Man gets life sentence for murder at Uvalde McDonald's

HOUSTON — A man who was found guilty Monday for the 2021 murder of a 71-year-old woman in east Harris County has been sentenced to life in prison without parole. Andrew Williams, 41, was convicted of capital murder in the death of Martha Medina.

On Sept. 23, 2021, Medina was run over and killed after being robbed of her purse at a McDonald's restaurant, located at 430 Uvalde. "They grabbed her purse, she fell toward the front of the car that was going out, and in a hurry to get away, they ran over her," Adrian Medina, the victim's son, said.

She was taken to a nearby hospital where she died, HCSO said. A McDonald's employee who asked not to be identified said she stayed by the victims side during her final moments. "I told her I'm going to pray for you and she said I'm grateful for that, I don't want to die," said the fast food employee.

Authorities said the suspect fled the scene in a

dark-colored Chevrolet Impala with black rims. According to Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez, Williams was out on bond in connection to a previous capital murder, in 2019, when Medina was killed. Court documents show that Williams shot and killed Chima Ogbonnaya with a firearm while attempting to rob another man. His bond was initially denied, but later granted at \$150,000 on Jan. 2.

Liliana Medina, the victim's daughter, said she feels satisfied but not happy because two families are still suffering from this incident. She said she also feels bad for Williams' family because they are also

"All I can say is that I feel satisfied. Do I feel happy? No. Because it's two families that are still suffering," Liliana Medina told KPRC 2 in Spanish. "Not only my family is still suffering, but I also feel bad for his (Williams') family as well, because at the end, they're also the victims."

Set The Example

hen you notice a sign that reads
"Entrance Only", how do you react?
Or when you have an empty cup in
your car, what do you do? What about when you
get around others that you are comfortable with.
When one person starts cursing or gossiping, what
do you do?

Living in an apartment complex, I have seen more than my fair share of actions that I feel like calling out on social media. Our complex has a one way entry and a one way exit. Yet like too many complexes, the gates do not always work; so, they always remain open. One of the biggest pet peeves of mine is for people to use the wrong gate, INTENTIONALLY. 
shut-out the Crusaders for the final minutes to win the game 1-0.

ASK DIAMOND JIM

Diamond Jim: "What Makes a Diamond so

In Light



When light leaves the sun, it races towards the earth at 186,000 miles per second. When it hits the diamond in front of you, it slows down to 77,000 miles per second. That speed difference is something you can see. Light in diamonds bends, reflects, refracts, and breaks apart into rainbows of color. Light is what gives us a diamond's brilliance, scintillation, and dispersion.

Of course, when I'm talking about light in diamonds, I'm talking about the cut. Each facet that a cutter polishes onto a diamond is designed to reflect light, bounce it around the diamond, and up to your eyes. Even one facet out of alignment can result in light that doesn't perform the way it should. And all light isn't the same. Because light is so essential to understanding the optics and the beauty of diamonds, the type of light matters.

This is the most overlooked part of understanding the quality of diamonds. But you have the perfect instrument to analyze the impact of light on diamond quality: your eyes.



Look and Look Again

Diamond facets are like mirrors: they reflect what's around them. When you look at a diamond from far away, it reflects the room and environment around you. When you look at a diamond close up, you're seeing a reflection of yourself. You'll be able to see the color you are wearing reflected in the diamond's facets. Differences in light are even more important. In direct sunlight, all diamonds look great. They flash and sparkle and throw off rainbows. You can't judge whether or not a diamond is well cut by looking at it in direct sunlight.

The light in an office is efficient but generally not flattering for diamonds (or for people!). Usually, it's diffused light that bounces off the ceiling. With diffuse or scattered lighting, a diamond's brilliance is more visible. Light enters the diamond from multiple directions, downplaying shadows and decreasing fire.

Candlelight and warm home lighting are good for people and for diamonds. You won't see optimum brilliance but you will get sparkle. Diamonds with larger facets like old European cuts and emerald cuts will look especially good in these lower lighting environments.

Daylight or indirect sunlight from a window, especially a north window which provides more consistent illumination all day, is the most important light for looking at diamonds. It's bright enough to assess its brilliance and scintillation without those blingy reflections that blind you to the areas where light is leaking and not being reflected back to the eye. A diamond that's beautiful in daylight will also be beautiful in every other light. That's why diamond dealers sort diamonds only in north light.

Which diamond looks most beautiful to you is personal: you may prefer one facet pattern to another. Diamonds have different rhythms to their scintillation and different personalities. I gravitate to step cuts and you might like the crushed ice look of a radiant cut. There's no wrong answer, it's just a personal choice.

When a piece of jewelry with well-cut diamonds is worn in daylight, in-office light, in candlelight, in sunlight, and even in moonlight, it will be more beautiful, with its diamonds dancing in the light.

