### 140 million votes nationwide, Biden on top; Mayor Moya reelected in Galena Park; Constables Garcia, Eagleton win

HARRIS COUNTY –
Voters went to the polls in record numbers for both early voting, and election day votes. In the county over 1,610,000 votes were recorded, and in the nation over 140,000,000 votes were cast.

Unofficial results have been tabulated for all but the Presidential race, where at press time five states were still counting, and with Joe Biden leading, Donald Trump has filed lawsuits challenging the results.

In Harris County, Biden

In Harris County, Biden received 56% of the vote, or 911,913 while Trump received 43% or 699,771 votes. However, statewide in Texas Trump had the lead, as did most Republicans seeking office.

For Texas Senator, John Cornyn was reelected over Democratic challenger M.J. Hegar.

Incumbent U.S. Representatives Sheila Jackson Lee was returned with 73% of the votes, and Sylvia Garcia with 71%.

For state office, Carol Alvarado was reelected for State Senate in District 6,

and State Representatives reelected included Armando Walle, Senfronia Thompson, and Ana Hernandez, all running unopposed.

In a strongly contested race for District Attorney, Kim Ogg retained her seat with 54% of the vote, against challenger Mary Nan Huffman.

For Harris County At-

For Harris County Attorney, Christian Dashaun Menefee defeated John Nation with 55% of the vote in his favor. Menefee is the first minority race HC Attorney. He replaces the retiring Vince Ryan.

For Harris County Sheriff, the popular incumbent Ed Gonzalez defeated Joe Danna. Gonzalez had 57% of the vote, Danna 43%.

Two races had candidates trying to regain their old positions. For Tax Assessor-Collector, Ann Harris Bennett defeated the previous office holder Chris Daniel, with 53% of the vote. For County Clerk, Teneshia Hudspeth had 54% against previous clerk Stan Stanart.

Harris County had an important race for County Commissioner. With incumbent commissioner

Steve Radack retiring, the voters in Precinct 5 sent another Republican to the panel. Tom Ramsey was elected with 52% of the vote, versus Michael Moore with 47%

with 47%.

Two Constable races were followed with great interest. In Precinct 2, Jerry Garcia had defeated incumbent Chris Diaz in the primary, and in the general election he won over the Republican challenger Daniel Vela with 61.6% of the vote. Garcia had 51,333 votes, Vela had 32,103

otes. and Noe Espa: In Constable district for Position 6.

Precinct 3, popular incumbent Sherman Eagleton was challenged by Andre Hines. Eaglewon got 60% of the vote, or 72,429 ballots, versus Hines 48,064 or 40%

### GALENA PARK

In a highly contested Mayorial race, incumbent Esmeralda Moya was returned to office, with 51% of the vote, or 1,318 ballots. Challengers Maria Cortez-Ochoa had 16% or 420 votes, and Barry Ponder garnered 33% or 863 votes.

On the Galena Park commissioner's court, Zenaida Granados won 55% to return to Position 1; Veronica Garcia 67% for Position 3; and Maricela Serna got 51.4% for Position 4.

For Channelview school trustees, Shumona Collins had 51.4% and defeated Keith Liggett in Position 1, and Hector Martinez won over Steve Dennis with 59.7% in Position 2.

Galena Park ISD trustees elected to the board included Herbert Sanchez, with 42% for Position 5, and Noe Esparza with 56%

# Harris County makes \$1,200 in COVID-19 relief money available

HARRIS COUNTY — Harris County has issued a new \$40 million COV-ID-19 relief fund to help residents in need during the pandemic that will be administered by Houston Catholic Charities.

It's set to open on Monday, Nov. 2, and will accept applications through Friday, Nov. 6.

The program will provide one-time payments of \$1,200 to up to 33,333 families struggling with financial hardships related to COVID-19.

The payments will be distributed in two rounds. The first round is already underway and is assisting families who applied, but did not receive help from the county's coronavirus relief program launched earli-

er this summer.

The second "public" round begins on Monday when anyone can apply.

The money can be used for any type of emergency expense, such as housing, food, utilities, healthcare, childcare and transportation.

Families can apply on their own without cooperation from a landlord or anyone else.

