Chronicle and other media outlets reported that the allegations are tied to Paxton's relationship with Nate Paul, an Austin real estate investor and campaign donor.

Congressman Chip Roy of Austin called on his fellow Republican to resign.

resolve differences and demonstrate if the allegations are false was eliminated by his choice instead to attack the very people entrusted, by him, to lead the office — some of whom I know well and whose character are beyond reproach,” Roy said.

Paxton's spokeswoman said the former aides were trying to impede an ongoing criminal investigation into criminal wrongdoing by public officials, including employees of the AG's office.

“Despite the effort by rogue employees and their false allegations, I will continue to seek justice in Texas and will not be resigning,” Paxton said in a statement.

MANY BARS GET SHOT AT REOPENING

Bars in most of Texas may reopen this week at 50 percent capacity under a new executive order issued by Gov. Greg Abbott.

In addition, other businesses may expand to 75 percent capacity. The expanded openings are permitted in regions where COVID-19 hospitalizations account for less than 15 percent of available hospital beds and with approval by the county judge.

Abbott praised Texans for following health protocols that include social distancing, wearing face masks and vigorous hand washing. He urged people to continue these practices to keep Texas moving forward.

“It is time to open up

more, provided that safe protocols continue to be followed,” Abbott said. “If everyone continues the safe practices, Texas will be able to contain COVID, and we will be able to reopen 100%.”

In the state's two biggest metropolitan areas, Dallas County Judge Clay Jenkins and Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo, both Democrats, said the science didn't support reopening bars yet.

“The data guiding county decision-making tells us we are doing much better than we were a few months ago, but we are still at the highest level: red. Indoor, maskless gatherings should not be taking place right now, and this applies to bars, as well,” Hidalgo said.

LAKE JACKSON GETS OK AFTER RARE, DEADLY AMOEBA

Lake Jackson residents can drink their water again after a deadly brain-eating amoeba killed a 6-year-old boy.

Gov. Abbott issued a disaster declaration for Brazoria County after the death of Josiah McIntyre. Officials suspect he became infected while playing at a Lake Jackson splash pad or with a water hose at his home. The cause of death is a single-cell organism, Naegleria fowleri, which travels via the nose to the brain via the olfactory nerve.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, infections from the amoeba are rare, but most cases of the disease are fatal. During the past decade, 34 infections were reported in the United States.

State officials lifted the boil water notice last week after flushing the city's water supply, testing environmental samples and providing free cases of water to residents.

This application was submitted to the TCEQ on September 21, 2020. The application will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, TCEQ Houston regional office, 5425 Polk Street, Suite H, 3rd Floor, and available at http://www.swslp.com/wpcontent/uploads/2020/09/Permit_9442_Public_Notice.pdf beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Houston regional office of the TCEQ.

The executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. An amendment application that is not subject to public notice or an opportunity for a contested case hearing is also being reviewed. The reasons for any changes or incorporations, to the extent they are included in the renewed permit, may include the enhancement of operational control at the plant or enforceability of the permit. **The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.**

PUBLIC COMMENT You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. **The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published.** After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. **If no hearing request is received within this 15 day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided.** According to the Texas Clean Air Act § 382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues submitted during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility; and (7) a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period. If the request is made by a group or association, one or more members who have standing to request a hearing must be identified by name and physical address. The interests the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for a contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material air quality concerns submitted during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

Travis Lindy Davenport

Travis Lindy Davenport, 92, of Crosby, died peacefully with his family around him on the quiet Sunday morning of October 4, 2020.

He was born in the Red River Plains of Oklahoma to Jim Davenport and Dora Ashford Davenport on August 27, 1928.

When Travis was 19, a beautiful redhead captured his attention at a dance, and he spent the next 69 years by her side. Together Travis and Geraldine raised their children Ronnie, Pam and Mike and grew into a tight-knit clan that eventually included six grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren. Travis mourned Geraldine's loss greatly these past three-plus years, and his family is comforted in knowing he no longer suffers their separation.

