Imprisoned Brittney Griner draws national attention

A Russian court extended the pretrial detention of the W.N.B.A. basketball star and former AISD Nimitz HS athlete Brittney Griner on drug smuggling charges, pushing her jail stint past the four month mark, according to the official state news agency TASS. However, Russian TV showed her on Monday, June 27 going to a hearing in handcuffs, in a Russian courthouse.



Although her contact with the public has been limited, reportedly her Russian attorney is able to pass notes back and forth, and Griner has been using this method to communicate with family and supporters in the U.S.

A rally in support of her was held last month in Houston, in front of the Toyoto Arena where the NBA plays their games. The rally included the presence of American Trevor Reed, recently released from Russian custody in a trade. The U.S. House has also passed a resolution demanding her

It has been suggested in Russian media that Griner is being held by the Russians as a potential swap for a convicted criminal, Viktor Bout, held in the U.S. The State Department has listed the release of Griner as a priority, clasifying her as "wrongfully detained," but not commenting on a possible swap.

To keep attention on her plight, the WNBA this week named Griner as an honorary starter in the upcoming All Star Game to be played in Chicago on July 10th.

EPA meets with community on Waste Pits

CHANNELVIEW Representatives of the federal EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) met with the public last Thursday evening, June 23 at the Flukinger Community Center in Channelview. The purpose of the meeting was to update interested members of the public on progress in remediation and removal of the toxic wastes in the San Jacinto River at several sites.

The slide presentation was made by the Superfund Project Manager, Ashley Howard, and a question and answer period following the talk was moderated by Jeanetta Coates.

About 75 interested members of the Channelview and Highlands com-

munities attended the meeting. Many of them asked questions after the presentation.

Also attending the meeting were a number of public officials, and agency representatives. The included staff from Senator John Whitmire, Congressman Brian Babin, Representative Ana Hernandez, and County Attorney Chris Menefee.

EPA had several staff members, engineers and geologists present, headed by John Meyer, who is Acting Deputy Director of Reg. 6 Superfund Sites.

Also present were members of Harris County Pollution Control, and TCEQ.

Howard showed a series of 25 slides, that covered the history of the waste

pits, the remediation solution approved by the EPA, and the current progress and schedule by the consultants for the PRP (Potential Responsible Party).

Howard's presentation was divided into details on the two sites called the Northers and Southern Impoundments. She characterized the problems and solutions and unique and different at the two loca-

Each site is about 15 acres, and the dumping of toxic waste from paper mills occured in the mid 1960s. However, the waste is much deeper and more extensive area in the Northern site, she said.





GPISD 2022 - The North Shore Senior High School has entered into a new realm of competition and student engagement: video games (Esports). Freedom

Our nation just celebrated the first officially recognized holiday of Juneteenth. This day celebrates the end of slavery in America. To many Black people, this is the official Independence Day. And next week, America will celebrate the 246th Independence Day where American became an independent nation.

Many high school graduations were held recently and to those who received their diploma, it represents freedom. The former students celebrate no more waking early, arriving to school and having teachers and administrators tell them what to do next. There were those who graduated from colleges, and they are celebrating the freedom from faculty and administrators setting their schedules. There are those who financially supported these graduates who are celebrating the freedom of no longer being financially responsible for supporting these young adults.

To the more than 160,000 incarcerated individuals in Texas, freedom is a goal to strive for and an opportunity to correct mistakes from their past. For the countless individuals who have traveled to the United States for a better life, freedom from oppression has been a dream for years.

Attendees were busy to point fingers as to who should have cleaned the floor. Many felt the mother should have at least attempted to pick up behind her children. Others felt the man being paid should have done it without complaining. Someone pointed out that many parents of young children have yet to balance the duties of parenting and to show grace by not making a big deal about it. Others mentioned that being a parent of multiple can be a handful especially when there is a special needs child.

Each day, we have the freedom to choose how we react to situations. We can react to what rubs us the wrong way and become bitter or we can react that we have another opportunity to be kind, to have influence and to be an example. Texas Penal Code Section 21.11 (a)(1): A person commits an offense if, with a child younger than 17 years of age, whether the child is of the same or opposite sex and regardless of whether the person knows the age of the child at the time of the offense, the person: (1) engages in sexual contact with the child or causes the child to engage in sexual contact; or (2) with intent to arouse or gratify the sexual desire of any person: (A)exposes the person's anus or any part of the person's genitals, knowing the child is present; or (B)causes the child to expose the child's anus or any part of the child's genitals. An offense under this section is a felony of the second degree.