"Thousands of families across Harris County have struggled to overcome the financial damage from COVID-19," said Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo. "While this relief will not reach everyone who needs it, we must do everything in our power to help those who are vulnerable pull through"

The fund is entirely need-based, and the money will be distributed equally across the county's four precincts.

Harris County residents living inside the city of Houston will not be excluded.

Applicants may apply online at CatholicCharitiesHelp.org starting Nov. 2.

Since the application process requires applicants to upload documents, all applications must be submitted online. For those who want help or who have questions may call the hotline at 832-990-1318 Monday through Saturday between 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

# Crosby Superintendent unveils district's finances

CROSBY – The status of Crosby ISD in recovery from the state of financial exegency was recently revealed by Superintendent Dr. Scott Davis.

"The With the adoption of the fiscal year 2020 au- $\operatorname{dit},\operatorname{Crosby}\operatorname{ISD}\operatorname{now}\operatorname{sits}\operatorname{at}$ the TEA minimum recommendation for fund balance totals. TEA recommends an unassigned fund balance of 15%of the current year's expenditure budget. Crosby's unassigned fund balance is now sitting at 19.78% of our 2020-2021 expenditure budget. TEA also recommends a total fund balance of 25% of the current year's expenditure budget. Crosby's total fund balance now sits at 26.42% of the 2020- $2021\ {\rm expenditure}\ {\rm budget}.$ The conservative budget approach and goal of living within our means has, in concert with assistance from HB3 funding, come together with the collective will of the school board and staff to get us to this positive and healthy financial position.

Some questioned how the school's audit might come out this year, Davis addressed this also.

"The 2020 audit had no  $findings, errors, or \, concern$ with the financial position of Crosby ISD. This now finds Crosby ISD with two years of positive and improving audits. Recent conversations with bond rating agencies and bond disclosure groups also find that the finance world agrees with the positive financial improvement and position with changes from negative outlooks to positive outlooks as Crosby ISD seeks to refund bonds in an effort to save over \$15 million in interest over the life of the bonds."

This school year has been especially challenging for most school districtto maintain enrollment and keep up with changing pandemic requirements. "Despite the challenges

of education in a COVID environment, Crosby ISD has only seen a decrease of 1.6% in enrollment from this time last school year. We still have 6331 students attending Crosby ISD. The majority of that decrease can be found in parents of Pre-K and Kindergarten students whose parents have chosen to keep their students at home for one more year while we all learn to live with COVID in our society. We have also seen our numbers of face-to-face students grow from 39% to 58% from the first nine weeks to the second nine weeks Our health safety, and cleaning efforts have helped Crosby ISD keep our active COVID cases low after an initial rise when we all came back to face-to-face. Honestly, that was to be expected as everyone had largely been apart since Spring Break last school year. Now, we are working to maintain academic rigor and contact with our students in both

parents and staff have worked together well to navigate these uncharted territories with remote instruction. Our first nineweek failure rates for students did increase from the same grading periods in 2019-2020, but our teachers are tirelessly working to reach out to students in remote settings to help them succeed. As an educator for 28 years, it will always be better for the majority of students to attend school face-to-face with teachers whenever that is possible and practical. I respect parents' decisions to keep kids home during this pandemic, but whenever possible, it is more productive for the majority of students to come to campuses.

Davis had a word for his fellow workers in the school district.

"I am most proud of our teachers and other support staff. Truly, these last months have been something out of our wildest imaginations! While we used to only speak of grit. determination, and perseverance, our amazing district employees now display those traits on a daily basis. We are humbled to work for those heroes and support them as they continue to make positive differences in the lives of our wonderful students. This is why Crosby ISD exists. We absolutely had to address the financial problems, but now that those difficulties have been addressed and we are moving positively forward. We can re-engage the lion+fs share of the focus to moving Crosby ISD into the fugreat possibility."

Houston Health Department, partners announce free COVID-19 testing schedule for week of November 2

HOUSTON - The Houston Health Department and its agency partners are announcing the schedule for sites offering free COVID-19 tests the week of November 2, 2020. The week will offer 13 free testing sites across Houston, including three mega sites.