Travis worked hard most of his life to provide for those he loved, beginning at age 13 picking cotton. And—like many from his generation—he took any honest work he could find: pin setter at a bowling alley, grocery store butcher, garbage collector, refinery worker. He learned to pitch from his father, Jim, and Travis stood proudly on the pitcher's mound everywhere from his high school in Soper, Oklahoma to the Yankees minor leagues. He knelt in his front yard in the evenings after work



and taught his own sons to throw fastballs and curveballs. He stood by the dugout and sat in the stands to root for his grandchildren. And with the Astros game on in the background, he sat in his recliner and tossed a ball gently to his great-grandchildren.

Travis cherished his faith in God, time with his family, being a member of the Choctaw Nation, Geraldine's German chocolate cake, any kind of sports competition, watching a good Western (and lots of mediocre ones too), and sweet tea. He said "Yello" when he answered the phone and "Gee-ads!" when he was surprised. In the late 50s and early 60s Travis helped develop the Crosby Little League Association, known today as the Crosby Sports Association. He also held season tickets for Crosby High School football games from 1948 until the end of his life, continuing to purchase them long after his health allowed him to attend games. He was proud to call Crosby home.

Travis was preceded in death by his wife Geraldine Atchley Davenport; his son Mike Davenport and son-in-law, Ralph Blaha; his parents, Jim Davenport and Dora Ashford Davenport; his brothers James Davenport, Kirk Davenport, Gray Olson Davenport, John "Wes"

Davenport, Jack Davenport, Bobby Jake "Bob" Davenport and Gary Buford, and his sisters, Fleda Dorthia Blankenship and Juanita Conca.

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Bill O'Brien era over, can season be salvaged? Rodgers, Brady matchup should be a special one

The Bill O'Brien era ended in Houston on Monday, Oct. 5 when the Texans brass gave him his walking papers after the team got off to a 0-4 start. It was probably the right thing to do.

Thus far in the 2020 season, the Texans have struggled on both sides of the ball and after losing at home to what was a winless Minnesota team the day before, Texans chairman and chief executive officer Cal McNair had seen enough.

Romeo Crennel will serve as the interim head coach for the remainder of the season as the search for a new head coach begins.

The Texans brain trust should give serious consideration to hiring a head coach who can take quarterback Deshaun Watson to the next level. Watson has the talent to be a top five QB in the NFL, but it seems his game has been stymied under O'Brien's tutelage.

Many Texans fans will want Watson's former college coach, Clemson head coach Dabo Swiney to get the job, but I think Swiney has his eyes set on replacing Nick Saban when he decides to step down as Alabama's head coach. Swiney is an Alabama graduate and was a member of the 1992 national championship team. I don't know if he would be interested in an NFL job, but the Texans should at least see if he would be interested.

While fans wait for a new head coach, there is still a season to be played and this week the Texans are supposed to travel to Nashville to face the Titans. Tennessee has been hit hard by the coronara virus and there is no guarantee the game will be played on Sunday. It will probably be a wait-and-see situation.

The most intriguing game of Week 6 in the NFL will take place in Tampa where Aaron Rodgers and the Green Bay Packers will face Tom Brady and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. It's a meeting of two future Hall of Famers and could very well be a shootout.

The Cleveland Browns will find out if they are



for real when they take on the Pittsburgh Steelers in the Steel City in a key AFC North contest, while Arizona visits a Dallas Cowboys team that is struggling on defense on Monday Night Football.

In college action, there are a couple of good ones slated for the SEC as LSU will visit Florida and Georgia will face Alabama in prime time on Saturday evening.

Before we take a look at those games and a handful of others, we must review last week's record. It wasn't a good week as a 3-6 record (the Pittsburgh-Tennessee game was postponed due to the corona virus outbreak among the Titans) brought the season record to 24-18 (57%).

