Harris County opens on-line Vaccine registration

on Tuesday, January 26th, Harris County Public Health (HCPH) will launch a new COVID-19 Vaccination Portal for residents who meet the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) criteria for receiving a vaccine. The portal will allow $individuals\ to\ be\ placed\ on$ a waitlist and contacted once vaccines and appointments are available. The waitlist will be available via the vaccine information link ReadyHarris.org and https://vacstrac.hctx.net

HOUSTON — Starting (832) 927-8787 once the portal is live to be placed on the waitlist.

Harris County's new "Smart Waitlist" system will not use a first-come, first-served process for allocating vaccines. In order to ensure fair access for elderly residents, working families, and vulnerable populations, registrants on the waitlist will instead be selected through a prioritization and randomization process in accordance with state guidelines. Only individuals who fall under the DSHS Phase 1A and 1B category will be eligible to receive the vaccine at this stage. Those who are not qualified to receive the ternet access can also call vaccine under 1A or 1B

will still be able to be placed on the waitlist but will not be contacted to schedule an appointment until the State of Texas expands eligibility beyond 1A and 1B, likely not un- tacted to schedule an til the Spring or Summer

Priority phases:

Phase 1A: Individuals in Phase 1A who register for the waitlist will be prioritized before those in Phase 1B to ensure everyone in Phase 1A has an opportunity to receive the vaccine. Within Phase 1A, individuals will be selected at random from the following age cohorts, with oldest cohorts prioritized first: 75+, 65-74, 55-64, 45-54, 35-44, 25-34, 18-24.

Phase 1B: Individuals in Phase 1B who register for the waitlist will be selected at random from the following age cohorts, with oldest cohorts prioritized first: 75+, 65-74, 55-64, 45-54, 35-44, 25-

Future Phases:

Individuals who are not qualified to receive the vaccine under Phases 1A or 1B will still be able to register for the waitlist. However, they will not be con-

Jacinto City's Finest - Lt. Walker and Dispatcher Solis

Jacinto City, TX. - January 26, 2021 - It will be eight years ago since March 20th, 2013 when Jacinto City's Lieutenant Dennis Walker was critically wounded while backing-up another officer, Sgt. J. Simpson-Castaneda who had been dispatched to investigate a family disturbance call with a family member threatening them with a gun.

When Sgt. Castaneda entered the house the deranged gunman opened fire, the bullet striking her and knocking her to the floor. Lt. Walker heard the gunshots as he arrived and without hesitation ran into the house where the gunman was about to shoot the

wounded officer again. Walker got death, the gunman and Walker the gunman's attention away from exchanged shots and the gunman the wounded officer preventing her fled for cover to the bathroom but Continued, see JC's Finest, page 8

shots to the chest. The suspect later surrendered and was subsequently sentenced

Castaneda and Walker were hospitalized and both underwent months of medical treatments before recovering. Castaneda gave up her police career but -Walker remains in active duty in the police department

According to Police Chief Joe Avala who said Lt. Walker is a key player in the department and the supervisor over the communications division. He performs detective investigations on homicides, thefts, narcotics and street patrolling. In his off time he's a State Licensed Firearms

When North Channel Star writer and former mayor and police chief Allan Jamail interviewed Walker for this story he asked him how after being wounded in the gun battle has it affected his police work. Lt. Walker said, "It made me more cau-

Texas proposes \$119.7B yearly budget, down 3%

as Speaker of the House Dade Phelan today released the following statement on the House's base budget for the 2022-2023

"The Texas House's base budget prioritizes the needs of Texans during this consequential moment in our state's history and advances the Legislature's commitment to the historic public education and school finance and property tax reforms passed last session. The decisions we make during the 87th legislative session will have lasting effects on the future of our state, which is why the House will work to improve our business climate, foster economic prosperity, and do what's right for our students. I am grateful to the Members of the House Appropriations Committee and the hardworking committee staff for their efforts throughout this process."

The House base budget recommendations for FY 2022-23 appropriate \$119.7 billion in general revenue, a decrease of

three (3) percent adjusted for population and inflation. The House budget recommendations are \$3.2 billion below the spending limit of 7.06 percent adopted by the Legislative Budget Board in November 2020, and maintain a maiority of the five (5) percent reductions identified by state agencies in 2020.

