### Sales Tax Holiday April 23-25 for **Emergency** Supplies

(AUSTIN) — As we enter severe weather season, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar reminds Texans they can purchase certain items tax-free during the state's sales tax holiday for emergency preparation supplies, which begins at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, April 23, and ends at midnight on Monday, April 25.

"Whether it's fires, freezing temperatures or tornadoes, severe weather conditions can strike at any time, so it is important that families, homes and businesses have the supplies they need to face these and other emergencies," Hegar said. "This tax holiday can help Texans save money while stocking up for emergency situations.

The Comptroller's office estimates shoppers will save more than \$1.5 million in state and local sales taxes during the tax holiday, which was approved by the Texas Legislature in

Galena Park/Jacinto City, TX. - On Tuesday April 12, 2022 Christmas came early for the communities of Galena Park and Jacinto City. Congresswoman Sylvia Garcia of the 29th Texas Congressional District presented \$4 million to be used for community improvement projects. The funds are part of a larger \$10 million nine Community Projects Funding request led and secured by Garcia, and will also include projects for Houston and South Hous-

The funding came from the historic \$1.5 trillion Bipartisan Omnibus Appropriations Bill that President Joe Biden promoted and Rep. Garcia

supported. It provides a substantial increase in spending for domestic and national security but also sends \$13.6 billion in emergency aid to Ukraine in its defense against the Russian invasion. Both parties scored political victories in the spending bill.

Garcia said in Galena Park, "You've heard of The Million Dollar Man, well I'm the Million Dollar Woman. I was proud to champion \$3,000,000 for the City of Galena Park to replace and upgrade their aging water line and fire protection systems. The residents of Galena Park deserve premier public service, and these funds will aid the delivery of safe

# ANOTHER DELAY REQUESTED FOR WASTE PITS, BUT EPA SAYS NO

Consultant deems Remediation Plan "unworkable"

EAST HARRIS COUN-TY - The Responsible Parties who are supposed to be working on the plan to remove toxic dioxin from the Waste Pits in the San Jacinto River, have instead sent a letter to the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) asking for a delay in the schedule, because they state that the current removal methods they had agreed to are unworkable, or "not implementable."

Citing new information they are asking for a revised ROD (Record of Decision) which tells them how to clean up the site.

At a press conference last week, on the banks of the San Jacinto River near the Waste Pits, activist

Jackie Medcalf called for no delay, saying the process has taken too long, and the objections now are simply "smoke and mirrors" in an attempt by the Responsible Parities to

avoid or minimize the remediation work.

In their letter of March 24, the Responsbile Parties state that their engineering consultants have determined that there is more

### When Tragedy Strikes

It has happened too often. Noise from the neighbors wakes me up and I find myself scrolling through social media. Are there any notices for lost children or adults? Which law enforcement agencies have he posted updates about local

Over the past few years, it seems like there have been too many mentions of our community when death or crime is mentioned. One thing comforting is that when it is a tragedy, there are multiple posts that show up. There are always the ones informing us of what has happened. Then there are the ones helping to connect the news with others. Within minutes, we put a human face on the event. And then, there are the so many posts where shock spreads through the community.

If there has been a death, we all want to know if there are loved ones and what do they need? If it was a murder, we want to be sure to share information with the loved ones about resources, including information about how to secure Crime Victim Assistance funding. If there are children involved, the school district is notified and services such as grief counseling and contacting other relatives.

The news spreads and if by chance the victim has been in the community any length of time, there will be multiple groups contacted and beginning to network. Was the person a graduate of one of our local high schools? Did they work in our community? Do they have parents or siblings still in our area? If they have young children, how can we help? Do we need to pick them up? Do we need to get them anywhere to have some sense of normality? How do we start talking to other children about what is happening?

It will be a whirlwind of activities in the next few days.

And the healing will begin because of the amazing people in our lives. We will stay by the sides of those who have lost someone. We will reach out and send a card. We will make phone calls and offer condolences not just to the immediate family, but to friends and coworkers.

But there is so much more to do. We need to pray for the individuals who suffered a loss. We need to pray for the First Responders who were on the scene as the others will be involved in the aftermath. Pray for the judge that will eventually try the case as well as the jurors who have to a decision. Pray for the loved ones who will patiently await justice being served. Likewise, those that are charged with a crime, will have family, and loved ones who are going through their own pain and frustration. And if you know anything about mental illness, you will know that many of those charged with crimes have made poor choices as they were not taking medication for their diagnosis. The stigma of mental illness keeps many of the ill from obtaining help, just as much as the prohibitive cost of medication.