Fugitive Abraham Albiter Orozco (5' - 5" 120 lbs - black hair, brown eyes) was convicted of Section 22.011 of the Texas Penal Code. (SEE BELOW)

Texas Penal Code Section 22.011: SEXUAL AS-SAULT. (a) A person commits an offense if the person: (1) intentionally or knowingly: (A) causes the penetration of the anus or sexual organ of a child by any means; (B) causes the penetration of the mouth of a child by the sexual organ of the actor; (C) causes the sexual organ of a child to contact or penetrate the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor; (D) causes the anus of a child to contact the mouth, anus, or sexual organ of another person, including the actor; or (E)causes the mouth of a child to contact the anus or sexual organ of another person, including the actor. An offense under this section is a felony of the second degree.

ASK DIAMOND JIM

Diamond Jim: "What exactly is "White Gold and how's it made?"

White gold is inherently warm in color, and not dead white like platinum. White gold is not found in nature, since the element from the earth is pure yellow gold (referred to as 24k). In order to achieve a whiter hue, other metals are added to the pure yellow gold. This combination of metals is called an "alloy." By definition, 14k gold means that 14 parts of the alloy out of the total 24 parts are gold. The remaining 10 parts in the alloy are other metals. The other metals depend upon the final color you're trying to achieve. For example, 14k yellow gold may have copper, silver, and zinc added so that the yellow color is lightened, but still maintained. Rose gold will have more copper so that the coppery hue is achieved. And white gold will have a white metal, such as nickel or palladium added so that the resulting alloy is whiter.

Although the final color of 14k white gold is whiter than pure yellow gold, 14 parts out of its total 24 parts are still yellow gold. I like to compare it to a bucket paint: It's like adding as much white paint to a bucket of yellow paint as you can. The resulting color will look much whiter, but that yellow paint in the bucket still remains. The same is true of white gold; It will appear whiter but its undertone is still yellow gold. Why is it that sometimes a white gold ring will turn warmer in color over time?


Sometimes that original warmer color is harder to see since our eyes are distracted by shiny things! Rings often start out polished, and the reflective surface makes subtleties in color hard to see. But as it's worn, the ring's surface becomes scuffed up, and that reflective surface dulls. White gold's inherent color is easier for us to see due to the duller, less distracting surface. Additionally, although most of the metals in the white gold alloy do not tarnish (turn colors due to exposure to oxygen), there are tiny amounts of metals which can oxidize. This means white gold can "turn" a slightly warmer color with time. Having the ring professionally polished can make it shiny again. But something to keep in mind is that professional polishing removes a layer of metal each time. You wouldn't want to get your ring polished too frequently since it would wear away the gold too quickly. If you prefer a whiter appearance I'd recommend going with **rhodium plating** rather than frequent professional polishing. That way the ring isn't thinned too early in its life, and the fine texture isn't polished away prematurely.

Rhodium is a metal in the platinum family, so it has that same grey/white color. Many commercially made jewelry will be rhodium plated to look like platinum. One downside to plating is that it requires upkeep by re-plating every so often. Some people prefer not to plate their white gold for a few reasons. The main reason is that they like the warmer color of white gold, and don't find it to be inferior to platinum's color. Many people prefer a whiter color in their white gold jewelry and would like to rhodium plate their rings. Rhodium plating can be done at Pineforest Jewelry in our repair shop and, unlike most jewelers who plate to a 1 micron of thickness, we prefer to plate to about 2 microns thick. This usually offers a longer lasting plating .of your beautiful jewelry. So, if you love that bright white hue, rhodium plating is a great option for you. 



Walle condemns Supreme Court Decision

Dobbs decision means Texas' new "Trigger Law," outlawing abortion and levying criminal penalties for performing abortion in Texas, will take effect 30 days after judgment

HOUSTON - On Friday, in deciding in Dobbs v. Jackson, the United States Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade in a 5-4 decision, upending nearly 50 years of precedent recognizing a women's right to choose to have an abortion. State Representative Armando Walle (D-Houston) released the following statement regarding the *Dobbs* opinion:

I am devastated about today's Supreme Court ruling in Dobbs v. Jackson-not only a massive setback for the civil rights of women but for all Americans. In setting aside nearly 50 years of precedent, the decision not only means loss of access to abortion, but reverses decades of progress in women's rights to self-determination and autonomy.