Significant provisions of House base budget recommendations include the following:

• Maintains the Legislature's commitment to House Bill 3, the school finance reform legislation passed last session, by

funding the Foundation School Program (FSP) at \$53 billion in all funds and \$41.2 billion in general revenue, an increase of \$3.8 billion. The House budget adds \$3.1 billion in general revenue to fund enrollment growth, an additional \$992 million in general revenue for tax compression; and \$1.1 billion in general revenue to replace one-time CARES Act funding provided in

CAPLE ANNUAL STATE OF THE PLANT REPORT Pandemic slows progress on new PO/TBA plant

CHANNELVIEW - The Lyondell-Basell Plant hosted their Annual CAPLE State of the Plant last Thursday night, January 21, where community members, plant leaders, and media representatives discussed how the plant has held up in the midst of the pandemic. The meeting was moderated by Anne Gowan. Plant Manager Chris Cain opened up the night explaining that 2020 has been a "challenging year." In spite of the challenges though Cain says "I'm proud of how are plant, company and people have dealt with the pandemic and still making sure that our plant is safe and successful."

There was an update on the new PO/ $\,$ TBA plant expansion project. Site Integration Manager Dean Hoffman gave a detailed status update. The new PO/TBA plant will be the world's largest. Hoffman said in April due to COVID-19. the number of people working construction on the project decreased from approximately 1,600 contractors to 200 contractors per day. In late May and early June, LyondellBasell (LYB) began to increase the number of construction workers to pre-COVID-19 numbers. The project will peak in mid-2020 with approximately 1900 contractors. The new plant will be completed in December 2022.

Cain said that Lyondell wants to be a responsible good neighbor in the communities that they operate. On the health and safety front in 2020 LyondellBasell's total recordable incident rate put then in $\,$ See CAPLE Meeting, Page 5 $\,$

Phases 1A and 1B. Once individuals are selected to receive a vaccine, they will be provided a link with instructions on how to select a location and time to get vaccinated at a HCPH site.

The launch of this new portal and waitlist expands the previous process by allowing eligible residents to sign up for vaccines on their own directly. Since December, Harris County Public Health has administered 27,426 vaccines to eligible residents. less than a week after receiving each shipment. To date, HCPH has so far been reaching out directly to and vaccinating frontline workers under Phase 1A and specific groups in Phase 1B who have high contacts or will have trouble obtaining a vaccine outside of HCPH.

As more supply of vaccine becomes available. HCPH will continue to en-

sure allocation and administration of vaccines are done in ways that are efficient, fair, and equitable, and that vulnerable communities have equal access to vaccines.

Residents who are selected for an appointment should show up no more than 15 minutes before their scheduled time to ensure the process flows smoothly. Those who are not eligible or who show up without an appointment at an HCPH site will be turned away. All appoint-ments are based on vaccine availability, and current appointments may be adjusted due to any possible changes to the depart-ment's vaccine allotment.



Lawmakers start \$7 Billion away from Budget target

Texas House and Senate leaders appear to agree on their proposed budgets. Next, they just have to figure out how to cut \$7.2 bil-

Senate Finance Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, worked with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick to propose a state budget of \$119.7 billion in general funds. House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, proposed the same budget figure, indicating a collaborative spirit at the start of the 87th session

That spirit will be tested as legislators try to meet Comptroller Glen Hegar's budgeted revenue forecast of \$112.5 billion.

"We have many tools available to balance this budget, which will require us to re-establish our priorities, stretch every dollar and find more efficient ways to deliver services," Nelson said in a statement.

Among the priorities

she set: Maintaining the education funding increases and teacher pay raises established in 2019, including \$3.1 billion to fund enroll ment growth for public education and \$1 billion in additional state aid related to property tax compression in the 2022-23 biennium.

\$5 billion for payroll growth and continued reforms to the Teacher Retirement System passed last session. \$8.1 billion to fund

higher education institution formulas.

Combined projected funding of \$8 billion for mental health across 24 state agencies, including an increase of \$19.5 million to maintain operations for the Texas Child Mental Health Care Consortium; more than \$1 million in new funding to create a peer-to-peer counseling network and increase ac cess to licensed mental

HIGHLIGHTS health grant programs.

