teaching career when he saw how athletics can be used to help young kids develop into something positive, he then decided he wanted to be a part of







State steps up DUI enforcement during holidays

MORE FUNDING FOR OPERATION LONE STAR

The state's Public Safety Office has awarded an additional \$38.4 million in funding to cities and counties along the Texas-Mexico border for law enforcement efforts. That amount doubles the funding provided for those

counties since last March. The funding is for specialized law enforcement equipment, labor costs including overtime, construction of additional communication towers and increased jail capacity and travel costs for law enforcement personnel from non-border counties that

provide assistance. "This addi additional funding will strengthen our response to the border crisis and ensure our law enforcement and local partners have the resources they need to keep our communities safe in the federal government's absence," Abbott said.

COVID-19 CASES SPIKE: OMICRON VARIANT SPREADS

As Texans continue to navigate life during a nearly two-year pandemic, the number of new cases of COVID-19 rose during the past week to 51,479, an increase of 41% from the previous week, according to the $\underline{\text{Coronavirus Resource}}$ Center at Johns Hopkins University. The number of new deaths dropped to 266, a decrease of 44%, however. Researchers have said that while the omicron variant is more contagious than the delta variant that sparked the last wave, its symptoms thus far are not as severe.

The number of lab-confirmed hospitalizations of COVID-19 patients stayed at about the same level as the previous week, with 3,376 reported by the Texas Department of State Health Services.

The number of Texans who are fully vaccinated stood at 16.36 million as of Sunday, which is 56.1% of the state's population. In addition, 4.35 million of the state's residents have received an additional dose, according to $\underline{\mathrm{DSHS}}.$

always keeps their junior varsity players ready to move up to the varsity squad. And that's what happened this year, they moved up junior varsity players, plus used their returning juniors and sophomores into a state championship team.

North Shore Mustangs beat the Duncanville Panthers in thriller to capture UIL, 6A Div. 1 Texas high school football state championship in front of 43,000plus spectators. This game was one of the hardest fought contact sport games I've seen in years. They played each other in 2018, 2019 and now 2021 and the Eastside Boys have won all three championships.

The game was a brutal defensive struggle; Coach Kay called it a "slugfest", rightly so. Only 3 touchdowns were made and a pair of field goals. The game's first quarter was nearly scoreless until the Mustangs struck first when 16 year old freshman quarterback Kaleb Bailey hit his older brother Jhalyn Bailey on a short pass to lead 7-0 with 2:55

left in the quarter. Duncanville scored next and tied the game 7-7 at 8:15 into the early 2nd quarter. It remained tied into the 3rd quarter, and then Mustang's Carlos Dominguez kicked a 32 yd field goal with 5:52 to go up 10-7 over the Panthers The Panthers answered back with a 32 yd field goal at 4:23 left in the 3rd. keeping the score tied 10-10 until late in the 4th quarter

Looking like the game may go into overtime with 2:53 late in the fourth quarter Kaleb Bailey delivered a 39-yard touchdown pass to Mustang's David Amador. I cannot let that be the only thing about the TD winning pass. It must be said Bailey's successful pass was only made possible by what looked like an all-pro-offensive-line, he had a perfect protective pocket to pass from, and no Panther was ever within 5 yds of him. Offensive linenen #64 Zach Chavanne #58 Omarion Dudley, #76 Tyler Edwards, #78 Tadderick Mathis, #65 Talmadge Pounds, and safety running back blocker #32 Xavier Owens.

That score gave the Mustangs a 17-10 lead. Kay as he has all season relied on his hardened defense to carry them across the finish line on top.