Knowing Texas has the highest percentage of uninsured people in the country and has a history of poor maternal health outcomes for pregnant women, we know the impact of this decision will be felt hardest by people of color and those with lesser means. More than ever, it is imperative that Texas take steps to repair its public health safety net and protect the health of women before, during, and after pregnancy.

The court majority's contortions made to overturn Roe required rolling back established principles of substantive due process. Despite the majority attempt to dispel concerns, I fear the opinion's line of reasoning severely threatens past Supreme Court decisions affirming the rights to contraception, same-sex intimacy, and same-sex marriage. I know my fears are not unfounded when Justice Thomas specifically suggests the court "reject substantive due process entirely" and specifically suggests reconsidering "Griswold, Lawrence, and Obergefell," the three cases which secured those rights.

It is a dark day in our nation's history. But I will work hard in Austin to mitigate the negative impacts of this decision (and the corresponding Texas abortion ban) on my constituents and all affected Texans.

Rep. Armando Walle is serving his seventh term in the Texas House of Representatives and is as a member of the House Committee on Appropriations, serving as Chair of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Articles VI, VII, VIII. Walle also serves as a member of the House Committees on House Administration and Natural Resources. He represents House District 140, which includes northern portions of unincorporated Harris County and the City of Houston.





"Today, the Court has restored one of the core principles of our Constitution with this landmark ruling. This decision correctly returns the authority of states to decide the limits on abortion and will save countless innocent lives. I commend the Justices for not bowing to the vicious intimidation campaign waged by the radical Left. I join Texans in celebrating this historic victory for life and the rule of law."

Comptroller releases Broadband Expansion Plan

Comptroller releases broadband plan

Comptroller State Glenn Hegar last week released his agency's <u>plan</u> to support the expansion of broadband internet access to areas with limited or no access. Hegar and his agency's Broadband Development Office received feedback through a series of town halls, virtual discussions and more than 16,000 responses to a sur-

vey.
"An important, recurring theme has been the reminder that though high-speed internet may once have been a luxury, it is now a necessity," Hegar wrote in a letter to Texas legislators. "Texans need reliable, high-speed connectivity for a wide range of potential applications including public health, safety, education and modern agriculture.

Census data collected in 2020 indicates as many as 7 million Texans — nearly one-fourth of the state's population — do not have broadband access. The issue disproportionately affects rural communities, low-income families and communities of color, the report said.

The report notes the statewide plan will require additional funding. The Legislature provided \$5 million to jump-start the Broadband Development Office, and the federal American Rescue Act allocated \$500.5 million for broadband expansion. In addition, the recently passed infrastructure bill allocates at least \$100 mil-

availability map. Manage recurring co-

ordination and communication opportunities across stakeholder groups.

Test results released last week by the Texas Education Agency showed modest improvement in three subject areas over last year. However, they still are lower than they were before the pandemic.

High school students took the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness in four subjects required to graduate: algebra, English I and II, biology and U.S. history. Compared to last year, scores rose in all but English I and II, which were largely unchanged.

Test score results are still short of the pre-pandemic results from 2019. In algebra, for example, scores are 16 points lower than spring 2019.

'We have made some progress to date, but there is still work to be done to fully recover from the academic effects of the COVslide," TEA Commissioner Mike Mor-

ath said. Results for STAAR tests taken by students in grades 3-8 will be made public this week.

Texas again leads nation in jobs created

May employment numbers released by the <u>Texas</u> **Workforce**

Commission show the state has added 762,400 nonagricultural jobs since May 2021. The seasonally adjusted jobless rate in May was essentially unchanged at 4.2%.

"Texas continues to set records for employment growth with more than 250,000 jobs added from the beginning of this year through May," said TWC Chairman Bryan Daniel. "Training and upskilling are crucial to maintain this level of employment growth, and TWC remains committed to offering innovative training programs."

The job increase is the highest in the nation, with a record 13.357 million Texans employed, according to TWC.

