### **GP Yellowjackets swarm** North Side Panthers 57 – 0

Houston, TX. - Saturday, October 9, 2021 at HISD Delmar Stadium the Yellowjackets of-Coach Spiro Amarantos stung the Panthers with a barrage of touchdowns (TD's) and defensively shut them out.

As odd as it sounds the Jackets this year have won two homecoming games, their own plus spoiling the Panther's homecoming by winning it.

Defensively they've been effective in stopping both the run and pass plays by keeping the Panthers to zero yards on their run game and only allowing 25 yards passing. The defense plays as a solid unit with many standouts. This week defensive back Joe Christian Ayala (Jacinto City's Police Chief Joe Avala's grandson) scored twice. He sacked the Panther's quarterback behind the goal for a 2 point safety and later intercepted a pass and made a 41 yard TD.

Amarantos' team looks like their more balanced on offense than last season, they're still lacking a consistent passing game which they must develop if they want to go deeper into the playoffs than the year before.


### Mustangs race past Kingwood 56-0, JV red team dominates 44-7

### Texans oppose unjust Gerrymandering

Austin, TX — Fair Maps Texas will be hosting a virtual press event as the 87th (3) Special Legislative Session gavels in on Monday. The press conference will feature a diverse group of Texans from across the State who have been impacted by our current gerrymandered maps, those who are not usually included at the table when maps are being drawn. These Texans will be speaking on the need for a fair and open districting process, one that fully considers the vital input of communities most impacted. These Texans are calling for better representation, for it's the same legislators that were elected under our heavily gerrymandered maps that are passing regressive policies that are hurting all people, especially poor and lowwealth Black, White, Hispanic, and Asian

In 2011, Texas drew maps that intentionally discriminated against people of color. The federal court that reviewed those maps noted the "exclusion of minority member and public input despite the minority population growth, the misleading information, the secrecy and closed process, and the rushed process." Recently the same panel of judges stated, "Given the record produced in 2011, the State must implement a process that, by any reasonable definition, is 'fair and open.'

At this press conference, Texans will stand together and demand that the Legislature use a "fair and open" redistricting process and demand that the U.S. Congress pass all provisions of the For the People Act and the John Lewis Voting Rights Act, reforms desperately needed in order to protect the rights of voters in the redistricting process.



### Redistricting skirmish continues in the Legislature

Along party lines, the Texas Senate passed a redistricting plan Friday that pits the only two Black members of Congress from Houston against each other and does not create any more minority-majority districts, reported the San Antonio Express-News. Attempts to amend the plan by Democratic legislators were all rejected by the redistrict ing map's principal author, state Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston.

The Texas House has yet to release any redistricting proposals for Congress during the third special session, which ends Oct. 18. If the House doesn't pass a redistrict-ing bill, it's likely both chambers will have to return for a fourth special session this year, the Express-News reported

#### STATE CLIMATOLOGIST: TEXAS IS GETTING HOTTER

The state climatologist recently predicted that Texas will continue to get hotter and for longer periods of time during the next 15 years. In "Ass ment of Historic and Future Trends of Extreme Weather in Texas, 1900-2036," John Nielsen-Gammon predicted the average annual temperature in Texas will be three degrees warmer than the average from  $\,$ 1950-1999, and the number of 100-degree days could nearly double compared to 2000-2018.

The report, sponsored by Texas 2036, a nonpartisan nonprofit group named for the state's bicentennial in 15 years, indicates that the average coldest monthly continue to rise, though that will vary across the state, as will rainfall predictions Extremel evere weather is expected to increase.

Storm surges from hurricanes will tend to be more severe because of

#### **COVID-19 CASES STILL** DROPPING

The number of new COVID-19 cases in the state is steadily dropping, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University, with 45,884 cases reported in the past week, along with 1,201 new deaths. Both categories are down more than 20% compared to the previous week. Lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations in Texas also continue to drop, with 6,730 reported Sunday by the Texas Department of State Health Services a drop of 18% from the previous

The number of Texans fully vaccinated has crossed the 15 million mark, which is 51.6 percent of the state's total population.