Life is not easy and again, I just want to remind you that we are all in this together, and together we can have influence. Hug someone today. Share a smile.



# Traffic deaths spike in highway work zones

#### TRAFFIC DEATHS SPIKE IN HIGHWAY WORK ZONES

The Texas Department of Transportation wants motorists to be aware of dangerous conditions in road construction zones after crashes in those zones killed 244 people last year.

The death toll is an increase of 33% over 2020 and is the highest in 40 years. The majority of those who died were drivers or their passengers, according to TxDOT.

"It's important for drivers to remember that driving conditions in work zones can be especially challenging because of extra congestion, slow-moving heavy equipment, temporary barriers and vehicles that make sudden stops," Marc Williams, Tx-DOT executive director, said. "That's why it's crucial for everyone to give driving their full attention and drive a safe speed in areas where construction and maintenance are un-

Among the tips offered by the agency to cut accidents:

- Slow down and follow the posted speed limit.
- Pay attention, put down the phone and keep your mind on the road.
- Watch out for road crews and follow flaggers'
- instructions.Don't tailgate. Allow enough room to stop safe-
- Plan for extra time to reach your destination, since road construction can slow traffic.

Traffic fines double in work zones when workers are present.

## WILDFIRE RISK CONTINUES WITH DRY, WINDY CONDITIONS

The risk of more wildfires continues this week with much of the state under drought conditions.

"Critical fire weather includes above-normal temperatures, increased wind speeds and low relative humidity levels," according to a Texas A&M Forest Service news release. Wildfires that start under these conditions may be



difficult to control, the agency said. The risk is nearly statewide, as virtually all of the state remains under drought conditions.

During the first week of April, the forest service and local fire departments responded to 117 wildfires that burned 23,560 acres.

### TEXAS HISTORY INSTRUCTION EXPANDED

The State Board of Education decided last week to expand instruction in Texas history to six grade levels, meaning students in those grades will have their knowledge of the state's history tested on the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills exam.

For decades, Texas history has been taught in fourth and seventh grades. Now it will also be taught in kindergarten through second grade, and sixth and eighth grades.

"With this significant increase, students will study Texas and the people and events that define it in most grade levels prior to high school," according to an SBOE news release.

The board will consider proposed revisions to the social studies aspect of TEKS at the June meeting to include Texas history content. Final revisions are scheduled for November.

#### PLEASE DON'T TOUCH THE WILDLIFE

With the balmy weather of a Texas spring, more folks are enjoying the outdoors. Experts at the Tex-

as Parks and Wildlife Department urge people who encounter wildlife to avoid lending a helping hand.

Often, the young offspring of wild animals can be mistaken as having been abandoned. Many of these human-animal encounters are unnecessary and can be detrimental to wildlife.

Newborn fawns, for example, are often left for hours at a time by the doe as she forages for food. "During that time, people may spot a fawn lying alone in tall grass or in a brushy area. Many people interfere with the fawn, thinking it has been abandoned by its mother and needs help. This is rarely the case," according to TPWD.

TPWD experts advise folks to leave all young animals alone unless obviously injured. Spend some time observing from a distance to determine if the animal truly is injured, since the mother may not return if humans are close by

The same principle applies to young birds. "If the bird's eyes are open, it has feathers and is hopping around, mom and dad are likely nearby. Grounded fledglings will usually be up and flying within a few days," according to TPWD.

If a wild animal is sick or injured, people are encouraged to contact a permitted wildlife rehabilitator, which can be found on the TPWD Wildlife Division website: tpwd.texas.gov/huntwild/wild/rehab/.

## COVID-19 cases rise while deaths, hospitalizations decline

The number of new Texas cases of COVID-19 reported by the <u>Coronavirus Resource Center</u> at Johns Hopkins University jumped by more than 100% in the past week to 46,375, though deaths dropped to 252 during the same time period.

Lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations in Texas have dropped to 875 patients, the lowest level in months. The highly contagious subvariant of Omicron, dubbed BA.2, has become the dominant version worldwide and is accounting for the majority of new cases.

new cases.