Houston Health Department The Houston Health Department, in partnership with the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services and the State of Texas, will offer testing (self nasal swab) at its Southwest Multi-Service Center, 6400 High Star Drive. The site has a 1,250 daily test capacity and will pen 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

Appointments are available at doineedacovid19test.com. Onsite registration is also avail-

The department also offers free drive-thru testing (self nasal swab) at the Aramco Services Company, 9009 W. Loop South. The mega testing site will open Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. It remains open until reaching daily capacity of 1,000 tests. People wanting to get tested at the Aramco site can call

People wanting to get tested at the Aramco site can call the department (COVID-19 Call Center at 832-393-4220 between 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. to receive an access code.

Izzy began training to be a therapy dog immediately, and she started joining Axl and their "parents" at the funeral home every day. Izzy responded well to interacting with people and always seemed comfortable with the unique scenarios and equipment that is encountered at the funeral home and places they visit.

Once the Conleys felt confident that she could meet all of the requirements of the therapy dog certification, Izzy went through the testing process. Following in big brother Axl's pawprints, Izzy became a certified therapy dog.

Axl and Izzy have their own scheduled therapy visits where they are happily welcomed by the residents and staff every week at a local retirement home, along with their regular therapy visits at a local rehabilitation facility, and of course, both working every day at their full-time jobs at Carter-Conley Funeral Home.

"Axl and Izzy are always on the move and are happy to ride along with us wherever we go," the Conleys said. ### It's not just Election Day any longer

For most Texans, Election Day is a misnomer.

More Texans voted early this year than cast their ballots during all of the 2016 general election. Many more voted early than went to the polls on Election Day.

A record 9.7 million people, or 57% of registered voters, completed their civic duty during the extended early voting period of Oct. 13-30, or by mail, according to the Texas Secretary of State.

Voters don't register by party in Texas, so political pundits could only specu-late about whether the record early turnout favored either Democrats or Republicans. Either way, the intense voter interest is unquestioned. When final election results are in, the state's percentage of egistered voters who cast ballots was expected to surpass 60% for the first time since the early 1990s.

#### CHANGES PROPOSED TO **SEXUAL ASSAULT LAWS**

Look for laws regarding sexual assault to change in the upcoming legislative

The Sexual Assault Survivors' Task Force has issued its first report to the Texas Legislature. The group began meeting earlier this year after being created by the passage of House Bill 1590 during the 2019 session.

The report includes 11 policy recommendations for the upcoming legisla-

tive session. A few of those: • Remove law enforcement's ability to decline forensic medical examinations for sexual assaults reported within 120 hours and clarify language pertaining to law enforcement's ability to decline forensic medical examinations outside of 120 hours.


· Require law enforcement to complete the Office of the Attorney General's Law Enforcement Request for Sexual Assault Exam form for every sexual assault that is reported to them.

• Require that a forensic medical exam be offered to all children who report a sexual assault, including cases reported more than 120 hours post-assault.

· Remove the word "alleged" when referencing a sexual assault or other sex offense.

One-third of adult Texans, or 6.3 million people, have experienced sexual assault at some point in their lives, according to a 2015 study by the University of Texas at Austin's Institute on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault

This has been a year that defies explanations

I spoke with my parents a week or so ago. We have used Zoom and other types of video to communicate but, more often than not, I just call up my dad, he puts me on speaker, and we chat as we always have.

My parents were about to go skiing. They live in the north, but they don't live on the North Pole. It was much too early to cross-country ski, but they'd had an early snow and my mom decided they should give it a try.

"You know what is going to happen," I told them.

"Uh-huh," my dad said.
"First the snow is going to stick to the bottom of your skis, then the leaves are going to stick," I told them. "You are going to be stuck in place!" I felt like the voice of doom, truth-telling to my very experienced 80-some-year-old parents.
"Yeah," my mother ad-

mitted, "I'm sure you're right!" I could tell this would not deter her for a minute.

My husband, Peter, and I were preparing for a visit from my former brother-in-law, Jason. This is the first visitor we've had in eight months and his visit precipitated a lot of housecleaning. There are places we just don't get around to cleaning until we are con-fronted with the prospect

of company.
"The baseboards in the bathroom were filthy!" Peter informed me.