Nearing Peak World **Population**

regularly talk to well-informed people who do not realize that world population growth is rapidly slowing and that global population will peak sometime between now and the end of the century. Currently, the UN estimates the most likely case is that the world's population will top out around 10 billion in 2080 and then begin a long, slow decline. Other modelers are projecting the peak will be reached in 2060 at 9 billion and then decline more rapidly. Some scenarios predict there will be fewer people on the planet at the end of century than now.

The UN's predictions for the U.S. are similar, with our population topping out at around 380 million near the end of the century. This is consistent with the Congressional Budget Office projections, which assume the U.S. annual population growth rate over the next 20 years will decline from .5% to .2%. Without immigration, the U.S. population would begin to decline around 2035.

Many of us grew up reading the Ehrlichs' Population Bomb, which predicted a worldwide apocalypse was just around the corner. The book, written in 1968, categorically predicted that "The battle to feed all of humanity is over. In the 1970s hundreds of millions of people will starve to death..." Of course, that did not happen and since around 2000, researchers have found there have been more obese people in the world than those who are undernour-

In part, it did not happen because of an explosion of agricultural technology in the 1950s and 1960s known as the Green Revolution. But the Ehrlichs' prediction also never came to pass because they missed that by the time they were writing their book, women had already begun having fewer

The critical metric for population growth is the average number of children women are having at any particular time, known as the "fertility rate." Other factors, such as childhood survival and longevity, also affect population growth but the fertility rate is the big driver. It takes a fertility rate of 2.1 children per woman to maintain a stable population, known as the "replacement rate." Anything above that and the population will grow and below that it falls.

When the Ehrlichs wrote their book the fertility rate was stunningly high at 5. That astronomical rate would go on to cause the world population to double just 40 years later. But what was not apparent to the Erhlichs at the time was that the fertility rate had peaked about five years earlier at 5.3. That began a steady slide downward to 2.3 today, just barely above the replacement rate.

However, a decline in fertility rate does not show up at once. It takes a while for that lower rate to work through the generational cycle, something referred as "population momentum." That is why you still see a hefty 25% increase in the world's population in the projections before it tops out in

Many countries around the world are already beginning to feel the effects of slowing population growth. Japan and Russia both face looming drastic population declines. China announced this year that for the first time its population had declined. Some countries have begun adopting policies to encourage young couples to have more children.

Of course, there is no question that the decline in population growth is very welcome news. Indeed, without the downturn we would be facing the apocalypse that the Erhlichs foresaw as we put ever increasing demands on the earth's finite resources. And polling in the U.S. generally finds that most people would like to see a lower population.

But for the last three centuries our civilization has been based on steady population growth and astronomical population growth since the midtwentieth century. Programs like Social Security and Medicare will not work in a world where the population is flat or declining, at least, not without some substantial modification.

Because lower fertility rates are correlated with educational attainment, the most uneducated, poorest parts of the world will be growing the fastest. The only places in the world currently with a fertility rate well above the replacement rate are sub-Saharan Africa and central Asia. This dichotomy will result in greater wealth disparity and conflicts.

The new population paradigm will cause many headaches which our children and grandchildren will have to wrestle. Some are obvious and some probably unforeseeable. It would be great if the world could start thinking through those issues now and begin to prepare. However, human behavior over the centuries has shown that kind of long-term planning is not one of our strong suits.

Texas Leads Nation in Jobs Added

The Lone Star State continues to lead the nation in jobs added with 58,200 new positions in February, bringing the state to nearly 14 million total nonfarm jobs, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. February also marked two full years of uninterrupted job growth in the state.

"The past 24 months of uninterrupted job growth show the strength of the Texas economy and ongoing economic opportunities for Texans," said TWC Chairman Bryan Daniel.

The state's jobless rate in February was 4.5%, which is higher than the national rate of 3.9%, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The highest jobless rate in a Texas metropolitan statistical area is 6.8% in McAllen-Edinburgh-Mission. The lowest rate in an MSA is 3.0% in Midland.

RAINY DAY FUND HITS CAP FOR FIRST TIME

The state's piggy bank is nearly full.

Comptroller Glenn Hegar predicts the state's socalled Rainy Day Fund, officially the Economic Stabilization Fund, will reach its statutory limit by 2025, which is 10% of what is deposited in the General Revenue Fund. Rising revenues fueled by spikes in energy prices and inflation have filled the state's coffers, Hegar said.

"The revenue increases that we have seen truly have been historical and unprecedented. We have never seen anything like this in the past, and I don't think we'll see anything like this in the future," he said.

The state experienced record growth in tax collections in 2022 of 25.6% from the previous year, filling the state's coffers with a surplus of \$32.7

"I am glad to see that lawmakers are giving careful thought to how this tremendous asset can be best put to work for Texans," Hegar add-

SENATE PASSES BILL TO LIMIT GOVERNOR'S POWERS

The Texas Senate unanimously passed a bill to rein in the governor's authority during emergencies or disasters, the Austin American-



Statesman reported. A matching proposal in the House is awaiting a committee hearing. The bill, sponsored by state Sen. Brian Birdwell, R-Granbury, would require the governor to call the Legislature into special session if the executive office wants to extend a disaster or emergency declaration past 30 days. Only the Legislature would be able to put restrictions on businesses such as those imposed during the initial weeks of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We must no longer allow a 19-month legislative interim to be leveraged against the Legislature, especially during times of emergency disasters that affect a significant number of Texans," Birdwell said.

