Chief Adams said "Now with their new ability to arrive with blood on board we can immediately give blood to a patient, reducing the time to more than half." He said two patients lives have already been saved on two separate events with their new ability. The first unit of blood ever given by CFD was given by EMS Supervi $sor\ Deivi\ Vigil, and\ Paramedics\ Jason\ Foster\ and$ Kristopher Henson. "All the entities that helped us played a key role in the survival of this critically injured person," Adams said.

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ASK DIAMOND JIM

Diamond Jim: "How to Spot a Fake **Rolex Bracelet**"

A watch's bracelet can also have a lot of telltale signs of its authenticity, some that are easier to spot than others. The four styles of bracelets by Rolex are Oyster, Jubilee, President, and Pearlmaster, in addition to different strap options, as seen below:



Links

Comparing these two watches again, you can see a couple visible differences in the bracelet links of both watches. On the real Rolex, the links are brushed metal all the way around the bracelet. Whereas on the counterfeit Rolex, only the outer links are brushed metal while the center links are polished and shinier in appearance.

There is also a noticeable difference in the size of the links and the width of the bracelets. The bracelet links on the genuine Rolex are thicker and more robust looking compared to the links on the replica that are much thinner and more slender in appearance, which in turn make its bracelet more narrow in width compared to the real Rolex bracelet.

The clasp on the authentic Rolex bracelet is much longer than the clasp on the fake Rolex, which you can clearly see with both clasps side by side.

The positioning of the Rolex coronet/crown on the clasp of each watch is different. The crown on the real Rolex is positioned so as the very bottom of the crown serves as part of the hidden flip-lock clasp mechanism - designed as a ledge to make it easier to open. On the replica, the whole crown is fitted within the center link with no part of it hanging off the edge like it does on the real Rolex. Additionally, the "hidden" flip-lock clasp on the replica isn't very hidden at all and is clearly a separate piece that protrudes out further than the rest of the clasp.

On the fake Rolex, you can see two buttons - one on each side of the clasp – designed as a push-release mechanism for the clasp. On the real Rolex there are no buttons as none are needed to open the clasp, which is opened using only the hidden flip-lock clasp.


If you open the clasps of both watches, you can see the inside of the real Rolex's clasp has an engraving of the Rolex crown above it - as well as the (very small) words "GENEVA" and "SWISS MADE" engraved to the right of the emblem. You can see that on the inside clasp of the replica, there are no engravings whatsoev-

Interestingly, the reverse is true about engravings on the back side of the clasps of both watches. This time, the back side of the clasp on the replica can have an engraving of the words "STAINLESS STEEL", while the back side of the clasp on the authentic Rolex has no engravings whatsoever. The fake will be a little harder to detect on this aspect alone, however, you can see the difference between the two.





Feds Investigating Meltdown at Southwest Airlines

Massive flight cancellations by Southwest Airlines during the Christmas holiday week are prompting the federal government to look into why thousands of travelers were left stranded across the country, along with huge piles of luggage in airports served by the beleaguered airline.

Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg said his agency would examine what caused Southwest's widespread cancellations, which began as a massive polar storm gripped much of the country a few days before Christmas. The airline was able to resume normal operations on Friday as another holiday weekend approached. The airline canceled more than 15,700 flights since Dec. 22, according to The Dallas Morning News. Cancellations by other airlines were a fraction of that amount, according to published reports.

"Because what we're seeing right now, from the system and the flights themselves to the inability to reach anybody on a customer service phone line, it is just completely unacceptable," Buttigieg told CBS early Wednesday. The Senate Commerce Committee also plans to investigate.

Southwest does not use the hub-and-spoke system relied upon by other major carriers, instead relying on a point-topoint system. That means even where planes were available, often crews and pilots were stranded in other cities.

RRC LAUNCHES PROBE INTO ATMOS SERVICE ISSUES

The Texas Railroad Commission has launched an investigation of Atmos Energy's gas distribution system. which left some Texans without heat during freezing weather just before Christmas. The company reported low gas pressure in cities across North and Central Texas, leaving some customers without heat. On Dec. 23, the Texas Tribune reported, Atmos asked its 2 million Texas customers to conserve gas use by lowering thermostats, not using gas fireplaces and any gaspowered appliances.