A collaborative effort between state agencies has led to a <u>first-in-the-nation</u> program that gives Texans the option to identify communication impairments, such as being hearing-impaired, on both the driver's licenses and vehicle regis-

In addition, all Texas law enforcement agencies have access to video training modules to gain a better understanding of people with a communication impediment, which also includes autism, cerebral palsy, Parkinson's disease and other disorders drivers might have and still legally be able to drive.

This simple addition to a driver's license or vehicle registration removes a potential barrier and can give officers the knowledge they need to help make sure everyone feels comfortable and safe," Steve McCraw, Texas Department of Public Safety director, said.

San Jacinto River Waste Pits Meeting,

When some toxic waste escaped from the Northern site in the 1980s, it was declared a Superfund site and a temporary cap of stone and mesh membrane was placed over the waste pits to contain the toxins.

After extensive studies by an engineering consultant and the EPA, a permanent solution of excavation and removal inside a BMP sheet piling wall was decided upon as the acceptable solution.

A final report on this method, a 90% Remedial Design document, was due to be presented to the EPA on June 26. Then the agency said it would take at least 60 days to review the document prior to authorizing the next step. After this a 100% RD will finalize the design and the EPA will authorize remediation work to begin.


However, the consulting firm, GHD, has raised some new issues since the last 30% Remedial Design submission. They say that additional test borings have shown that the waste is deeper and more extensive than originally thought, and wil required more work and more material to be removed..

They also questioned whether the design solution originally proposed was safe or even possible, and asked for additional time to study. A partial schedule extension was approved in October 2021, but another request in March of this year was denied, and the PRP were directed to continue to work on the current schedule.

Howard described one of the new problems as "hydraulic heave" where the escavated area could heave upward when water pressure from below pushes up and causes the integrity of the excavation to fail. Howard said that the con-

sultants were still studying two methods to solve the problem, one a dry method and one a water column. In either case, a sheet pile enclosure, known as a BMP (Best Management Practice) would be required.

In summary, Howard said they are working to solve three problems: the escavation technique just mentioned, the Northwest corner of the site where the greatest heave potential exists due to its depth and configuration, and the coordination with TXDOT as they plan on a replacement

bridge for I-10 over the river. TXDOT has expressed concerns over interference with a permanent construction around the waste pits, construction access, and the potential liability to the stability of the I-10 bridge when material is escavated next to the foundations of the bridge.

Howard said that she expects many of these questions to be answered in the 90% RD submittal, due this week. Then all agancies affected by the work will have an opportunity to review and comment on their concerns.

SOUTHERN IM-POUNDMENT REPORT:

Howard said that the Southern Impoundment is on schedule, and excavation and removal should start in Fall 2022. She said that it has not been determined yet where the toxic material will be sent. She showed a colored map, indicating that excavation will only need to be 10 feet deep at the most, and none of it will be under existing buildings or structures. She indicated that below 10 feet some toxic material might remain, but the toxicity would be at acceptable levels. She said the whole excavation process should take about two years. After remediation work is completed, the sites will be under Institutional Controls forever, and EPA will monitor them every 5 years.

A lengthy question and answer session followed, with many attendees not satisfied that the remediation would be complete and satisfactory.

whether the Remedial Design took into account the barge activity adjacent to the site, and the hurricane potential during remediation. Howard said they were aware of both problems, and that the RD would address them. She said remediation work is limited to November to April, out of the storm season.

Some of the questions came from THEA representatives, several of whom were present. Rachel Jordan asked if there were plans to repair the CAP after a hurricane or barge strike. John Meyer of EPA said that the contractor now has a stockpile of extra stone and membrane in the area, ready to use for repairs if needed.

Carolyn Stone of CHIC asked if there was a master list of agencies that would be notified if a problem arose at the site, and if they were trained to handle toxic materials. She was told that a list existed, and that coordination meetings were being held.

One question was whether remediation called for the BMP wall to be removed, and the excavation filled with clean material. The answer to both questions was yes.

On the Southern Impoundment site, a person asked why the material was not completely removed so that it was 100% non-toxic. And if not, whether property owners would be compensated for any decrease in land value. John Meyer of EPA explained that decisions were difficult and complex, and many times factors included compromise with cost and capability. He said that EPA maintains a department that is just involved in "re-use of property" on Superfund sites, and they were involved in these decisions.