Under current law, disaster declarations last 30 days but can be renewed by the governor. For example, Gov Greg Abbott has extended a disaster declaration relating to illegal border crossings each month since May 2021, according to the Statesman.

Abbott expressed support in his State of the State address in January for involving the Legislature in disaster declarations that deal with public health crises.

SENATE BACKS BOOST FOR **RETIRED TEACHERS**

The Texas Senate also unanimously approved a package that allocates \$4.7 billion from the budget surplus to increase monthly payments for retired teachers and gives a one-time bump to retirees over 75, the Statesman reported. The bill is now headed to the House for consideration.

The measure calls for a 2%raise for teachers who retired between Sept. 1, 2013, and Jan. 1, 2022, and a 4% raise for those who retired before Sept. 1, 2013. Senate Bill 10 also provides a one-time stipend of \$7,500 for retirees older than 75. The bill affects nearly a half-million retired teachers. "This is a significant finan-

cial commitment from the state," state Sen. Joan Huffman, R-Houston, said. "Many TRS retirees have been struggling for so long. We needed to do this.'

Retired teachers on average make \$2,100 a month through the Teachers Retirement Sys-

BOATERS, ANGLERS URGED TO AVOID COASTAL ROOKERIES

Anglers and boaters along the Texas coast are urged to watch out for nesting birds during this peak breeding and nesting season, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Brown pelicans, roseate spoonbills, black skimmers and reddish egrets are among the birds nesting in dense colonies, called rookeries. TPWD encourages folks to watch out for these nesting birds so they are not disturbed during a sensitive time.

"With too many disturbances, an entire colony of thousands of birds may abandon an island and give up on breeding for the year, which can potentially lead to drastic population declines," said Trey Barron, a diversity biologist with TPWD. "When approached too closely by boaters or people wading nearby, birds are frightened off their nests, leaving eggs and chicks exposed to the summer sun, which can cause them to overheat. The abandoned nests also allow opportunistic predators like gulls and grackles to quickly swoop in and feed on them."

Boaters and anglers are also encouraged to properly dispose of fishing line, tackle and other waste to ensure it does not harm birds, turtles or other marine life.

"The habitats that waterbirds use are the same habitats in which we - including myself - enjoy fishing, hunting and photographing wildlife," Barron said. "We just have to remember to give them their space, especially during the nesting season, and pick up after ourselves. If you're out on the water, look for the yellow signs that identify rookery islands and keep your distance. We can all enjoy the same places, as long as we do it responsibly."

HOUSE PASSES DIAPER, PERIOD PRODUCTS BILL

The Texas House last week overwhelmingly passed a bill repealing the state sales tax on diapers, period products, baby wipes and similar items. The measure now heads to the Sen-

Its sponsor, state Rep. Donna Howard, D-Austin, has tried for several sessions to get the measure passed.

"This bill provides an opportunity to help Texas families at every stage of life," Howard said Tuesday, as reported by The Dallas Morning News. The measure also exempts adult diapers.

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

The effluent will be discharged to Sheffied ditch, thence to Houston Ship Channel/Buffalo Bayou Tidal in Segment No. 1007 of the San Jacinto River Basin. The unclassified receiving water use is minimal aquatic life use for Sheffied ditch. The designated uses for Segment No. 1007 are navigation and industrial water supply.

In accordance with Title 30 Texas Administrative Code Section 307.5 and TCEQ's *Procedures to Implement the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards* (June 2010), an antidegradation review of the receiving waters was performed. A Tier 1 antidegradation review has preliminarily determined that existing water quality uses will not be impaired by this permit action.

Numerical and narrative criteria to protect existing uses will be maintained. A Tier 2 review is not required because no intermediate, high or exceptional aquatic-life-use water bodies have been identified in the discharge route. Existing uses will be maintained and protected. The preliminary determination can be reexamined and may be modified if new information is received.

The TCEQ executive director reviewed this action for consistency with the Texas Coastal Management Program (CMP) goals and policies in accordance with the regulations of the General Land Office and has determined that the action is consistent with the applicable CMP goals and policies.

The TCEQ executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, executive director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at Galena Park Library, 1500 Keene Street, Galena Park, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application.

Generally, the TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period; and the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

MAILING LIST. If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the executive director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. In addition, you may request to be added to: (1) the permanent list for a specific applicant name and permit number; and (2) the mailing list for a specific county. If you wish to be placed on the permanent and the county mailing list, clearly specify which list(s) and send your request to TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

All written public comments and public meeting requests must be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TCEQ, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087 or electronically at https://www14.tceq.texas.gov/epic/eComment/ within 30 days from the date of newspaper publication of this notice.