Now, onto this week's game.

NCAA

Oklahoma State at Baylor: Mike Gundy's Oklahoma State Cowboys appear to be the team to beat in the Big 12 in the early going. They won their first three games, have an explosive offense and a pretty solid defense. They face a Baylor team that lost in double overtime at West Virginia two weeks ago. The Bears must try to slow down OSU running back Chubba Hubbard (339 yards, four TDs) if they hope to pull off the upset in Waco on Saturday. OSU has been led by true freshman quarterback Shane Illingsworth (483 yards, 3 TDs) who has filled in admirably for injured starter Spencer Sanders. If Sanders is back for this one, he gives Gundy just one more weapon on offense for the Bears to handle. My pick, Oklahoma State 33, Baylor 30

Texas A&M at Mississippi State:

Jimbo Fisher's team heads to Starkville on Saturday to face Mike Leach's Mississippi State Bulldogs and could very well be riding a two-game losing streak (they hosted No. 4-ranked Florida last Saturday), so a win is a must for the Ags on Saturday. Two weeks ago, Fisher's team was routed by Alabama, 52-24. After tying the game at 14-all, the Aggies watched as Saban's team outscored them 38-10 the rest of the way. A&M needs quarterback Kellen Mond (567 yards, 4 TDs) to step up. Look for running back Ainias Smith (8 receptions, 108 yards, 2 TDs) to be a bigger factor in the offense. The A&M defense will look to slow Leach's offense, which is led by quarterback K.J. Costello (936 yards, 6 TDs, 5 interceptions). After opening the season with an upset win at LSU, the Bulldogs were upset at home the following week by Arkansas. My pick, Texas A&M 34, Mississippi State 26

LSU at Florida: The defending national champions hit the road to Gainesville to take on the fourth-ranked Florida Gators and quarterback Kyle Trask (684 yards, 10 TDs). After losing their season opener, LSU rebounded in Week 2 with a 41-7 pasting of Vanderbilt. The Tigers are led by quarterback Myles Brennan (682 yards, 7 TDs). Trask and tight end Kyle Pitts (12 receptions, 227 yards, 6 TDs in two games) and the rest of the speedy Gator skill players should be too much for a rebuilt LSU defense. Florida has some issues on defense, but the offense is potent and will score enough to wrap up a comfortable win on Saturday in The Swamp. My pick, Florida 41, LSU 30

Georgia at Alabama: The Game of the Week in the SEC and in college

football pits No. 3-ranked Georgia against No. 2-ranked Alabama in prime time on Saturday night.

As was mentioned earlier, the Crimson Tide rolled over A&M two weeks ago 52-24 as quarterback Mac Jones (684 yards, 6 TDs) and wide receiver Jaylen Waddle (13 receptions, 276 yards, 3 TDs) and John Metchie III (7 receptions, 223 yards, 2 TDs) struck for big play after big play against the Aggies. Saban's team will face a much better defense this week, one that limited Auburn to a measly six points in the 'Dawgs 27-6 win two weeks ago in Athens. The key to Georgia pulling off the upset will be how well young quarterback Stetson Bennett (451 yards, 3 TDs) handles the pressure the Tide defense will surely bring. 'Bama has speed all over it defense and will look to rattle Bennett early and often. I think Georgia hangs around in this one, but Alabama's big-play ability on offense will take over in the second half as the Tide rolls to another victory. My pick, Alabama 31, Georgia 18

NFL

Kansas City at Buffalo: Another good one for Thursday Night Football has Patrick Mahomes (1,134 yards, 11 TDs) and the Chiefs visiting the Bills. Both teams won their first four games and both appear to be headed to the playoffs. Two weeks ago, Buffalo picked up a nice road win at Las Vegas, while the Chiefs took care of New England 26-10. Mahomes is once again spreading the ball around to a host of talented runners and wide receivers. The best of the bunch are tight end Travis Kelce (24 receptions, 297 yards, 2 TDs) and speedy wide receiver Tyreek Hill (19 receptions, 286 yards, 4 TDs). Buffalo QB Josh Allen (1,326 yards, 12 TDs) has some weapons as well, especially wide receiver Stefon Diggs (26 receptions, 403 yards, 2 TDs). Buffalo is also strong on defense and if that unit can slow Mahomes a bit, I think the Bills can pull off the upset. My pick,