Like the original omicron variant, this strain is more transmissible but generally has less-severe symptoms, according to health experts. The best protection continues to be getting vaccinated and getting a booster if already vaccinated, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

DSHS says unvaccinated Texans are eight times more likely to test positive for COVID-19 and 42 times more likely to die of a COVID-19 associated illness.

As of Sunday, 17.479 million Texans — or nearly 60% of the state's population — were fully vaccinated, with 6.6 million getting a booster dose.

"That was a good party!" Peter announced when we finally returned to our little apartment upstairs. "Jorge ate a lot of cake!"

We don't know what they really think of us, the kind people running this family hotel. We wouldn't blame them if they thought we were a little awkward or odd.

But we wanted to try to let them know how much we appreciated finding such a clean, cheerful place to live. We appreciated all the beautiful art being made, the plants being grown, the countless small kindnesses shown to us every day.

"Gracias!" we say again and again. "Thank you."

"De nada," they always reply. "It's nothing."
But, of course, it is everything.

**ELECTION** May 7, 2022

The Board of Directors of Crosby Municipal Utility District has called a maintenance tax election for May 7, 2022 at the District office located at 103 W Wahl St., Crosby, TX 77532 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The purpose of the election is to obtain authorization for a maintenance tax of up to \$0.25 per \$100 of assessed value. Over 95% of the utility districts in Harris County have authorized maintenance taxes. These districts use the maintenance tax collections to supplement water and sewer revenues to reduce increases in water and sewer rates. Crosby MUD tax rate has decreased from \$0.57 in 2013 to \$0.47 today, and some of the decrease could have been replaced with a maintenance tax. If approved the Board of Directors of the District does not anticipate levying the full \$0.25 at this time, but something in the range of \$0.05 cents. The maintenance tax is needed because the District is currently operating at a deficit in its operating account. The District has not raised water and sewer rates in a number of years; however the rate charged by the San Jacinto River Authority for water increases annually. The maintenance tax will supplement payment for purchased water from the San Jacinto River Authority, as well as assist in payment for maintenance and repair for certain facilities within the District. The Crosby MUD Board, all of whom are residents in Crosby MUD who pay the water and sewer rates and the taxes that the residents do, are very mindful of managing the District's operations in a conservative manner. Early voting is at 103 W Wahl St., Crosby, TX 77532 from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Monday through Friday, beginning April 25, 2022 through May 3, 2022, on each day which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday. 



drinking water to residents and will provide for more than 100 new fire hydrants for our first responders to better protect and serve residents."

The GP project would replace and upgrade the aging system and allow the city to guarantee delivery of potable drinking water to residents and provide adequate firewater pressure in case of fire. The project would replace over 52,000 linear feet of water mains.

In Jacinto City she said, "Securing nearly \$1 million in federal funding for Jacinto City to replace some of their 80-year-old water mains is something

than \$3,000.

For purchases made online, note that delivery, shipping, handling and transportation charges are part of the sales price. If the emergency preparation item being purchased is taxable, the delivery charge is also taxable. Consider these charges when determining whether an emergency preparation item can be purchased taxfree during the holiday.

For example, if you purchase a rescue ladder online for \$299 with a \$10

delivery charge, the total sales price is \$309. Because the total sales price of the ladder is more than \$300, tax is due on the \$309 sales price.

Several over-thecounter self-care items, such as antibacterial hand sanitizer, soap, spray and wipes, are always exempt from sales tax if they are labeled with a "Drug Facts" panel in accordance with federal Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations.

Purchases that do not qualify include:

-- batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles;

-- camping stoves and camping supplies;

-- chainsaws; -- plywood;

-- extension ladders and stepladders; and

-- tents.

A list of emergency preparation supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website.

"hydraulic heave" that would make the excavation unstable and fill with water. This would occur because the excavations were so deep.

Although TXDOT has not announced exact plans for the I-10 replacement bridge, the consultants, GHD engineers, claim that part of the structure would be built in the only remainig Right-Of-Way, and make access to the site impossible or at least difficult. The engineers state that at least 162,000 cubic yards of material must be removed, taking 20,000 truckloads to haul away. They state that the bridge construction might start as early as 2025 or 2026, impacting the movement of trucks and equipment at the Waste Pits site.