Gov. Greg Abbott signed a letter ordering the railroad commission and the Texas attorney general's office to inves-



to prepare for the winter weather event last week."

Leading up to and during the winter event, State of Texas agencies worked around the clock to mobilize resources and assist utilities in any way possible. At no time did Atmos Energy request assistance... It is apparent that Atmos Energy acted irresponsibly and was unprepared for the event," the letter said in part.

ABBOTT PUSHES BACK ON MIGRANT BUS CRITICISM

Abbott has drawn criticism after a bus from Texas dropped off more than 100 migrants in freezing weather near Vice President Kamala Harris' official residence in Washington, D.C. An Austin American-Statesman report noted the state has bused nearly 16,000 migrants to so-called sanctuary cities. Abbott tweeted a breakdown of how many migrants have been bused to cities outside of Texas.

Thus far, 8,900 have been sent to Washington; 4,900 to New York City; more than 1,500 to Chicago; and more than 630 to Philadelphia. The governor has maintained in the past that the migrants have given permission to be bused North. The White House has called the move "a cruel, dangerous, and shameful stunt."

"We're providing relief to local communities overwhelmed by President Biden's open border policies," Abbott said.

The U.S. Supreme Court has so far stopped the Biden administration from eliminating Title 42, a federal rule enacted during by the Trump administration during the COVID-19 pandemic to allow the U.S. to return asylumseeking migrants to Mexico or

their country of origin.

TPWD OPPOSES LISTING PRAIRIE CHICKEN AS **ENDANGERED**

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has reiterated its opposition to a decision by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to list the lesser prairie chicken as endangered in some areas and threatened in others, citing "tremendous" voluntary collaboration with private landowners and industry to conserve the chicken's

The federal designation will take place in January. It primarily affects Panhandle counties where the lesser prairie chicken is found.

"This decision jeopardizes decades of voluntary conservation efforts, increases regulatory burden and does not assure recovery of the species," David, Yoskowitz, TPWD executive director, said.

\$54 MILLION IN CAREER, **TECHNICAL EDUCATION GRANTS**

The Texas Workforce Commission has announced 152 grants totaling more than \$54 million to various public community, state and technical colleges, as well as school district and charter schools across the state. The grants will be used to buy equipment to establish or expand programs that offer Texas students the opportunity to earn licenses, certificates, or postsecondary degrees in fields such as nursing, welding, automotive repair and dentistry.

"It's important to identify high-demand jobs, but it's critical to proactively commit resources to ensure Texans are ready to meet those workforce needs," said TWC Chairman Bryan Daniel.

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Updated COVID-19 boosters for children at Harris County

Houston – On Friday, December 16th, Harris County Public Health (HCPH) will begin administering Moderna COVID-19 updated boosters (Bivalent) to children six months of age to five years old and Pfizer COVID-19 updated boosters for children six months to four years old at all HCPH Vaccination Sites. The updated COVID-19 booster vaccine offers higher protection against the original COVID-19 strains and the Omicron variant

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that children six months to five years old who previously

completed the primary series of the Moderna COV-ID-19 vaccine are eligible to receive a Moderna updated booster vaccine two months after their final primary series dose. Children six months to four years who are currently completing a Pfizer primary series will receive a Pfizer updated booster vaccine as their third primary

As a result of the expanded eligibility, the original (monovalent) Pfizer COVID-19 Pfizer vaccine is no longer authorized as a third primary series dose in children six months to four years old and will not be offered at HCPH sites moving forward.

HCPH encourages everyone to get their updated booster when they meet eligibility criteria. Residents can also utilize the CDC's online vaccination tool or reach out to their healthcare provider if they have questions.

HCPH offers free COV-ID-19 vaccines and updated booster doses. Please visit readyharris.org or call 832-927-8787. Appointments are not necessary, but HCPH can help you find a location closest to you or help with special accommodations for those who need travel assis-

with the HCSO Honor Guard presenting colors, and ended with the Pride Chorus Houston singing "We Are Family." Bishop James Dixon gave the Invocation.

Later in the week, candidate for county judge Alexandra del Moral Mealer issued a statement saying that the vote count for offices was not correct, and that many votes had been "suppressed." She said she would file a challenge to the count, with the intent to overturn the results.