#### ARTS COMMISSION SEEKS 'YOUNG MASTERS'

The Texas Commission on the Arts and the Texas Cultural Trust are seeking applications for the 2022 class of Young Masters. 
And maybe that will be the end of my peanut eating.

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# Abbott agenda for 3rd Special Session



AUSTIN – Governor Abbott today issued a proclamation announcing that he will convene a third special legislative session at 10 a.m. on Monday, September 20, 2021. The proclamation identifies 5 agenda items for the third Special Session

"The Texas Legislature now has the opportunity to redraw legislative and congressional districts in accordance with the new census numbers," said Governor Abbott. "In addition to redistricting, there are still issues remaining that are critical to building a stronger and brighter future for all Texans."

Agenda items for the third Special Session will include:

- Legislation relating to the apportionment of the State of Texas into districts used to elect members of the Texas House of Representatives, the Texas Senate, the State Board of Education, and the Unit ed States House of Representatives.
- Legislation providing appropriations from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), Pub. L. No. 117-2.
- Legislation identical to Senate Bill 29 as passed by the Texas Senate in the 87th Legislature, Regular Session, disallowing a student from competing in University Interscholastic League athletic competitions designated for the sex opposite to the student's sex at birth.
- Legislation regarding whether any state or local governmental entities in Texas can man-

date that an individual receive a COVID-19 vaccine and, if so, what exemptions should apply to such mandate.

• Legislation similar to Senate Bill 474 as passed by the 87th Legislature, Regular Session, but that addresses the concerns expressed in the governor's veto statement.

#### Abbott Announces Additional Items For 3rd Special Session

AUSTIN — Governor Greg Abbott today submitted a message to the Secretary of the Senate identifying two additional agenda items for the Third Special Session that began Monday, September 20.


"These two additional agenda items are crucial to improving the quality of life for all Texans," said Governor Abbott. "I look forward to working with my partners in the Legislature to pass these additional items that will lower property taxes and keep Texans safe."

Additional agenda items for the Third Special Session include:

- Legislation providing additional property-tax relief for Texans.
- Legislation proposing a constitutional amendment to further protect the safety of the community, law enforcement, and victims, from accused criminals who may be released on bail, including by giving magistrates the discretion to deny bail under some circumstances to people accused of certain violent, sexual, or trafficking of-

### **ASK DIAMOND JIM**

## Diamond Jim: "Is Amber really a gem?"



Amber is probably best known for its insect and other types of inclusions. Millions of years ago, when amber oozed from countless plants, the substance acted as a sticky trap for ants, bees, termites, and other insects. Flower parts, leaves, and pine needles are also typical amber inclusions, along with gas bubbles. Amber containing



larger animals like scorpions, snails, frogs, and lizards can be very valuable—especially if the animal "inclusions" are preserved intact.

Insects embedded in amber formed the basis of the movie "Jurassic Park." The story centered around the cloning of dinosaurs from DNA found in dinosaur blood sucked up by prehistoric mosquitoes that were subsequently preserved in amber. The movie generated great interest in the gem. Even today, scientists and collectors alike treasure amber that contains suspended animal or plant fragments.

Amber comes in a variety of colors. The most familiar ones are yellow to orange, while a reddish color is rare. Some types of amber are found in the ground. Other types have been freed and carried by tides, ending up on beaches or nearshore areas. The Baltic coast bordering Germany, Poland, and Russia is still an important source of amber. Amber is sometimes called "gold of the North." Its warm luster is featured in beads, carvings, pendants, and cabochons, as well as decorative items like cups, bowls, snuff boxes, and umbrella handles.



A related material, called copal, is also fossilized tree resin, but it's far younger than amber, at less than a million years old.