Buffalo 26, Kansas City 23

Cleveland at Pittsburgh: Don't look now, but the Browns might be for real. Two weeks ago, Cleveland put up 49 points against Dallas on the way to an 11-point victory as wide receiver Odell Beckham (16 receptions, 236 yards, 3 TDs) had a monster game with two touchdown receptions and a 50-yard TD run. Quarterback Baker Mayfield (729 yards, 7 TDs) is doing a better job of protecting the ball this year, but he will face his sternest test of the season when he faces a Pittsburgh defense that is one of the best on the NFL. The offense is pretty decent as well led by quarterback Ben Rothlisberger (777 yards, 7 TDs), running back James Conner (224 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receiver JuJu Smith-Schuster (17 receptions, 160 yards, 3 TDs). The Browns will be without star running back Nick Chubb, who suffered a knee injury against Dallas. That could be a key loss for this game. I think Cleveland sticks around in this one, but look for Big Ben to outduel Mayfield as the Steelers continue to be the team to beat in the AFC North. My pick, Pittsburgh 30, Cleveland 26

Houston at Tennessee: The Texans head to Tennessee with hopes of getting back into the AFC South race and it won't be easy when they face a Titans team that won its first three games before the league shut them down due to an outbreak of the corona virus that struck players and staff. If Houston is going to win this game, the defense must do a better job of stopping the run and that will be a lot to ask when it faces Derrick Henry (319 yards, 2 TDs). Henry is a brute and his ability to move the chains sets up the play-action passing game for quarterback Ryan Tannehill (809 yards, 6 TDs). Watson (1,092 yards, 6 TDs) will have his hands full against a very good Titans defense. I think it's going to be a long afternoon in the Music City for the hometown

team. My pick, Tennessee 33, Houston 18

Green Bay at Tampa Bay: What a game this has the potential to be and luckily, it's slated for the 3:25 window on FOX Sunday afternoon. The Packers, who are coming off their bye, should be well rested for this one as quarterback Aaron Rodgers (1,214 yards, 13 TDs) should have his top wide receiver Davante Adams back after Adams missed three weeks with a hamstring injury. The Bucs will not only have to contend with Rodgers and Adams, but a well-rested Aaron Jones (374 yards, 6 total TDs). Brady (1,122 yards, 11 TDs) has guided TB to three wins against one loss and two weeks ago he showed the Tampa fans how special he is when he tossed five TD passes to five different receivers in the Buc's 38-31 win over the Chargers. Look for wide receiver Mike Evans (17 receptions, 230 yards, 5 TDs) to have a big day against a suspect GB secondary as Brady leads the Bucs to their biggest win of the young season. My pick, Tampa Bay 31, Green Bay 29

Arizona at Dallas: This could be another shootout on Monday Night Football as Kyler Murray (919 passing yards, 7 TDs/265 rushing yards, 4 TDs) take on Dak Prescott (1,690 yards, 9 TDs) and the Cowboys. Dallas will need a big night from Prescott, running back Ezekiel Elliott (273 yards, 3 TDs) and wide receivers Amari Cooper (37 receptions, 401 yards, 1 TD) and CeeDee Lamb (21 receptions, 309 yards, 2 TDs) because their defense is pitiful. That unit surrendered 49 points and gobs of yards to the Browns two weeks ago and the Cardinals could do the same to them on Monday night. Dallas needs to get on a roll because it appears the Eagles may have righted the ship with their upset win at San Francisco two weeks ago. My pick, Dallas 36, Arizona 33