"Your desk is covered in dust!" I told him.

We cleaned places we hadn't looked at closely in three-quarters of a year so that we could entertain Jason, who spent almost the entire time on our pa-tio, which Peter swept for the occasion. Peter made his famous enchiladas, and I made my Aunt Betty's apple squares, and it was a lovely evening. Peter built a fire and we sat around and talked until much later than I usually

stay up.

Jason's father, my former father-in-law, is 94 and failing and Jason is driving all the way from California to Wisconsin to see him—even though he knows he'll have to visit his father through a window, even though he'll have to drive through a lot of ill-ness and some early winter storms to get there.
"I didn't think I was go

ing!" Jason told me, just before he left. He sounded a little surprised. But he ended up renting

a car and is driving to see his dad, who now weighs only 100 pounds, who may or may not recognize him when he gets there, and who is no longer able to

"I wasn't going to go," Jason repeated. "But now I'm going.'

For quite a while, I've been trying to let go of expectations. People say that holding too tightly to our expectations only leads to unhappiness, but I've always had a hard time letting them go. I like the idea that I have some idea of where my life is headed and what is going to hap-

A few hours after I spoke with my parents, I saw a photo posted on Facebook of my mom on her skis in the woods. Their house was nowhere in sight so they must have made it some distance I'm sure it wasn't great skiing-but that wasn't realthe point, was it?

If this year has taught me anything, it's that maybe I need to let go of some of my expectations of how things work. This isn't the year for them.

I looked again at the photo of my mom She's skiing in the early snow and smiling.

### Clemson visits ND in meeting of the top five teams; Texans return from Bye week with trip to Jacksonville

It's been a tough season thus far for Texas' two professional football teams.

The Texans lost six of their first seven games and return from their bye week with a trip to Jacksonville to take on the only team they have beaten so far this season. Up I-45, the Dallas Cowboys entered the 2020 season with Super Bowl aspirations, but have looked anything but a SB contender. After losing quarterback Dak Prescott to a horrible ankle injury, head coach Mike McCarthy turned to former Cincinnati starting QB Andy Dalton to lead the offense. Dalton was knocked silly on a cheap shot by Washington linebacker Jon Bostic two weeks ago (Bosfrom the game) and might be able to return this week for a home date against Pittsburgh. This November birthstone is the transparent yellow to brownish orange variety of quartz which has been used in jewelry for thousands of years. Citrine has been a popular gemstone since ancient times and has shared a history of mistak-en identities with the other November birthstone, topaz. As a result, people thought citrine had the same powers as topaz. They believed the citrine birthstone could soothe tempers and calm the wearer.


The ancient Greeks carved rock crystal ornaments that glistened like permafrost. Roman pontiffs wore rings set with massive purple amethysts, and citrine has been reported in Roman jewelry. It was particularly popular in colorful Scottish jewelry from the Victorian era. Citrine, believed to derive from the French word for "lemon" (citron), is given for the thirteenth wedding anniversary.

Today, most of the citrine in the marketplace results from the heat treatment of amethyst. With its ready availability in a broad range of sizes, citrine birthstone is one of the most affordable and desired yellow gemstones. The top sources for this November birthstone are Bolivia, Spain, Madagascar, Mexico and Uruguay. Amethyst that's typically heat treated to a citrine color is mined mostly in Brazil.

Those memories from her childhood pushed her to incorporate domestic violence awareness programs into the schools She also was determined to work with community groups to help raise funds for back to school supplies, uniforms and for holiday gifts. She frequently shared her story with students as a way to encourage them to apply for college admission as well as scholarships.

Perhaps those who were not successful in winning their elections can use their testimony to touch lives and make a difference. While it hurts our pride and wounds our ego to spend time and money for an unsuccessful campaign, we can still count our blessings. The candidates had supporters, financial or volunteers and should count their blessings. They gained community exposure and the experience of being a candidate. If they choose to run in another election, they have an advantage over a newcomer.

For those who ran an unsuccessful race, breathe and take a few days to rest and then get up and get busy. The community has much to learn from your experience as well as from the winner's experience. Do not "fall off the face of the Earth" but instead look at how you can give back to the community in other ways. And count