State & Capital

\$352.6 million for women's health programs, including the continuation of the Healthy Texas Women program's enhanced postpartum care services implemented by the Legislature last session.

\$57.6 million to continue fighting human trafficking through prevention, detection, victim services and the justice

\$1.3 million to performnecessary maintenance on the Texas Election Administration Management System, which manages voter registration in Texas.

\$39.1 million in new appropriations to fortify security at the Texas Capitol, including additional troopers and enhanced safety measures

\$30.4 billion to the Texas Department of Trans-portation to address the state's transportation needs, including \$26.4 billion dedicated for highway planning, design, construction and maintenance.

Phelan's statement indicated the same support for public education and also included an appropriation of \$74.2 billion for the Texas Medicaid program, including \$27.4 billion in general revenue.The general revenue.The House version includes an additional \$920 million to address projected caseload

STRAWBERRY FIELDS FOREVER

You don't find many strawberry fields in Texas, but that could change if a seed planted by the Texas Department of Agriculture takes root.

The department has awarded a second grant to the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service to research and test how the state's farmers can make more money growing strawberries

Leading the project is AgriLife extension's Russ Wallace, a horticulturist in Lubbock. You might call him the John Lennon of Texas strawberries.

"We're extremely excitlearned thus far to successfully grow strawberries in Texas and increase profitability," Wallace said in an AgriLife news release. "This is the next step in our ongoing research where we'll be doing more work with shading trials, fine-tuning fertilization and additional work with herbicides."

Strawberries have some juicy potential as a specialty crop because consumers have shown an increasing hunger for locally grown produce, ag experts say, although they don't often use had puns

One of the research sites is Atascosa County's Poteet, the self-proclaimed strawberry capital of Tex-as. Poteet Strawberry Festival organizers recently announced the event will go on April 9-11.

Some readers of the festival's Facebook page criticized the move as having potential to spread COVID-19 faster than jam

Festival organizers responded that "we've been working and hoping for a blessing that we can continue, within allowable restrictions or capabilities, but still continuing as possible. We hope all goes well.



All because a fair election deposed the man who breathed life into their racist delusions. Some of them dream of the helterskelter of a race war. That's where Donald Trump's presidency was leading us and what American citizens rejected Although, the uncomfortable fact is that more than 70 million people continue to believe that the election is unfair, corrupt, a "steal," or whatever word their iconic leader wished to call it. That's who the fascists are now rejecting as too moderate. The majority choice of Joe Biden promises to be a turn toward more moderation, at least until another authoritarian wannabe comes along.



Amethyst often occurs in geodes or in the cavities of granitic rocks. It can be found all over the world, including the United States, Canada Brazil and Zambia. The amethyst is not only the February birthstone, it is also used to celebrate the 6th and 17thyear of marriage.

It has been associated with many myths, legends, religions, and numerous cultures. Some historical accounts say that Saint Valentine had an amethyst ring carved with an image of Cupid. And for those familiar with Old Testament history, amethyst was one of the twelve gemstones that represented the twelve tribes of Israel.



For many years, amethyst was held to be one of the most precious gemstones, often favored by royalty or exclusively by the clergy as a symbol for the diety of Christ. It was even held for many years in the same regard as the diamond. It wasn't until the discovery of more abundant supplies of amethyst that it became a gemstone enjoyed by more than just the wealthiest buyers.

Many wearers of amethyst throughout history and even today prize the gem for its symbolism as well as its beauty. Leonardo da Vinci once said that amethyst helps to quicken intelligence and get rid of evil thoughts. Other qualities like peace, stability, courage and strength are said to be derived from this gemstone. Today, many wearers simply prize the amethyst for its beautiful shade and the way it complements both warm and cool colors.

Communication Specialist Leslie Solis is a true emergency dispatcher, always respectfully giving her name when answering the citizen's phone calls. By dispatchers giving their name and letting a complainant, witness or crime victim know who they're

talking to it has proven to be critical in getting a conviction in criminal court cases. In court when a defense attorney questions a witness's accuracy and asks who in the police department did they report or complain to and the witness is able to give the name of the police dispatcher who they've reported the crime to; it makes their statement about facts etc much more

believable.