Mealer's statement is as

"After reviewing all publicly available data, I have decided to file an election contest in light of the post-election assessment submitted by Harris Countv Election Administrator Clifford Tatum.

It is inexcusable that after two months, the public is no further along in knowing if, and to what extent, votes were suppressed. Far from being a "success," as the report characterizes, there were serious operational issues that occurred throughout Election Day that call into question whether the county's failures denied voters their right to vote. The report culminates with the ultimate "dog ate my homework" excuse of the World Series parade being responsible for delayed openings and fails to solidify the number of polling stations that suffered

from ballot paper shortag-

Unlike those holding office. I do not have the weight of government behind me to investigate the matters with the gravity and effort that reports of voter suppression justify but I do have the ability to exercise my legal rights as a candidate. My decision to file an election contest is fundamentally about protecting the right to vote in free and fair elections. There aren't a lot of things that Lina Hidalgo and I agree on but surely, we can both agree that it is un-American to suppress

ed by a \$10,000 grant from LyondellBasell and modeled after Memorial Hermann Life Flight's Pre-hospital Blo Product Administration Program, CFD now carries one unit of O positive Whole Blood on board for patients that experience any medical or trau ma-related condition that results in uncontrolled hemorrhage."

Tony Wood, Site Manager for the LyondellBasell Channelview Complex said, "Our emergency responders are critical to our communities, and vital within our operations at LyondellBasell," "We are honored to support CFD's Whole Blood Program and grateful for the sacrifices and relentless efforts that our first responders make every day; they are true heroes to our community."

Chief Adams said, "be-

cause of the generous grant donation from LyondellBasell, we're able to obtain the proper equipment to store and administer the whole blood. Gulf Coast Regional Blood Center's quality assurance team directed our process with the storing, maintaining, and the documentation of whole blood. Memorial Hermann Life Flight provided a plethora of knowledge when it came to writing the medical guidelines and policies for the administration of whole blood and the blood warming device."

"Once each of these aspects came together and months of training were completed, we were able to start the whole blood program. Every citizen who resides in our response district as well as anyone

passing through will now have a better chance of survival, should they be experiencing a medical, or trauma induced uncontrolled hemorrhage. The end goal is to keep organs and tissues perfused with whole blood, while enroute to a definitive care hospital. We at the CFD deeply appreciate the support and dedication from Lyondell-Basell, Memorial Hermann Life Flight, and Gulf Coast Regional Blood Center that made such an enormous impact to the citizens we serve," Adams concluded.

As of now this writing six agencies have the ability to provide blood in the field; Harris Co ESD#48, Community FD, Cy-Fair FD, North Channel EMS, South Lake Houston EMS and Channelview FD



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
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HCC Approved to Launch Two Bachelor's Degree Programs in 2023

HOUSTON, TX (Dec. 15, 2022) — Houston Community College (HCC) has been approved as a Level 2 baccalaureate granting institution, beginning with four-year degrees in Artificial Intelligence & Robotics and Healthcare Management.

The announcement was made by the Southern Association of Collegand Schools es Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) Board of Trustees at its 2022 Annual Meeting Atlanta, Ga., recently. SACSCOC is the accrediting organization for HCC and other colleges and universities across 14 states in the southern United States.

HCC will launch its new bachelor's degree programs in fall 2023.

The Bachelor of Applied Technology in Artificial Intelligence and Robotics will address a growing and critical need for skilled workers in a rapidly evolving technical field. Over the last decade, Artificial Intelligence (AI) has gained a substantial foothold in a variety of industries. The National Security Commission on Artificial Intelligence (2021)recognizes AI as "already ubiquitous in everyday of AI techniques to solve problems is...turning once-fantastical ideas into realities across a range of disciplines."

Graduates of this program will enter a profession with 2,586 annual job openings in our region and a median annual salary of \$97,200.

The Bachelor of Applied Science in Healthcare Management will prepare students for career advancement or entry-level healthcare managerial positions. The degree program enables working professionals to advance their career by focusing on leadership skills, knowledge, and credentials in the healthcare management field.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics cites Medical and Health Services Managers as a growing occupational field based on increased demand for healthcare services as the baby-boom population ages. As medical service needs increase, the need for managers "who organize and manage medical information and healthcare staff" will also increase.


sion with 1,752 annual job openings in the Houston region and a median annual salary of \$64,200.