For these reasons, the Respondents have asked for a pause in the schedule, to "reconsider and alter the response action." This includes changing the criteria for how waste material is tested to determine how much must be removed. They recommend a test called SWAC (Surface-Weighted Average Concentration) but this is not approved in the ROD. It would allow a reduction in toxicity of material to be removed from 30ng/kg to

about half the amount. The Responsible Parties are International Paper Company, and McGinnes Industrial Maintenance Corp. They signed an agreement with the EPA several years ago, to remove the toxic dioxin materials at their expense, in an approved manner. Now they seem to want to reexamine this agreement.

Jackie Young Medcalf has led the movement against the Responsible Parties, and to make them fully remove the material

and restore it to its natural condition prior to the waste pits. In her press conference last week, she stated:

The San Jacinto River Waste Pits Superfund Site is one of the most vulnerable and notorious Superfund sites in the nation. Consultants working for the parties responsible for these toxic pits, recently submitted a letter to the **Environmental Protection** Agency (EPA), claiming they cannot clean up the Site as previously ordered by the EPA. However, this is not the responsible party's first attempt to convince the EPA, and others, that the waste should remain in the river. In fact, internal corporate emails from 2011 show they had a plan to create a global consensus to "sell" leaving the waste in the river as the final remedy. The catch? Hundreds of millions of dollars are on the line for the parties responsible but the future of Galveston Bay and the health of our communities hinge on this waste being removed in a controlled and engineered environment and not in the next hurricane.

The Pits, straddling Interstate 10 in the San Jacinto River, were filled with dioxin-contaminated waste in the 1960s and have been in a heated battle between community members and those responsible for the cleanup. The EPA named International Paper and McGinnis Industrial Maintenance Corporation (MIMC, a Waste Management of Texas and Waste Management Inc subsidiary) the parties responsible for the cleanup under a federal administrative order.

The San Jacinto River Coalition, a local community group led by Texas Health and Environment Alliance (THEA), began advocating for the full removal of the Waste Pits over a decade ago. The Coalition, with over 55,000 supporters, has worked with scientific experts and policy advisers to understand what is truly the best remedy for this Superfund Site. In 2017, the EPA signed the Record of Decision (ROD) for the complete removal of the Northern Pit down to a level of dioxin that is safe for a youth recreational fisherman - exactly what the local communities asked

In a recently released letter, the responsible parties dispute the ability to remove the waste as described in the ROD and ask the EPA to consider altering their selected cleanup plan. Jackie Medcalf, a former resident and the founder of THEA, states that "this is nothing more than smoke and mirrors - removal is possible, it will cost hundreds of millions of dollars, but it is feasible." The reality of the situation is the waste will remain toxic for upwards of 750 more years if left in the river. How many hurricanes will strike our coast during that time and how many more generations have to live with this burden?

In reply to the letter from the Responsible parties, the EPA's Region 6 Regional Administrator Earthea Nance, sent a letter in response, stating that EPA would not grant a schedule extension, and that 90% Remedial Designs were still due on June 26. However, she did say that after submission, the parties could work on any modifications that might be required.

## Two die in another train/car collision

#### Vehicle drove around crossing gates

HARRIS COUNTY - Two people died after a train reportedly slammed into a car in northeast Harris County Saturday evening.

According to officials from the Harris County Sheriff's Office, the crash occurred in the 12900 block of Beaumont Highway and Van Hut Lane around 8 p.m.

Sheriff Ed Gonzalez said in a news conference that a Chrysler 300 attempted to cut around the railroad crossing arms, when an Amtrak passenger train collided with the vehicle.

The vehicle was then engulfed in flames, according to Gonzalez.

Deputies said two people were ejected from the vehicle. Both died at the scene.

Witnesses told deputies that the arms were down at the time of the crash, and the vehicle tried to beat the



Amtrak passenger train stopped on tracks near Old Beaumont Highway and Van Hut Lane, Saturday night after hitting a car attempting to cross the tracks. Despite damage to the entine, the train later continued westbound to Los Angeles.

The Amtrak train had three cars and 81 passengers. The train had minor damage in the front, according to Sheriff Gonzalez.

No injuries were reported to any of the passengers or crew members onboard.

Amtrak issued the fullowing statement:

"On April 16, Amtrak train 1 was traveling from New Orleans to Los Angeles when an occupied vehicle obstructing the track came into contact with the train about 12 miles from Houston Station. There have been no reported injuries to the 81 passengers or crew onboard. Amtrak is working with local law enforcement to investigate the incident."




